The 27th annual Floyd County Junior Fat Stock Show kicks off here Monday, activities beginning at 7 a.m., when the show barn opens and weighing of animals gets underway.

The event is sponsored by the Floyd County Junior Fat Stock Show Association, the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, the County Vocational Agricultural Departments and the County Extension Service.

About 371 animals are entered in this year's show, County Agent Doyle Warren said yesterday, including 199 barrows, 110 lambs and 62 steers. This compares with 324 last year.

Animals are to be weighed and sifted Monday and judged Tuesday, the judging of swine beginning at 9 a.m., lambs at 1 p.m. and steers at 3 p.m. The auction sale is scheduled for 1 p.m. Wednesday, Thursday at 7 p.m. Floyd County Farm Bureau, Plainview Production Credit and the Floyd County Co-ops will sponsor a banquet for 4-H and FFA exhibitors and their parents at the Lockney Elementary School Cafeteria.

## City Election Uncontested

# Seven Enter School Board Race

Seven persons had filed Tuesday for election to the Floydada Independent School District board of trustees. Voters of the district will choose three trustees in the April 3 election. Two of the three board

members whose terms expire in April, Bill Hale and Newell Burk, announced last week that they would not seek re-election. The other incumbent, Thomas Warren, was the first to file for a trustee position, on Tuesday of last week. Mrs. Chuck (Betty) Holmes, sales manager at KFLL Radio, announced her candidacy Tuesday.

Other school board hopefuls are Harvey Allen, Lighthouse Electric employee; Joe Hesson, Joe's 7-11 Grocery; Arlis Powell, Powell Super Market; Harold Vinson, farmer in the McCoy community; and O. N. Bertrand, Lakeview farmer.

Two terms expire on the county school board - C. C. Whittle's in Precinct 1 and H. E. Frizzell's in Precinct 2. County Judge J. K. Holmes said Tuesday afternoon that Whittle and Frizzell had filed for re-election.

In the Dougherty Common School District, the terms of Wayne Rainwater and Ray Gene Carthel expire, and both seek to succeed themselves in the April elections. Bob Ross is also a candidate for Dougherty trustee.

At South Plains, Kendis Julian's and Eugene Beedy's terms expire. Julian is seeking re-election. Beedy had not filed Tuesday.

The Dougherty and South Plains elections will be held April 3 at the respective school houses.

## CITY COUNCIL ELECTION

Also set for April 3 is a city election to name two councilmen and a mayor. Tuesday afternoon, only the expiring-term incumbents, mayor Jimmy Seay and councilmen Ed Hammond and Boone Adams, had announced they were running for the

posts. Filing deadline for both the city and school board candidates was yesterday.

Candidates for the Caprock Hospital board of directors have until March 9 to present petitions to the board secretary, requesting that their names be printed on the ballot. The petitions must be signed by 25 qualified voters of the district.

Through Tuesday afternoon, two candidates had applied for the two hospital board spots - Jay S. Hale Jr., and W. F. Daniel, Jr. Hale's term, along with Walton Hale's, expires in April.

## Council Approves Building Addition

In a special called meeting of the Floydada city Council Monday, the council approved a building addition for northeast Floydada. The building is to take place in block seven of the Honerhea addition of the city between 12th Street (the Silverton highway) and 14th Street from East Lee to Thornton Street.

Herman Temple Jr. of Plainview is the builder of the low income housing project. Approximately 15 building sites were approved. The city is to extend water and sewer service and two paved streets to the area, east of the Silverton Highway. Families qualify for the low income housing on a basis of income and family size. Loan interest rates are low, and are also determined on family income/size basis. Some families may qualify for a no-down-payment loan with 40 years to pay. In other business at the special called council meeting, bids on repainting the city's elevated water tanks were rejected, as the council considered all bids too high.

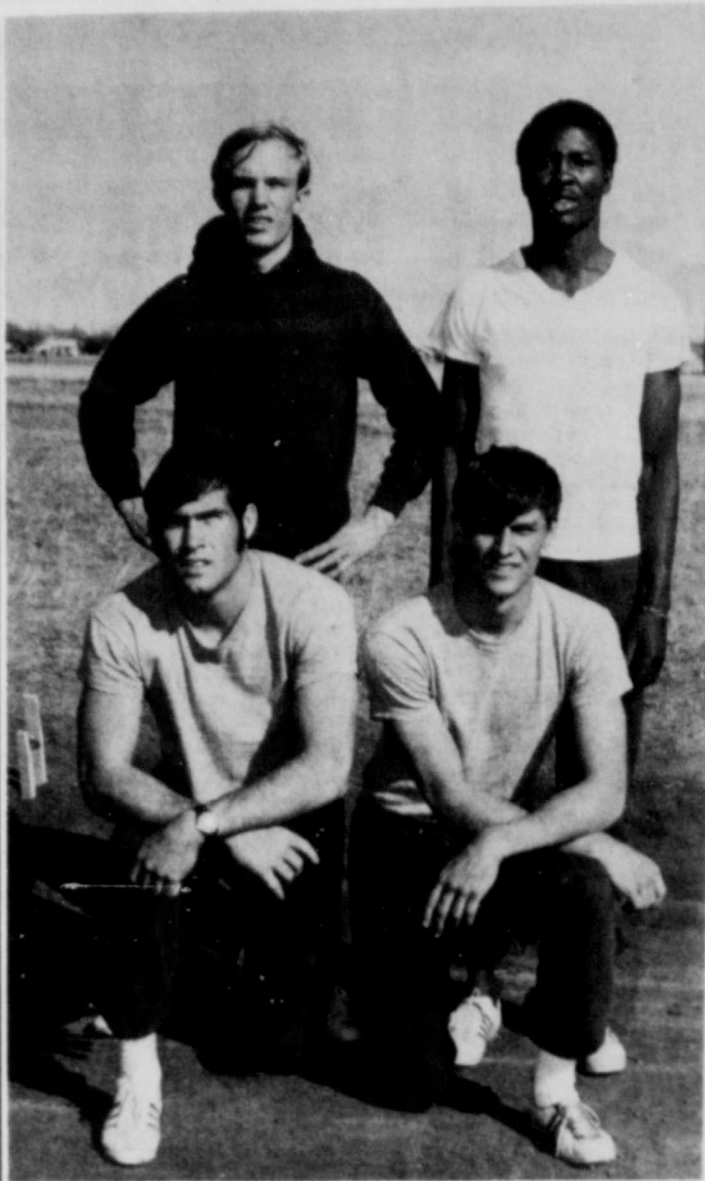

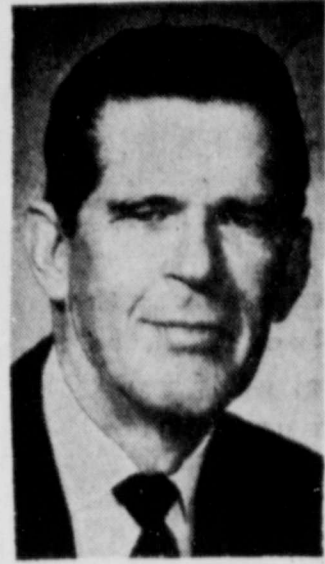

A. Write or visit your social security office and tell them when you expect to retire. Do this at least 3 months before you retire so you can get your first check soon after you stop working.



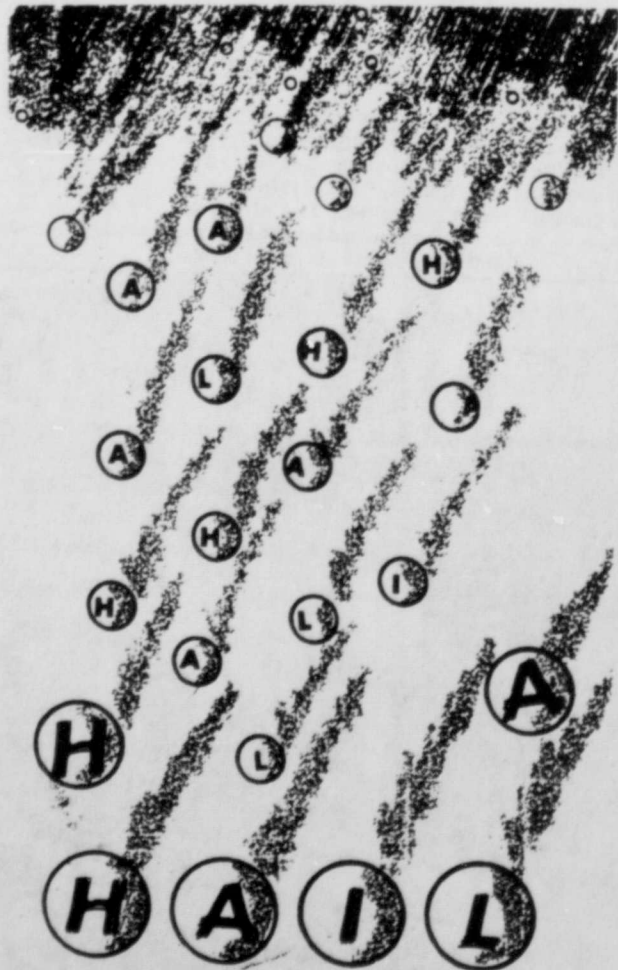

assets will be instantly available to all industrial firms considering new plant sites in Texas.

Sheffield presented Jake Webb who served as the commission's local coordinator for the project, a massive 88 page printout containing 1444 items of information on the Floydada area. Local award recipients collected data for 393 items of information on the printout and the balance were collected for the community by the commission staff.

As soon as the local group has reviewed the information and suggested any changes necessary, a computerized Community Analysis Report will be available that shows how Floydada compares with other cities of similar size on the factors that industrialists look for in locating new plants. Using the Community Analysis Report as a guide, Floydada leaders will be able to plan effective measures to spur local economic growth.

"The next phase in the development of the computer program is to match Floydada plant location resources with a profile of the location requirements of all types of expanding industries", Sheffield said.

"This will enable us at the commission to help you concentrate your industrial development program on companies you have the best chance of attracting to Floydada", Sheffield continued.

Statewide, more than 14,000 business and civic leaders in 390 Texas cities will receive the special citations for their part in making the new program possible.

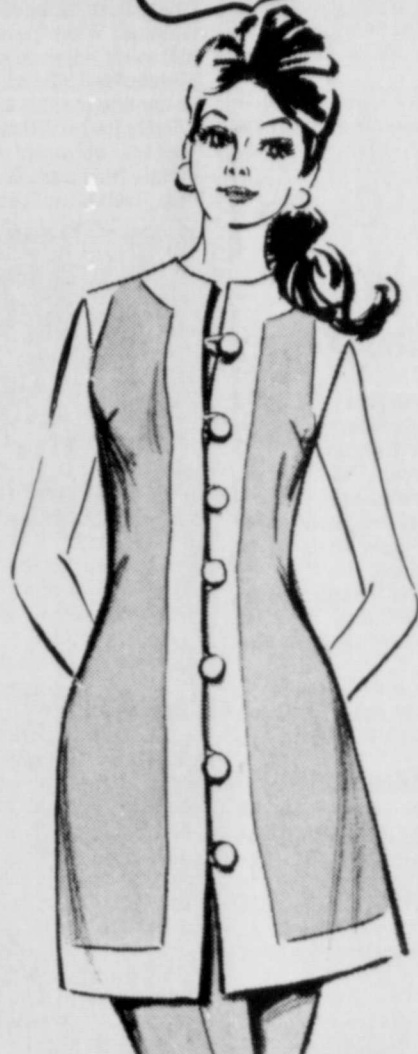

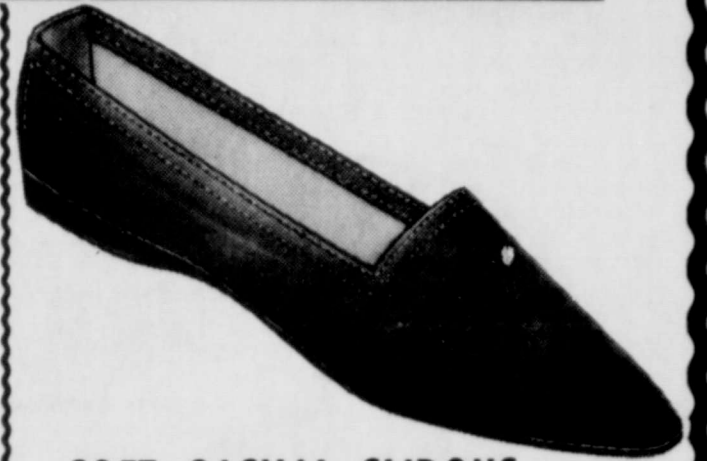

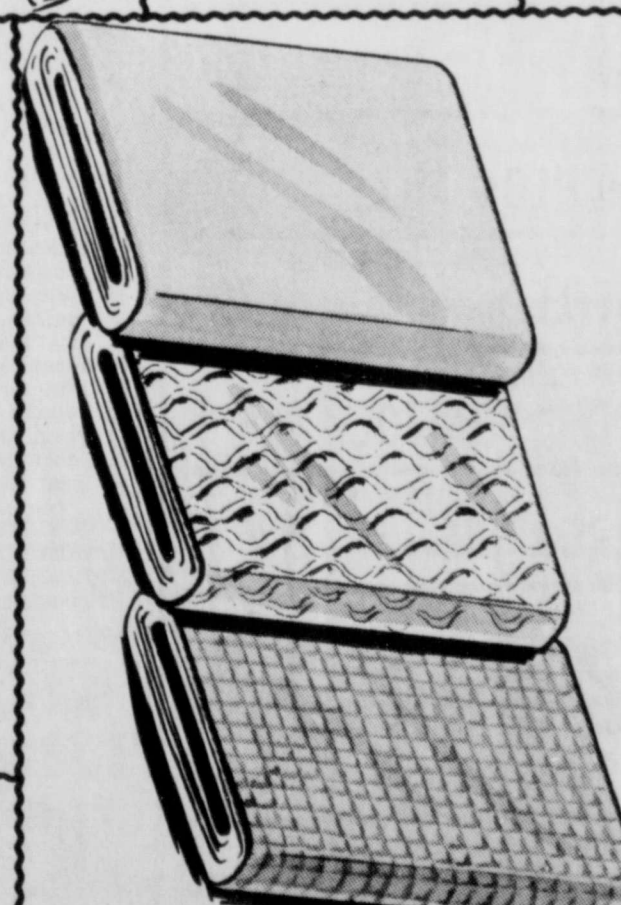

## Peggy's Meddlin's

In a recent letter to the editor of the Plainview Daily Herald, Dr. Dale Seigler, father of Steve Seigler, 16th, serviceman of Plainview to die in Vietnam, wrote of these boys and others who have lost their lives. His letter contained such heart touching comments that I wish to pass it along to others. Speaking of the boys, he wrote "All these boys were very dear to us and can never be replaced. We are heartbroken and life will never again be the same for the loved ones they left behind."

"It would be easy to be bitter but instead we are very proud of our boys. Thank God, we still have young men who are willing to fight and die, if necessary, for our country. When our servicemen are home on leave each one of us should thank them for the job they are doing."

He went on to point out that there is much talk these days about the "younger generation" and reminded us that those young men who gave their lives also are a part of that "younger generation."

"I think we are leaving our heritage in excellent hands," said Dr. Seigler. "I can't help but believe that one of the reasons we have such outstanding young men in Plainview is that

many of these boys start their young lives by taking an oath which begins with these words: On My Honor, I Will Do My Best, To Do My Duty To God And My Country."

I would like to add to Dr. Seigler's words, that goes for Floyd County boys too.

A TOP heart surgeon has predicted that a technique known as "by pass surgery" will become the "cardiac surgery of the 1970's." Dr. Denton A. Cooley of St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital in Houston, said his team has used the operation on 303 patients with a 10.9 per cent mortality rate in the past year, making the new procedure much safer than a heart transplant.

ONE of the most common phrases heard in our society and bigger cities today is "police brutality." Perhaps I don't understand the meaning, but I would like to give you one mother's point of view on the subject. She is the wife of a minister in one of our larger towns and the mother of two teen-age sons. She is a typical mother in one way, not wanting them hurt by anyone, in another way, she is not a typical mother for she sees many things other mothers never see or hear of. Being a minister's wife she sees the very best and the sordid worst.

Her open letter to the Chief of Police of the bigger city

is as follows: I would like for you to be brutal with my sons. Is that a surprise? If you find them speeding in a car, please be brutal. I have sat at a hospital holding a grieving mother's hand because of someone's mistake. That was brutal. I have gone with my husband to tell a wife her husband was killed. That was brutal. I have helped nurse a beautiful teen-age girl crippled in a wreck. That was brutal. I have played organ music at funeral services for babies, teen-agers, and adults, because someone drove too fast. If you should catch my under-age sons with liquor in their possession, please be brutal.

I have sat all night by my husband's side trying to piece together two under-age young men's lives, both broken by drinking. That was brutal. I have listened to the horrors experienced by another man while he was drunk and heard him recall the many jails he has served time in for this. That was brutal. I have helped feed hungry children because a drunken father didn't come home. That was brutal. I have tried to console a mother whose daughter was killed after being struck by a drunken driver. That was brutal.

If you should find my sons with drugs in their possession, please be brutal.

I have tried to rehabilitate a woman just out of prison for shooting her husband while she was drugged. That was brutal. I have seen a handsome young man turn into an old ugly one because of drugs. That was brutal. I have seen a young mother who was addicted to a drug scream and rave for a lack of a "fix."

That was brutal. If you find my sons committing any kind of immoral act or carrying any pornographic materials, please be brutal! I have listened to the sad cry of a young girl who was pregnant but not married. That was brutal.

If police ever see persons doing something that isn't thoroughly in the interest of society, please be brutal. I have walked into a hushed, sacred church that was stripped of everything that could be sold. That was brutal. I have seen a lovely, expensive home and yard completely torn up by vandals. That was brutal. I have seen a school and its marvelous equipment torn apart by young vandals. That was brutal. I have wiped a little boy's tears and helped him hunt for his stolen bicycle. That was brutal.

If you should ever catch my sons doing anything illegal, please be brutal. I have come to realize that your kind of "brutality" cannot in any way compare with the brutality that comes from breaking our laws.

My husband and I have tried to teach our sons that their rights end where someone else's begin. We believe they have learned this lesson, but in case they forget, we look to you and others who influence their lives - teachers, coaches, etc., to see that they remember.

I do not want my two sons to grow into two grown-up boys. I want them to become men, able to assume their places in this world and make good contributions to it. I sincerely hope they won't need your help; but if they do, and if you must, then be brutal.

**VA Sets Mobile Home Rates**

The Veterans Administration announces that the rate of interest on GI Loans to buy mobile homes has been set at 10.75 percent.

Purchase of mobile homes under the GI Loan Program was authorized for the first time by the Veterans Housing Act of 1970, and Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson says that 20,000 Veterans are expected to make purchases during the first year of the program.

Johnson said that two-thirds of the loans would be granted to Vietnam Era Veterans.

VA will guarantee up to 30 percent of a loan for mobile home, up to a maximum of \$10,000 for the loan. Once the loan is paid, the Veteran is again eligible for a guaranteed loan on a conventional house, a guarantee that may go as high as \$12,500.

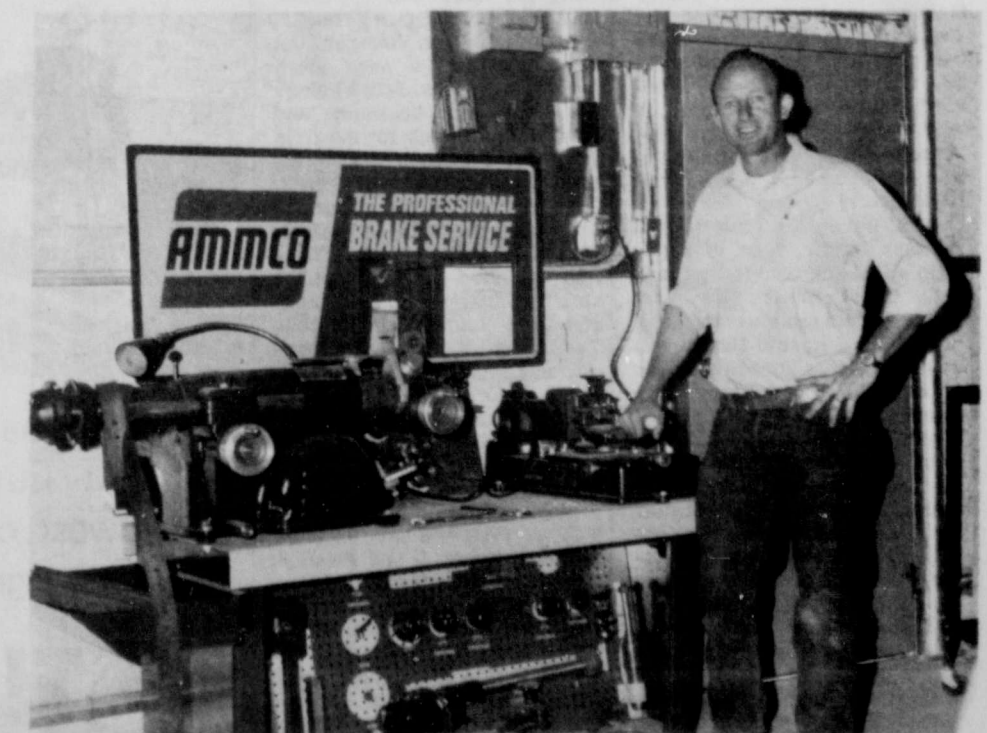

### My Political Feathers Plucked

"I was a corporal, but I  
have been reduced," - Three  
musketees.

Shortly after I began editing  
The Hesperian I was given a  
lesson in human behavior that  
was hard to take - and for me  
it still is - namely, to conform.  
This lack has cost me money  
and even friends, not to be able  
to conform with good grace.

Judge J.N. Stalbird of Lock-  
ney, Democratic county chair-  
man, called me one morning in  
June. He wanted me to come  
over to the courthouse to help  
prepare the ballots for the July  
primary in 1912. I was flatter-  
ed and willing to help the  
party and my friend, the judge.

It took us quite awhile to paw  
through that dusty accumulation  
in the basement storage room  
and round up enough boxes with  
keys and locks that would fit

and have them ready for deli-  
very to the presiding judges.  
Judge Stalbird and the execu-  
tive committee had already  
done all the other preliminar-  
ies.

Next thing (in 1914) you know  
I was appointed party chairman  
for Precinct No. 1. I was flatter-  
ed again, beginning to get up  
in the world I thought.  
But my feathers were plucked  
that very year.

In 1912 it was Colquitt and  
Ramsey in the run-off for gov-  
ernor. The hot, hot issue was  
prohibition. Feeling was rather  
intense. No other issue counted.  
Prohibition in this county be-  
came a symbol of good citizen-  
ship to many people.

There was nothing good that  
could be said for an anti that  
was a candidate for governor,  
whatever else he might be pol-

itically. So "Colquitt" was a  
dirty word.

Made A Good Governor

When Mr. Colquitt won the  
office he made a good governor.  
The Texas Almanac says "his  
administration was charac-  
terized by economy, prison  
system reform, prompt steps  
to protect the border along the  
Rio Grande; Also passage of  
statutes of permanent effect,  
including regulation of hours  
of women workers, child la-  
bor law, workers' compensa-  
tion, home rule for cities of  
more than 5,000 and judicial  
reform."

What the Almanac did not  
mention is that the governor  
responsive to the mandate at  
the polls, gave strong support  
to enforcement of the prohibi-  
tion laws.

"The people want enforce-

ment of the liquor laws, I have  
tried to give that to them,"  
he said. The sheriff of this  
county at the time confirmed  
this.

So I supported Colquitt for  
a second term. This fact came  
to light at the precinct con-  
vention and I was raked over  
the coals good. After the  
speaking motion was made to  
put me out of office, the vote  
was unanimous. I was not only  
a black sheep but a "lost"  
black sheep.

In the summer two years  
later Judge Stalbird called me  
to come over again. He needed  
help to prepare for the prim-  
ary election. I did and we did,

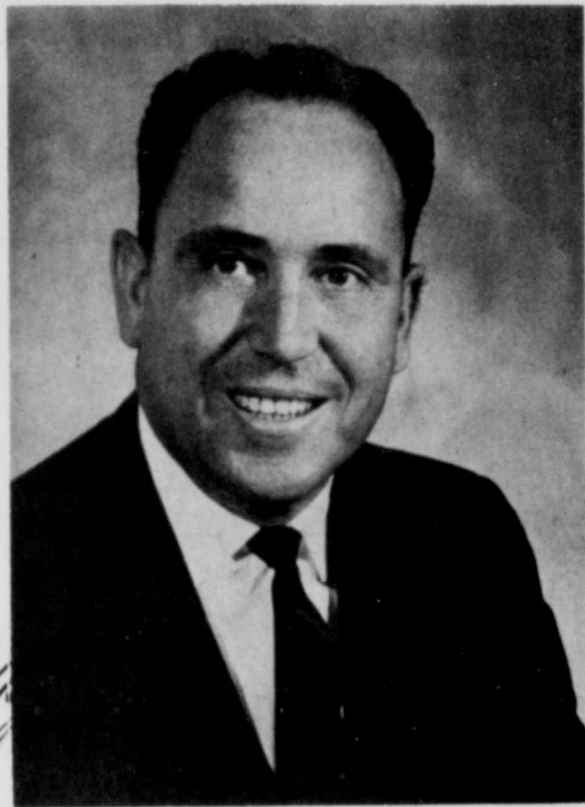

**CD CAP Sets Mock Tornado Sunday**

Floydada Civil Defense and Civil Air Patrol will engage in a planning exercise Sunday, March 7, according to CAP commander Richard Thomas. A "mock tornado" will hit the city of Floydada at 1:30 p.m., the fire sirens will sound a repeated long blast, and the Civil Defense and CAP operation will test disaster procedures. The City fire department, police department and some city officials will be involved, Thomas said.

Radio station KFLD will broadcast information about the "mock tornado" during the exercise, and the station is co-operating with the local CD-CAP by broadcasting publicity releases and bulletins prior to the operation.

Thomas said that anyone who would like to participate in the drill is welcome, and especially invited are those with wreckers, boom trucks, or any other type of equipment which might be used in rescue operations in a tornado or other disaster, and those with automobile citizens band radio equipment.

The "mock tornado" will cut a path five to six blocks wide northeast from approximately Ollie Avenue and Third Street to Jackson Street and the Silverton Highway.

Activity will be restricted to the streets of the area and will not infringe on private property, Thomas said. EOC, Emergency Operation Center, will be at City Hall, which will also be the site of a critique after the exercise. The drill will last until about 3:30 or 4 p.m.

This is a MOCK tornado, a drill only, Thomas emphasized, and the sirens will not be blown if the weather is threatening or if severe weather warnings are issued.

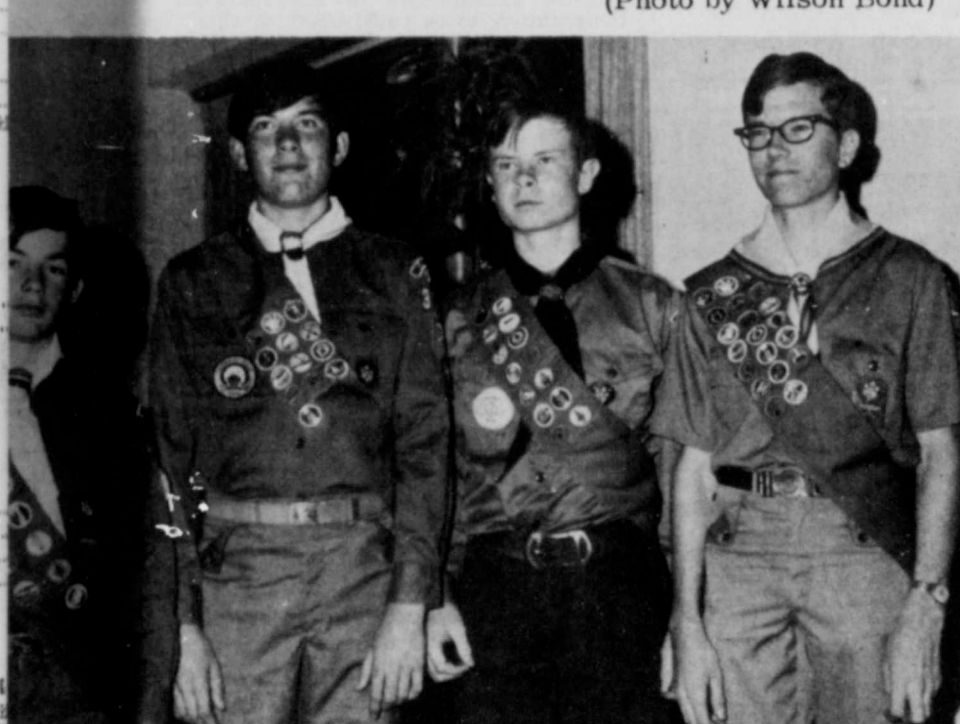
