SHREDDING OF WEEDS and volunteer vegetation such as pictured above is extremely important this summer with the added moisture we've had for plants to grow. It is essential for the establishment of permanent grasses to control all vegetation on fields which were seeded to grass this spring. Weeds also may be controlled by spraying with chemicals. Undesirable plants should be controlled for the following reasons: (1) they will shade out the newly seeded grass plants, (2) they rob moisture which is needed by young plants, (3) and when left to go to seed, much more competition is present for the following years.
