Simon's Strength Came From Jesus' Friendship, Prayer

The International Sunday School

Scripture: John 1:42; Mark 8:27-29; Luke 22:54-57, 61-62; John 21:15-17; Acta 6:20

THERE are some men who are so settled and uniform in their ways and habits, so fixed in character and psychological reactions, that their attitudes and actions in any situation could be predicted






