## Canning of Beans And Peas Starts At New Plant

The Deaf Smith County Food Products Company began canning operations at the new plant west of Hereford last Friday night when the first cans of green beans rolled off the production lines.  
The plant is still hampered by damaged equipment, and part of the work is being done by hand labor in the early runs, but some 1500 cases of green beans had been canned by mid-week.  
Canning of black-eyed peas was started last night (Wednesday) when the first test runs were made.  
Harvesting of peas and beans is getting well underway this week, according to Fred Owen, field manager for the plant, and additional laborers are needed for the harvest.  
A call was sent out to the Plainview office of the Texas Farm Employment service for additional laborers Wednesday by County Agent Hugh Clearman.  
Average stands of black-eyed peas are very satisfactory. Owen reported this week after early harvesting operations were underway. Bean crops are well above average, he said.  
W. T. Johnson, 8 miles southeast of Hereford, harvested 2650 pounds of green beans in the first picking of one acre of land in one of the earliest harvests. The beans were sold at 5 cents a pound, and cost \$1.70 for picking and hauling. Sixty pounds of seed, at \$10, was planted, and the crop was watered and plowed three times. The beans matured in 65 days.  
The season is too early, yet, Owen said, to make any definite estimates on what the yield from black-eyed peas will be. Harvest will continue through most of October.

## HAS MASTERS DEGREE

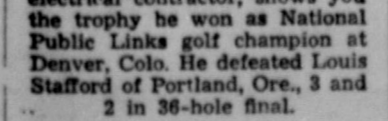

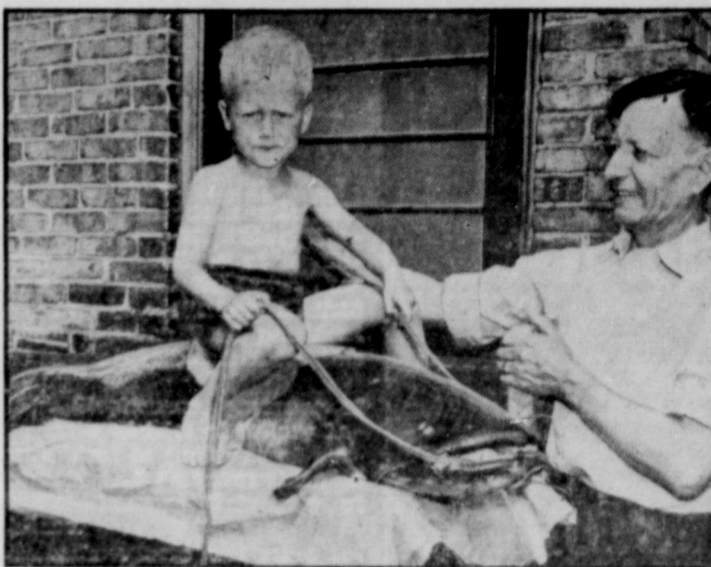

## FEED SHORTAGE A PROBABILITY

The long continued drought still continues, at least in so far as Friona and the immediate surrounding territory is concerned, and this territory extends for several miles in all directions, except probably to the southeast and toward the north and northwest.  
The situation is becoming so critical that unless a goodly amount of rain comes within the very near future, there will be no feed crops produced in this territory, with the exceptions of farms that are supplied with irrigation wells. These farms show crop growing with as good promise as is normally the case here.  
Practically no row crops or feed crops were planted here during the spring or usual time for planting such crops, owing to the lack of moisture, so that the production of such crops here will be nil.  
However, following or during the wheat harvest sufficient rain fell over the territory, that many farmers plowed and planted in broadcast fashion, many acres of the fastest growing row crop seed, which has come up to a good stand, in the hopes of securing a quantity of rough feed for cattle, but unless the rain is forthcoming, this feed also will be a failure and the feed situation here will become desperate.

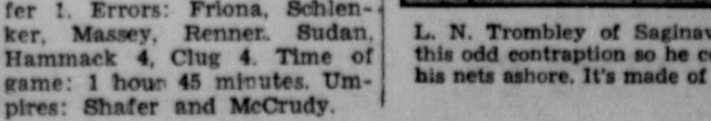
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## Funeral Service Held for Mrs. J. Hughes Last Week

We will have good news for you in regard to the hospital, soon.

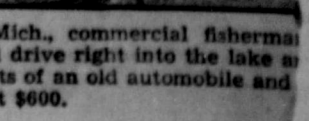

## Veterans Warned of Penalties For Taking Checks After Leaving Job

Veterans who fail to notify the Veterans Administration when they interrupt their training or education and continue to accept Government allowances are subject to severe penalties, VA warned today.

Eldon F. Fuller, Chief, Vocational Rehabilitation and Education, Lubbock VA Regional Office, cautioned veterans that VA training officers are making regular investigations to prevent such practices.

Beginning September 1, a blank form will be with each check mailed to veterans in training.

Those forms must be returned to the Disbursement Office that mailed the check, whenever the veteran's training or education is interrupted.

This notification will enable VA to discontinue payments.

Veterans who accept checks under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act to which they are not entitled will be ineligible to receive any further benefits under the act. They also may be punished by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or by imprisonment for not more than one year, or both.

Most schools are prompt to notify VA of withdrawals, but some business firms approved for on-the-job training have neglected to report the withdrawal of veterans from training.

In both cases, however, Fuller emphasized, the responsibility rests on the veteran.

VA investigators who made a recent three-day check in one Texas community found 38 veterans receiving allowances to which they were not entitled. Some of the veterans had discontinued training as long ago as October, 1945.

The veteran should take careful note of the month for which his subsistence check is issued as shown by the date of the check.

If he has discontinued education or training for any reason during the month prior to the month for which the subsistence check was issued, he should not cash the check under penalty of the laws.

The check should be returned without endorsement to the Disbursement Office shown on the

## Texas Crime Rate Nearly Doubles In Two Years

Austin, Aug. 18—(Sp)—Criminals are preying upon the rural population of Texas at nearly double the rate of two and a half years ago, Director Homer Garrison of the Department of Public Safety declared today.

Garrison said rural crime increased 85.27 per cent from the first six months of 1944 to the first six months of 1946.

Biggest gain was in robbery, up 158 per cent. Another staggering gain was shown in burglary, up 121 per cent. Auto theft jumped 96 per cent; felony theft 61 per cent; murder and homicide 55 per cent; and rape 48 per cent.

During the same period crime increased 42 per cent in the cities. The overall gain for both rural and urban jurisdictions was 54.54 per cent.

Garrison said law enforcement officers are "holding their own against long odds," for arrests have increased in direct proportion to the gain in crime.

Convictions, however, are lagging behind. The penitentiary system received 930 new prisoners in the first half of 1944; 862 in the first half of 1945; and 1221 in the first half of 1946, Garrison said. This represented an increase of 31 per cent from the 1944 to the 1946 period.

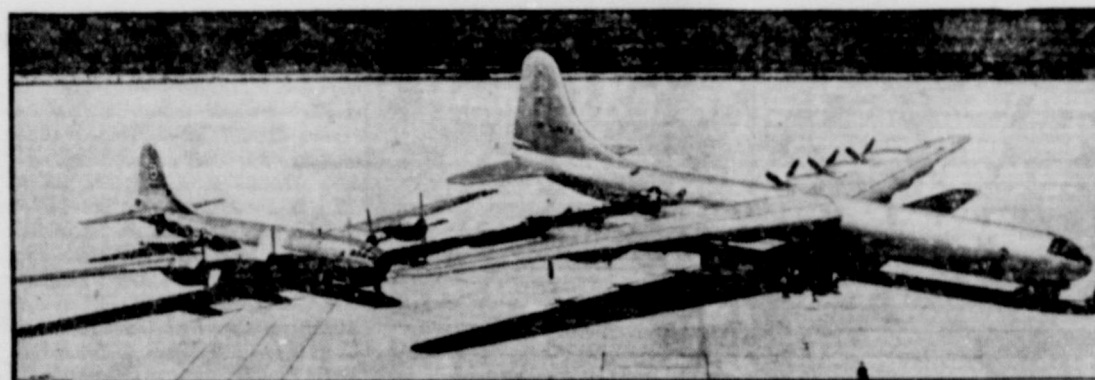


## Detassels 35 Acres a Day

## Stretch Wheat Flour With Other Grains for New Taste and Texture

College Station, August 10 — Stretching wheat flour in home baking can bring a variety in taste and texture to home baking. Possible extenders include rye flour, oatmeal or cornmeal, potatoes and sweet potatoes. But Edith Lawrence, specialist in food preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, caution housewives that for good results they must know the correct amounts to use and the best method of mixing.

Yeast bread may be made entirely from rye flour. The German bread, pumpernickel, is a familiar example. All-rye bread is darker, more moist and heavier than wheat bread. A lighter loaf may be made by using half rye and half wheat flour.

In extending with oatmeal or

cornmeal, only a third as much finely ground oats or fine cornmeal as wheat flour is recommended. Oatmeal bread is slightly coarser and darker than white bread but excellent in flavor.

These flours or meals are sifted or mixed with the wheat flour and then the bread is made by the standard method for white bread offered in any reliable cookbook.

In using potatoes in bread, both the proportions and the method of mixing are different. Only a small quantity of potato can be used—about one cup of mashed potatoes to five or six cups of flour. The mashed potato is thinned with potato water, then mixed with the softened yeast cake before the flour is stirred in to make a dough or sponge. Mashed sweet potatoes may be added to the sponge with the flour.

## Showers Bring Relief to Dry Panhandle

The nearest approach to a desperately-needed general rain which the Panhandle has seen this summer was a series of heavy showers which started last week and, according to "guesstimates" by the Amarillo Weather Bureau, ended Tuesday.

A near-cloudburst late Tuesday afternoon brought nine-tenths of an inch of rain in Hereford in little more than half an hour, but the storm appeared to be fairly well localized and covered little territory.

However, rainfall Sunday and Monday ranging from three-quarters to two inches covered most of the dry northern and northwestern part of Deaf Smith county, according to scattered and un-official reports.

Good rains were reported at Adrian and Wildorado, and Charlie Hoover, who lives in the northwest part of this county, reported three-quarters of an inch of moisture Sunday afternoon and night.

Heavy showers were reported Sunday night in Randall county, extending from south Amarillo to the south edge of the county, and across the whole northern end of Deaf Smith county.

Only two tenths of an inch of rain was recorded in Hereford Sunday night, and little moisture has been reported south and west of the city.

A spokesman for the Amarillo Weather Bureau station Tuesday night predicted that "its all over" as skies cleared and the sun turned on the heat again.

Amarillo received nearly two inches of rainfall during the week's cycle. Other Panhandle totals for the week were Claude, 3.23; Dalhart, .85; Dumas, 1.51; Plainview, 1.56; Clovis, .12; and Stratford, 2.24.

In Deaf Smith county, Daniel community reported about an inch of rain in showers Sunday and Monday nights. Wyche reported half an inch of rain Tuesday morning.

The August showers followed one of the driest July's in recent history, and brought some relief to the Panhandle area which has been drought-stricken all this year.

Row crops throughout this area have been aided materially by the moisture.

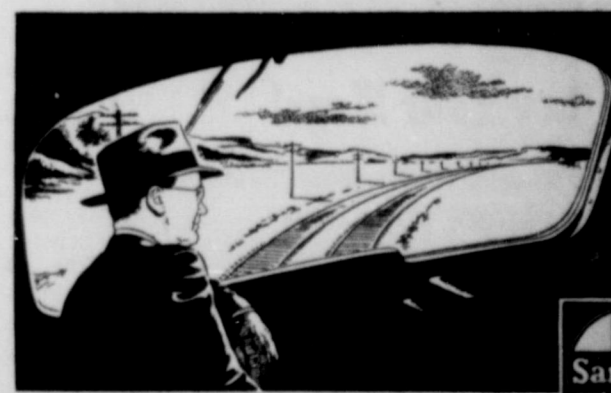
