### Tie-Dyeing Tips

NEW YORK (ED)—The latest method of resist printing, has been rediscovered today's teens.

In tie-dyeing, areas of fabric are blocked off (usually with string or rubberbands) so aren't exposed to the dye submerged in a dye bath.

It's important to exercise caution in selecting fabrics. These notes that most washers, fabrics can be used, with the exception of polyester, glass or metallic fibers that should be washed in warm water, or textured fabrics should not be used, since they should be close to the skin.

Always wash all tie-dyed fabrics in cool water, to prevent color bleeding and fading.

### HOW TO TIE-DYE

1. Pre-wash item in hot water. Rinse thoroughly.
2. Make all knots on wet fabric laid on a flat surface. Knots tightly with rubber string or string. (Check your package for directions.)
3. Prepare dye in a flat pan.
4. Place wet fabric in dye bath (not boiling) dye bath. Place fabric knots down. Submerge the entire piece if it is all one color.
5. Keep item in hot dye bath to 20 minutes — longer for heavy fabric, or if a shade is desired.
6. Remove, squeeze out dye, and rinse in cold water.
7. If a second color is to be on some sections, repeat 3 through 6 on those areas.
8. Untie knots. Re-rinse water runs clear.
9. Drip dry. Iron while damp.

## Tie-Dyeing Tips

NEW YORK (ED) — Tie-dyeing, one of the oldest and most interesting methods of resist printing used to create patterns on fabrics, has been rediscovered by today's teens.

In tie-dyeing, areas of fabric are blocked off (usually with string or rubberbands) and are exposed to the dye solution in a dye bath.

It's important to exercise care notes that most washable fabrics can be used with the exception of polyester, glass or metallic fibers.

## HOW TO TIE-DYE

1. Pre-wash item in hot water. Rinse thoroughly.
2. Make all knots on wet fabric on a flat surface. Tie knots tightly with rubber string or string. (Check your package for directions.)
3. Prepare dye in a flat pan. Pour over fabric. Place wet fabric in dye bath. Place fabric knots in dye. Submerge the entire piece if it is all one color.
4. Place wet fabric in dye bath (not boiling) dye bath. Place fabric knots in dye. Submerge the entire piece if it is all one color.
5. Keep item in hot dye bath for 20 minutes — longer for heavy fabric, or if a shade is desired.
6. Remove, squeeze out dye, and rinse in cold water.
7. If a second color is to be used on some sections, repeat steps 3 through 6 on those areas.
8. Untie knots. Re-rinse water runs clear.
9. Drip dry. Iron while damp.

The styles and uses of purpose fabrics have increased from today's wear. Prints are designs that two patterns can be used on walls, and decorative accessories give a striking one-pattern or print may be combined with color-coordinated solids.

## Meditation On Jeremiah 18:3-6

There are still skilled craftsmen who ply the potter's trade. On a foot-propelled potter's wheel they place the clay, and with skillful fingers they mold it. Sometimes usefulness and sometimes beauty is the primary aim of the potter. Experienced hands sense the quality, consistency, temperature and moisture content of the clay. Foreign objects and lumps of inferior material cause an occasional failure which necessitates a remodeling or discarding of the vessel. The skill and inclination of the potter are the deciding ultimate factors in such circumstances.

There are a few basic comparisons that are good for us to keep in mind. First, we are creatures of dust bearing the impress of Deity in our total person. Not only did God create our first parents, but his eye has observed and his hand has intervened repeatedly in our behalf. Next, all who believe the Bible confess that we are members of a fallen race. This modifies the reasonable expectations of beings made in the image of God. One jokerster observed that when man fell he must have "lit on his head." We can all easily observe in others that something has interfered with correct thinking processes. A third consideration is that there are influences other than man's inherent limitations and inherited inclinations involved in our circumstances. Some men hide behind these external circumstances, refusing to accept any responsibility for themselves, but that is an extreme position. Fourthly, we need to remind ourselves that in spite of the combined liabilities mentioned, God is still capable of intervening and remodeling us into useful persons acceptable and pleasing to Him. Some things He does with our cooperation, and others, in spite of us. We always get more satisfaction from working with Him than working against Him.

Then I went down to the potter's house, and behold, he wrought a work on the wheels. And the vessel that he made of clay was marred in the hand of the potter; so he made it again another vessel, as seemed good to the potter to make it. Then the word of the Lord came to me, saying, O house of Israel, cannot I do with you as this potter? saith the Lord. Behold, as the clay is in the potter's hand, so are ye in mine hand. O house of Israel.

## Bell Says Hang Up On Abusive Callers



The best response to abusive calls: hang up.

The phone rings. You answer and the caller's language is abusive, obscene, or threatening. What do you do? "Hang up," says Leslie R. Stevens, Manager for Southwestern Bell here. "Use the phone on your own terms. Don't talk to anyone you don't want to, whether they're selling something, seeking information, playing a prank or mouthing obscenities. Don't give them an audience and they're not likely to call back."

Stevens said the phone company has other suggestions on how to fight annoying calls: 1. Make callers identify themselves. When someone asks, "Who is this?" don't tell them unless you recognize the voice or until he identifies himself.

2. Don't answer any questions from a strange voice that you wouldn't answer in a face-to-face meeting with a stranger on the street.

3. If a caller remains silent, hang up. Some abusive callers want to listen, just to see what you'll do.

4. Hang up at the first indication of an obscene or suggestive remark. The caller would like nothing better than for you to respond to his comments.

5. Hang up if you're not interested in a product or service being sold by telephone and the caller persists despite your disinterest.

"And where a threat is involved," he continued, "such as a call threatening injury to person or property, kidnap or robbery, call the police and the telephone company immediately. There are laws against abusive calling, and we have methods of tracing these calls to their source."

The law makes it a misdemeanor to use profane, vulgar or indecent language, threats, harassment or enticement by use of the telephone. Conviction carries a fine from \$100 to \$1,000, one to twelve months in jail, or both.

Stevens said experience has shown that annoying calls come from almost anyone—not just from strangers, but sometimes from close acquaintances, neighbors or fellow workers.

## The Drinking Driver

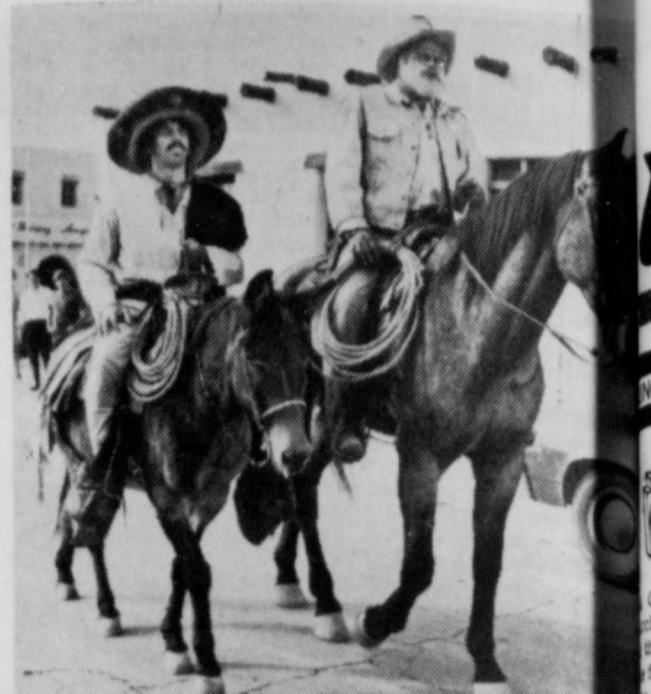
Drunken drivers continue to be one of the major problems on Texas highways.

Department of Public Safety Director Col. Wilson Speir, speaking to the annual Governor's Traffic Safety Conference this week, painted a rather dismal picture of the state's traffic situation. He said more persons have died in Texas highway accidents to date this year than at this time a year ago. And, he added, drunken drivers are accounting for up to 50 percent of the wrecks in some areas.

His concern was akin to that of a recent caller to The Herald who asked "Can't you say something about drunk drivers? If an epidemic was taking the same number of lives that accidents involving drinking drivers are causing, every effort would be made to stop it. They'd rush in doctors and vaccine and quarantine entire areas. But look at the number of innocent people being killed on our highways by drunks!"

Our caller has a point, of course, and it is a good one. The toll of death and misery caused by the drinking driver is staggering as is the financial loss. Stricter enforcement and more severe penalties probably are the only answers.

Col. Speir pointed out that attempts to secure a minimum suspension period for intoxicated drivers were unsuccessful in the last Legislature. "I fear that until the chronic drinking driver is inconvenienced considerably more than he is today, that no great progress is going to be made in this area," he said.

## GUEST EDITORIAL

### Farm Problem Will Stay

President Nixon has named a new Secretary of Agriculture to replace Clifford M. Hardin, and new man is getting about as hard a time in Senate as are the two Supreme Court nominees.

Farm organizations are demanding another choice, but it is unlikely that any Secretary of Agriculture can solve the problems that face farmers of this nation today.

American agriculture is a far cry removed from the old days when a man followed a mule and walking plow up and down the row.

National and international events affect the farmer. For example, the dock strike at Houston port affects milo growers in our own area because one of the largest exporters of grain in Houston is the Union Equity and the Union Equity largest stockholder is the Perryton Equity.

Perryton. When dock workers refuse to load the grain piles up, contracts cannot be honored, and losses incur.

Thus the dock strike is more than a story in a newspaper. It is something that affects the farmer.

Prolonged work stoppages are depressing prices on corn, soybeans, wheat and milo and if the strike continues, the foreign markets, principally Japan, will be lost.

The basic problem facing any Secretary of Agriculture is how to bring about an adjustment in supply to demand, so that farm products will command satisfactory prices.

This is an almost impossible assignment. Farmers and ranchers want higher prices for their crops and livestock. They are entitled to high prices. What they are getting now is about what they got 30 years ago, which is absurd.

But processors and consumers want low prices. The government, made up of politicians has a sensitive eye on this because higher prices mean dissatisfied voters and there are more consumers than farmers.

Not only that, the Secretary of Agriculture, confronted with a number of farm organizations who can't agree on what should be done, and some of them are bitter enemies. No wonder the Secretary is confused.

There is a conflict of interest between farmers and stockmen. The price of milo brings smiles to farmers when it goes up, but feedlot operators rather the price go down because it means difference between a profit and

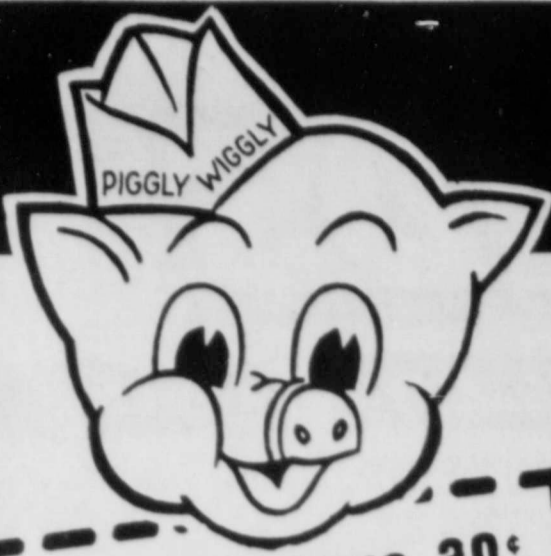
