According to a spokesman residents continue to voice angrily of the farmers hiring cheap labor. It was said the group would continue to meet, apply pressure and appeal to the farmers, to consider not hiring illegal workers.

Four reasons for not hiring the illegal help were pointed out at the meeting: 1. It causes permanent residents to become unemployed; 2. It also means

The first load of cukes came in to the Louisiana Strawberry plant on the Lockney highway last Thursday, when about 400 bushels were processed. Another 400-bushel load was received Monday.



A new law effective August 30 stiffens the penalty for littering highways in the state, perhaps in connection with the recent national ecology movement. Violators of the highway littering law may now be fined up to \$400 for each offense. The new law, House Bill #52,
