Reue cited a recent bulletin from the Council of Better Business Bureaus, Inc., which detailed a Federal Trade Commission cease and desist order against Bestline Products Inc., San Jose, Calif., a multi-level marketing program to sell household, commercial and industrial cleaners through franchised distributors-investors.

The Hesperian will print this information nearer January 1. Rainey said the side mirror law also comes in January 1. requiring mirrors that reveal objects 200 feet to the rear. Rainey listed these requirements of laws that are now in effect:

Two or more red reflectors not less than 15' high nor more than 60" high mounted on the rear of trailers and a light. When pulling a vehicle with objects that protrude over the sides, if object extends more than 4' to the rear or sides red reflectors and lights should indicate corners of projections at night. Nighttime is considered 30 minutes after sundown and 30 minutes before sunup. In daytime objects that extend over 4' should be marked with 12" square red flags. In case a trailer is parked at

night by the roadside, it should have white lights at front and red lights at rear. Rainey said that he would take a "reasonable attitude" considering whether or not the farmer left the trailer on the shoulder of the road or pulled it into the safety of the barrow ditch.

The big triangle reflectors are only applicable for vehicles traveling less than 25 miles per hour. These laws apply to all county

and public roads, paved or dirt. The brake laws are effective now



weight). Licensed farmtrailers can have a gross weight of 10,000 pounds before brakes required. Farm trailers are not to be pulled faster than 30 milers per hour loaded or unloaded.

A farmer may pull two trailers if overall length of trailers and pickup does not exceed 65 feet. Cars can pull only one trailer, and this includes station wagons.

As many persons as can be carried in the cab of a pickup and not obstruct driver's view or ability to control the vehicle is lawful.

Persons must not occupy house trailer while being pulled in Texas.

The law about piling grain sorghum, cotton, or cotton burrs too high requires that load must be no higher than 6" from the top of the sideboards. About the new law of leaving


keys in vehicles: this applies to public streets and roads, not private parking. Also emergency brake must be set when you leave car.







Ralls Falls, 21-0, To 'Wind Ground Attad Harris, Mitchell, Kunkel Find EndZone

Whirlwind running backs divided the scoring Friday night as the 'Winds whitewashed Ralls, 21-0, in the season opener for both clubs. The Ralls stadium crowd saw speedy Walter Harris scoot 24 yards for the initial tally with 7:43 remaining in the second quarter; Van Mitchell exploded 66 yards for another first-half TD run, and fullback Jim Kunkel went three yards for the final Floydada sixpointer late in the last period.

The Whirlwind defense held the Jackrabbits twice after they had penetrated the Floydada ten-yard line, threatening to get back in the game in the third period, Ralls had driven to the 'Winds' 17 late in the second period, when the Floydada defense also held,

field position by returning the the Floydada 45. Mitchell picked up three yards and Kunkel banged for the first down at the Ralls 37. Three carries by Mitchell and Harris nettednine yards, and Kunkel's fourthdown carry was short of the mark and Ralls took over.

An offside penalty against the 'Winds put the ball on Ralls' 32. 'Rabbit quarterback Joe Flores was trapped twice for losses totaling three yards before fullback Tony Chron bolted for 43 yards, and Ralls threatened from the Floydada 28.

Four plays later, Kim Rose intercepted Flores' fourthand nine pass, and the Whirlwinds went to the attack from their 25.

Floydada quarterback Rick Watts threw what was to be his only pass of the night, an incomplete toss to Charles Jackson, after Kunkel got nothing on the first-down run. Watts was thrown for a five-yard loss, and Mark Vinson punted, a 35yarder. Ralls completed a third-down pass, but Chron fumbled after the catch, and Mitchell made the grab for the 'Winds at the 45.

Mitchell got 10, Harrispicked up 25 on a penalty-aided run that advanced the ball to the Ralls 20, then three plays later Ralls recovered a Harris fumble at their 14 to end the

Harris gave the 'Winds good drive. The Jackrabbits owned the ball third-and-13 when the opening kick-off 30 yards to first period ended. They couldn't go, and punted to the Floy-

dada 32 Carries by Harris and Mitchell advanced the ball to the Ralls 24 (Mitchell clicked on key third-down carries of 22 and seven yards to keep the drive alive). Harris broke loose for the final 24 steps and the score. The score stood Floydada 6, Ralls 0 after Harris, new to the kicking game, missed the ball on the kick try.

Ralls took the ensuing kickoff at their 28, advanced to the 36 on the return, then started a drive that went all the way to the Whirlwind 17 before they lost the ball on downs.

Mitchell hit for eight yards, and Harris picked up the first down at the 34 yard line. Then Mitchell thrilled the crowd with his 66-yard TD run. The Whirlwinds led 14-0 after Harris evened things up with a twopoint conversion run.

The kickoff came with 1:36 left in the first half, and Ralls had nosed the ball into Whirlwind territory when time ran out.

Halftime statistics showed running back brought the crowd to their feet with the 66-yard scoring the 'Winds leading in rushing jaunt. yardage, 202 - 130. Flores was 1-for-2 passing for 13 yards and one interception; Watts was 0-for-1. Floydada led in first downs, 7-6.
