### Concern Over Labor Problems Here Increases

The community meeting held Monday night was well attend- ed and an increased interest is being shown concerning the labor problems in the local area.

According to a spokesman residents continue to voice an- grily of the farmers hiring cheap labor. It was said the group would continue to meet, apply pressure and appeal to the farmers, to consider not hiring illegal workers.

Four reasons for not hiring the illegal help were pointed out at the meeting: 1. It causes permanent residents to become unemployed; 2. It also means

no employment for the chil- dren, who need work in order to purchase clothing and other necessities in order to contin- ue schooling; 3. It means the money the illegal help is earn- ing is being taken out of this area; 4. The people that are hired are in this area illegally. On these facts the residents are appealing to the farmers, businessmen and others to take another look at the situation. There were 26 persons at- tending the meeting voicing their opinions, and efforts are being set forth to contact others who are facing the problem of becoming unemployed due to hiring workers here illegally.

An official of the community said it was reported to him that Tuesday morning a woman left her children at the Floyd County Day Nursery, anticipating she would be working in the field. When she reached the place of employment she found the field already full of work- ers from the south, so another permanent resident unemployed, he said.

At the meeting the people also discussed the amount of money farmers receive in addition to what they get from their farms. It was reported by one citizen at one time enough funds came to this county for the farmers, that each man, woman, boy, girl and infant could have had \$1,000 each. The spokesman said "the farm- ers call this 'supplement'

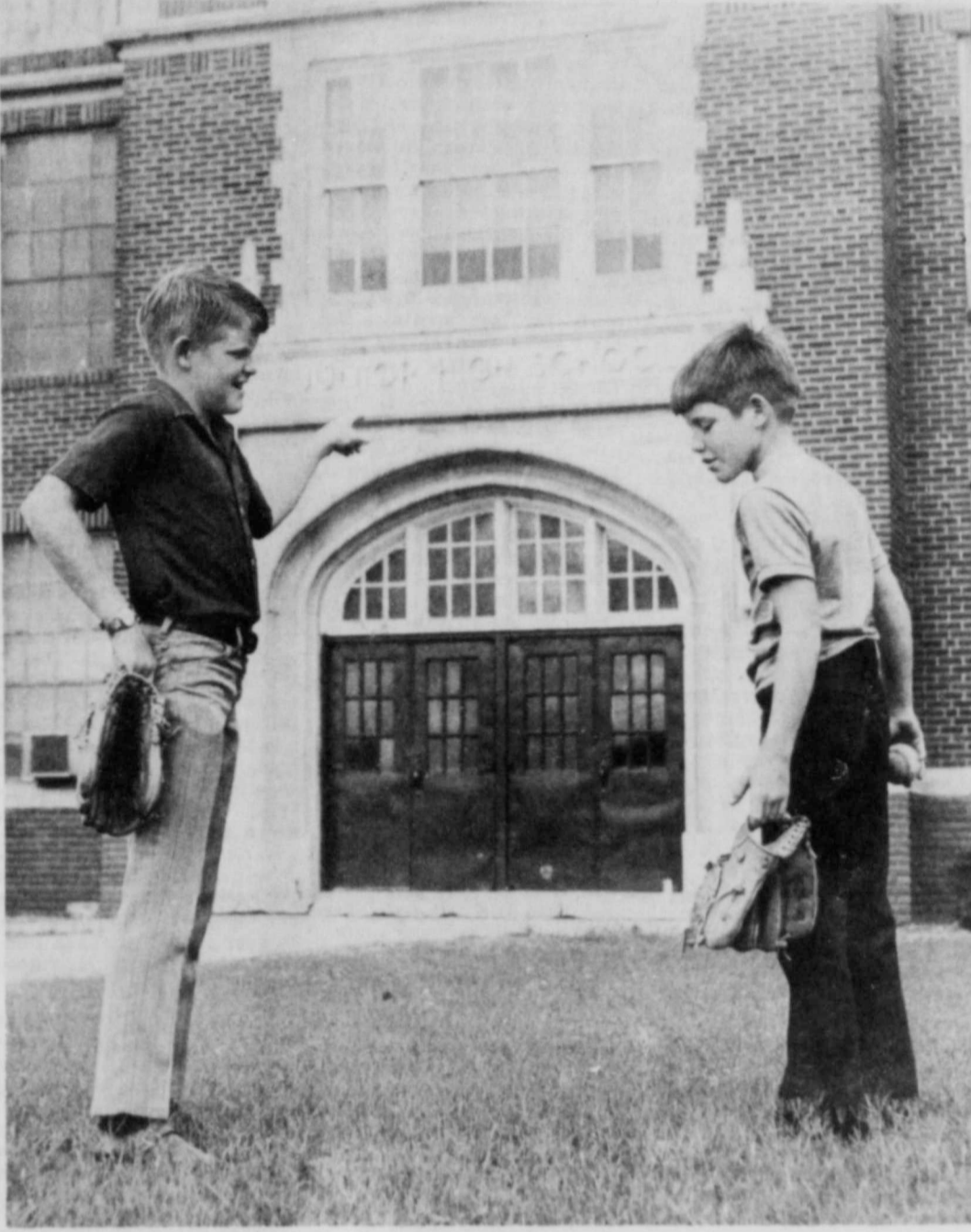
### Floydada Girl Shot

Mrs. John Delgado Jr., 15, of Floydada was taken to Lock- ney General Hospital and on to Lubbock Methodist Hospital following a shooting at the home of her father-in-law, at 508 E. Kentucky in Floydada.

Hospital spokesmen said she was in serious condition and in the intensive care unit at Methodist the day after the shooting.

Sheriff's officers here said Mrs. Delgado was shot in the stomach after she reportedly entered the bathroom of the senior Delgado's residence. The local authorities said the wound, from a .38 Special revolver, was reportedly self-in- flicted. Other persons in the house said they heard the report from the gun after Naomi Delgado entered the bathroom, apparently alone, officers re- ported.

### Disabled Vets Now Eligible For Free License Plates

Under a new law signed by the Governor May 28, disabled veter- ans in Texas may now get free license plates if they qualify under rules set up in the law. A \$1.00 application fee is the only charge made to qualifying veterans.

To qualify for Disabled Vet License Plates, a veteran must be a Texas resident; be a veter- an of the United States Armed

Forces; have a service-con- nected disability of at least 70%; now be receiving compensation from the Federal Government as a result of such disability; Texas Title must be in applic- ant's name before application for Disabled Vet license plates can be approved. Only one set of free plates may be obtained annually for either a passenger car or a light

commercial vehicle having a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity of one (1) ton or less. Registration of the vehicle must be in the name of the disabled veteran but not neces- sarily in his name solely. Joint ownership is permissible. Vehicle must be used for veter- an's personal use only. Section 1 of the application must be completed by the applicant and then forwarded to the Veteran's Administration or appropriate branch of the Arm- ed Forces for verification of the veteran's disability rating. Upon confirmation of the dis- ability rating by the appropriate office, the applicant may mail or present this application for

### Louisiana Strawberry Processes Cucumbers

The vegetable harvest in the Floydada area is continuing with cucumber packing this week, according to a Louisiana Strawberry spokesman.

The first load of cukes came in to the Louisiana Strawberry plant on the Lockney highway last Thursday, when about 400 bushels were processed. Another 400-bushel load was re- ceived Monday.

Cucumbers will be worked here until the freeze, Louisiana Strawberry bookkeeper Romeo Jimenez said. The '71 cucumber harvest is running about ten days later than last year. The onion harvest is contin- uing, and the local Louisiana Strawberry sheds currently employ some 65 workers, will add another 30 to 35 when the pepper harvest starts.

MOSQUITO FROM P. 1 has been a lot of talk about a disease called VEE. Maybe you've wondered what it is all about.

The disease began in South America some years ago. It then moved into Mexico, and now has invaded South Texas. VEE is short for Venezuelan Equine Encephalitis. The name comes from the fact that it was first discovered in Venezuela among equine-type animals such as horses and donkeys.

The disease is highly fatal for horses, mules and donkeys, but is much milder in humans. Sometimes opossums, rodents, and possibly even birds can get it.

The disease is caused by a virus which is carried from sick animal to healthy animal

The daily bag and possession limit is unchanged from last year, at 10 and 20 birds for both species. The early teal season this year will be Sept. 11 through Sept. 19. The daily bag limit will be four birds in the aggregate of the three species of teal, and possession limit is eight in the aggregate, just in case you hunters don't know.

BY ANYONE'S estimate, the number of waterbeds and waterbags, the latter unheated plastic sleeping sacks filled with water, now dominating U.S. bedrooms is fast reaching the quarter-million mark.

Buyers pay from \$35 for a bag to an average \$300 for a king-sized bed complete with frame, headboard, and a garden hose to fill it up.

The result is a sea of uncertainty as everyone tries to decide if the waterbed is a novelty soon to go away - or a serious threat to "the dead bed," the term "water babies" like to use when referring to the traditional bed. Even David Mendelsohn, one of four partners who run 14-month-old Aquarius Products, Inc., is unsure. The Manhattan firm, which makes and sells waterbeds in 15 of its own shops located around the nation, scorns the bags as hazardous. "Wait until they start bursting," a 21-year-old college man said. "There'll be a lot of ruined homes."

### Diet Supplement Demonstrated At Local Gin Camps

Demonstrations given at the Brown Gin and Farmers Co-op Gin camps and at the County Agricultural Building here last week showed the advantages of using MPP-Multi Purpose Food - as an addition to low-income diets.

Mrs. Frances Wilcox, a Health Educator with the Migrant Program in Austin, gave the demonstrations and expressed interest in getting migrant workers and other low-income families to use the dietary supplement in their daily cooking. MPP is derived from soybeans and is naturally high in vitamins and essential protein which low-income diets sometimes fail to provide, Mrs. Wilcox said.

You may bring the animals to a spot designated by the veterinarian and the owners will be permitted to take the horses back to his premises but they cannot be moved from there for 14 days and then be moved only accompanied by the vaccination certificate.

There is no charge for the vaccine for inoculation.

### Littering Penalty Up

A new law effective August 30 stiffens the penalty for littering highways in the state, perhaps in connection with the recent national ecology movement. Violators of the highway littering law may now be fined up to \$400 for each offense.

The new law, House Bill #52, reads as follows:

H. B. 52 - (Effective Aug. 30, 1971). Amends Art. 696 a, P.C., relating to the penalty for leaving refuse garbage, rubbish, or junk, on or near a public highway. Any violation of this act by any person, firm or private corporation, shall upon conviction, subject the offender to a fine of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$400.00, and each day of any such violation shall be treated as a separate offense.

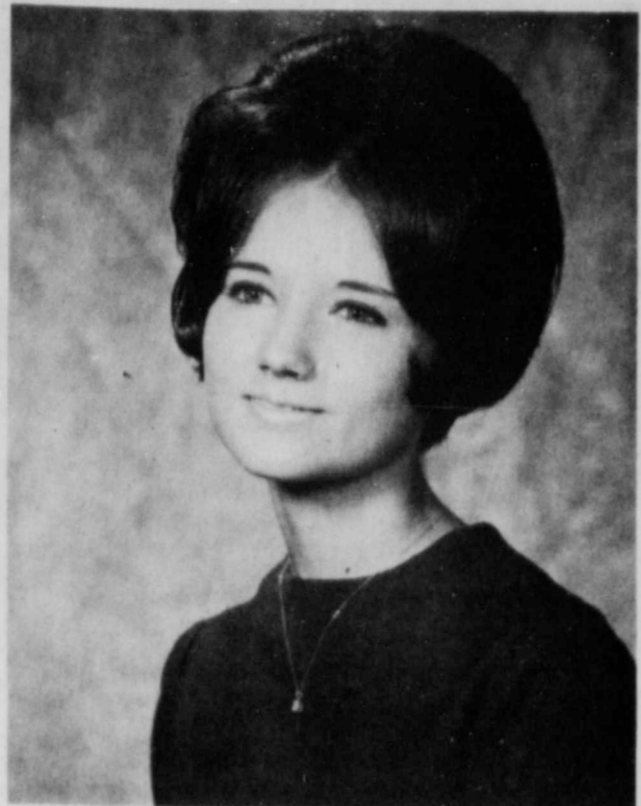

What better way to celebrate any occasion than with a freezer of homemade ice cream or a homemade pie from the freezer. Make a favorite flavor, try a new surprise or combine ice cream with fresh fruit. Texas favorite is fresh peach ice cream. And now is the time to watch produce counters as the first peaches are coming off the trees. To make fresh peach ice cream, simply peel and mash peaches to a fairly fine pulp, leaving some small lumps. Then use any plain ice cream base recipe, adding peaches according to your taste. If the peaches are very tart, you may want to add extra sugar. Try the following recipe for crank-type or electric freezers: in a saucepan, combine 4 beaten eggs with 2 cups milk, 2 cups sugar and 1/8 teaspoon salt. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until the mixture coats a metal spoon. Cool. Add 2 cups light cream and 2 cups mashed peaches. Freeze in crank type or electric freezer. Milk is a good source of calcium, important to bone and teeth development of growing boys and girls as well as helping to maintain sound bones and teeth for mom and dad.

Cut slits in the top crust of two crust pies. All pies that are to be baked go directly to the oven without thawing. Allow 10 to 15 minutes extra time. Place on lower oven shelf, since it is somewhat more difficult to brown the bottom crust of frozen pies. Chiffon pies should be removed from the freezer and placed on the refrigerator storage shelf for 1 or 2 hours before serving.

### FRESH BLUEBERRY PIE (8 servings)

Pastry for 2 crust 9 or 10 inch pie

- 1 quart fresh blueberries or 3 10-ounce packages dry packed frozen blueberries
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 tablespoon butter or margarine

Line pie plate with pastry. Rinse berries, drain them well, then turn them out on a soft towel to remove all possible water. Combine sugar, flour and nutmeg and add to berries, tossing lightly. Turn into the pastry. Top with dots of butter. Brush edge of pastry with water. Cover fruit with top crust, sealing to bottom crust by turning it under. Press with a fork or the end of a spoon to form decorative edging. If not to be baked the same day, place in freezer until firm, then wrap in foil and return to freezer. When ready to bake, cut slits in center of top crust. Bake at 450 degrees F. 12 to 15 minutes, then reduce heat to 350 degrees F., and bake 15 minutes longer.

Another recipe to try on the family is a frozen lime cream pie. Make several of these to have in the freezer for unexpected company.

### FROZEN LIME CREAM PIE

Crust: 2/3 cup graham cracker crumbs

- 2 tablespoons softened butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar

1 3 cup finely chopped pecans

1 4 teaspoon cinnamon

The Powells learned that the exotic flowers blooming for the first time this year on a vine in the Powell's yard are Passion flowers. Mrs. Bill Hardin also learned an interesting story about what the strange flowers are supposed by some to be.

The outer ring of ten petals is said to represent the ten apostles who witnessed the Crucifixion, or Passion, of Christ. Within these there is a ring of filaments, suggesting the crown of thorns, while the five stamens represent the wounds, and the three stigmas the nails.

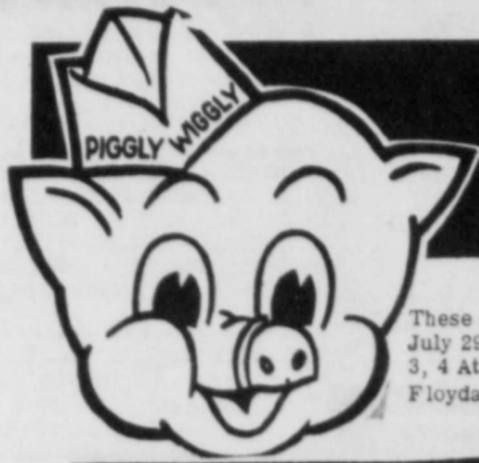
