**Recycling Art Is 66 Years Old**

The re-cycling of aluminum, considered a new environmental art by conservationists, is in reality more than sixty-six years old. Industry has been gathering and re-cycling the nation's waste aluminum since 1904.

In that year, the U. S. Reduction Company of East Chicago, Ind., first began to take the cast-off portion of aluminum and to melt it down for re-use in manufacturing.

Today a handful of aluminum smelting companies supply more than a fifth of the country's total aluminum needs. In 1971, they will sustain this flow by re-cycling a major slice of an estimated 2 billion pounds of new and old scrap aluminum from the nation's growing scrap pile, equal to more than 14 per cent of the total scrap generated by the country since 1960.

**PLAZA SUITE**

While Walter Matthau is usually an excellent actor portraying his character roles with finesse—there's just too much Walter Matthau in "Plaza Suite."

ogenic bacteria from water supplies, but known methods will not remove viruses economically. Chlorine, while destroying bacteria, has only limited effect on viruses.

**Virus-Free Water Possible With New Filtration**

A successful, large-scale removal of viruses from water, through the use of filters has been announced by The Carborundum Company, Niagara Falls, New York.

Developed by two Baylor College of Medicine scientists, Professors Joseph Melnick and Craig Wallis, their method economically processes large volumes of water to a virus-free state.

As few as 10 viruses in 10,000 gallons of water can be detected, Professor Wallis stated, and such studies could lead to improved knowledge about virus-caused diseases such as hepatitis, meningitis, myositis, myocarditis, malaria and fever in humans.

Health advantages from the Baylor method should be significant, Professor Melnick said. Their approach makes it feasible to protect drinking water. It is possible with present contaminant removal technology to treat water and remove path-

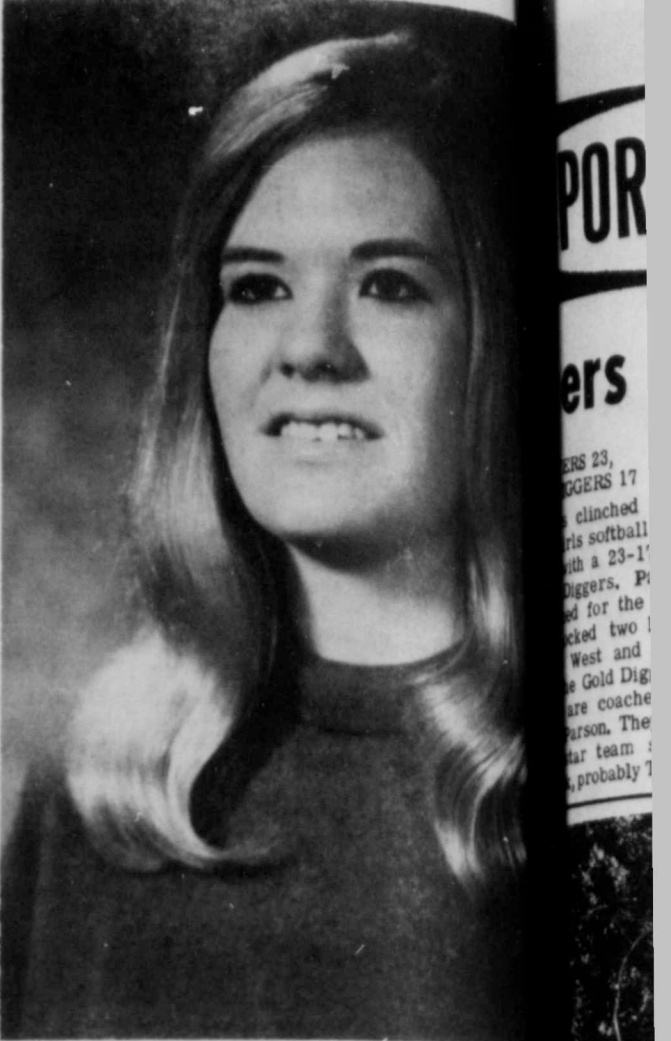

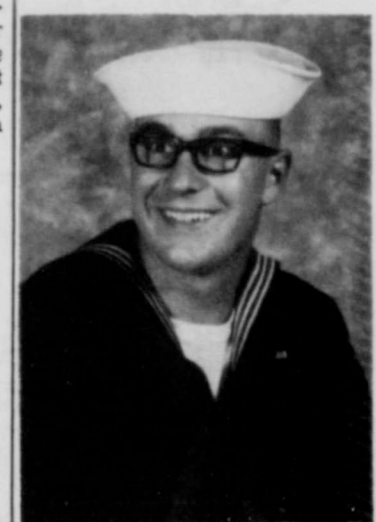
### Center Programs Are Outlined

## NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

Fast action along with proper procedure is the key to successful stain removal on upholstery, drapery and other furniture fabrics.

Don't forget to pre-test cleaning products in an inconspicuous area of the upholstery fabric.

Common stains fall into these three categories: greasy, non-greasy and stains that are a combination of the other types. Greasy stains, such as butter, margarine, or car grease can be removed from washable fabrics using a detergent foam. However, it's usually necessary to use a dry cleaning solvent. Soaps, detergents, glycerine, denatured alcohol, or a weak ammonia solution should be used on foam rubber and nonwashable fabrics.

Be cautious in using any solvent, since many are flammable, poisonous, and may cause illness of their vapors are inhaled.

For removing nongreasy stains, like fruit, black coffee, milk or catsup, use a damp sponge wrung out of cool water

on washable fabrics. Or, try a detergent-water foam, wiping thoroughly with a sponge wrung out with clean water. On non-washables, a final rinse with sponge wrung out of alcohol helps remove detergent and dries the fabric. Dilute in the alcohol with two parts water for use on acetate fabrics.

Use a sponge wrung out with cool water, then apply a detergent - water foam removed by sponging with clear water to eliminate combination stains from ice cream, chocolate or coffee with cream. If the spot is still visible, sponge with a grease solvent on either washable or nonwashable fabrics.

Use bleaching on upholstery fabrics only as a last resort. Then, use only a very weak solution if a trace of the stain's discoloration remains.

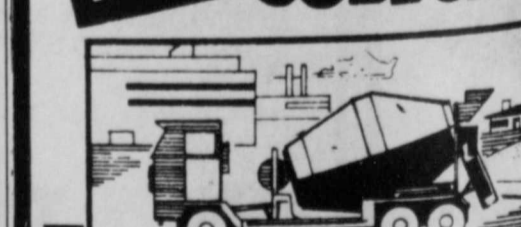

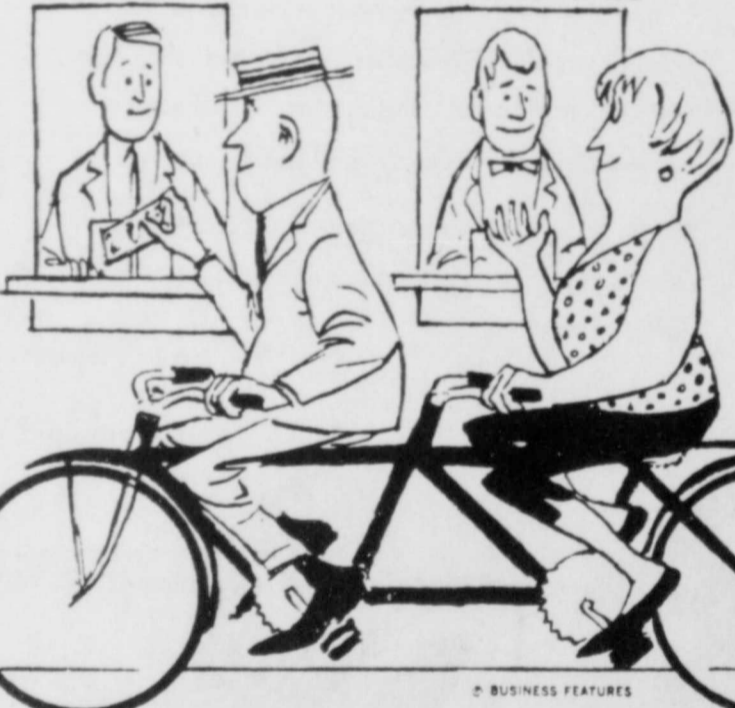
