

# Old Settlers Blast Off!



Floyd County has grown from a long level bare stretch of land since it was organized in 1890 when the population stood at only 529. Very few pioneers who staked their claims that year, will be around to reminisce Saturday, May 29, but a host of other early day settlers of Floyd County and their descendants will converge on Floydada for the 43rd Old Settlers Reunion.

The first white girl born in the county, Maud Duncan Hollums, who never misses a re-

union, will be unable to attend this celebration due to her health. Other familiar faces will also be missed for one cause or another, as oldtimers start gathering for registration at 9 a.m. Saturday morning.

A business meeting for the election of new officers will be held at 10 a.m. followed by the memorial service at 10:30; guest speaker at 11 and the pioneer and traditional songs at 11:30. Joe Reeves, who is usually in charge of this event, may be another pioneer unable

to attend. Last Friday he was still in a Plainview hospital for treatment of a heart condition.

Smokey's Barbecue of Plainview will cater the noon day meal which will be served free to pioneers here 50 years or longer. Others wishing to eat at the reunion may do so for a charge of \$1.45 per plate.

At 1 p.m. the Whirlers' Dance Club members and possibly other clubs will present exhibition square dancing. The parade follows at 2:30; the Style

### Record Low Rainfall Year In The Making

Floydada's official rainfall for May - a trace; for the year - 1.44 inch, 1.23 of that from a couple of "April showers". We searched the Hesperian rain chart for comparison, and went all the way back to 1927 before we found a drier initial five months in any year. In '27 the city received 1.15 inch in the January-to-May period. The average May rainfall, the chart reveals, is a little over three inches (3.15" to be exact) for the 46 years covered. In the driest year on record here, 1956, over three inches had fallen by the end of May. The total rainfall that year was 8.45 inches; 3.38 inches came in the first five months of the year.

In another of the "dry fifties" years, 1954, the year's total was 10.56, but over eight inches of that came in the first five months, 6.20 inches in May. So a dry year doesn't always mean a dry year here, or vice-versa, but with a five-month "drouth" such as the area has to start on this year, the weatherman has some catching up to do if he makes a wet year out of 1971.

Incidentally, there have been three other completely dry Mays - in 1927, in which year the total rainfall here was 12.50 inches; in '31, when it totaled 17.70; and in '45 when 14.08 inches was the city sum. SEE RAIN, PAGE 3

### First Grade, Kindergarten Pre-Enrollment Extended

Pre-enrollment for kindergarten and first grade students will be extended through June 4, 1971, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. at A.B. Duncan Elementary School. Parents are to bring birth certificates with them. All parents are urged to register their children at this time as there has not been a census this year and this will be the school's only method of locating kindergarten and first grade students. The state has set definite regulations regarding kindergarten students. The regulations regarding eligibility for

enrollment are as follows:  
1. Pupils whose birthdays fall from September 2, 1965, through July 1, 1966, are eligible if they meet either of the following requirements:

1. A child is from a family whose family income is \$3,000 or less.
2. A child who cannot speak, read, and comprehend the English language to the extent that he is not familiar with the common English language words that are necessary for normal progress in the first grade.

pupil eligibility for enrollment:  
1. Present legal birth certificate.  
2. Student-parent interview with principal of Duncan Elementary School.

3. Immunization requirements will be the same as first grade students (Item 502, Regulations and Policy Handbook)
- A. Each child will be given a metropolitan readiness test.
- B. Income of family will be established by a signed statement of parent where this is a determining factor for eligibility.

## MEMORIAL DAY

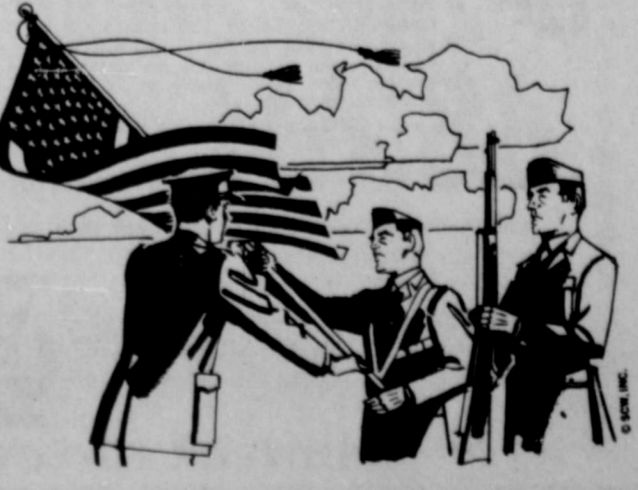

# Howard Gene Bishops Win Trip To Hawaii

NFO night in Floydada last Saturday night was highlighted with Howard Gene Bishop winning a trip for two to Hawaii and the national NFO vice president making his annual report.

The event was well attended by NFO members, their families, and guests.

Each \$1 earned by the American farmer for raw materials grows to \$3.65 within his county and adds \$7 to the national economy. As the agricultural dollar has sagged, the economic structure of all Rural America has diminished.

This message was delivered Saturday night by National Farmers Organization vice president Erhard Pfingsten to members of the Floyd County NFO and their guests in the Floydada High School auditorium.

The Sgt. Bluff, Mo., farmer told his audience that the economy of all Rural America is being threatened.

"Our situation (low farm prices) is ruining not only the family farmer, but small communities, businesses, churches and schools."

Four of every five implements dealers have disappeared in the past 20 years, Pfingsten said.

Col. C. O. Mendon was mission coordinator; Major Parks was air operations officer and Lt. Richard Thomas, Floydada, was ground operations officer.

A mock nuclear explosion was held in North Texas and Oklahoma and 35 civil defense and National Guard personnel were airlifted from Dalhart to Amarillo in the CD test.

While air operations were transporting, ground operations set up a radiological monitoring station and decontamination point. Each returning aircraft was monitored for radiation and decontaminated.

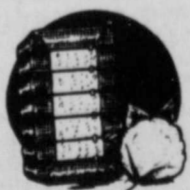

Hale, who did his utmost to help in the solution of the many problems which occur in the life of a hospital.

My decision to leave Floydada is purely on professional grounds. Seven years of surgical training are difficult to ignore and Floydada needs, as I mentioned in my letter to the hospital board, mainly general practitioners and less specialists. I want to return exclusively to surgery, which I have done during all my professional life.

We will always remember Floydada and the wonderful time we had here. We take this opportunity to thank everyone for the many letters and presents we received on our departure.

Dear Mr. Tooley;

The thing that prompts me to write you is my interest in the Floydada Cemetery.

July 7, 1941 I was made Secretary-treasurer and general manager of the cemetery and have done my best to keep the cemetery in good condition. Later on Charlie Bedford was made president and Walter Collins, Troy Leonard, Watson Jones, Cecil Hagood and Homer Steers, were made directors. Charlie has done a wonderful job collecting and helping oversee the works.

The directors are also helpful and ready for council at any time.

We send out 500 cards every spring and receive during the year about 250 remittances.

The expenses are paid mostly by donations but we sell a few lots and get some from burial privileges.

Expenses have doubled in the last twenty years and almost tripled in the thirty years that we have had charge.

We had to have a new well dug recently at a cost of about \$600 which is an extra above regular expenses.

We have not had a solicitor among the merchants for more than twenty years. We solicit help from Dallas to California. If we depended entirely on the merchants, as it used to be, they would be hard hit. Some of the merchants do pay without being solicited.

Our expenses are now running around \$3,500 every year, exclusive of any extra expense such as new well, graveling streets, etc.

Too many people do not take an interest as they should and take for granted that the job will be done.

We would welcome a special donation at this time to help overcome the expense of the new well.

The cemetery has become so large that it is going to take more labor and two men will be needed through the summer if it rains very much.

Many are paying the same amount that they did twenty five years ago. This will not get the job done.

Some are depositing money in the bank and they pay the interest to the cemetery. You can draw this out any time you wish. It will still be your money. It does save having to remember to send in your dues.

A lot of money is being sent out of town for worthy causes and for memorials which is very fine, but some of this could be diverted to the upkeep of the cemetery. This is being done in a number of communities in West Texas. Remember the cemetery?

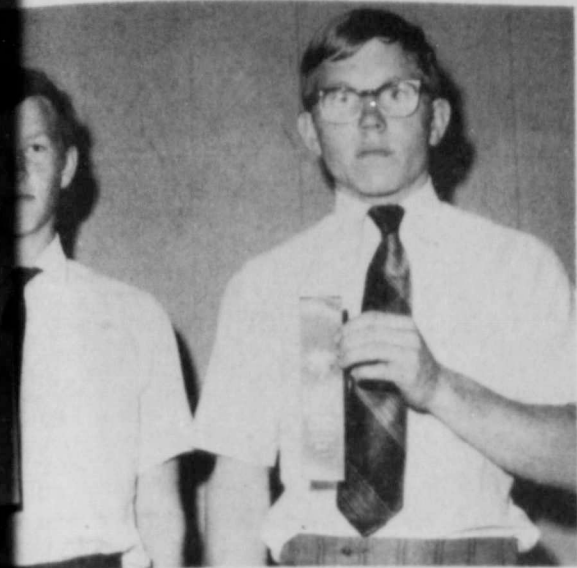

**Barleson**  
*Had What It Takes*

Barleson was a healthy discount store and some added to the mystic of the store. I still believe Barleson must have been the best baseball pitcher to ever work in any number of games in the world. I qualify what I say by the fact that there were any number of good pitchers first and foremost whom I did not know, especially those who did their stuff as far away south as Lamesa and Sweetwater and north from Canyon.

And I do not discount Lefty Holmes who went to the American Association after he grew up and developed his pitching arm. So far as I know Lefty did not get hooked up in any of the local dutch games like Bob did in this small corner of the world.

It was probably 1922 when Bob pitched a shut-out for Floydada against Canyon in a two out of three match for what we called the championship of the plains. Glen Wise of Quitaque caught for Bob in that baseball battle. And it was Sammy Hale (of Estelline?) who got the only score of the game with a lazy right field hit that it seemed would never, but finally did, "craw" over the wall for a home run.

Exploits of some of the famous characters who excelled in athletics of that former day are said to be enshrined in a "hall of fame" in Amarillo. I have heard of such a "hall" but have never been there. Boone Hall talked about it one day recently when we were jawboning about old times. He thought Barleson's name was one of those among the honored greats.

Bob had Control  
Barleson could cut the inside or outside corner of the plate with amazing control and every once in a while he'd "throw a fast one" past the batter.

But (like Dick Merriwell) he had one unflinching pitch. It was strictly an overhand pitch, right down the alley. In the strike zone all the time the ball would rise as it neared the plate. If the batter got any of the ball at all there'd be only a pop fly and an easy out. I never saw Bob throw one of these pitches that "hung" on him.

**SEWING HINTS**  
Hints are identified by the lengthwise direction and courses the crosswise direction.

**Beginning to Sew:** To prevent jamming of threads, hold the upper and bobbin threads to the rear of the pressure foot. While sewing, hold the fabric taut, but do not stretch.

**Seams:** Narrow seams are suggested. One of the following methods is recommended.

- a single row of narrow zig-zag stitching.
- combination straight stitch and zig zag.
- special stretch stitches.
- double row of straight stitching.
- French seams for sheer fabrics.
- Elastic: Three types of elastic are suitable.
  - Tunnel elastic inserted in a casing.
  - Ruffled edging elastic attached either by topstitching or by stitching and turning.
  - stretch lace elastic which is always topstitched in place.

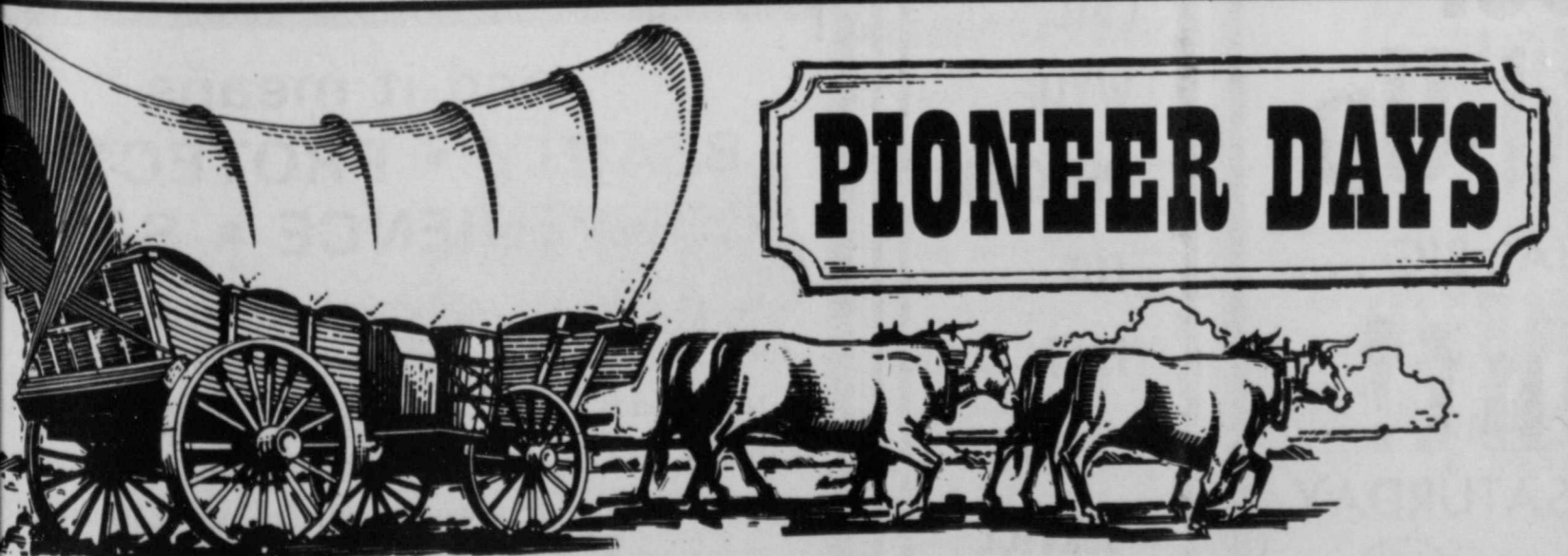
To assure even distribution when attaching the elastic, we suggest dividing the elastic circle into 8 equal parts and marking each eighth with a pin. Do the same for your garment. Place the wrong side of the elastic to the right side of the tricot and match the pins. As you sew, stretch the elastic just to meet the tricot. If you stretch both the elastic and tricot to excess it will distort your elasticized area.

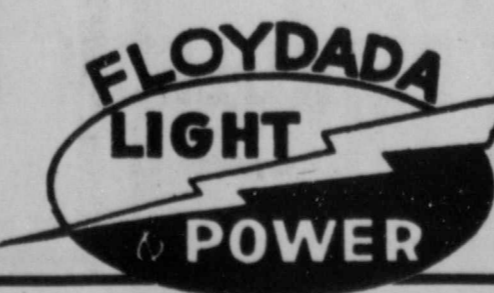

## More Loan Funds For Drought Area

Emergency loan funds are available, applications are being taken, and more money has been requested to combat the serious effects of the drought which grips Texas, Lynn Futch, state director of Farmers Home Administration, reports.

President Nixon has asked the Congress to add \$65 million to the fund from which FHA finances its nationwide emergency farm loan program, Futch says.

The Farmers Home Administration has already made 1503 emergency loans totaling \$15 million to farmers and ranchers in Texas to help them overcome the disastrous effects of the drought which has scorched parts of the state since the spring of 1970.

Emergency loans are made to enable farmers and ranchers to continue normal operations which have been disrupted by natural disasters. These loans previously were available in 53 Texas counties, and last month, the Secretary of Agriculture increased the number to 235 counties.

The impact of the drought has centered primarily in Texas and Oklahoma, but Futch says that emergency loans may be made outside of designated areas to eligible applicants who have suffered severe losses as a result of the drought.

Current interest rates on emergency loans are 4-7/8 percent, repayable as soon as possible consistent with the financial ability of borrowers.

Application for loans should be made at county offices of Farmers Home Administration.

## Greenbug Resistant Grain Goal Of Research Specialists

Grain sorghum resistance to greenbugs is the goal of researchers beginning TGSPB-financed studies at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Lubbock. A \$13,133 grant from the TGSPB will finance operations at the center.

Four specialists will seek to transfer greenbug resistance into agronomically desirable sorghum lines and evaluate other sorghum varieties for additional sources of resistance. The greenbug has caused severe damage to High Plains sorghum crops in past years, according to GSPA Executive Director, Elbert Harp.

Massive application of insecticides for greenbug control could possibly be eliminated through development of a resistant hybrid milo. Not only are the applications expensive, but rapid build-up of other injurious insects may result. Greenbugs spread the damaging

Maize Dwarf Broomrape problem on sorghum could be curbed in greenbug resistant grain sorghum lines. Texas A&M researchers hope to cut the cost of greenbug control and increase the economic production of sorghum. Entries have been made in the World Sorghum and each variety is being bred for resistance to greenbug. Breeding procedure often requires eight years, but the first crop of greenbug resistant lines will be available in 1971.

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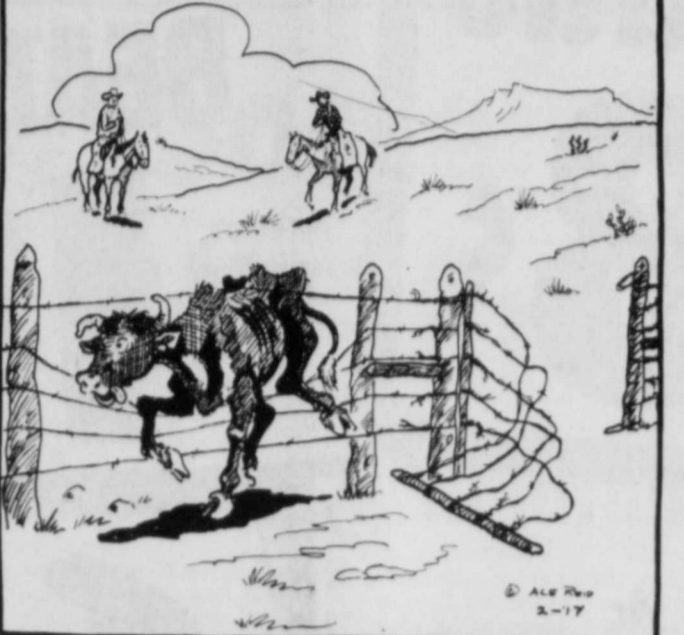
