The Floyd County Commissioners Court has granted permission to a group of 'Farmers and Ranchers for Natural Weather to conduct a poll Tuesday at the same polling places and time of the Constitutional Amendment election to see if Floyd people prefer natural weather or aerial cloud seeded hail prevention weather.

The group will have v boxes and ballots ready for the election Tuesday and although the ballots were not printed at press time it will seek to poll the people in regard to their desires as to whether or not they are for or against the Weather Modification program which seeks to keep hail clouds from forming.

Bill Hale Appointed To School Board

The Floydada School Board appointed Bill Hale to serve for the next year on the board, completing the unexpired term of the late Elmer Biggs. Hale had just completed three years of service on the board, and although deciding not to seek reelection agreed to serve this year.

In other business the board hired three teachers: Mrs. Audrey Spence to teach sixth grade, Mrs. Wayland Jones to teach fourth grade and Mrs. Jan Waggoner to teach in special education.

The board granted a request of Jr. High principal A. W. Coltharp for an expenditure of \$500 to \$700 for backstops and side fencing for the Jr. High tennis courts.

Painting of the football stadium was discussed and superintendent A. E. Baker was instructed to get more information on the project.

The board also approved participation in the Region XII media center in Lubbock for another year. The media center supplies, films, testing and teaching aides for schools in

(Editor's note: In order to help better acquaint readers with the four proposed amendments to the state constitution, which will be voted on next Tuesday, The Hesperian is publishing the four amendments. In capsule form, we are stating pros and cons of each issue.)

AMENDMENT NO. 1

"Establishing a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the legislature, state officers, and legislative officers and to investigate violations; to recommend compensation for members of the legislature and the Lieutenant Governor; and to recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."

Arguments for: As servants of the citizens of Texas, members of the state legislature should be required to give an accounting of their stewardship; the proposal should go far toward improving public confidence in state officials and legislative officers with its provision requiring them to file a sworn financial statement within 10 days after being elected or appointed; commission would be impartial body, free from political pressure; legislator can no longer be considered a parttime official, and the \$4,800 annual salary now provided is inadequate to meet present-day costs of living.

Arguments against: Although ostensibly the proposed amendment's major purpose is creation of a State Ethics Commission, it is possible that this is merely a subterfuge and the real purpose is to bring about a legislative pay raise without going through the procedure of obtaining voter approval. Texas voters themselves can best judge the conduct and ethics of members of the legislature and can so express opinions at the polls. Since the proposed amendment provides for financial disclosure as privileged information, people of Texas would still have no way of identifying sources of income of legislative members and could not make individual assessments on the relationship of a legislator's income and its source to the interests of good gov-

AMENDMENT NO. 2

"Providing that the legislature may propose amendments to the constitution in called as well as regular sessions of the legislature,"

Arguments for: The Texas Constitution of 1876 is old and unwieldy and situations arise frequently that require emergency action. Because of the restriction limiting consideration of proposed constitutional amendments to regular biennial sessions of the legislature, people of Texas could suffer needlessly while awaiting the regular session year for submission of urgently needed changes in the constitution.

Arguments against: Texas Constitution has been amended all too frequently, even under the provision restricting amendment proposals to the regular sessions convening every two years. The 200 amendments adopted since 1876 would doubtless have been double that number without the present constitutional res-

AMENDMENT NO. 3

"Removing the limitation on the total state appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy blind, and the tions during a fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

The May 16 boost comes under what the Postal Service claims as its authority to make temporary increases in postal rates pending a recommendation by the Postal Rate Commission.

A group of mail users, led by magazine and newspaper publishers, have challenged the right of Postmaster General Wintom M. Blount and the nine other members of the Postal Board of Governors to use such

authority. In a suit filed in U.S. District Court in Washington, the mailers are seeking an injunction to halt the increases until the rate commission, which begins hearings next Monday on a permanent, \$1.45 - billion-aThornton and East Lee streets just east of the Silverton high-

West Texas Equipment Company submitted the low bid on both the track loader and trailer and their bid was accepted. Delivery is to be the latter part of May on a Caterpillar 955 Series K loader and a Hyster Tilt Trailer HP15T. Bid on the loader was \$32,654.00; on the trailer. \$4,350.00.

The machine will be used to cover garbage with dirt at the city dump in accordance with the state anti-pollution law and pickup concrete foundations of old houses as they are demolished in Floydada,


Arguments for: Texas Department of Public Welfare reports that under the present constitutional ceiling, funds allocated for public welfare assistance grants will be exhausted shortly after the date this amendment is submitted to Texas voters on May 18, 1971. Therefore, it is imperative that the proposed amendment be approved to prevent a drastic cut in aid to welfare recipients, thereby working an extreme hardship on persons who have little or no other means of subsistence. Adoption of the proposed amendment would remove inflexible limitations on welfare expenditures for the needy aged, needy blind, and needy disabled, which have caused welfare crises in Texas time and again.

Arguments against: It is only too apparent that welfare costs are constantly spiraling upward, and unless a halt is called somewhere the only result can be ever-increasing tax burdens on the citizens of Texas. In current period of inflation and tight money, it might be wiser to seek cost-saving reforms in public assistance programs instead of authorizing larger expenditures. Entire program of public welfare, since regulations established in Washington, should be financed entirely by federal government.

AMENDMENT NO. 4 "Authorizing the issuance of \$100 million in bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes; providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at six percent."

Arguments for: Future of Texas depends upon the quality and supply of its water. Passage of amendment would make more funds available to assist local governments. Adoption of proposal would make it possible for state to realize a greater return on tax dollars, since the federal matching share of costs would increase from a maximum 30 percent up to a maximum 55 percent, Increase in maximum interest rate from four to six percent would meke it possible to sell Water Development bonds in today's

competitive market. Arguments against: Interest which state will pay on bonds under proposal would increase revenue responsibilities when Texas already experiences serious financial difficulties and taxation problems. Adoption would permit cities and towns and other political subdivisions to pass on to state another financial burden which is rightfully their responsibility.



-Anonymous. For forty-nine or fifty years, until a year ago in fact, I had never doubted that I got a quite proper come uppance one morning in the spring of 1908.

There were four practicing doctors in Lockney when I went up there in February to "run" The Beacon. The doctors were Dr. W. H. Freeman, Dr. J. C. Dial, Dr. C. I. White, and Dr. J. L. Guest. They taught me a lesson in public relations that made a lasting impression.

The way they did it tore up my youthful vanity. But I am of the opinion the lesson was one I needed. It was "worth the money" to me. I would not have done me that way had I been them, but they thought that piece in the paper was damaging and an uncalled for reflection on the medical profession.

Who Comes Here? I glanced up from my work and wondered as they walked an angular path to my 12 x 18 domain. I had come up from Floydada to print the paper, which my father had bought from Jim Meriwether. Jim told me he was mighty glad to get rid of the paper.

I got the idea he had acquired the newspaper plant while he had a sort of a lapse. He was talking when he should have been listening. It scared him, he said, just to think what a mess a person could get into printing a newspaper. So many things that could go wrong, so many words that could be mis-

Dr. Freeman was spokesman for the distinguished doctor delegation. A capable practitioner he could also "think on his feet", as they say about a man who can express himself well. He had been a representative in the legislature from his former Cooke County home. He had sold out a drug store and a good practice to come west. The other three doctors were of high standing in the profession also and prominent

A Miraculous Cure

The issue of The Beacon about which they came to see me had a glowing account of a cure for a serious ailment, The cure had done wonders for some citizen. Plucked from a bed of pain after all other sources, including medical aid, had failed him, he was enthusiastic about the remedy. He had been about ready to give up, to accept death as a welcome relief from a pain-wracked world.

It was just in time that the patient came across this relief. There was unstinted praise for the man who discovered the remedy, in my free blurb.

First and last I have done all the things wrong that the book lists, but never was I more chagrinned than by that visit paid me by the doctors. I was appalled. I can't recall making any kind of an answer to Dr. Freeman's well-presented protest. I did not bristle up (either then or later in private) as I now recall. Ido remember it went through my mind it would take me a long time to live that one down.

Judge William B. Bryant is tentatively scheduled to rule early this week, but postal authorities profess confidence he will not block the temporary rate increases.

So confident are they, in fact, that some stamps reflecting the higher, temporary rates have already gone on sale. More go on sale this week at post offices around the nation.

The Postal Service has printed up billions of the eight-cent Eisenhower stamp, record best-seller in its six-cent version, and the eight-cent American-flag stamp, also popular at six cents.

Postal reform legislation took from Congress the power to set postage rates. Now, the postal Board of Governors, which takes full control of the postal system July 1, is supposed to set its own costs and bring in enough revenue to break even.
