back into bank deposits.

The First National in Floydada was up in deposits from last year's \$9,874,070.66 to \$10,703,682.69 and up in loans from \$4,453,667.39 to \$4,963,998.69.

The First National in Lockney was up in deposits from last year's \$6,116,290.17 to \$6,789,609.84. The bank was down in loans from last year's \$2,867,964.23 to \$2,766,928.02.

Mr. Brookes' report indicates that the City of Floydada has recently purchased tractor equipment for operations at the solid waste disposal site, that the old dumping area is presently being covered, and that plans are to operate the site in accordance with the Health Department's required minimum standards. It was also reported that three cubic yard metal containers are being installed on city collection routes. We wish to take this opportunity to commend your city for providing these facilities, and we trust that you will provide high standards of operation in both the collection and disposal phases of your program. Many of our cities could benefit from the City of Floydada's progressive attitude.

A copy of our publication "Sanitary Landfill Facts" is enclosed for your information. We wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation extended to Mr. Brookes during his visit to your city. If we can assist you in any phase of the solid waste program, please let us know.

The council rejected a plan submitted by Lighthouse Electric and Southwestern Public Service to participate in an electric range promotion.

The city along with the other electric companies put up and take down the lights, plus the city furnishes the electricity.

add \$2.50 to all fines. The new assessment goes to the state. The light agenda was completed by the council in record time and all councilmen were present.

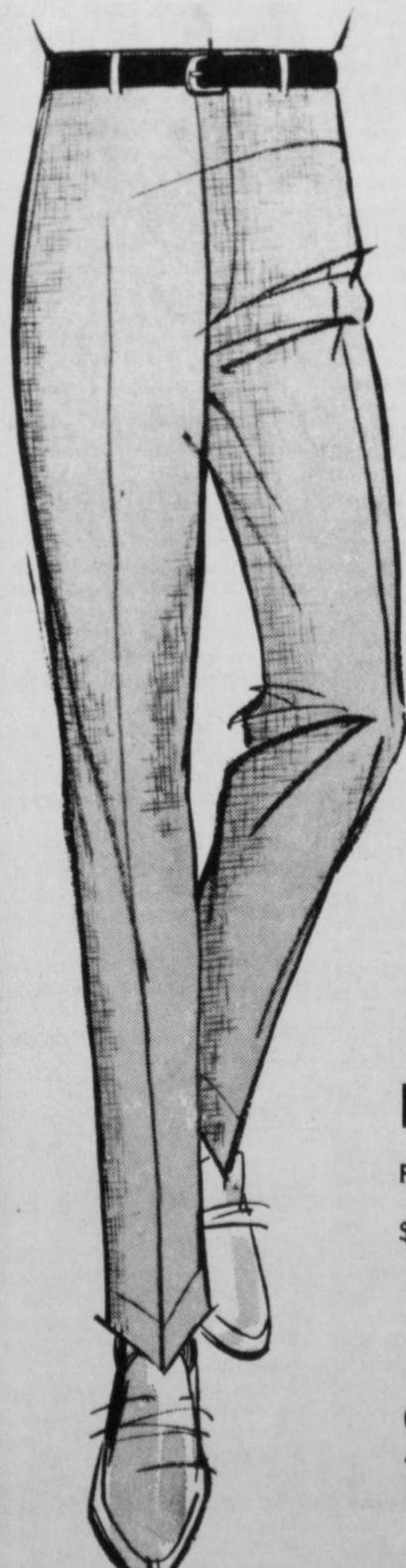

High Plains Cotton acreage Assessed

The first official effort to assess 1971 cotton acreage in the 25 High Plains counties places "standing or better" with a good chance for emergence" at 2,293,000 acres, reports from the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and Cotton Growers, Inc.

The 1970 assessment for the same area was 2,147,200 acres. The lack of moisture made a forecasted 2.7 million acres earlier this year an almost impossibility.

The "base" allotment for the 25 counties, adjusted for a net 187,973 acres brought in through leases and other allotments, totals 1,818,195 acres. However, the program in effect for 1971 imposes no limit on how many acres can be planted above their allotments.

A third of this year's cotton is planted on dryland and the condition of these crops is highly erratic. The dryland areas are said to have fairly uniform moisture to hold them until late July or August.

Crops on the Plains, generally, are in good condition and average to above average yields.

New Law Helps Farmers Save Cotton, Grain

A new state law effective immediately will help the farmers save grain and cotton that blows off their trailers and trucks and help keep the streets and highways neat and clean.

The law reads as follows: "H. B. 759 Amends Art. 827a, P.C., relating to restrictions on loads of motor vehicles transporting certain loose materials such as dirt, sand, gravel, and certain agricultural products that may blow or spill from a vehicle as a result of movement unless properly protected as specified in Act. This act includes vehicles operated by COUNTY, State and/or any political sub-division. Misdemeanor and first conviction fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200.00. Second conviction a sum of not less than \$200.00."

Farmers Home Administration Helps 53 Farmers

The rural economy of Floyd County is stronger because loans from the Farmers Home Administration have helped 53 farmers finance real estate or operating expenses, Alfred A. Harrison, County Supervisor of Farmers Home Administration said today.

During the past year 19 Floyd County families have secured loans that will enable them to move into modern homes.

The agency's wide range of services added a record \$94,886 to resources available for housing and farming in this county last year. At year's end, the agency was providing direct benefits to 105 families in the area.

These loan programs supervised by the rural credit arm of the U. D. Department of Agriculture will be repaid, with interest, Harrison said.

The farmer programs are one part of a three-point attack

on rural problems by the Farmers Home. The other two, also operating in Floyd County, include loans for home ownership and for water and sewer systems.

Farmers Home Administration loan services are carried on in Floyd County through the

agency's office at 107 W. California Street, Floydada, Texas, 79235. Housing loans may be made for homes in the rural countryside, and in all towns of the county. Community facility projects may include service to rural towns of not more than 5,500 population.

Cadet Mitchell is a member of the AFROTC unit at Texas Technological University. He is a 1966 graduate of Lockney High School.

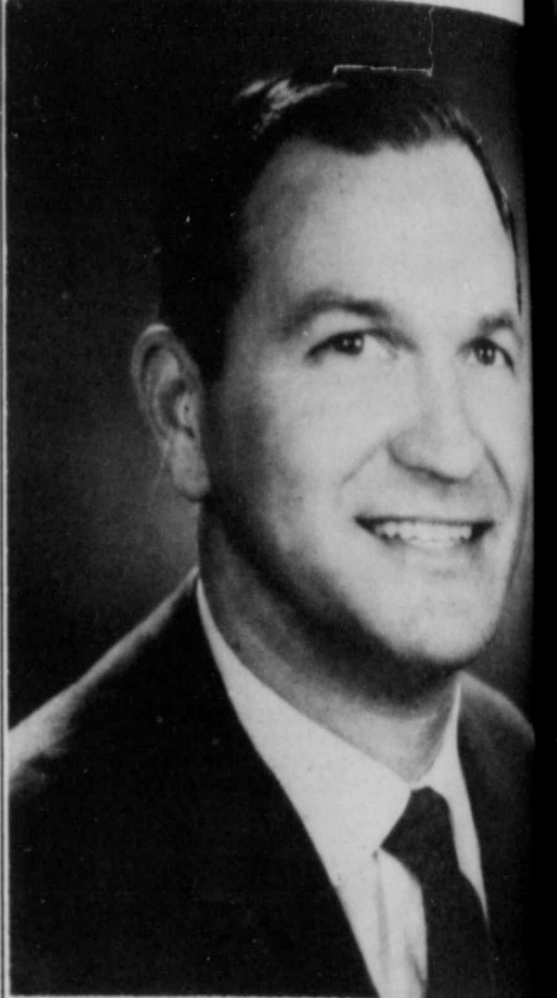

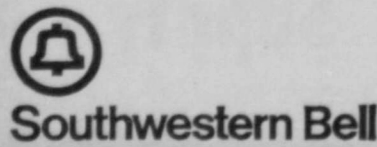

ly professional service he was a practicing physician at the new town of Slaton. He also practiced briefly in and/or around San Antonio.

I remember the spring of 1908 when he came home to Lockney from medical school at Tulane. That may have been the year he finished at the Louisiana school. I believe I admired that wonderful Van Dyke he grew more than any other I ever recall. Any man who can grow such a handsome beard, I am still convinced, has to be a winner.

When Drs. Smith & Smith (George and Lon) opened their sanitarium in Floydada in September of 1923, Dr. Nichols was helpful. He did one or more surgeries for them.

The Bullard Family

When we got to Floyd County to start off the year 1900 in a new country, it seemed to me that not long after I knew of a Bullard family and got it in my mind they had been around Fairview - Hillcrest all the while like the W. Paige Carruth Serves Rotarians By Airplane

Paige Carruth, vice president for student affairs at West Texas State University, will stress the 1971-72 theme of international president Ernst G. Bretholtz of Sweden, "Good Will Begins With You."

Carruth feels that many civic organizations are full of apathy. "They meet, eat, burp and go home," he says. "Members feel it is easier to just write a check instead of grabbing a project and really making it go."

That is one of the reasons for his fly-in visits with all the clubs in his district. "I can look at the clubs, and if they need help, I can recommend the committee chairman within the district who could help them get started in the right direction," he says.

The governor says that Rotary has three main service areas - community service, vocational orientation and international goodwill.

During the next year, Carruth says, "I want to emphasize youth within the club, increase the membership and extend Rotary to more people, and upgrade the types of services

sponsored by the clubs on the community and international levels."

Carruth, who flies a Cessna 150, was born at Vernon, Tex. and was graduated from West Texas State in 1952. After a year of military service in Korea, he returned to WTSU and obtained a Master of Education Degree in 1955.

He was a social studies teacher at Kermit High School for three years and then received a teaching fellow at Texas Tech University, where he obtained a Doctor of Education Degree in 1959.

Carruth became an assistant professor of education at West Texas State that fall and two years later was named associate dean of men.

Four years after he joined the Canyon Rotary Club in 1960 he was elected president. In the interim he served as weekly bulletin editor, a club director, chairman of various committees and vice president.

The Canyon club has had the distinction of providing two other district governors. The late Dr. Harris M. Cook, former dean of men at West Texas State, served in 1944-45 and

was changed to vice president for student affairs last year. In his visits to the Rotary membership, Carruth says he will stress the 1971-72 theme of international president Ernst G. Bretholtz of Sweden, "Good Will Begins With You."

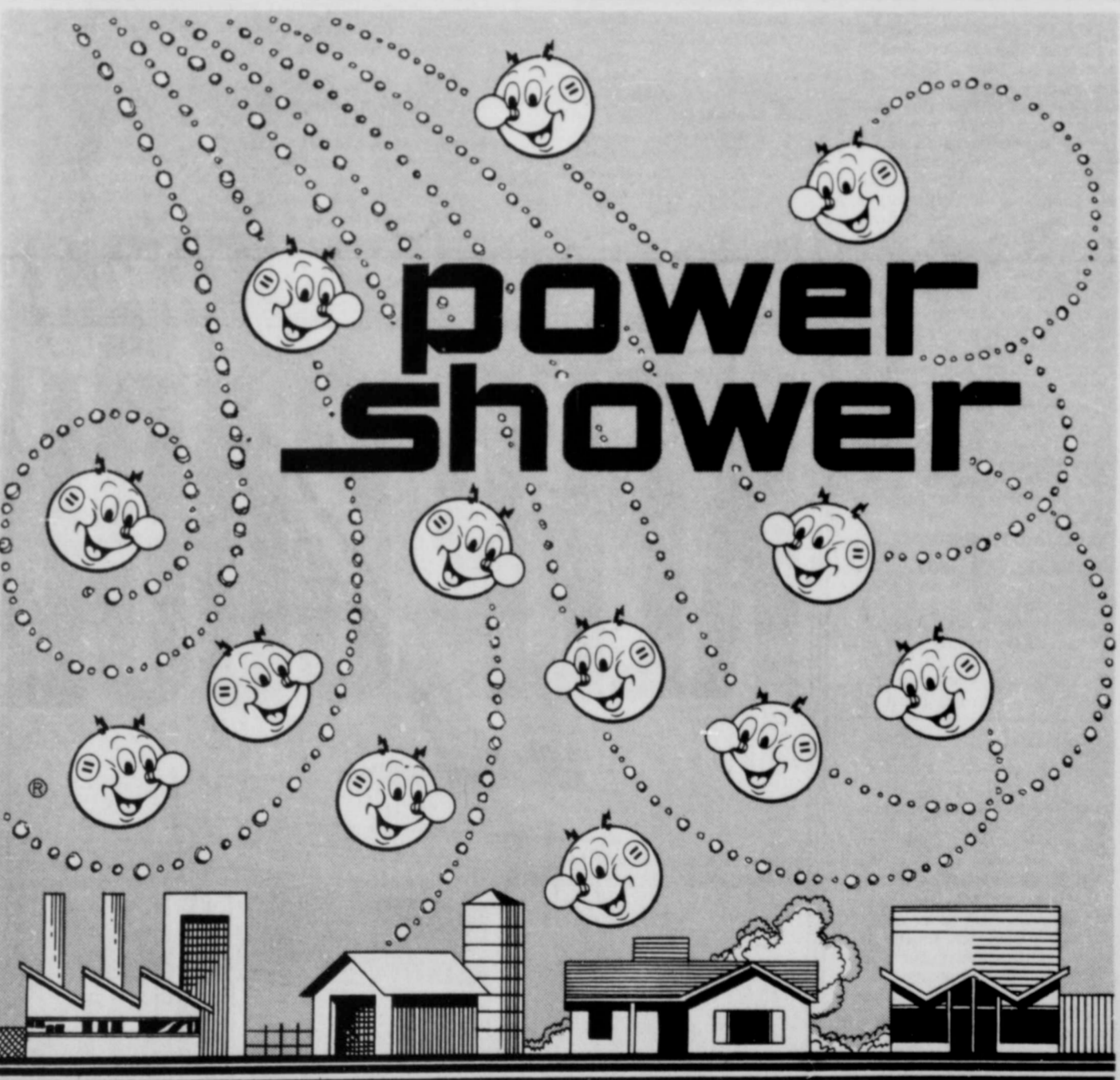

SHREDDING OF WEEDS and volunteer vegetation such as pictured above is extremely important this summer with the added moisture we've had for plants to grow. It is essential for the establishment of permanent grasses to control all vegetation on fields which were seeded to grass this spring. Weeds also may be controlled by spraying with chemicals. Undesirable plants should be controlled for the following reasons: (1) they will shade out the newly seeded grass plants, (2) they rob moisture which is needed by young plants, (3) and when left to go to seed, much more competition is present for the following years. For further information on proper care of newly seeded areas, contact your local Soil Conservation Service Office.

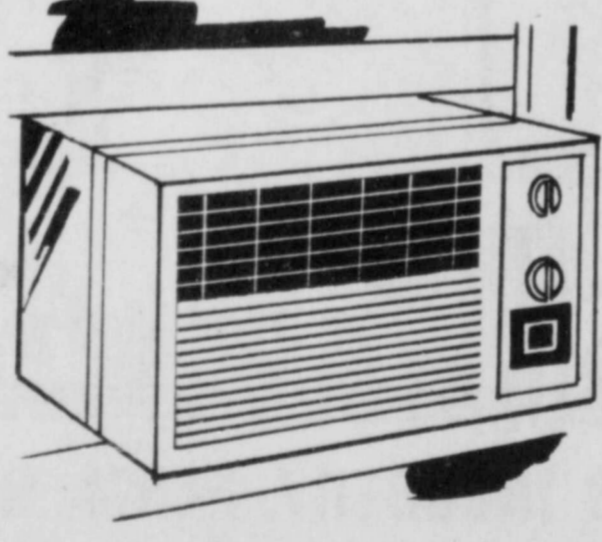

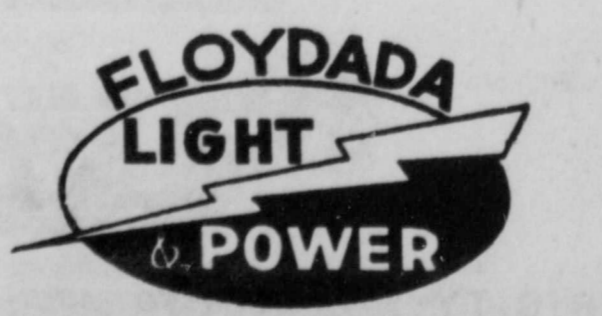
