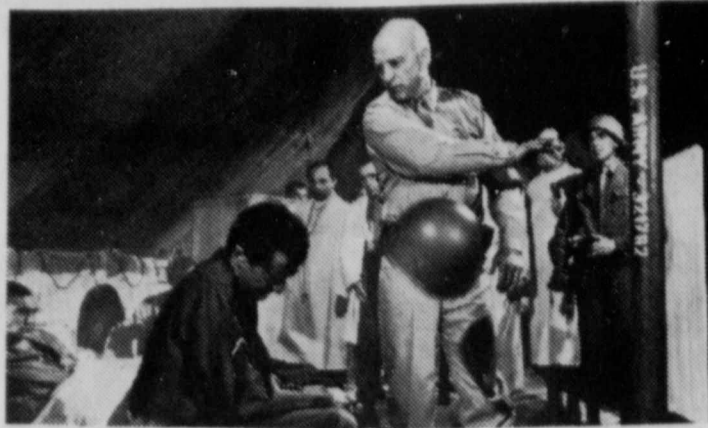

weight). Licensed farm trailers can have a gross weight of 10,000 pounds before brakes required. Farm trailers are not to be pulled faster than 30 miles per hour loaded or unloaded.

A farmer may pull two trailers if overall length of trailers and pickup does not exceed 65 feet. Cars can pull only one trailer, and this includes station wagons.

As many persons as can be carried in the cab of a pickup and not obstruct driver's view or ability to control the vehicle is lawful.

Persons must not occupy house trailer while being pulled in Texas.

The law about piling grain sorghum, cotton, or cotton bolls too high requires that load must be no higher than 6' from the top of the sideboards.

About the new law of leaving keys in vehicles; this applies to public streets and roads, not private parking. Also emergency brake must be set when you leave car.

Raney said fines on the trailer laws were anywhere from \$1 to \$200.

Raney said these laws were set up to conform with laws of other states.

As a result, Reue noted that participants often would not be able to find additional investors in a given community or area by the time they enter the program simply because the recruiting activities by earlier participants have exhausted the number of prospects.

Reue emphasized that wise investors are advised in considering such a business venture to weigh the factors ordinarily involved in establishing independent small businesses and any state and local requirements.

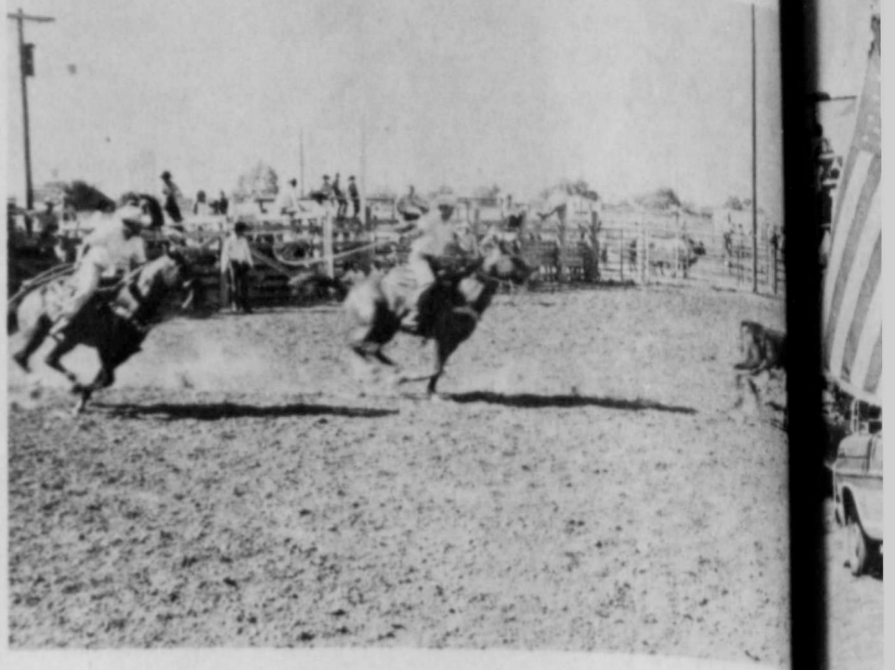

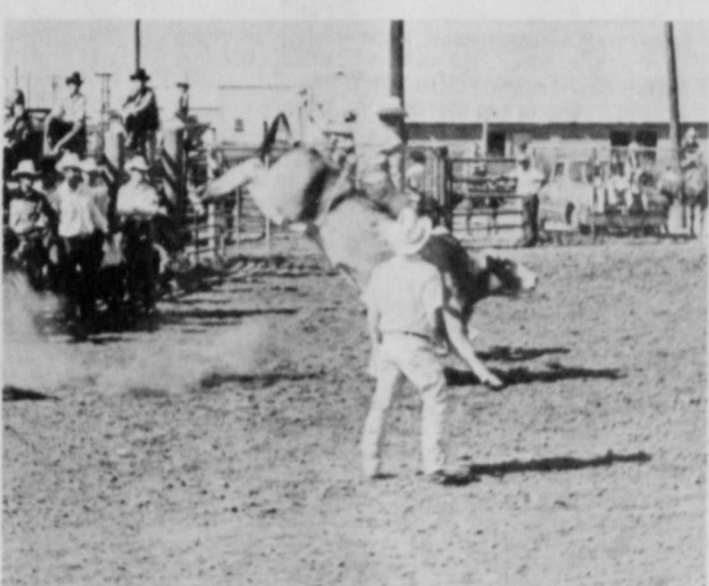

**Arwine At Cancer Meeting Held In Houston**

15,800 Texans died of cancer last year, the nation's second highest death rate. Dr. Charles Pelphey of Austin, chairman of the service and rehabilitation committee, presented an example of service and rehabilitation in rehabilitating a patient after cancer surgery. The Society claims that more than half of all cancers could be cured now if people would heed the warning signals, get regular health check-ups and seek prompt treatment.

Mrs. Arwine, reporting on the meeting, said the American Cancer Society volunteers made progress in all program areas. She added that Texas leads the nation in fund raising and ranks third in reaching the greatest percentage of people with educational programs. Mrs. Arwine further stated that the cancer research investment in Texas has reached a new high with grants totaling \$1,347,336 in Texas institutions. Nationwide, ACS research grants totaled \$21,789,462 as of the last granting period (July 1, 1971).

Much of the Society's meeting was strictly business according to Mrs. Arwine, with 36 different volunteer conferences, committee meetings and elections. The 110 member State Board elected new officers, 58 directors-at-large and 33 executive committee members.

Dr. Grover Bynum of Austin, outgoing president of the Texas Division, made the final address to the 300 delegates at the annual dinner.

# Ralls Falls, 21-0, To 'Wind Ground Attack

## Harris, Mitchell, Kunkel Find End Zone

(by JAMES HUGGINS)

Whirlwind running backs divided the scoring Friday night as the 'Winds whitewashed Ralls, 21-0, in the season opener for both clubs. The Ralls stadium crowd saw speedy Walter Harris scoot 24 yards for the initial tally with 7:43 remaining in the second quarter; Van Mitchell exploded 66 yards for another first-half TD run, and fullback Jim Kunkel went three yards for the final Floydada six-pointer late in the last period.

The Whirlwind defense held the Jackrabbits twice after they had penetrated the Floydada ten-yard line, threatening to get back in the game in the third period. Ralls had driven to the 'Winds' 17 late in the second period, when the Floydada defense also held.

### PLAY-BY-PLAY

Harris gave the 'Winds good field position by returning the opening kick-off 30 yards to the Floydada 45. Mitchell picked up three yards and Kunkel banged for the first down at the Ralls 37. Three carries by Mitchell and Harris netted nine yards, and Kunkel's fourth-down carry was short of the mark and Ralls took over.

An offside penalty against the 'Winds put the ball on Ralls' 32. 'Rabbit' quarterback Joe Flores was trapped twice for losses totaling three yards before fullback Tony Chron bolted for 43 yards, and Ralls threatened from the Floydada 28.

Four plays later, Kim Rose intercepted Flores' fourth- and nine pass, and the Whirlwinds went to the attack from their 25. Floydada quarterback Rick Watts threw what was to be his only pass of the night, an incomplete toss to Charles Jackson, after Kunkel got nothing on the first-down run. Watts was thrown for a five-yard loss, and Mark Vinson punted, a 35-yarder. Ralls completed a third-down pass, but Chron fumbled after the catch, and Mitchell made the grab for the 'Winds at the 45.

Mitchell got 10, Harris picked up 25 on a penalty-aided run that advanced the ball to the Ralls 20, then three plays later Ralls recovered a Harris fumble at their 14 to end the

drive. The Jackrabbits owned the ball third-and-13 when the first period ended. They couldn't go, and punted to the Floydada 32.

Carries by Harris and Mitchell advanced the ball to the Ralls 24 (Mitchell clicked on key third-down carries of 22 and seven yards to keep the drive alive). Harris broke loose for the final 24 steps and the score. The score stood Floydada 6, Ralls 0 after Harris, new to the kicking game, missed the ball on the kick try.

Ralls took the ensuing kickoff at their 28, advanced to the 36 on the return, then started a drive that went all the way to the Whirlwind 17 before they lost the ball on downs.

Mitchell hit for eight yards, and Harris picked up the first down at the 34 yard line. Then Mitchell thrilled the crowd with his 66-yard TD run. The Whirlwinds led 14-0 after Harris evened things up with a two-point conversion run.

The kickoff came with 1:36 left in the first half, and Ralls had nosed the ball into Whirlwind territory when time ran out.

Halftime statistics showed the 'Winds leading in rushing yardage, 202-130. Flores was 1-for-2 passing for 13 yards and one interception; Watts was 0-for-1. Floydada led in first downs, 7-6.

### SECOND HALF

Harris' kick-off was returned 13 yards to the Ralls 29, and the Jackrabbits drove-for-first downs at their 45, Floydada's 45, and the Whirlwind 34, 22, and nine-yard lines. The gains came on runs by Chron and James Arthur. Ralls drove on to the Whirlwind seven before the defense held again, and the ball went over on downs.

Just two plays later, though, a Ralls lineman fell on a Van Mitchell fumble and the 'Rabbits threatened again from the seven yard line. Three running plays and an incomplete pass netted 'em a minus three yards as the Big Green defense once again came through in the clutch.

## SPORTING EVENTS



The Whirlwind offense cranked up and moved the ball this time, relying on the running of Mitchell and Harris. Mitchell carried for six, seven and four yards, Harris added eight, and sophomore back Rex Rose picked up two just before the third period ended. The 'Winds owned the ball at their 37, a second-and-eight try to come. Mitchell provided the tenth Floydada first down as he exploded to the Ralls 46, but FHS could manage only five more yards from there, and they were forced to punt.

The 'Rabbits advanced from their 11 to a first down at the 21, then were thrown back to their seven and forced to punt. Langston Williams returned to the Ralls 32, and Floydada started the final scoring drive of the night.

This one was Kunkel's: the Whirlwind fullback ground out 23 of the 32 yards to the goal, including the final three steps through the line with 3:34 remaining in the game. Rance Young kicked the PAT and that was all the scoring.

Williams intercepted Flores' pass on the first play from scrimmage after the score. Penalties kept the Whirlwinds around midfield and forced the punt. Terry Jester jumped on the fumbled punt at the Ralls 28, and the 'Winds tried it again, advancing to the four before

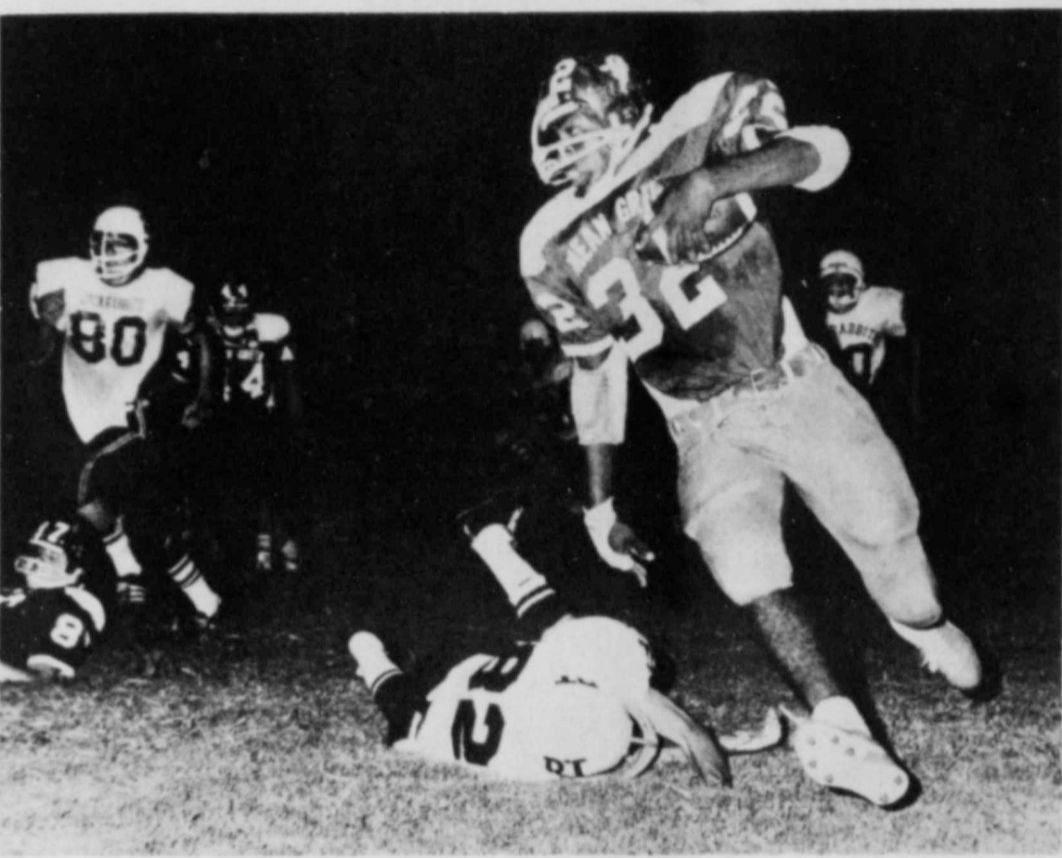

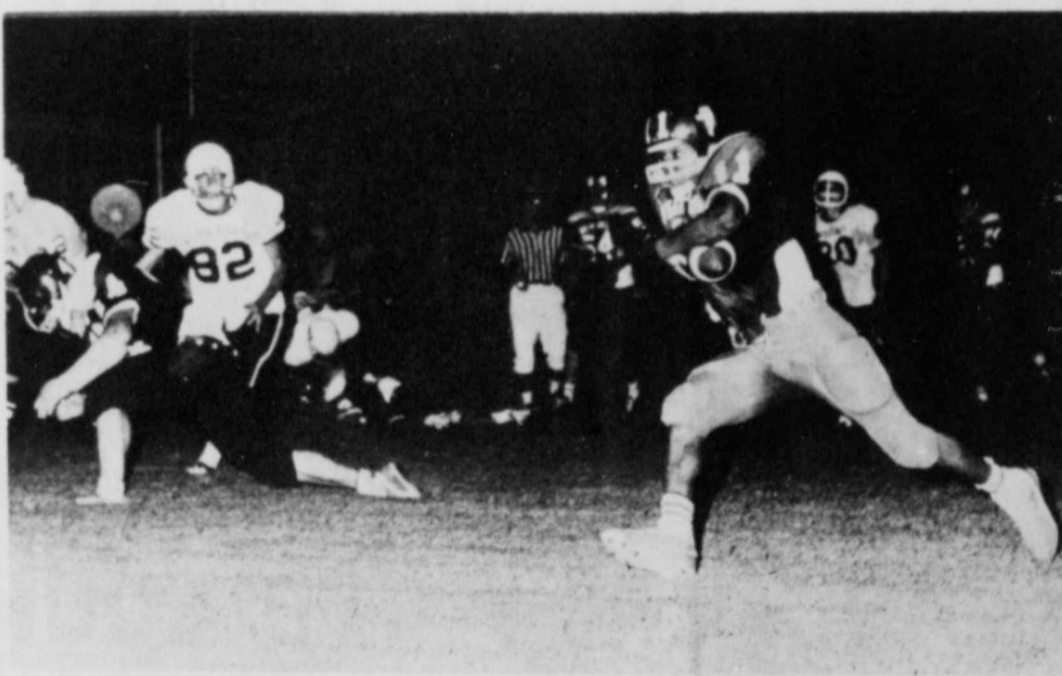

**LEGAL NOTICES**

AN ACT relating to the recording and rerecording of livestock brands and marks; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 Title 121. of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who according to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

(d) Immediately upon the taking effect of this Act, the county clerk of the county shall have this Act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of thirty days. The publication shall be paid for by the county out of the general county fund.

Sec. 2. All clerks in registering brands shall comply with Articles 6890 through 6899, inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, and with Section 1, Chapter 273, Acts of the 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended (Article 6899a, Vernon' Texas Civil Statutes), and shall also be aware of and comply with Articles 1484 1485, and 1486 of the Penal Code of Texas, 1925.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 4. The importance of this legislation and the crowded condition of the calendars in both Houses create an emergency and an imperative public necessity that the Constitutional Rule requiring bills to be read on three several days in each House be suspended, and this Rule is hereby suspended; and that this Act take effect and be in force from and after its passage, and it is so enacted. 9-30-71

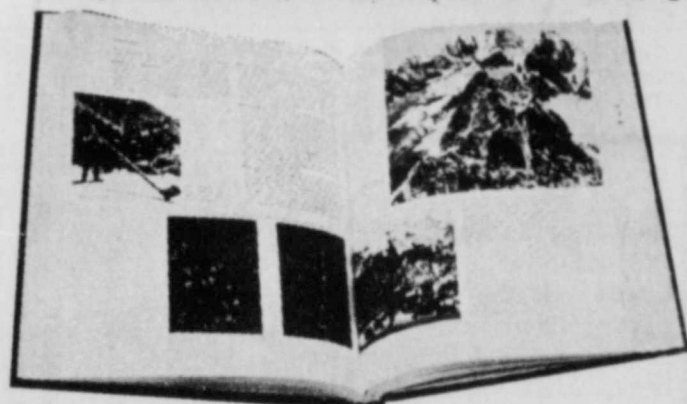
