

Butler Hired As Sheriffs Deputy



After the dinner, we learned that Mrs. Murray wanted to give the community center...or Massie Activity Center to the people of Floydada! Not only that, but she and her husband improved the original plans in many ways at a substantial increase in cost.

Then Kenneth took district attorney George Miller into confidence and the two went to work forming a non profit corporation and filed request for confirmation with the Internal Revenue Service in Dallas.

Then the tension really set in... we thought the commitment would never come through from Dallas... about six months, When it did come through, the local Post Office people got a glimpseof what was coming as correspondence from Dallas began to come in addressed to me, "President of the Massie Activity Center." So Ed Wester and some of the folk at the Post Office were in on the secret.

Last Friday, Kinder Farris was kind enough to take his plane and fly Kenneth and me to Dallas where we met with Mr. and Mrs. Murray, the contractor, a brick representative from Fort Worth, and finalized the plans for construction. Obviously the community will have the privilege of enjoying

the new activity center, likewise it will have the responsibility of maintaining and preserving it. Consequently an 18 member board, representative of most organizations in this community will be set up for its care. Of course you folk who were in Floydada long before I came

here are personally acquainted with Mrs. Murray, but I would like to share with you some of my impressions of the Murrays They are good Christian people, who are most enthusiastic about civic endeavors where they live and elsewhere...they are

courteous, kind, friendly. Mr. Murray told me that Colonel Massie said when Geraldine went to New York to work, "well, she'll meet and marry a Yankee."...and that's just what happened. Geraldine had a girl

friend who lived in Harrisburg, and when she visited her while working in New York, she met her husband-to-be.
"He may be a native Pennsylvanian," but there's not a better booster of Texas than Bill, Mrs. Murray told me in one of the

Mr. Murray is certainly one of the most successful architects in the United States. He returned to his hometown of Harrisburg after receiving his architect's degree and devoted his energies and talents to creating a very successful firm sharing of his time and material rewards to the many areas of need within his community and country.

It is possible that the Murrays will be in Floydada for the ground breaking ceremonies, and of course the dedication ceremonies. I know everyone will want to meet them and welcome

FLOYDADA MAY be off out here in the country, but we have quite a few "Continental Type" citizens in this community. I would guess that we average doing pictures and features on persons from other countries visiting here about once a month. Some of our people travel abroad, they make friends . . . and these friends eventually visit Floydada. Some of our Floydada

ver the beautiful masonry preengineered steel type building. A spacious walk flanked by the American and Texas flags leads into glass doors, opening into the lobby-snack area, Rest rooms, storage area are located just south of the lobby. In the southwest corner of the building is a completely furnished kitchen.

The overall auditorium area is 50 x 72 feet and will seat 300 persons at banquet tables, or 400 people with seats in

A sliding partition divides the auditorium area into a smaller meeting room next to the kitchen 29 x 50 feet to be used by smaller club meetings. A small stage is centered on the west side of this

At the east end of the auditorium is a stage with dressing rooms on each side.

Contractor estimates that the building can be built in 90-120 days depending upon weather conditions. Floor is vinyl convered concrete, and cold weather might delay pouring of floor.

OPERATION OF THE ACTIVITY CENTER Operation of the center, once it is built is up to the citizens of Floydada. It is also the responsibility of the Floydada people to see that the building is properly maintained and preserved.

A non-profit corporation has been formed. Present officers include Wendell Tooley, president; Kenneth Bain, member of board, and Clay Henry, vicepresident

Wants To See President Establish Secretary Of Recall

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm has become aware of how many items are being recalled these days, his letter this week indicates. Dear editar:

When I read in a newspaper last night that 87 tons of cornbread mix had been recalled by the Food and Drug Administration because it contained too much of something call aflatoxin, I began turning over in my mind the things I can think of that have been recalled in recent months.

These included soup, tuna, detergent, swordfish, cereals, lipstick, toys, airplanes, automobiles and a few diplomats. There may have been others that escaped me but this gives you an idea of how the recall business is
