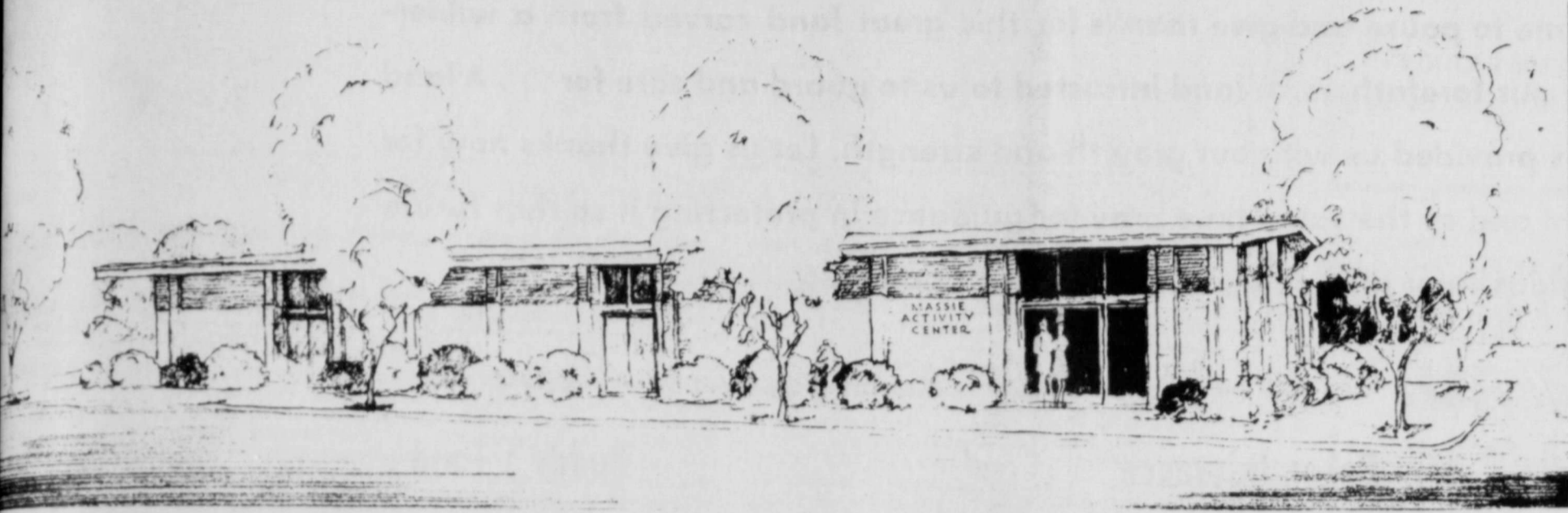

Whirlwinds Land Seven Spots On District Team

The Floydada Whirlwinds placed six players on the 1971 3-AA All-District team. The All-District team members are selected each year by vote of the district coaches.

Whirlwind guard-linebacker Kim Rose made the district dream team both ways, giving the "Winds claim to seven positions on the team.

Floydada stars who made the team include, on offense: Rose, at a guard position; Mike Vinson at center; and running backs Walter Harris and Jim Kunkel.

Whirlwind defensive standouts who were selected to the team were tackle Terry Bunch (who led the balloting, with six votes, for one interior line-man spot); Rose at linebacker; and Langston Williams at safety.

Littlefield halfback Ralph Funk was, predictably, a unanimous choice at one running back position, as were a pair of Littlefield players on defense — Dennis Hartley and linebacker Matt Giles.

THE WORST thing that can happen to a newspaper is to know some big news and not be able to tell it. I've been in my situation since April this year. . . I have just received an announcement in today's Hesperian of the gift of the Activity Center is of course the big news to which I would like everyone would want to know about the development of the center, so I'll sorta tell you the steps that brought it about.

Floydada youth have visited my office saying "we need a center."

I decided to start an editorial campaign to build a center that would serve high school youth, boy scouts, civic clubs, women's clubs, old settlers, community organizations.

I visited with several organizations and they all agreed that was what Floydada needed. . . but where would the center be from to build it.

I know, except we would all have to get out and gather up the money. The American Legion mentioned they had a little help on it.

A year ago I received a letter from William Lynch Murray of Harrisburg, Pennsylvania saying, "the paragraph about building a Community Center in Floydada, part of your column in October eighth issue of The Hesperian interested my wife very much. She is the former Geraldine Massie and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Murray, were early settlers in Floyd County. If this proposed project should take substantial form, we would appreciate the essential details. I am certain that Mrs. Murray would want to be a substantial contributor."

I met the plans, contractor's estimate of cost to Mr. Murray, and this was by phone from Arizona, where he was on vacation.

When I got home, they had been discussing the project with my neighbor Kenneth Bain, and wanted to meet with me, Kenneth, and two or three other interested Floydada people. I met them the first of April this year, Kenneth, Clay Henry, and the contractor from Lubbock, and I met Mr. Murray at an evening dinner in Amarillo.

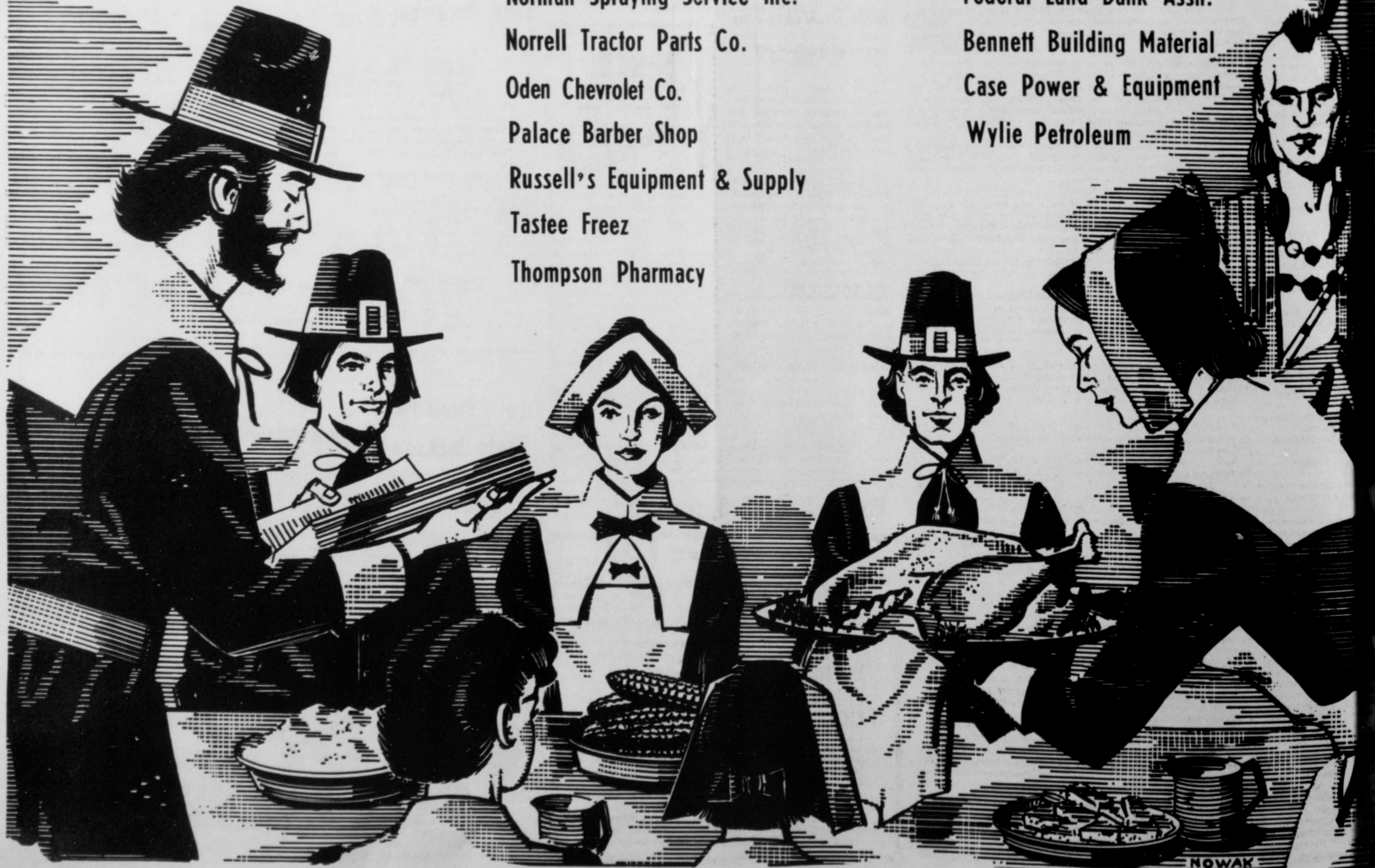

Operation of the center, once
it is built is up to the citizens
of Floydada. It is also the re-
sponsibility of the Floydada
people to see that the building
is properly maintained and
preserved.

A non-profit corporation has
been formed. Present officers
include Wendell Tooley, pre-
sident; Kenneth Bain, member
of board, and Clay Henry, vice-
president.

Tentative plans call for an
18-member board of directors
to supervise the care and use
of the Center.

Today American farmers

for food and fiber imports.

announce for the U. S. Senate... have to watch this one awhile.

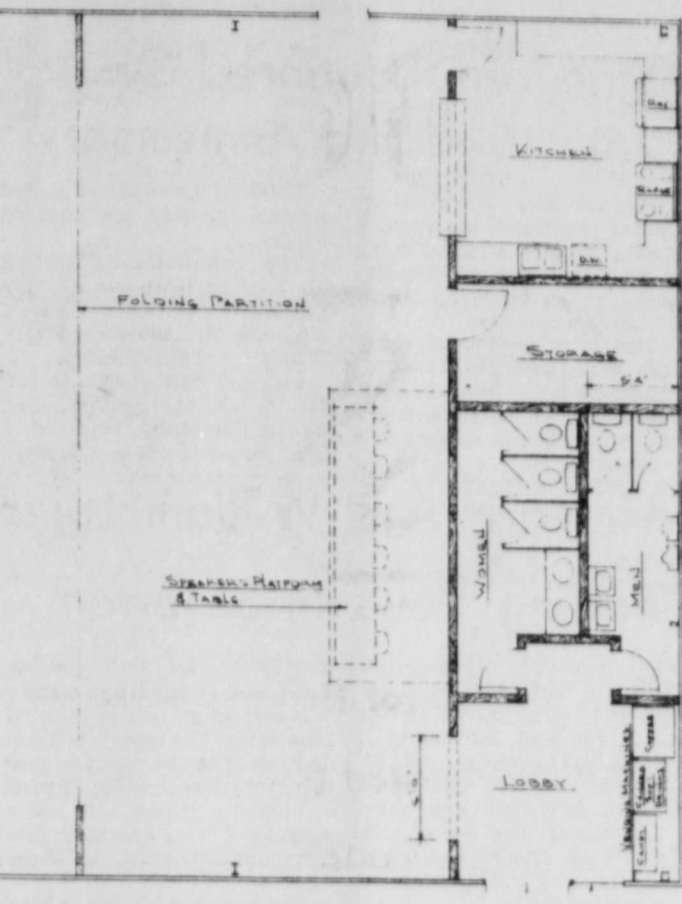
THE PRESIDENT of the U.S.A. deserves the respect of our

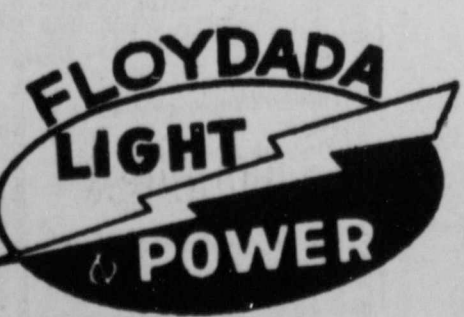

Co-Op Representatives Study Underground Line

Although underground electric power lines are relatively new, it is a coming thing. This statement was made by Bob Pierce, Operations Manager of the South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc. His opening remarks at the second Underground Rural Electric Distribution Conference sponsored by the electric cooperatives of West Texas.

The conference was held at the South Plains Electric Cooperative with representatives of twenty-one electric cooperatives and several suppliers and manufacturers in attendance. These men studied methods of installation and maintenance and underground electric power lines.

Even though the cost of installing underground high voltage cable is now approximately twice the cost of overhead lines, new manufacturing techniques and volume are reducing this cost differential all the time. Therefore, it does seem that eventually many power lines will be underground, thereby reducing the exposure to ice storms and high winds and improving electric service.

Wants To See President Establish Secretary Of Recall

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm has become aware of how many items are being recalled these days, his letter this week indicates. Dear editor:

When I read in a newspaper last night that 87 tons of cornbread mix had been recalled by the Food and Drug Administration because it contained too much of something called aflatoxin, I began turning over in my mind the things I can think of that have been recalled in recent months.

These included soup, tuna, detergent, swordfish, cereals, lipstick, toys, airplanes, automobiles and a few diplomats. There may have been others that escaped me but this gives you an idea of how the recall business is booming.

If it keeps up the President may have to establish a new cabinet position to be known as Secretary of Recall.

Several columnists have suggested that it would be simpler to check foods before they leave the plant, rather than waiting till they get on the grocery store shelves, but this takes all the drama out of it. There's no news value in cornbread suppressed, but cornbread recalled, that's a headliner.

If the President does establish a Secretary of Recall I can foresee many opportunities for the office other than those involving foods, cars, and such like.

Cotton loans: producers may obtain Form A loans from County ASCS Offices or Form G loans through cooperative marketing associations.

All Form A loans shall be disbursed by the county office where the farm records are kept. An approved loan clerk outside the county office can also prepare loan forms.

This office will have custody of warehouse receipts and class cards, handle loan redemptions, and send receipts and class cards to banks for re-payments.

REAP: Funds are available for cost-sharing needed prac-tices.

1972 cotton program: 1972 cotton program sically the same as in 1971. New program raises the minimum set-aside to 25%, set-aside payments, barley into the program, and offers two options to set-aside acreage beyond the January 17 and 28 through February 28.

Loans will be available at: \$1.08 per bu. corn, \$1.79 per bu. sorghum, 86¢ per bu. ley, and \$2.25 per bu. beans.

Set-aside payments: 40¢ per bu. for corn, 50¢ per bu. for sorghum, 40¢ per bu. for grain sorghum. Payment to be paid on the established times one-half of the corn, or grain sorghum.

At sign-up time the farmer can agree to set-aside a total amount of acreage, 10% of his corn and sorghum base and up to 5% of his barley base. Payment for this voluntary set-aside is computed at 52¢ per bushel corn, 49¢ per bushel sorghum, and 42¢ per bushel ley.

Also at sign-up time the farmer may offer to set-aside 5% or 10% of his corn or sorghum base acreage. Secretary of Agriculture will announce by mid-March whether to accept any of the set-aside acreage. Payment will be the same for the acreage as for the first voluntary set-aside.

Soybeans have been the list of crops which can be planted to protect the base or wheat allotment.

If you intend to receive gram payments equal to the farms established yield, set-aside acreage must be of this quality.

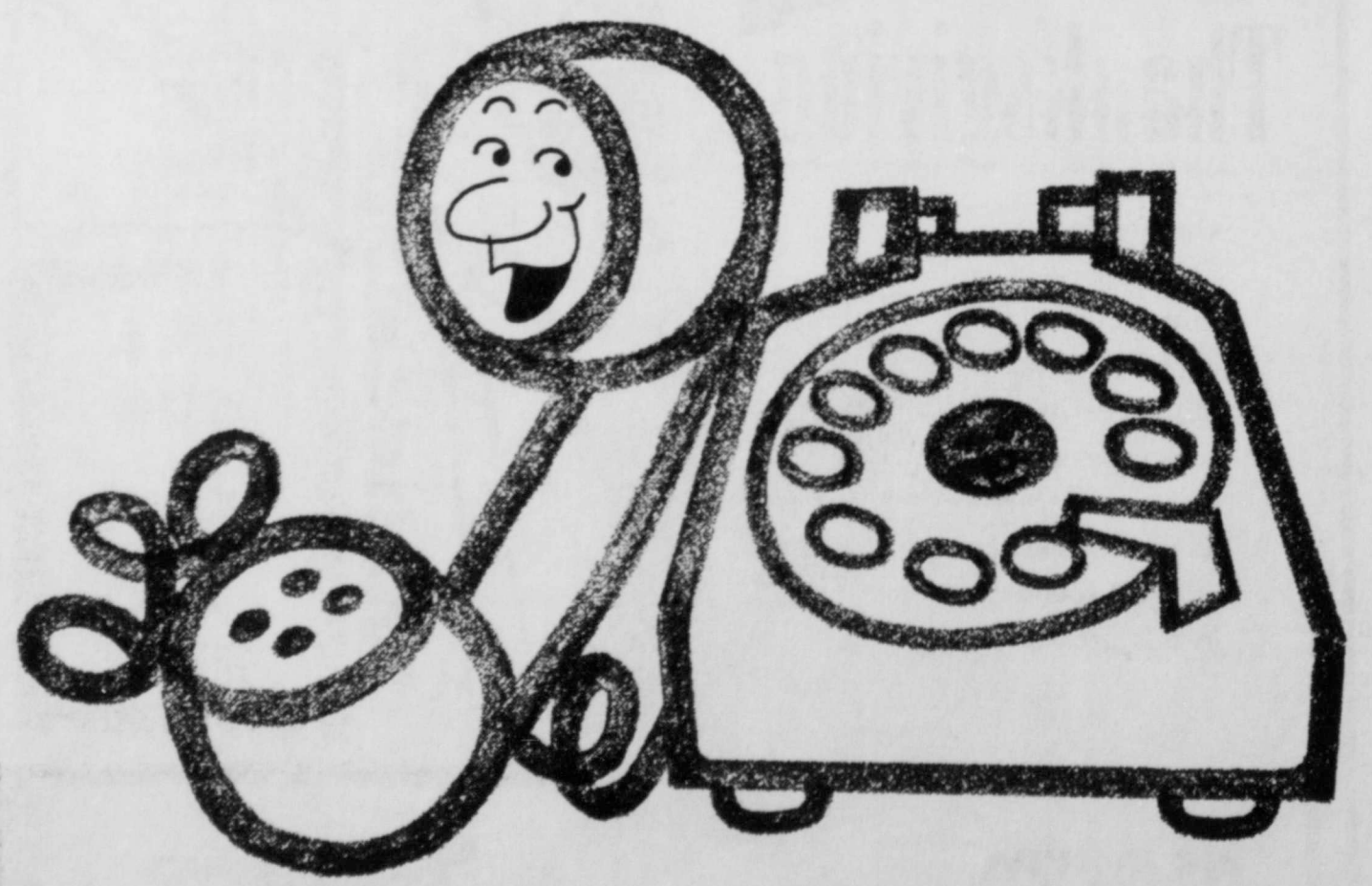

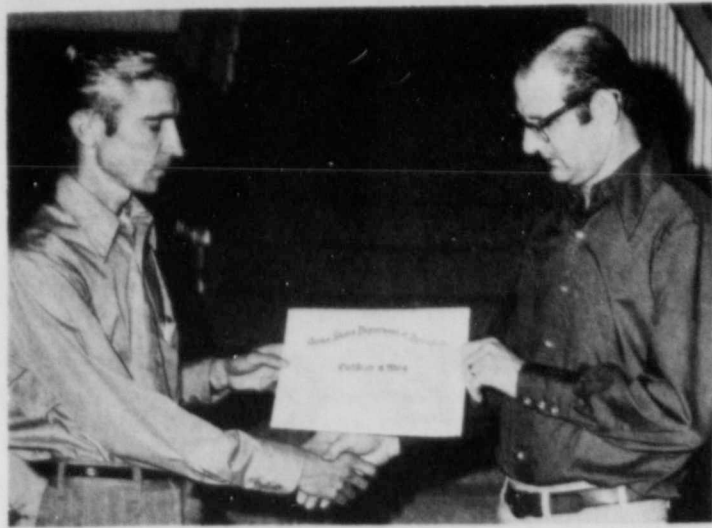
