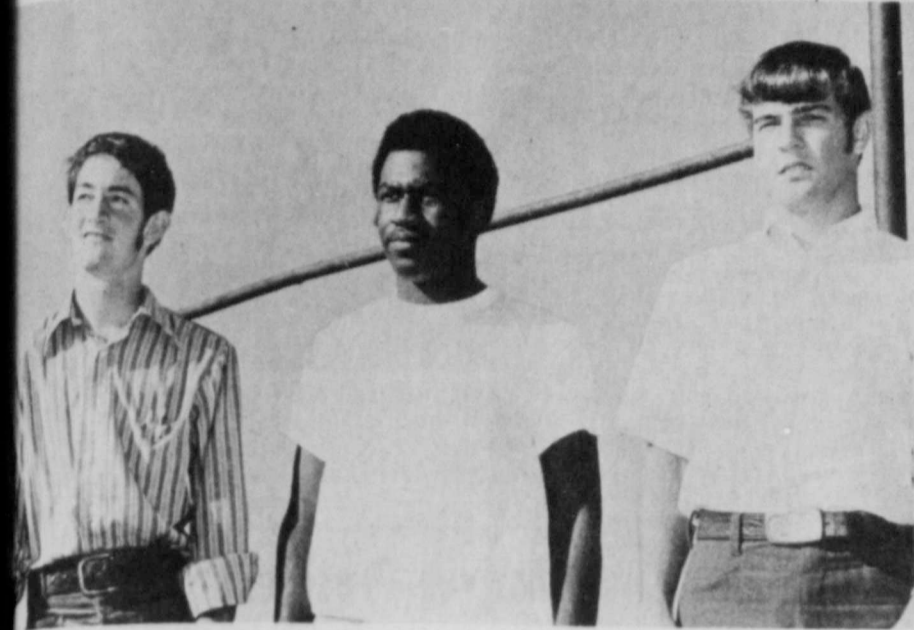


Whirlwinds Breeze Into Ralls Friday Night

Kick-off At 8 p.m.

The Ralls Jackrabbits will provide the first grid test of the 1971 season for Coach L. G. Wilson's Floydada Whirlwinds in a non-conference game there Friday at 8 p.m.

The 'Rabbits, who moved up to AA ball just last year, were ranked in pre-season polls as "a year away from championship caliber." Ralls joined the AA ranks in the tough District 4-AA, which includes the likes of Denver City, Slaton and Friendship. Their 1970 record was 3-6-1.

Quarterback Lee Clodfelter, a six-foot, 170-pound senior, started both ways last season for the Jackrabbits. Kenny Wideman (6-0, 160, senior) and Joe Flores (6-0, 140, sophomore) are back-up men at the quarterback position.

Running back James Author

(5-11, 140, senior) is a returning starter from last year. Other Ralls runners include David Sleuter (5-8, 130, senior), Rodney Reese (5-10, 135, soph.), and Scott Gilbreath (5-10, 130, soph.).

Receivers to watch include David Myers (6-1, 155, soph.), a starter last year, Danny Blackburn (6-0, 165, junior) and James Couch (5-6, 130, senior).

Jackrabbit linemen Bobby Roye (6-0, 165, senior), Lynn Daniels (5-9, 150, senior), and Ricky Tucker (6-0, 185, senior) all started last year and provide the Ralls line experience.

In all, Ralls returns six offensive and four defensive from 1970.

INJURIES LISTED
The Whirlwinds are not in

top physical condition for the season opener, Wilson said Tuesday. Tony Goen injured a knee in the Tahoka scrimmage, Kim Rose and Les Robertson have sore backs, and quarterback Rick Watts is nursing a bad leg. Rose, Robertson and Watts are listed as starters Friday, however.

DEPTH PROBLEM
Wilson said the Whirlwinds looked good at time in the Tahoka scrimmage, but need to develop a consistency in the offensive attack and a little more aggressiveness in their defensive play. "Inexperience showed up (in the Tahoka scrimmage) and depth is still a problem, especially in the line," Wilson noted. "Our young linemen must continue to improve," he said.

RALLS IMPRESSIVE
Ralls looked impressive in their scrimmage with Olton last week, the head Windcoach said, Clodfelter at quarterback directing the ball club well and

doing a good job of running and passing, especially to end Bobby Roye.

"Ralls always hits the field against the Whirlwinds with blood in their eyes," Wilson remarked. "We know this game will be no exception."

Alma Holmes Ends Radio Career

The final broadcast of "Listen Ladies" on KFLD Radio Tuesday marked the end of some 26 years in the radio business for Alma Holmes, manager and part owner of the local station who "gave up the reins" that day.

Alma and her late husband Ed Holmes started in radio in 1945 at KVOP in Plainview with a family show featuring the Holmeses and their five children. They brought radio to Floydada in April of 1951 when they opened KFLD. B. A. Robertson and Marshall Formby were other partners in the KFLD venture. Mrs. Holmes took over the management of the station in 1960. Holmes was killed in September, 1954.

Cotton Pesticide Use Eyed

A method of establishing chemicals on cotton production is the subject of a new A&M University study.

Dr. Ronald Lacewell, agricultural economist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is heading the project.

Emphasis of the study is to test the feasibility of a new technique, the "Delphi Method," as a means of establishing the relationship between cotton production and pesticide use.

In this method, informed judgment is brought to bear on the particular topic under consideration by using a closely directed survey process. Experts in herbicides which include approximately 150 weed scientists, entomologists and economists are being used in testing the

By considering the total Cotton Belt and using the Delphi method Lacewell explains they expect to obtain data that will permit (for cotton) a complete production analysis of the impact of any specified pesticide regulation. This analysis would include expected regional adjustments in acres grown and crop substitutions that may occur. Total national output along with farm and consumer prices of cotton can be estimated from this.

Lacewell contends that area or regional control of agricultural chemicals may not be adequate because crops and insects are not totally limited by geographic boundaries.

Per acre values of farm land and buildings went up 3 percent nationally in the year ended March 1, 1971.

GUEST EDITORIAL

THERE'S NO DOUBT but what a part of our racial prejudice is due to the color of one's skin. . . or any other physical or mental characteristic, for that matter.

In Biblical times there was an animosity between the Jews and Samaritans. In more modern times, there has been animosity between the Irish and the English, the Japanese and Chinese, as well as the black and the white.

BUT WE HAVE LONG insisted that much of our present problem involving the white and black is due less to color of skin than to hygienic, educational, and social differences.

We don't have to be guilty of a weakness to bear its stigma.

For instance, . . . all Brooklynites are supposed to speak with a Brooklyn brogue, all southerners fail to pronounce their "r's", all northerners are supposed to be cold and unfriendly, all southerners are supposed to be warm and friendly, all Texans are supposed to have big mouths and a few oil wells.

All Irishmen are supposed to have red hair, a lot of gab, and dance the Irish reel. All Scotchmen are supposed to be stingy.

SO IT IS THAT all Negroes are supposed to live in dirty shanties, permit their living premises to look like hog pens, have a stabbing or shooting every Saturday night, be intellectually and educationally inferior, filthy mouthed, deficient in personal hygiene, immoral, and the like.

So it is that when someone objects to eating in the same restaurant with a Negro, swimming in the same pool, going to school together, living next door to a Negro, he is often thinking not so much of the color of skin as these other attributes.

TRUE IT IS THAT some Negroes are guilty of these charges, just as some Irishmen do have red hair, some Scots are stingy, some northerners are cold, some southerners are friendly, and some Texans do own several oil wells.

But the thing to remember is that not ALL fall into the same pattern.

It's one thing not to want to live next door to a Negro who keeps his premises like some of the Negroes living in Sunbelt, do, who don't want their children to associate with some Negro children in Tulsa who have filthy mouths, who are lacking in cleanliness. . . just as some would not want to live next door to some Tulsa whites whose homes look like hog pens, who have a body odor that can be detected a half block away, who have filthy mouths.

The lesson to be learned is that we must judge individuals, not races. A person should be accepted or rejected on the basis of his own character - not some characteristic attributed to his race.

There's no reason why a Negro can't be just as cultured, just as clean, just as educated as any white. Our blood cannot be distinguished in the laboratory. The physical properties that make up our minds and bodies are just the same. We are all descendants of Adam and Eve.

THE NEGRO WHO refuses to take advantage of his opportunities to live up to the moral, hygienic, and educational standards of society should be censured. . . just as the white who refuses to accept the Negro AFTER he has "earned his place in society", as some bigots put it, should be censured.

BOE TIEUEL, a Negro who writes a column for this paper, said what we have been saying for a long time - only he said it much more eloquently. He was much more articulate.

He told of a black real estate firm in Dallas which recently carried in substance the following advertisement in a number of papers:

"At CEMA Village, we discriminate! At CEMA Village we are prejudiced! We want you to know before you move in or apply for a CEMA home! We are prejudiced against families who do not cut their lawns or take care in yard beautification. We discriminate against those who cause blight in the community by having useless junk cars parked on their lawns. However, we are color-blind - we welcome persons of all races, creeds and colors irrespective of dogmas. We actively seek to build a multi-racial community, an oasis of understanding, a community of progressive minded people. If you are one of these, you will be welcome."

Can you think of any white Tulsa families whom you wouldn't want living next door to you? Whom you don't want playing with your children? Whom you wouldn't want to sit by in a restaurant? Whom you wouldn't want sitting by you in church or swimming in your swimming pool? (Tulsa Herald)

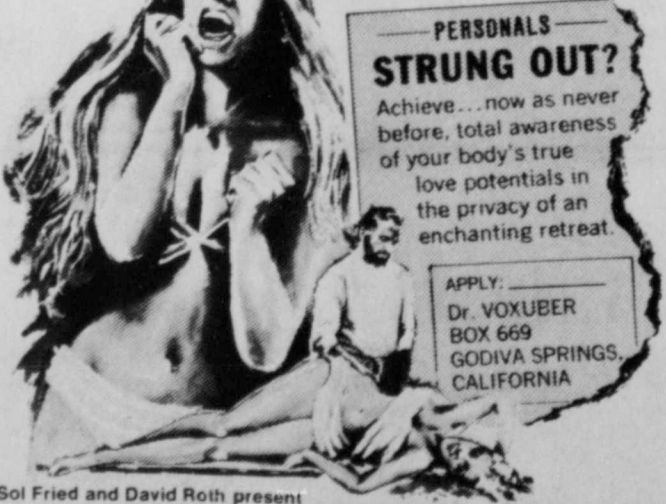

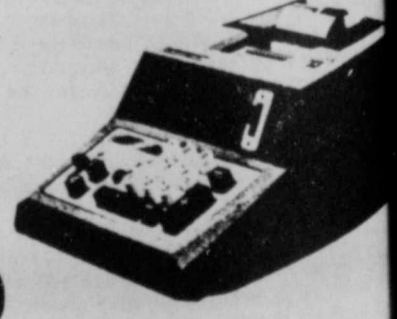

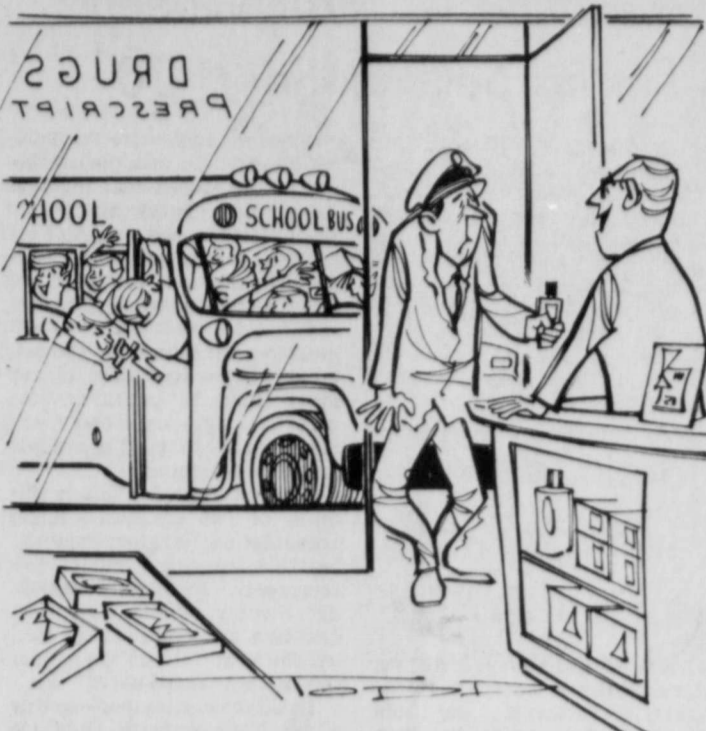
Has Congress looked into the matter of how many returning Viet Nam veterans have picked up this no-handshaking habit?

WTSU STUDENTS HEAR SENATOR

Withdrawal Of Most Troops By June '72 Seen By Tower

CANYON (Special) — U. S. Sen. John Tower said Tuesday he feels all American ground forces in Vietnam, with the exception of those necessary to protect vital installations, will be out of the country by June 1972.

The senator from Wichita Falls was in Canyon to address the West Texas State University ROTC students and the WTSU student body in the second of the university's special speaker series.

The Senate Armed Forces sub-committee member said he feels Vietnamization will be successful enough by mid-1972 that the South Vietnamese government can protect itself.

Speaking briefly on the Nixon

wage-price freeze. Tower predicted that a "frost" would follow and that some controls will remain even after the official freeze is concluded.

The senator said he expects "a voluntary board of some sort" to govern such controls on prices and wages following the conclusion of the freeze.

A lengthy question and answer session followed the senator's 20 minute speech. When questioned about the president's upcoming trip to China, Tower said, "The only lines of communication

between Americans and Chinese are between the ping pong teams."

Foresees No Thaw

"I foresee no thawing of the Cold War between our two countries," Tower said.

Prior to his visit to the West Texas State campus, Tower held a brief press conference in Amarillo and then toured the city.

He left Canyon following his address to the WTSU student body in order to be in Washington for today's session of congress.

The McCarthy Of 1972-- Which Man Will It Be?

By Edward H. Sims

There are always eager-beaver or conscientious politicians ready to react to highly emotional national dilemmas such as the Vietnam war. In 1968 the emotional reaction of some politicians and militants might have cost the Democrats victory. And the intriguing question this year among many has been: Who will turn out to be the Gene McCarthy of 1972 in next year's presidential election?

There might be another McCarthy but there also might not be. If President Nixon has successfully defused the war, emotions will have calmed. Support for a candidate who wishes to bring all the troops home tomorrow, or impeach the President, etc., will have less impact.

The press on the left is trying to boom California's Congressman Pete McCloskey. He suggests impeaching the President. But he may be more of a political opportunist than anything else. He made his pitch for a debate on impeachment before a student audience at Stanford. He announced some days later he would oppose Mr. Nixon in the primaries.

In spite of the fact that the New York Times Magazine devoted a long article to him recently (the week before it ran an article with simulated headlines of Mr. Nixon's defeat in 1972) and in spite of the noise

in behalf of McCloskey by California college students (perhaps the worst advertisement for him in national, adult eyes), he isn't yet to be taken seriously.

There are others to be taken more seriously, including Senator Ed McGovern of South Dakota, older and longer in Congress.

Vets' License Requests Due By October 1

Certification of Texas veterans disabled 70 percent or more for qualification to receive free license plate for one auto will be done by the Veterans Administration, according to Jack Coker, VA Regional Director at Waco. VA records show 14,150 Texas veterans are 70 percent or more disabled. Eligible veterans should act now to establish their claim for this state benefit approved by the last Texas legislature, Coker emphasized. Texas motor vehicle authorities must have the request by October 1, 1971, in order for the veteran to qualify to receive his free 1972 license plate. Forms for application have been distributed by Texas officials to VA offices, Texas Veterans Affairs Commission county service officers, Tax Assessor Collector offices and Texas Motor Vehicle District offices. Since this is a new state be-

nefit Texas officials do not know which Texas residents qualify, so it is the responsibility of each veteran who has a 70 percent service-connected disability to make application. Coker expressed concern that so far the Waco Regional Office has received only 1,700 applications for VA verification. Coker noted that eligible veterans should obtain their form, complete the veteran status part and sent it to 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, Waco, Texas 76710. The VA will certify the degree of disability and return the form to the veteran applicant. The veteran then tenders this certified form to the Texas Motor Vehicle Division with one dollar for handling and mailing. The dollar should not be sent with the form to the VA. Since several days of mail transmission to and from the VA and records checking by the VA will be necessary, veterans are cautioned not to wait until the last few days in September before acting.

Green Thumb Crew Returns To Work

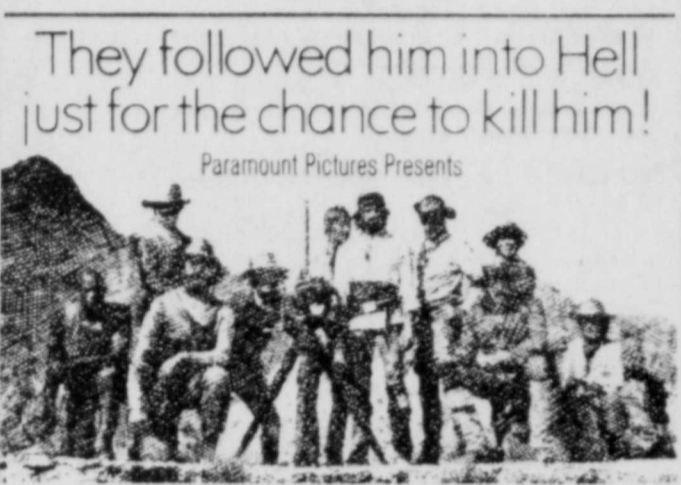

Green Thumb is sponsored by the Texas Farmers Union in a twofold effort to revitalize rural areas and provide a decent living for retired rural citizens. One of the most successful projects to aid low income citizens, the program spends over eighty-five percent of its budget in wages to the work participants. To qualify for the program an individual must be over 55 years of age, live under a minimum income level established by the Department of Labor, and be physically able to work. The average age of Green Thumb workers in Texas is 66 years. Most men come from rural backgrounds and have little or no retirement or social security income. 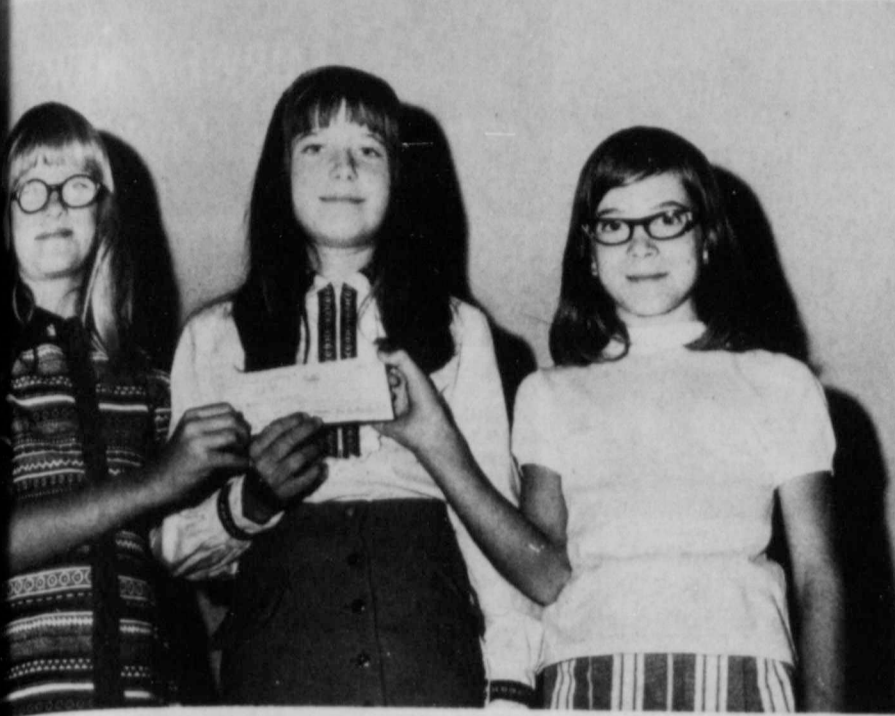

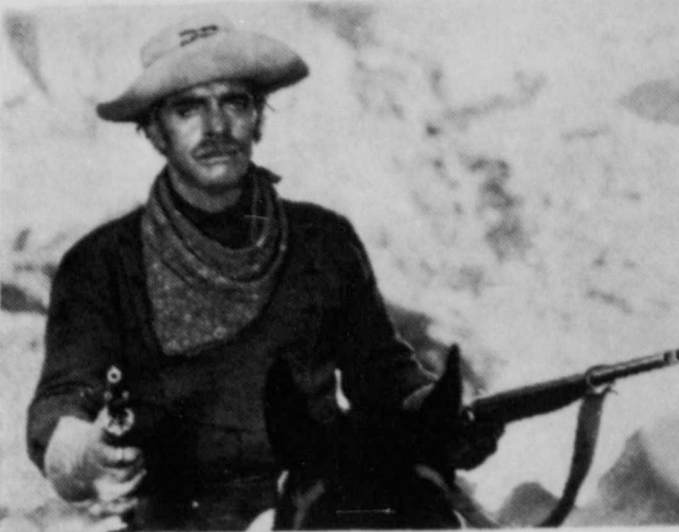

Bell Contributions To Economy Up

In spite of a generally dull performance of the economy during 1970, four Bell System companies posted a record \$718 million contribution to the economy of Texas.

Leading contributor among the four companies operating in the state was Southwestern Bell Telephone Company with expenditures of more than \$491 million. The company serves about 80 per cent of the state's telephones. Other associated companies operating in Texas are Western Electric, manufacturing and supply unit of the Bell System; Mountain Bell Telephone Company, providing telephone service in four El Paso exchanges; and AT&T Long Lines Department which maintains much of the system's long distance network.

Payroll for the four companies accounted for the largest single expenditure—nearly \$323 million of the \$718 million total, according to H.D. Schodde, vice president of Southwestern Bell's Texas operations. The four companies employ more than 40,700 Texans.

Commenting on the increasing amount of construction being undertaken by the Bell System, Schodde said that construction expenditures in Texas for buildings and outside plant hit a record \$157 million. He pointed out that this represented six per cent of the total non-residential construction in the state.

Schodde also noted that the

Bell System's Texas payroll and construction program, when coupled with a state and local tax bill of more than \$75 million, had substantial impact on nearly every community served by the System. This local impact was typified by Western Electric which alone made purchases from 1,740 suppliers in 112 towns and cities throughout the state amounting to more than \$103 million.

At year's end, Bell System telephones in Texas totaled more than 5,243,000.

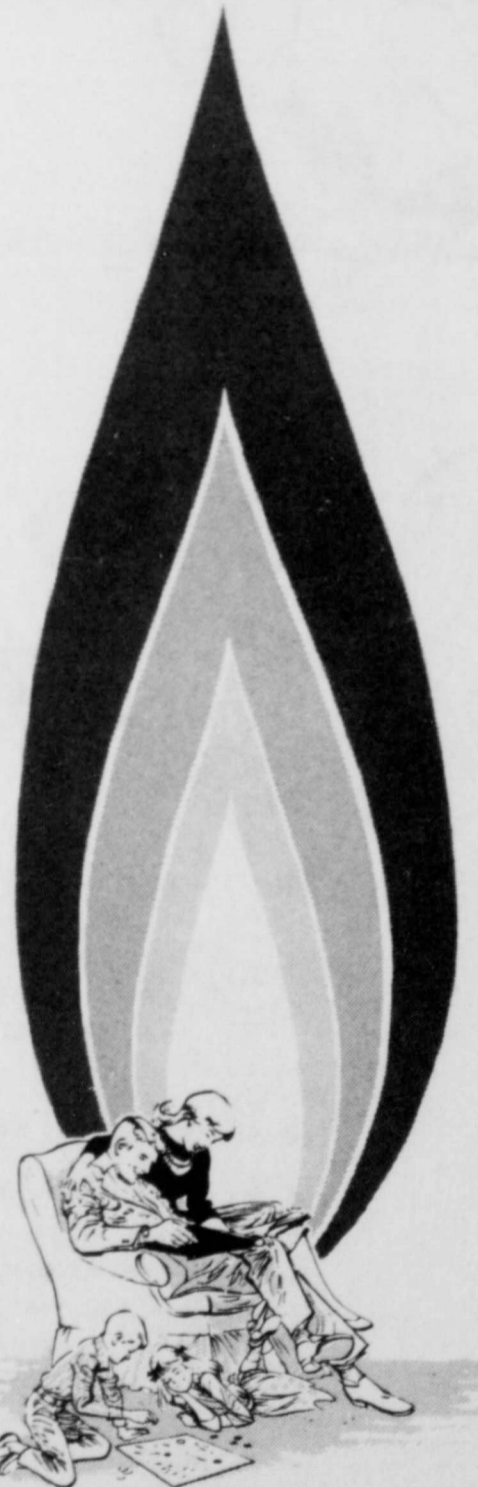
