Floydada Rodeo Begins Tonight

Time in Floydada. The annual Floydada rodeo is a three-day run (Friday) at 8:30 p.m. It is sponsored by the Rodeo Association, the Riding Club, and the Pony Express.

Rodeo events and fees are: bare back riding, \$20; saddle bronc riding, \$20; bull riding, \$20; calf roping, \$15; girls barrel race, \$15; team roping, \$17; junior flag race, \$3 (two divisions, 10 and under and 11-14 years).

Admission is 75¢ for children and \$1.50 for adults.

Floydada Wins City Beautification Award

The city of Floydada has been awarded a certificate of merit for progress shown in community improvement. The award came at the third annual "Beautify Texas Council" meeting held last Thursday in Austin. Governor Preston Smith made the presentation to Jake Webb, Chamber of Commerce president. Webb and John Reese, Chamber of Commerce manager, represented Floydada at the Council.

Floydada was among cities competing for the first three

Governor's Community Achievement Awards, which were presented to Atlanta, Graham, and Lockhart.

Other area cities receiving recognition in the program included: Brownfield, Happy, Littlefield, Morton and Quitaque. The awards went to cities under 12,000 population showing the most progress in community improvement.

The Chamber, along with City

officials, has sponsored a city-wide clean-up and beautification campaign which included street and alley maintenance,

burning off weeds on vacant lots, rehabilitation of slum areas, and removal of junk cars from the city.

Wheat Harvest Nears Three-Quarter Mark

Wheat harvest in the Floydada trade area is about 70% complete, according to local elevator officials. Yields on dry-land wheat harvested are reported to be above average to exceptional, averaging 15 to 20 bushels per acre with several fields yielding 25 bushels, and some as high as 35 bushels per acre.

Irrigated wheat yields have gone as high as 50 bushels per acre.

Crop damage from early June hail storms affected the total pounds of grain brought to local elevators, but the above-average yields on wheat harvested is expected to offset the total pound decrease somewhat.

Dry-land wheat farmers who missed the hail are experiencing yields of up to twice that of some previous years with the 20 to 25 bushel per acre harvest.

Heading for Cologne, leaving Amsterdam. People enjoy a slow, easy-going life. Amsterdam because of high taxes that allow poor people a way of life. Leave Amsterdam on boats via canals and modern buildings. Seeing some of Amsterdam with Mr. and Mrs. L. V. both Floydada natives. L. V. is an architect and director of Austin-Nederland N.U. The snow capped into the clouds on the other side of the lake. We traveled by boat up the Rhein River where we saw the hillsides. We saw what was left of the bridge, which the Americans crossed before the Germans destroy it in World War II. We traveled through the Black Forest country of Germany Switzerland... all very beautiful. Saw farmers cutting hay and raking it by hand. Of course we saw larger farms with tractors and hay equipment. We are getting exposed to a little culture along the way. Rembrandt Museum in Amsterdam and Beethoven's home. Our trail: Dallas, Mainz, Amsterdam, Utrecht, Cologne, Bonn, Koblenz, Bingen, Mainz, Darmstadt, Karlsruhe, Freiburg, Schaffhausen, Zurich and Lucerne. A series on Hippies. There seems to be a Hippie in the middle of each city. I enjoy visiting them and some from everywhere. Seeing how the Germans have recovered from the war; modern cities and now have one of the strongest economies world. (Of course this isn't true of Communist East Germany.) We take a cable car trip to the snow-capped top of Mt. Elbrus. Day after tomorrow we enter Peter Prischl's home. I shall try to telephone Peter's parents. 1,600,000 Gallons Of Water Pumped In City Tuesday

City wells pumped 1,600,000 gallons of water Tuesday, a million gallons over the average, as the town sweated in 106-degree heat. Temperatures played around the century mark all week long, with the city recording an official reading of 98 Monday. 103 degrees, recorded in the louvered enclosure at Producers Co-op Elevator. The 106-degree reading was recorded at KFLD radio, where a 101-degree reading was reported Monday. More of the same is in store, according to the weatherman, with a few clouds on the way to perhaps temper the heat some. Temperature was 98 at press time Wednesday.

Aerial Mosquito Spraying Scheduled For Tomorrow

Aerial spraying for mosquito control is scheduled to start tomorrow (Friday), according to City Manager Bill Feuerbacher. The city has contracted with Mel H. Christler of Christler Spraying Service, Thermopolis, Wyoming, to spray whenever needed.

Mosquito spraying will be over a 2,560-acre area centered around the Floydada city limits. Ultra-low-volume Malathion will be sprayed from a DC-3 Aircraft flying at low altitude over the four-section area.

Wednesday the City was in the process of getting FAA clearance for the spraying, and it is hoped that spraying will start on schedule Friday morning. Early morning hours around six o'clock are expected to be the best times for spraying. Temperatures of about 70 degrees and wind velocities of less than 10 miles per hour are needed for the spraying to be effective.

Other area cities contracting with the Christler Spraying Service include Plainview, Hale Center, Olton, Tulla, Abert, Kress, and possibly Edmonson, Feuerbacher said.

Funeral rites are to be held this afternoon (Thursday) at 2 o'clock in the Methodist Church in Ropesville for Albert J. Dunavant. A son stationed in Vietnam arrived in the states Tuesday night. Dunavant, 69, died of an apparent heart attack in Brownwood Monday afternoon about 5 o'clock. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Dunavant of Floyd County and moved here as a young man with his parents. He was born March 7, 1901 in Wyatt, Texas. The deceased had been a

longtime resident of Ropesville until moving to Brownwood. Survivors include his wife, the former Thelma Corley; three sons, Ray of Austin, Pat of Ropesville and Mike, stationed in Vietnam; three brothers, Phillip and Grady Dunavant of Floydada and Floyd of Hereford; four sisters, Mrs. Vera Rhodes, Shallowater; Myra Dunavant, Floydada; Eula Jones, Lockney and Joy Wright of Sand Springs, Okla., and five grandchildren. Dunavant was preceded in death by one daughter.

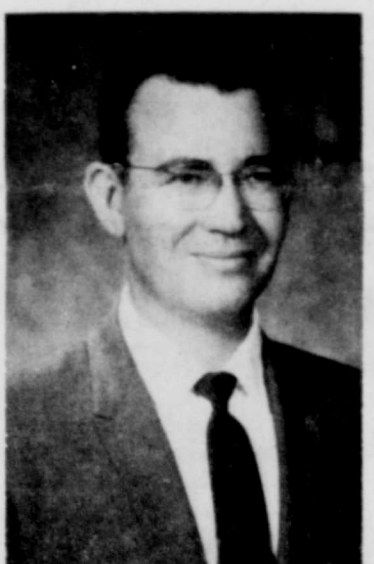
Pastor To Preach At Victory Revival

King died in the Floydada Nursing Home yesterday morning about 6 o'clock. He had been a resident there for the past five years. The deceased was born in Jack County, Texas, September 10, 1876 and married Alice Smith December 23, 1900 in Carter, Okla. The family came to Floyd County in 1904 and King farmed until his retirement. He was preceded in death by his wife, who died in 1957, and two daughters, Ethyl, who died at the age of six, and Mrs. Tressie McCracken. King was a member of the Baptist Church. Survivors include one son, Eddie King of Floydada; three daughters, Mrs. Emmitt (Ruth) Dutton and Mrs. Hubert (Flos) Ellis, both of Floydada and Mrs. Ralph (Jessie) McGhee of Lockney; six grandchildren, 11 great grandchildren and one sister, Lula McDonald of Woodward, Okla. Dr. Floyd C. Bradley will officiate for the rites. Interment will be in Floydada Cemetery with Moore-Rose Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

For the "hate-to-cook" homemaker, may we suggest quick tricks with rolls. Serve one or all of these when you entertain with a brunch or coffee or surprise the family with your cooking skill!

For your creativeness, it is important to keep a supply of Brown 'n Serve rolls on hand. (Freeze and keep up to 12 months in your freezer.) Try one of the following recipes or create your own:

APRICOT NUT ROLLS
1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine
1/3 cup apricot jam
3 tablespoons chopped pecans

12 rolls
Combine jam and butter. Spread bottom of an ungreased shallow pan. Sprinkle nuts over apricot mixture. Place rolls with tops down, over mixture. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes. Let stand in pan a minute or longer, after removing from oven. Invert pan and serve warm.

TUTTI-FRUTTI ROLLS
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/4 cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons corn syrup
2 teaspoons orange rind
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
2 tablespoons seedless raisins

2 tablespoons chopped Marshino cherries
1/4 cup coarsely chopped pecans
1/4 cup shredded coconut
12 rolls

Melt butter in shallow baking dish. Stir in sugar, syrup, orange rind, cinnamon, raisins, cherries, pecans and coconut. Place rolls, top side down over mixture. Bake at 400

degrees for 15 minutes. Let stand in pan a minute or longer, after removing from oven. Invert pan and serve warm.

JEWEL BUNS
12 rolls
2/3 cup jelly or preserves
1 1/2 cups sifted powdered sugar

1 1/2 tablespoons milk
Cut half-way through the center of each roll with a 1-inch round cookie cutter, using a twisting motion. Remove centers and fill with jelly just to the top. Place on cookie sheet and bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Combine sugar and milk; mix until creamy and smooth. Spread sugar mixture over top of hot rolls around jelly center.

PINEAPPLE COCONUT ROLLS
1/4 cup drained crushed pineapple
1/4 cup shredded coconut
1/3 cup brown sugar
2 tablespoons pineapple syrup

3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
8 rolls
Combine all ingredients except rolls. Spread over bottom of ungreased shallow baking dish. Place rolls, with tops down, over mixture. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes. Let rolls stand in pan a minute, or longer, after removing from oven. Invert pan to remove rolls so that fruit mixture is up. Serve warm.

when I visited the first picnic they had. The late Dr. Kimble and John Kimble had fitted me with several pairs of glasses. And the late Dr. Thacker pulled purty ny all of my teeth and I know quite a lot of folks in and around there. In the early days my Daddy operated a blacksmith shop here in Petersburg and did work for a lot of the old timers of western Floyd Co. such as Grandpa Carr, in which Carrs Chapel Church was named for, Uncle Dave Allmon for which the Allmon Community was named after, Grandpa McCoy of the McCoy community and many many others of the early day settlers.

I liked to sit around my Daddys shop and listen to them tell of the hardships they had to bear in the olden days; they would load a wagon of maize heads in the afternoon, get up real early next morning, for Floydada they would head. Sometimes it would be so cold with a blue Norther blowing they would have to walk on the south side of the wagon to keep from freezing. You just couldn't sit on a load of maize and brave one of our old time blue northers we used to have here. When they got to town they had their maize weighed up and after unloading it most of the time in a box car, they would drive a ways down the railroad and shovel a ton or more of coal into their wagons and head for home, arriving most of the time quite a while after dark. Sometimes they had to go to the house and thaw out before they could unhitch their team and feed them.

How lucky our present generation is to have all the modern ways to do things. Can't you just picture one of our present day farmers walking fifteen or twenty miles along the side of a wagon load of maize? That was a hard way to serve the Lord but on top of all the hardships folks in those days enjoyed life as well and maybe better than some do nowadays. They had their good old time revivals with dinner all day and preaching on the ground as they would say in those days.

About once a week there would be a party at some neighbor's home and all the young folks were invited. They would play a lot of games and every so often the party would wind up by opening up a ten gallon can of ice cream that someone had gone to town and bought, and all of the boys would chip in and pay them for the trip and ice cream. They also had picnics, old time threshing days, quilting parties where you could get the latest in community happenings. In those days there were fewer people and lived quite a distance apart and they were just glad to see one another at any place or time.

Well I could just go on and on telling about pioneer life on these plans of West Texas, and maybe some time I will write some more if Mr. Tooley don't object.

Do inverted air masses cause tornadoes? Are the causes of tornadoes all known and understood?

Many weather experts (if there are any) agree that inverted air masses make for tornado conditions. This is logical from the standpoint that heavier air falling through to lower altitudes is likely to set off all sorts of disturbances and whirls.

The varied causes of tornadoes are not fully understood—even with all the modern scientific knowledge and weather satellites at our disposal. The theory that inverted air masses produce tornadoes is one of several. This theory holds that heavier air, pouring down, gets turned, or twisted, in a whirlwind manner, and creates one or more tornadoes.

The inversion and the rushing and falling air masses might cover an area of approximately one hundred miles or more, while the small tornadoes created might be separated by many miles, some never touching the surface of the earth. One small tornado, either bouncing off the surface or staying above, is often the result of an inversion—though several are more often produced.

menace lurking, the sand worm. The unwelcome visitor is said to be a parasite derived from the intestines of dogs and cats. Over the years our Senators and Congressmen have arrived at the conclusion that there are no ills that an increase in the amount of money spent can't cure. It is proposed to apply this to Increasing Secretaries Proficiency. The plan covers a Pilot Program of only 100 people before putting it into effect on a national scale.

Relying on the statement that more money solves all problems, it is proposed to increase the annual pay of secretaries in the pilot program by the sum of \$9,000 a year above their present salary. This figure has been arrived at by using the same amount one Congressman increased the wages of his secretary after he married her.

On this basis, the sum seemed fair. It would allow these young ladies to have a sports car, take an annual vacation in foreign lands and otherwise lead the good life and by so doing raise their Secretariatism. It is believed that this increased pay will automatically show them how to spell, add, properly place the decimal point, punctuate, know where the various Pittsburgs are (with and without the H) and other facts of business that come within their province, and that it will overcome all and sundry deficiencies they may have had previously.

To finance this program, one must use the same principle our Senators and Congressmen apply. As there are roughly 600 Congressmen and Senators, the amount needed for each Secretary would amount to but \$15 a year for each member, or 30¢ a week, or on an hourly basis of 40 hours, the insignificant sum of 7/10 cents per hour.

100 secretaries could be put on this program and it would cost business nothing and our Congressmen and Senators but 70¢ an hour out of their bank account. This is only 1/3 of what they propose to be the minimum wage every business may pay unskilled help. Surely they cannot object to doing only one-third of what they expect

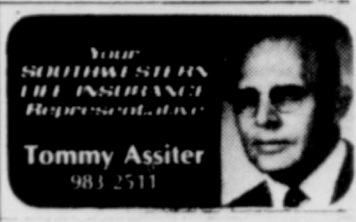
