## Wonderful Rain, Some Hail And Storms Hit Area

### Up To Six Inches Of Rainfall

Hesperian reporters were busy writing drought stories, the old timers were singing, "how in the heck can you wash your neck when it ain't gonna rain no more. . . and then. . . suddenly, it started raining, last Wednesday afternoon, about two hours after The Hesperian went to press.

And, Mother Nature didn't stop with just one rain. She continued to pour out the welcome moisture for the next three or four nights.

Floydada's official rain gauge at Producers Cooperative Elevator showed a total of 4.17".

Other totals in the county included: Antelope community, 5.2"; Dougherty, 4"; Lakeview, 5.94"; Sandhill, 3"; Barwise, 2"; Harmony, 4"; Blanco, 6"; Cedar Hill-Liberty, 1.5"; South Plains, 1.3". Jim Jackson, about five miles southwest of Floydada, received 6.6 inches total.

The rains probably came too late for the dryland wheat farmer, but will help irrigated wheat that was still green. Most rowcrops were up and growing and benefitted from the moisture. Although hail wiped out some cotton, most of the grain sorghum will be in good condition to continue growth without replanting. Cotton in the west part of the county will not have to be replanted.

#### LAKES FULL

Many farmers received enough lake water to irrigate row crops up into the summer hot weather. The first rains came hard with considerable wind, and much of the water ran off into the lakes.

By Tuesday this week, many farmers were back in the fields planting cotton and grain sorghum.

#### HIGH WINDS ACCOMPANY RAINS

Friday night at about 8:15, high winds overturned two mobile homes at the West Side Trailer Park in southwest Floydada.

Ivy Schoonvelt was the only occupant of one of the trailer

houses; the other was unoccupied, and belonged to Evelyn Pierce of Floydada.

Schoonvelt had had the trailer for ten days; he saw the

cloud, ran to his pickup parked east of the trailer, and by the time he unlocked it and got in and tried to leave, the trailer had tipped over on it. He was not injured.

The Pierce trailer was parked at the courts and not hooked to utilities. Most of the living-room and bedroom furniture had been removed, but it still contained a piano, stove, refrigerator, and some clothes and dishes. All contents except the clothes were damaged, the owner said; she estimated damage at \$5,000. The winds tipped the trailer against a telephone pole which wound up halfway into the trailer, entering from the top.

Northeast of the trailer park, on the way, the wind leveled half of a large billboard; and at Charlie Berry's on East Georgia St., large limbs were torn off trees.

Wind damage was reported at Kings Restaurant and to a fence at the John Farris residence.

### Shotgun Mishap Injures Girl

Shirley Jean Powell, 16 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher Powell of South Plains, who will be a junior in Floydada High School next semester, was reported to be doing "remarkably well" under the circumstances in Lubbock Methodist Hospital Tuesday.

Miss Powell is in intensive care, suffering from wounds sustained Saturday night by a .12 gauge shotgun. She was rushed from the Barry Hale home, where the mishap occurred, to Caprock Hospital by Moore-Rose ambulance, then transferred to Plainview, then on to Lubbock for surgery.

Relatives said during surgery a portion of Miss Powell's lung, liver and colon were removed as well as her spleen. She also lost a rib from the shotgun blast which entered the left side of her chest, the family said.

According to investigating officer, Sheriff Walter Hollums, the accidental shooting occurred in the Hale home about 8:30 Saturday night. Hollums said a friend of the girl's, Lee Sinor, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Sinor of Floydada, was helping Hale unload shots from shotgun shells in preparation for a fake shoot-out during Old Settlers activities. They were planning to load the gun with blanks. Hollums was told Sinor reached for the shotgun, which had one live shell, and it accidentally discharged. The girl, standing just inches away playing darts, was struck by the bullet.

Following the mishap, Sinor went into shock and was taken to Caprock Hospital by city officers, Hollums reported. He was dismissed from the hospital Monday.

### Ford Harvests 1st Floyd Wheat

Dick Ford of Cedar Hill has harvested the first load of wheat in the Lockney area and probably in the county. He pulled onto the scales of Patterson Grain Company here at 1:50 p.m. Tuesday.

Ford's dryland wheat went 58 per cent test weight. Moisture content was 16.3 per cent. Delbur Rose delivered a 2,600 pound load to Lockney Cooperatives late Tuesday afternoon. It came from his place just east of town.

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### Car Turnover Kills Elevator Manager

Valmer Wesley (Pete) Bell became the first Floyd County traffic fatality since 1969, when a '67 Ford Bronco driven by his son overturned at 6 p.m. Tuesday. The mishap occurred 7.6 miles north of Floydada on Highway 207.

The victim was thrown 165 feet from the point where the vehicle overturned.

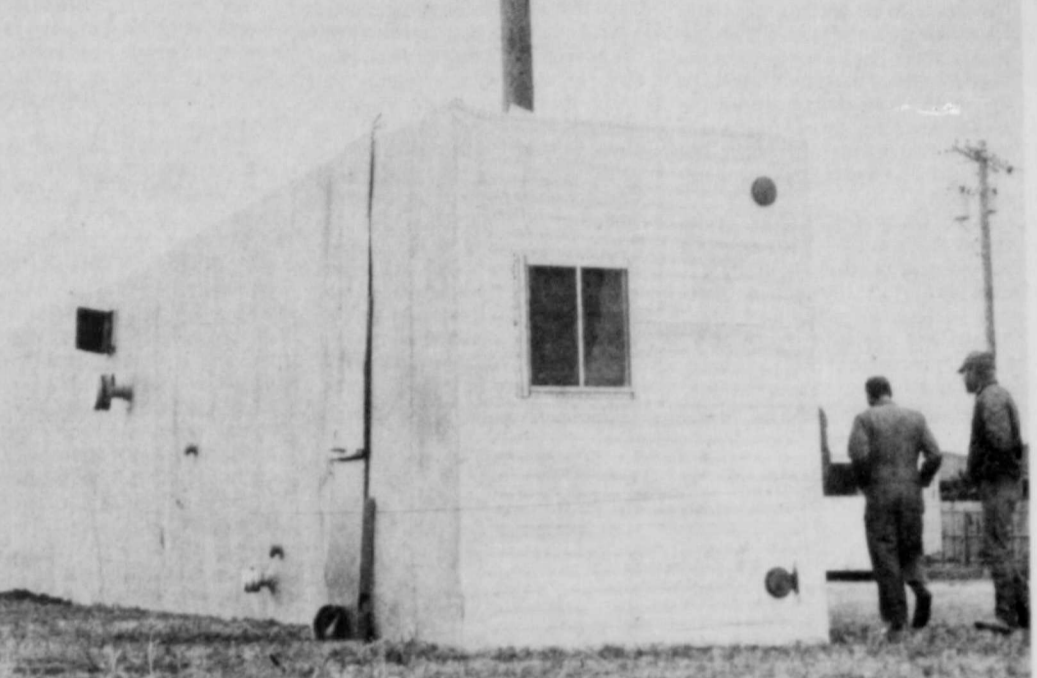
Bell, 68, had been manager of Clubb Elevator at South Plains for "a short time." Previously, he had managed elevators in the Crosbyton area for over 20 years.

Services were pending Wednesday morning at the King Funeral Home in Crosbyton. Bell made his home in that town.

The son, James Martin Bell, was taken to the Crosbyton Hospital. The younger man, 22 years of age, also resides in Crosbyton.

Highway Patrolman Bud Rainey said this was the first fatality he had investigated since 1968, although a companion "worked two traffic deaths in 1969."

Bell was the 45th victim of South Plains traffic this year. Forty-eight had died at this time last year.

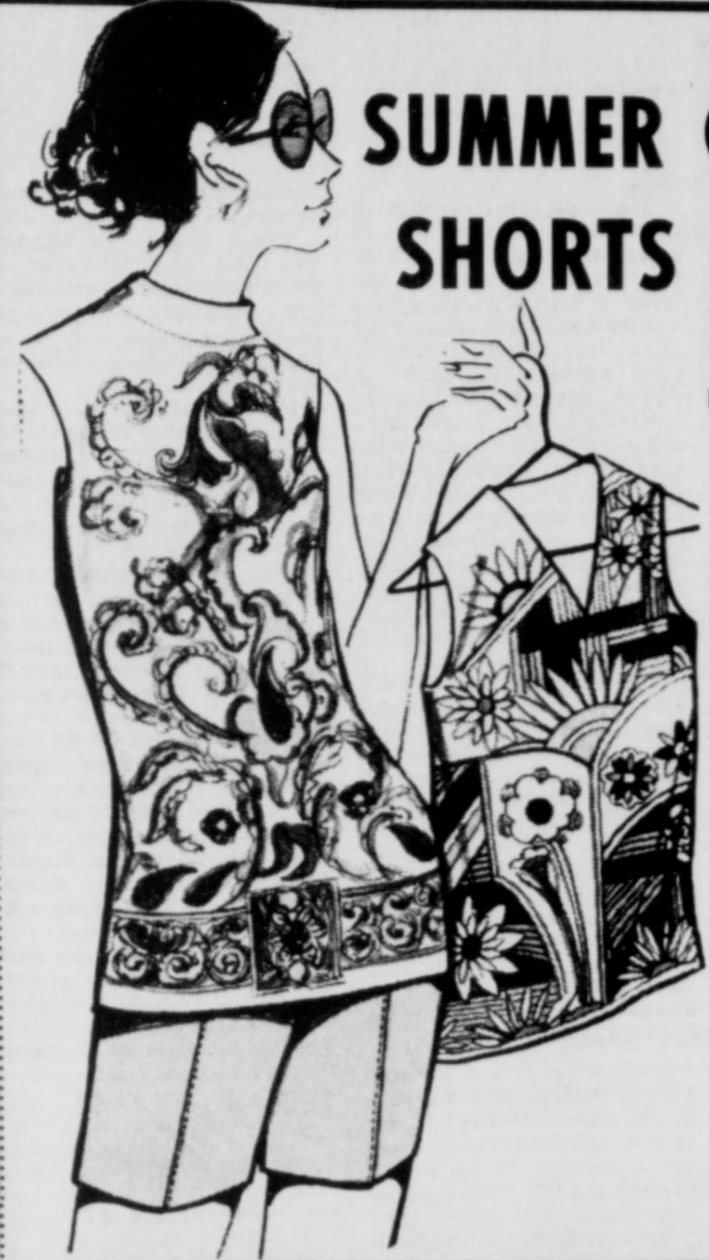

The benefits of summer employment do not end simply with those employed. The economy benefits by the addition of new workers. Young people can build good work habits. For youth from economically-deprived areas, the opportunity to work now could lead to a chance for a better

life." The TEC office will work closely with any other groups or agencies in the area who have plans to aid in the summer job search.

The TEC office has been contacting prospective employers of youth, reminding them of the need for summer jobs for teenagers, asking them to examine their help situation and see if there is room for a summer worker.

"We placed many area youth last year in this campaign, and we hope to do better this year, even though the economy is slower in most places," Hambright says. "There are many ways these young people can help. Boys have been satisfactorily placed in jobs from lawn work to loading and unloading trucks at warehouse docks. Girls can be placed in jobs from babysitting, which incidentally is a more responsible job than it is sometimes thought to be, sales work, to clerical work, including typing and shorthand."

"We hope all employers will check over their situation and try to use some summer help

### I REMEMBER, I REMEMBER... Masonic Hall Burned

Once a long time ago - it was 1903 but I can't recall the month exactly - the Masonic Lodge here lost their first meeting place by fire. The hall was over Gound & Sarginer's grocery. I janitored at the Methodist Church and the Masons used men on occasion. I worked for them two or three times then and also later when they got in their new location at the corner on the north end of the west side block.

The lodge had been organized some 12 years at the time of which I speak. The petition for a dispensation to organize here was forwarded by resident members to the Grand Lodge in 1891. Their petition had the recommendation of the Plainview Lodge.

Floyd City Lodge  
The Lodge at Floydada, if granted a charter, would meet over the store of S. B. Chadwick, fourth door north of the present-day First National Bank corner. Their dispensation was received in April and the charter was granted December 11, 1891.

The lodge was named Floyd City Lodge No. 712, A.F. & A.M. The petition had gone in before it was known the post office could not be named Floyd City. (There was already a Floyd City in Texas.)

The next year, 1892, S. B. Chadwick sold his building to C. J. Menefee. And sometime before 1897 the latter had sold the top story of the building to the Lodge because in that year of 1897 Menefee transferred the property to A. C. Bowers, stipulating in the deed "title only to the first floor of the building is conveyed, the second floor of the building belonging to the Masonic fraternity."

The Fire in 1903  
Mr. Bowers put a similar stipulation in his deed when he sold to C. W. Gound and L. C. Sarginer in 1900. Three years later on a Wednesday afternoon I was hired to clean up the hall. I cleaned up and dusted the place and left all the lamp chimneys shiny and bright.

My luck was running strong. The hall, along with all the other buildings on the block, except two, caught fire sometime Saturday night and was in ashes the morning after a lodge meeting. This was a full 48 hours after I had finished my job and turned the key back to Mr. Scott, Mr. Starks, or maybe it was to Mr. Sarginer.

Clearly carelessness of some grown person and not a tow-headed boy was responsible for the fire.

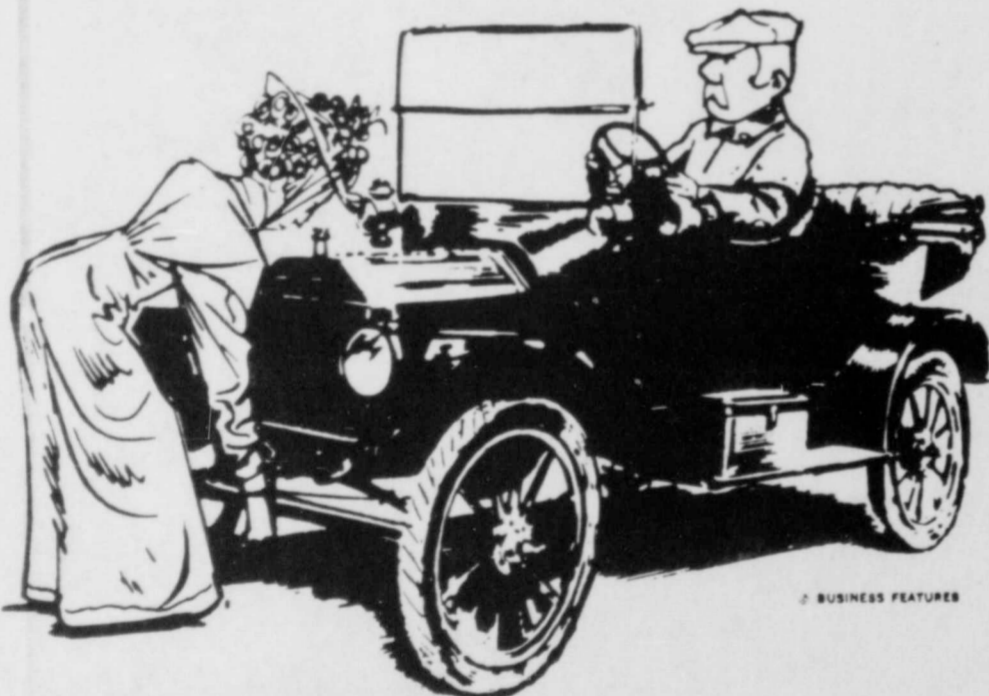

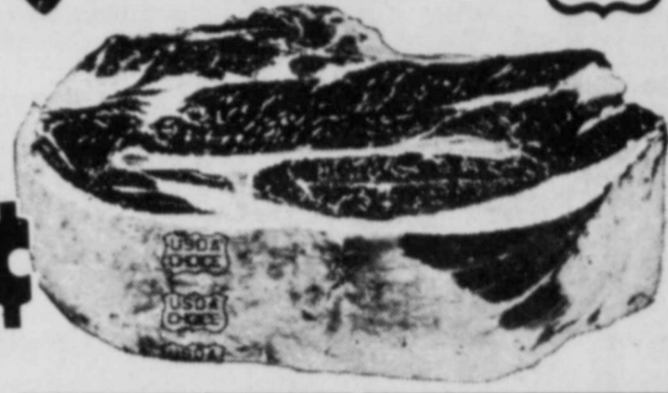
