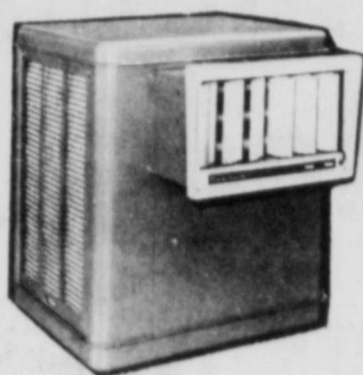

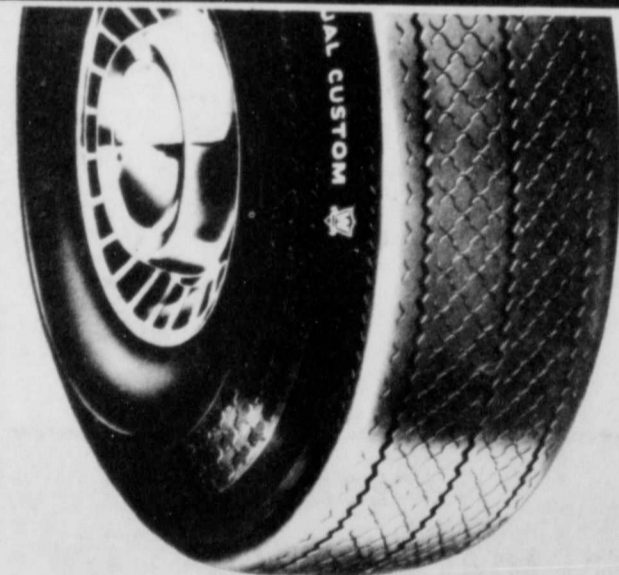

Weed District Directors Named

Final returns from the ballots mailed in for the Board of Directors for the Floyd County Noxious Weed Control District gave the positions to L. B. Brandes, Charlie Perry, and J. A. Colston.

Brandes replaces Cecil Baxter as District at Large, Perry replaces William Bertrand in Precinct 1 and Colston replaces James Lee Nichols in Precinct 4.

At the present time the Weed Control is applying herbicides on fence row, around irrigation wells for weed control, since bindweed is beginning to show. It will be difficult to work this type of treatment; the District will have to spend as much time as possible on bindweed control.

The District has again signed a contract with the State Highway Department where they furnish the herbicide and the Weed District will make the application. The herbicide can only be applied adjacent to farm land where bindweed control is being carried out or where the adjacent farm land is free from bindweed.

The District plans to begin treatment on county barrow ditches. The herbicide being used for this treatment is a soil sterilant and will be applied only adjacent to farms where control practices are being carried out.

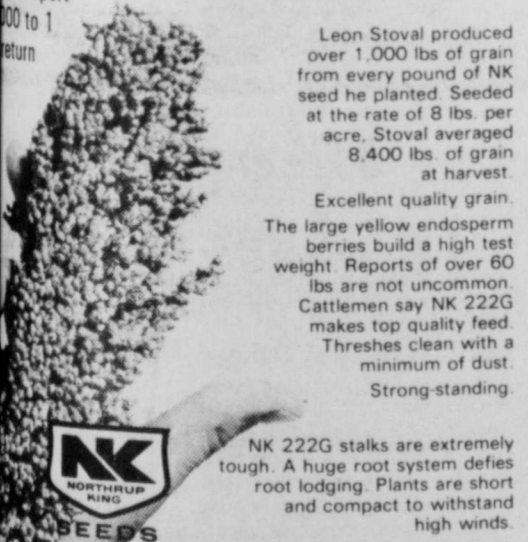

The Towel Trick

The outdoor barbecue is taking women out of the kitchen faster than instant pudding.

The solution: stitch up an apron from two handsome cotton terry bath towels. In the original no-iron fabric, the towel apron can be popped in the washer and dryer and it'll come out fresh and new looking again.

The apron's so easy to put together, you'll want to make several in different colors. Besides the towels, you'll need a yard of cotton bias tape and 5 1/2 yards of cotton ball fringe.

Here are simple step-by-step instructions:

1. Cut off solid color borders of the towels and then measure to desired length for the apron. Allow an extra inch for seams and cut.

2. Cut out a 12-inch scoop-neck opening for front and back, and bind neck edges with bias tape.

3. Stitch sides together at selvages up to the armholes, and then stitch across the shoulders.

4. Trim edges with ball fringe — including neckline opening, sides, armholes, and hemline.

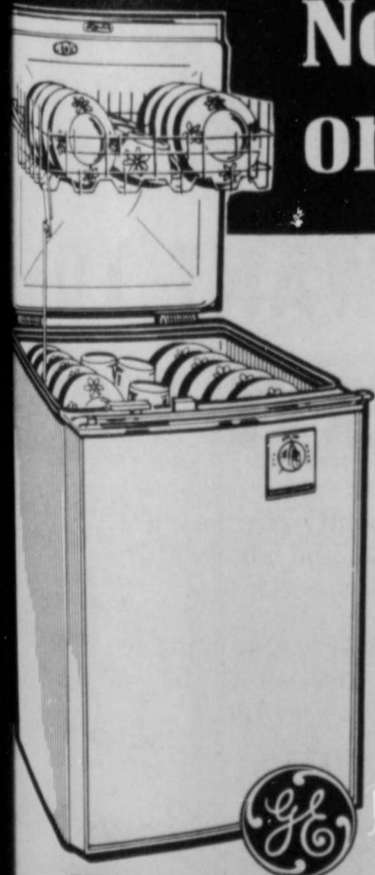

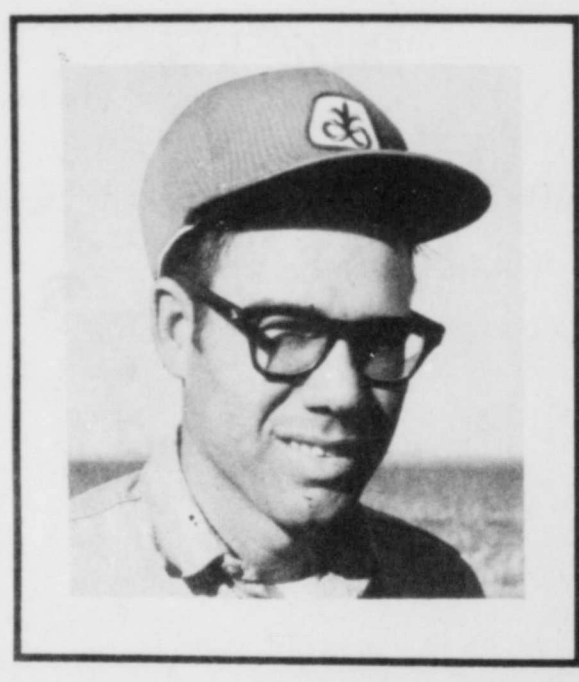

Red Cap Alert For CAP Sunday

Sunday afternoon, the Floydada Composite Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol, in conjunction with the Lubbock Senior Squadron, will hold a practice Redcap. Redcap is the call to CAP members that a plane is overdue in their area, according to flight plans. If a check with airports, flight stations, and FAA offices within 150 miles of the missing plane's flight plan shows no communication with the plane, a CAP search can be authorized at headquarters in Kansas City, and the squadron nearest the downed plane goes into search-and-rescue operations. The local CAP squadron, with help from the Lubbock group, will get a taste of what goes on in a Redcap emergency starting at 2 p.m. Sunday when they

hold their practice search and rescue, or SARCAP. About 15 to 20 planes, flown by Lubbock members, will search the area around Floydada for a dummy airplane wreckage planted earlier by local members. When they spot the wreckage, they will dispatch the local CAP, on the ground, to the site. The Floydada squadron, after they find the simulated casualty, will administer first aid and carry the previously-planted dummy out of the wreckage and back to the airport. The public is invited to sit in on the briefing at the airport before the search begins. Sponsors of the CAP are specially invited. Commander of the Floydada CAP is Lt. Richard Thomas.



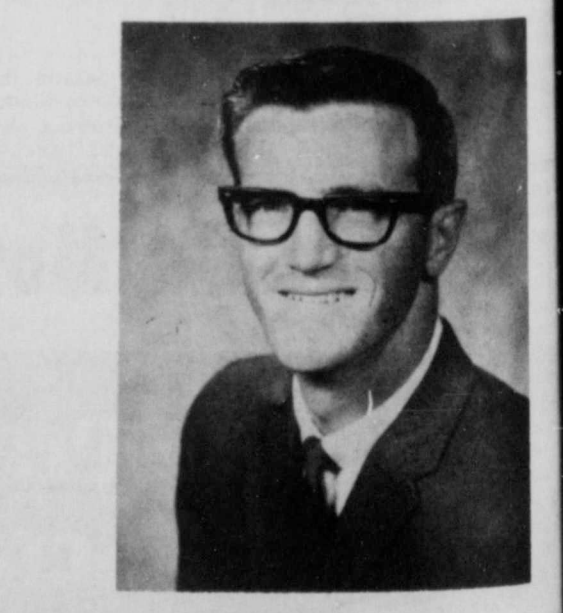

The 55 Farmers who planted 1,731 acres to Watson G-L 16 received the following results. It produced 1,756,680 pounds of cotton seed. The \$20 per ton premium on the seed amounted to \$17,566.80. The Cone Gin paid a \$0.45 per CWT premium this year which amounted to \$7,905.09. This included a total of 2,046 bales of cotton, with a total lint production of 1,026,126 pounds and an average yield of 592.8 lbs. per acre.

For example BOB KIMBROUGH, from 250 acres, produced 325,160 lbs. of cotton seed for a premium of \$3,251.60 from Watson, and \$1,463.22 from the gin. His 372 bales produced 187,498 lbs. of lint for an average of 749.9 pounds per acre.
