FIRST, I called Mr. Coltharp to get ALL the facts AND the reasons for the decision the administration made to abolish the "graduation" as it has always been. I was given the utmost consideration by Mr. Coltharp and he went to great lengths to give me the answers I sought. He was extremely reasonable and thanked me for my interest and attitude. Never ONCE did he even HINT that the matter was no concern of mine. In fact he carefully outlined the CORRECT procedures for airing a grievance with the school system and gave me every assurance that if enough opinion against this decision was voiced in a calm and reasonable manner, he would work WITH any interested parent to work out a solution to the problem.

I don't believe this is an exceptional attitude on Mr. Coltharp's part. I believe he knows full well that his position carries with it the responsibility to LISTEN as well as to SPEAK.

I intend to send a copy of this letter to Mr. Coltharp and hope it expresses my faith in his fairness. With it, I will send the names of people I have contacted and who would like to voice their opinions concerning this matter. I am confident each person's opinion will be considered and every effort will be made to solve this and any problem presented.

Dear Wendell:

I have before me a copy of the petition sent to the President by you and others in regard to the future of the Agricultural Conservation program. I appreciate having the benefit of your views on this important matter.

As you may know, on many occasions in recent years the budgets submitted by Presidents of both parties have not requested funds for the continuation of the Agricultural Conservation program. The budget for the current fiscal year requested no ACP funds but the Appropriations Committee, which I head, recommended \$195.5 million, the same amount available last year. The Senate subsequently provided \$190 million but Senate-House conferees have now agreed to the \$195.5 million figure. I think you will be interested in the attached statement contained in the Conference Report on the appropriations bill in regard to the ACP program.

I have always strongly supported this and other conservation activities and I assure you of my continued desire to work with all concerned to maintain an aggressive program in this area.

Let me hear from you at any time.

Amendment No. 39: Agricultural conservation program. - Establishes a 1971 program of \$195,500,000 as proposed by the House instead of \$190,000,000 as proposed by the Senate. The conferees agreed to call on the Department to announce the 1971 program, which should have been announced months ago, including therein all programs, practices and procedures available in the calendar year 1970 program and such changes as may be recommended by the county committee and approved by the State committee.

The conferees have not included compulsory instructions in the Act, as in the past, choosing rather to rely on the good faith of the Department in carrying out these provisions. In taking this action, the conferees considered the fact that ACP is the best program for fighting pollution at its source. The Department reports that about 85% of the funds were related to pollution control and abatement. Typical is the fact that ACP has shared costs with the farmer in the construction of 2 million sediment and water holding structures.

We are in a very special neighborhood. There are no racial problems here in this country. We get our "roots" down I'll be fine. It's just so it would be the same if we had moved to Illinois or any time.

very nice slow town and you can double park anywhere you take all day to do some very short shopping. The European flavor as I said it takes all day to learn to slow down. In the Bank which we are always, we are the first Americans to open an account. How unique we are and the old English laws are new to us.

The natives can't believe there's someone in the trunk (boot, its called over here). depreciation was \$59,802. This left a net profit on electricity of \$70,426.00. The net investment in facilities is \$725,087 and the return on the investment is 9.7% \$70,401 electric profit and \$34,500 water profit were transferred to the general fund.

The mayor reported the following other incomes for the city in 1970: Taxes \$103,121, sanitation department \$45,441, citizens contribution to paving projects \$60,372, occupation and franchise tax \$10,343, court fines \$7,598, and miscellaneous income \$18,224.

MONEY PAID OUT

The mayor then itemized the costs of operating the city's many services for the year 1970: administration \$54,963, police \$38,604, sanitation \$37,929, fire dept. \$18,712, street dept. \$45,512, park department \$8,525, health dept. \$3,147, airport dept. \$1,463, miscellaneous expense \$378.00, capital outlay \$54,490.

With a total expense of operation \$263,723, debt payment of \$10,473, a net revenue of \$75,804 is realized in the 1970 operation of the city. \$46,000 of this amount was used in the city's share of paying the Texas addition, \$22,000 was paid on the new fire truck, leaving a net of \$7,804.

CITY'S INDEBTEDNESS

The mayor also revealed the city's indebtedness, a total of \$650,000 owing on the electrical plant \$507,000 owing on the water system, \$118,000 tax bonds. (Paid out of tax collections). 17% of tax collections go to bond payments.

This would make a total indebtedness for the city of \$1,338,000.00. However the city has in reserves and cash some \$271,904, which would reduce the debt to \$1,066,000.00.

City manager Bill Feuerbacher accompanied the mayor on his visit to the Rotary Club.

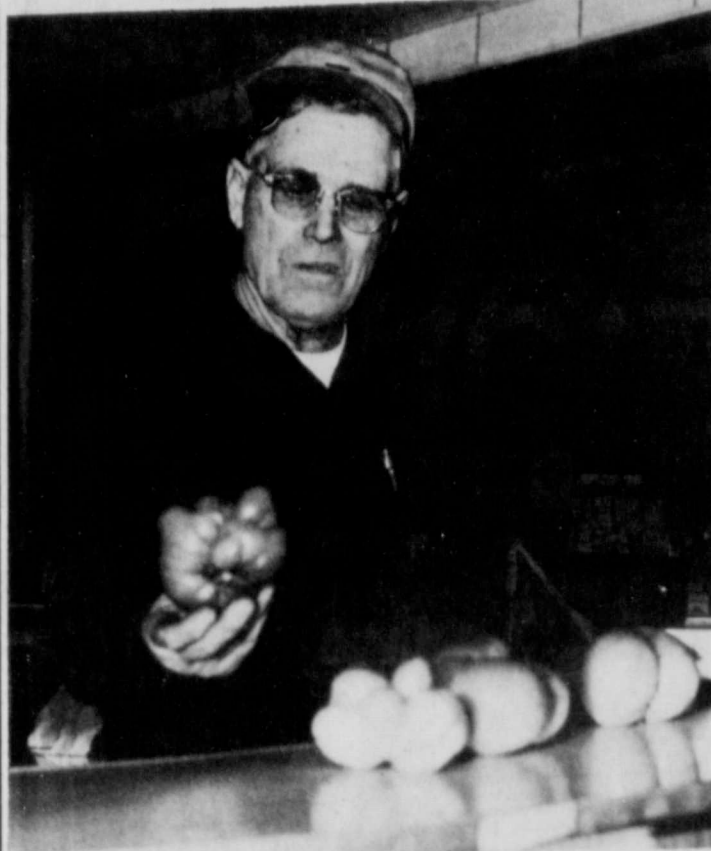
