

Weed District Directors Named

Final returns from the ballots mailed in for the Board of Directors for the Floyd County Noxious Weed Control District gave the positions to L. B. Brandes, Charlie Perry, and J.

A. Colston. Brandes replaces Cecil Baxter as District at Large, Perry replaces William Bertrand in Precinct 1 and Colston replaces James Lee Nichols in Precinct

At the present time the Weed Control is applying herbicides on fence row, around irrigation wells for weed control, since bindweed is beginning to show. It will be difficult to work this type of treatment; the District will have to spend as much time as possible on bindweed

control. The District has again signed a contract with the State Highway Department where they furnish the herbicide and the Weed District will make the application. The herbicide can only be applied adjacent to farm land where bindweed control is being carried out or where the adjacent farm land is free from bindweed.

The District plans to begin treatment on county barrow ditches. The herbicide being used for this treatment is a soil sterilant and will be applied only adjacent to farms where control practices are being carried out.



District Camporee Set This Weekend

Steps Aired On Controlling Verticillium In Cotton LUBBOCK - Verticillium wilt, caused by a soil-borne

fungus, takes its toll of cotton on the High Plains every year, especially in the heavier soils during cool, wet periods of the growing season. However there are several steps that producers can take to combat this disease. "First of all , producers

that have a history of wilt in their fields should consider planting adapted tolerant varieties," points out Dr. Earl Minton, USDA plant pathologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock. "A number of tolerant varieties are available such as Paymaster 909, Tamcot 788. Acala 3080 and Acala 1517V. A number of other varieties also have some degree of wilt tolerance."

Certain cultural practices can reduce the damage from Verticillium wilt, adds the plant pathologist. Rotations have reduced the disease considerably at the A&M Center. Crops that have reduced the incidence of wilt, in order of their effectiveness, are barley, wheat, grain sorghum, castors and soybeans.

"We have found that a threeyear rotation is much more effective in reducing Verticillium wilt than one or two years," says Minton. "Also, the effect of the rotations are not evident after three years of continuous cotton, so we encourage producers to avoid growing cotton continuously on the same field for more than three years."

In studies at the A&M Center, cotton yields have been increased by most rotation treatments, Fiber and seed quality have also been improved by rotations.

Minton also encourages producers to follow a good weed control program in order to reduce Verticillium wilt in cotton. Careless weed is one of the many hosts of the fungus.

"Producers should avoid deep cultivation during the growing season," cautions Minton, "since the fungus readily penetrates injured roots. Proper timing and application of irrigation water and nitrogen fertilizer and practices that increase the soil temperature also help control the disease,"

Skip - row planting and an adequate plant population (four to six plants per foot of row) will further reduce losses from Verticillium wilt. According to the plant path-

ologist, chemical control of the disease has been ineffective. onset and reducing the rate of development of the disease from two to four weeks have increased yields and improved fiber and seed qualities. So, the time to take steps to combat Verticillium wilt in cotton is right now."

Wilt attacks cotton at all stages of growth. The outstanding symptom is the mottling of the leaves with yellow areas between the veins and on the margin. The woody stem near the soil line also takes on a brownish discoloration. Infected plants generally shed their leaves and many bolls. Bolls: often open prematurely, producing poor quality fiber and seed. In serious infestations, plants may be killed almost immediately by the disease, adds Minton.

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm turns economist this week, more or less. Dear editar:

One of those serious columnists had a column in this newspaper I found out here yesterday expressing righteous indignation over some people who were feeling sorry for the million high-priced white-collar workers who have been layed off recently.

"Why," he asked, "should you feel sorry for them? Here's a man who's been making \$40,000 a year or more, he gets layed off, and immediately has to draw unemployment compensation because he hasn't got a cent in the bank and has a big mortgage on his home and three cars. Why hadn't he been saving his money all along?"

That writer clearly doesn't understand modern-day economics.

Why would a man with three cars still owe on them. Because if he'd paid cash he could have bought only one, what with payments on his boat and his \$75,000 home and his trip to Europe, and that means two other cars went un-bought, and you multiply that by a million and you've reduced the national car output by 2 million, and you figure up how much the economy would lose by not making those 2 million cars, counting all the people and materials it takes to make them plus all the gas and oil and tires and repairs it takes to keep them moving, plus all the work to build and maintain the highways it takes to run them on, and you can see what trouble this country would

It's all right for some people to save their money, looks like there's no way to stop it, but if everybody did, if everybody waited till he could pay cash for everything he bought, no telling what would happen to the economy.

Outside of groceries, I don't know of anything that's bought with cash these days. You'd be surprised at how many Cadilacs are bought on the installment plan. Most daily newspapers are bought by the month, and a lot of them by the day. You name it, television sets, cars, clothes, washing machines, air conditioners, political office, everything these days is bought on time with borrowed money

It used to be said, "getting and spending, we lay waste our lives," but you let enough people get and not spend and see what happens. The only reason I haven't been doing my part to keep the economy humming is that nobody has given me a \$40,000-a-year job to fire me

Cotton Production Methods Studied

With the growing interest in narrow-row cotton production, scientists at the High Plains Research Foundation have initiated a study to compare cotton varieties under double-row production methods.

According to Dr. Douglas Owen, who will conduct the program, there is significant interest among farmers and seed companies alike to determine how different cotton varieties perform under close-row, high population conditions.

Dr. Owen said that in a double-row versus a single-row test conducted last year on the Dennis Mooney farm near Mayfield, it was pointed out that variety was an important consideration to farmers planning narrow-row cotton production.

He said in close-row operations, populations reach from 75,000 to 100,000 plants per acre. "This is almost double the average standard singlerow per acre populations. While some varieties may show increased yields, other varieties won't yield any more", he said.

"We think that the shorter, more determinate type varieties will be best suited for close-row production", Dr. Owen stated.

Guide lines for the test require cotton to be planted on 40-inch beds with two rows of cotton planted 10 to 12 inches apart. He pointed out that the regular cotton variety test the
