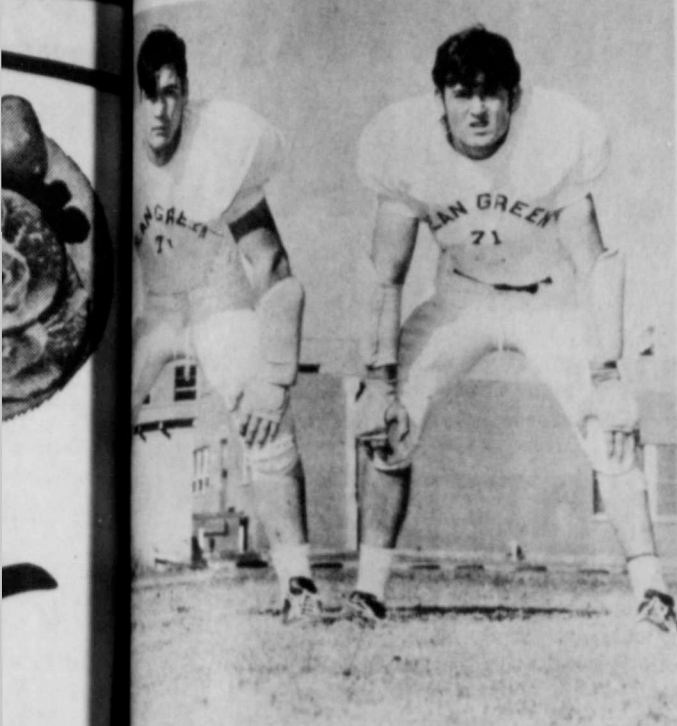


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# Whirlwinds Need Win Friday To Finish As 3-AA Champs . . . Or Co-Champs

## More Paving And Police Protection For Floydada

More paving and more police protection for the citizens of Floydada highlighted the regular monthly meeting of the Floydada City Council when it met Monday night.

Bill Yandell and Albert Pricer met with the council about paving Jeffie Street just east of Jr. High School. They told the council that 9 of 12 property owners had signed petition for paving. Then Lawrence Stovall, Louis Bearden and J. E. LeWallen presented a petition for paving Hallie Street, southeast of Jr. High School. They report 7 of 10 property owners had signed for paving.

The council approved both projects and instructed city manager Bill Feuerbacher to complete paper work on both. It was surmised that the complete paving job might not be complete until spring due to cold weather ahead.

**POLICE PROTECTION**

Chairman of the Floydada retail trade committee Bill Hale met with the council and asked for more police protection for Floydada business firms as there has been a considerable amount of burglary lately.

The council instructed the city manager to initiate a program for increased police protection from the hours of 10

p.m. to 7 a.m. seven nights a week. A policeman will be patrolling the downtown area of Floydada, another the outlying areas.

These policemen will be on duty at all times, no coffee breaks, snacks or meals will be eaten in the police car. Should one policeman encounter trouble, he will contact city police dispatcher for aid, while other patrolling policeman continues to keep his area under surveillance.

#### FOOD SHOPPING HINTS

To make wiser use of food dollar shop with a grocery list. A key to making a thrifty list is checking newspaper ads. Find out which food items are on special and work them into your weekly menu. Also consider the plentiful foods for the month and include these in your menu.

Plan your menu for the week in advance and make your shopping list from your menu. In making your list, jot down items by departments to save steps in the store.

Take advantage of the specials that you can use and store. If frozen foods are on special and you have the freezer space you will save money by taking advantage of these items. Make sure your family can make the best use of items on special. Keep in mind that price is no measure of nutritional value

of food. Loin steaks are pleasurable eating, but other cuts such as chuck or roast provide the same healthy boon at a more economical price.

Large cuts of meat on special mean a bargain in price per pound as well as meat for several meals.

Compare the prices of meats and poultry with the number of servings you'll get from each pound. You can figure on four servings from a pound of corn in meat and one serving from a very bony choice.

Many meat substitutes can be purchased for a reasonable price. Some meat substitutes include eggs, dry beans, dry peas, nuts and peanut butter.

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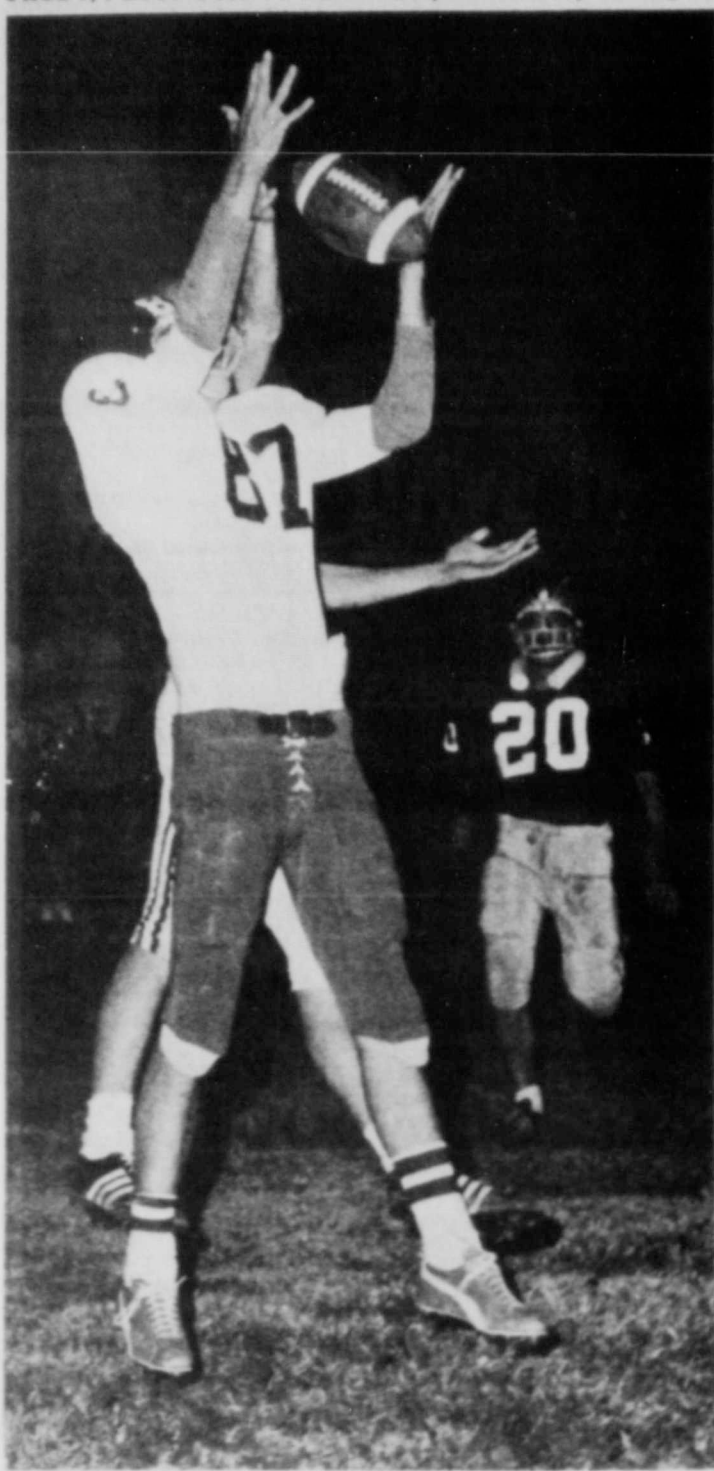

# Littlefield Wins: 0-0; 1-1; 13

## First Downs Are Victory Margin

Four first downs meant the difference in the ball game and almost certainly the District 3-AA representative in the playoffs November 19, as the Littlefield Wildcats tied the Floydada Whirlwinds on the scoreboard (0-0), and in penetrations (1-1), but edged the Green 13-9 in first downs to take the 3-AA victory Friday night.

The victory (and victory it was by 3-AA rules, sadly enough for Whirlwind fans) give the Wildcats a 5-1 district record, identical with the Whirlwinds, and means the playoff spot for Littlefield unless they lose to Morton this week while the Whirlwinds whip Abernathy. Victories (or losses) by both Floydada and Littlefield will leave the top spot knotted and allow Littlefield to advance to the bi-district game with 4-AA Roosevelt, via their win over the 'Winds. And a Wildcat victory, coupled with a Whirlwind loss, would give Littlefield sole possession of the title.

Late in the second quarter, Floydada advanced to the Littlefield 20 on a pass from Rick Watts to Langston Williams, and on the next play Van Mitchell crossed what was later to become the goal line for the 'Winds, that 20-yard line. But that was the only time the Green could crack the magic line for the night; last-ditch passing attempts in the fading moments of the game fell from the grasp of Walter Harris and Mark Vinson near the goal line.

The Wildcats got their penetration late in the game, on a 15-yard pass completion from quarterback Jay Trammell to tight end Larry Birkelbach that carried to the Floydada 15-yard line. Three plays later, Langston Williams recovered a Littlefield fumble at the eight to stop the scoring threat, but as it turned out, the penetration was all the Wildcats needed, as they had built up a big lead in the first-down department.

Seven of the 13 Littlefield first downs were made on carries by halfback Ralph Funk. The heralded Littlefield runner had a busy night, carrying 37 times for 138 yards.

### PLAY-BY-PLAY

Littlefield got three of its first downs on a 49-yard drive, the first time they had the ball. After the 'Winds failed to pick up their initial first down, Mark Vinson's punt went 45 yards, to the Littlefield 16, and the Wildcats weren't stopped until twelve plays later, when the Floydada defense held 'em at the Whirlwind 35. Funk carried the ball on all but two of those plays, all rushes.

Deep in their own territory at the nine, the 'Winds could make but a single first — at the 20 — before having to punt again. Fullback Jim Kunkel busted for four yards after Van Mitchell had netted seven yards on two carries. Then Walter Harris got a couple, and two passes missed their mark, forcing the kick from the 22.

The 'Cats took possession at their 46 and drove to the Floydada 35 before losing the ball on downs. After another Floydada punt, the Littlefield crew

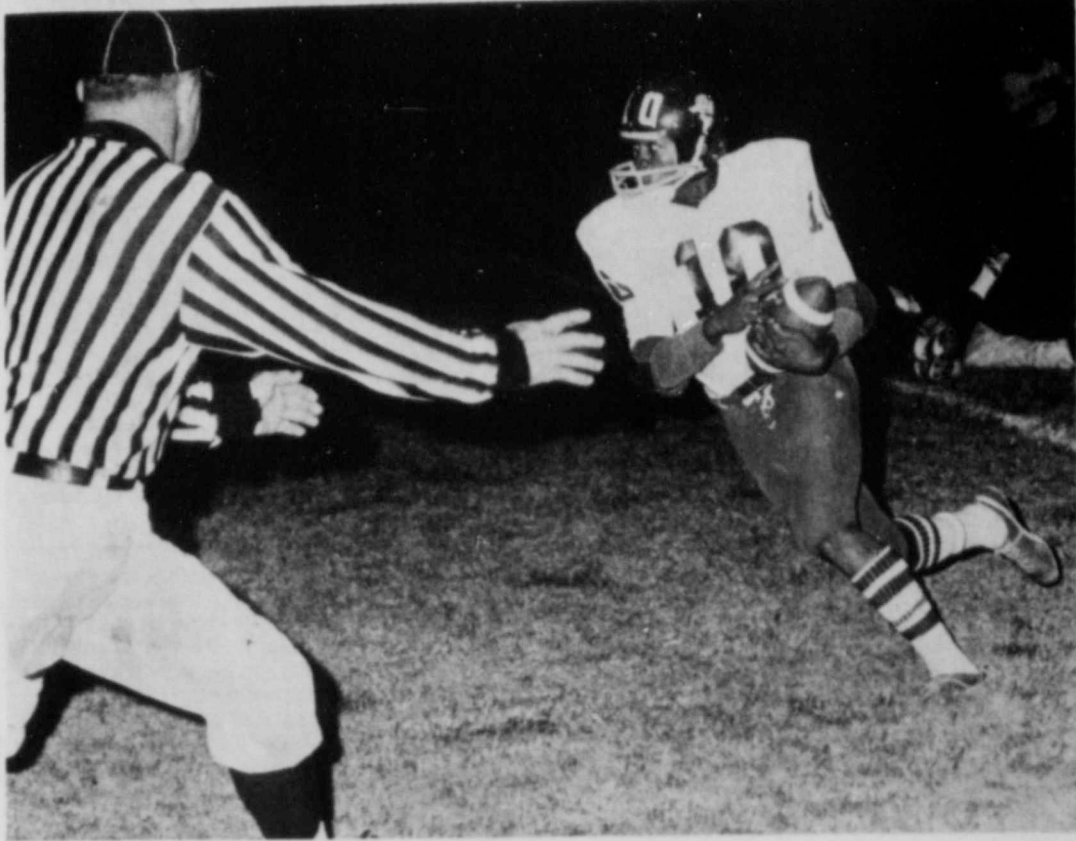
was able to push into Floydada territory again before Whirlwind linebacker Jay Jones fell on a fumble to end that drive at the 41.

Then came the Whirlwinds' penetration drive: Mitchell carried for two yards, Harris crossed into Littlefield's end of the field at the 49, then Mitchell ran again for the first down at the 45. Watts completed a 13-yarder to Harris at the 32, and, after sending Mitchell for a yard and missing him on a pass, threw the 11-yard completion to Williams at the 20. Mitchell got another yard, and quarterback Watts scampered to the Littlefield nine. A holding penalty on the next play put the 'Winds back to the 25. Watts connected with Harris on a four-yard pass, then tried to find end Mark Vinson near the goal on three pass attempts, but the two couldn't team up for a completion, and the ball went over on downs at the 21.

The 'Cats drove out to their 43, and, with time running out in the first half, Trammell lofted a pass to the Floydada 20-yard line that was picked off by Whirlwind safety Langston Williams on the last play before the halftime gun.

### SECOND HALF

The 'Cats took the second-half kickoff and set their ground game to work from their 32. Funk carried on nine of the ten plays the Wildcats ran, and was stopped inches short of a

first down at the Floydada 34. Taking over at that point, the 'Winds sent Harris for a 12-yard gainer, then Kunkel got three, Mitchell one, and Watts' pass to Harris was incomplete. Vinson had to punt again, the line of scrimmage right at midfield.

The 17-yard kick gave the 'Cats the ball at their 33, but, for the first time in the game, the Whirlwind defense refused to allow the 'Cats a first down,

and forced the punt.

Williams returned the kick eleven yards, to the Floydada 22. The Whirlwinds got out to their 38 and had to kick it away again. Vinson's 44-yarder put the 'Cats on their 18.

Jay Jones caught Trammell five yards behind the line, Funk carried for four, and a pass attempt was incomplete, forcing a punt.

Williams fielded the punt at his 35 and brought it out to the

Littlefield 47. Carries by Kunkel and Harris netted three yards, then Watts zipped for 13 and a first down at the Littlefield 37. Littlefield's defense held again, however, and Vinson punted, fourth and seven at the 34.

Going to the offense from their 20 following the touch back, Littlefield made what was to be the game-winning drive: on five straight carries, Funk got the ball up to midfield. Dennis Hartley broke loose for a 13-yard gainer, Funk netted two yards on a pair of carries, and then the back-breaker: two consecutive pass completions, the first to Hartley at the 30-yard line, and the game-winning (as it turned out) penetration, a completion to Larry Birkelbach at the Floydada 15. A fumble, recovered by Williams for the Whirlwinds, ended the scoring threat at the eight, but the 'Winds had to penetrate again to salvage the victory, and time was on the Wildcats' side late in the game.

Watts looked for Williams on three pass tries, hitting on only one, for four yards. Vinson's punt sailed 48 yards and put the 'Cats on their 40. The Floydada defense gave the 'Winds the ball one more time; an 18-yard Littlefield punt went only to the Floydada 35. Watts found Harris open for an eight-yard pickup, then Kunkel picked up the 'Winds ninth first down of the evening with a three-yard carry. After an illegal procedure penalty against the Whirlwinds,

Rex Rose carried for four yards, out to the Floydada 45, but that's as far as they could go, as, with time running out, three desperation passes, one intended for Harris and two for Mark Vinson, 'way downfield,

fell incomplete. The Littlefield had only to fall on time to kill the game.

## African Visitors Friends Of Former Floydada Folks

An African couple, Kathleen and Norman Peacocke, have been visiting friends of the Fred Martins here, the Louis Lloyds and Dr. and Mrs. Jack Jordan. Peacocke and Martin are both in the farm implement business in southern Africa, and they met in that capacity, Peacocke said. The Peacockes live about 500 miles from the Martins.

Peacocke is in the United States on a business trip for Thomas Barlow and Sons, the farm machinery firm for which he works. The scale of agriculture here is "vast", Peacocke said, "and vastly different in comparison to Africa's". The Peacockes have four children: Ian, 16; Kevin, 15; Jennifer, 12; and Susan, 9. The children did not accompany them on their U.S. trip. His father was born in southern Africa, of European parents, and Mrs. Peacocke's father was an American citizen. The Peacockes said there seemed to be a misconception in this country that all Africans are black, which is certainly not the case.

Few Americans are seen in southern Africa, they said, which was a shame—the Peacockes thought the people they have met here very friendly and generous. Life is very similar in the two countries — except for a small language problem (the "y'tell" and the "ma'am" they hear repeated here brought a chuckle). Another difference is the extent of use of "gadgets" he e, they noted — appliances, like mixers and other pre-prepared foods. They have such goods in Africa too, of course, but they're not used

so much there as in this country. South Africa is a bi-lingual country — English and Afrikaans — and highway signs, instructions, etc., are printed in both languages. The weather there is very similar to ours, temperature-wise, the Peacockes said, although it doesn't get quite as cold in the winter (it seldom freezes). The rainy season is from November to March, (that's summertime south of the equator, by the way) and the average yearly rainfall there is 30 to 40 inches.

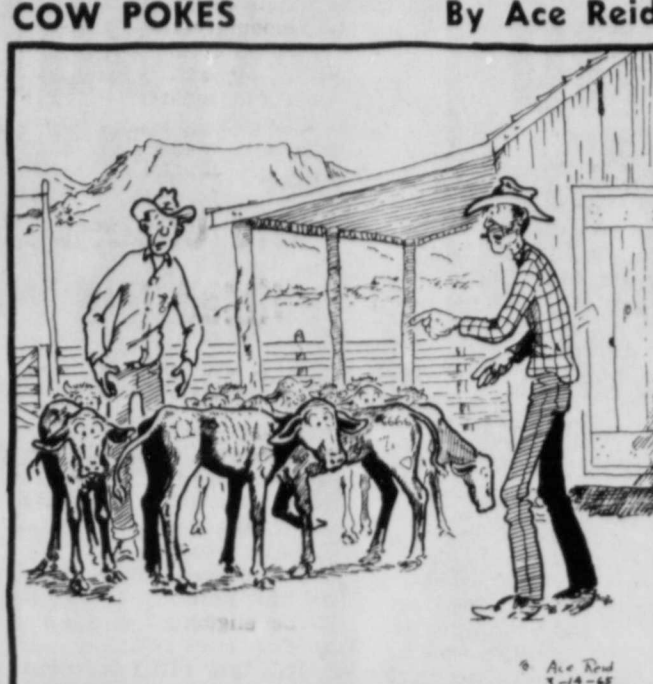

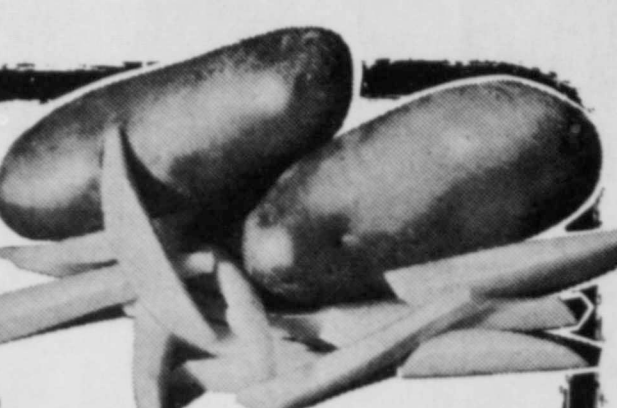

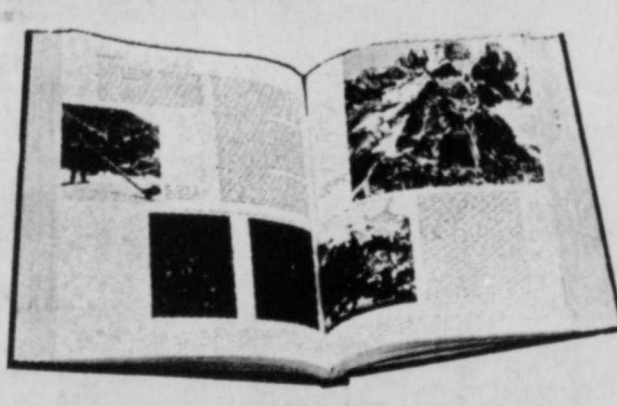
