### Filing Deadline February 7

Democratic Primary candidates have until February 7, 1972 to file for the posts, according to Floyd County Democratic Chairman Ben Ayres. Of special interest to local voters is the May 6 primary election will be for District Attorney, Sheriff, County Superintendent, Tax Assessor-Collector, County Attorney, and County Commissioners, Precincts 1 and 3.

### Cattle Quarantined

Floyd County is among 34 counties in the Panhandle-South Plains area which have been placed on quarantine because of psoroptic scabies among cattle.

The disease is more widely known as cattle scab.

George W. Apple Sr., chairman of the Texas Animal Health Commission, ordered the quarantine Friday following an outbreak of the disease.

The quarantine went into effect at 8 a.m. Friday and will remain in effect "until further notice", Apple said.

The only exceptions will be movement of cattle from "non-quarantined herds," where they are accompanied by a certificate of inspection issued by state or federal personnel or accredited veterinarians and dated within 10 days before they are moved.

### Two Men Held On Drug Charges

Charges of possession of marijuana were filed Monday against Charles Mitchell, 24 and Robert Taylor, 23, both of Floydada.

Both men remained in custody in Hale County jail under \$5,000 bond each set by Justice of the Peace Glenn Stone.

The duo was arrested Saturday morning by Hale County deputies who recovered five matchboxes of a substance thought to be marijuana.

### City Council Receives Another Petition For Paving

The Floydada City Council received a petition to pave Fourth Street between Mississippi and Kentucky Streets at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The council instructed city manager Bill Feuerbacher to contact the city engineer on cost estimates for the paving and work out other details.

In other business the council approved bid of Continental Oil Co. for regular gas and diesel fuel for another year. . . . Crutfield Tire Co. for flat tire repairs.

The council took no action on a request by Southwestern Bell Telephone for a rate increase.

Bill Hale, Ed Wester, and Charlie Bedford were reappointed to the Federal Housing Board.

The Council approved some adjustments to insurance coverage, according to estimated value of buildings and equipment. The council has been

studying its insurance program for the past two months.

The council approved the closing of city offices on December 24, 25, 26 for Christmas.

All councilmen were present except Ed Hammond.

### Bell Seeks Rate Increase

Southwestern Bell filed an application Monday with the Floydada City Council for an increase in basic telephone rates - the first such request in more than 12 years.

Les Stevens, Southwestern Bell manager, assured council members that implementation of the approved rate schedule would conform with any restraints imposed under Phase II of the wage-price freeze.

The last basic telephone rate increase in Floydada was in July, 1959.

## -30- Homer Steen

Homer Steen, a newspaper editor 55 years before he died in 1962, died at the age of 91 in Floydada Sunday, Dec. 12 about 5:30. He had been in failing health for several months. He maintained an office at 218½ Street where he had the Steen Addition, his column for the County Hesperian. He had been 82 December 14, 1905.

His rites were conducted 2:30 Tuesday, December 14, in the First United Methodist Church. Rev. C. B. Gandy, minister, officiated for the service.

His family includes his wife, Edna Potter Steen; one son, Golden Nabors; one daughter, Edna; two sons, Maurice Green, Kenning Green, and Phil Steen of Denver; a daughter, Festus; two sisters, Lonnie and Mina Gordon; all of them seven grandchildren; and six great grandchildren in Hamilton County, Texas. Homer was the son of Thomas P. and Anna Grigsby Steen.

## Caprock Chat BY WENDELL TOOLEY

A DEAR FRIEND and this community lost a real one with the passing of Homer Steen. I would suppose that he has given me more encouragement through the nine years I have lived here than anyone else. He was most company of the things I tried to do, and when I bogged down during a campaign I headed for Homer's office for a little bit.

I have a keen sense of fairness in assessing my problems, and I said, "But if you feel that what you are doing is worth it by your convictions."

Floyd County leadership moves away with the passing of Homer Steen and Maud Hollums. . . and they were old friends. . . old debate opponents. . . both worked long and hard for the betterment of this community.

I knew the "hard days" of newspapering. Days when it wasn't any money. Sometimes he took eggs, cows, and newspaper subscriptions.

He said Floydada to be progressive and personally gave money to both merchants and farmers. He always had a "neighbor" with everyone who came in the doors of The Hesperian.

His Christian philosophy concerned love of God and love of man. Recently when I went into his office, I noticed him reading his Bible.

After retiring from the newspaper business, he saw the need for housing in Floydada. Therefore he opened building addition and many low down payment FHA homes built in south Floydada. (From "editions" to "editions").

Homer was just as proud of our new offset printing plant. He enjoyed coming in and watching the press runs. Great love for history. . . especially Floyd County and Texas country. He gave me some money to help pay on the cost of microfilming the 1912 through 1936 editions of the Hesperian. . . so that they would be properly preserved.

He says had a soft spot in his heart for the city council. He follows down at the city hall get a lot of criticism, so he tells me every time you get a chance," he told me many times.

We're breaking an editorial policy: Ordinarily we don't break news that have passed on an inside page, obituaries are the exception. We're breaking the rule, we feel that Homer Steen should have the front page of the Hesperian one more time.

Lord Bless and comfort the many who mourn his loss. . . especially his immediate family.

COTTON FARMERS continue to "sweat" the cold, wet weather. I hear many remarks around town which indicate the farmers are not sure of the crop and the farmer's ability to still make a living.

Neighbor, Louis Pyle said, "I know that the West Texas weather, 'don't never turn down a rain or a bull calf in Texas.' . . but I'd just as soon have the bull calf as the weather."

Another said "this is the worst cotton crop I've tried to raise since 1934."

One said (optimistically) "I had more white cotton open than before. . . believe the moisture got in the boll, the boll expanded, opening the boll."

Another and a farmer were watching a basketball game. They decided to bet on the outcome of the game. The farmer told the merchant, "I'll bet you 50¢. . . or my cotton."

explain politics.

Homer remembers he was the champion cotton chopper and picker for his size in or near the village of Pottsville, where he began his school career. His father was postmaster in Pottsville when Homer was born, but due to changing politics or some reason he doesn't recall, Homer's earliest experiences were in a cotton field.

Homer continued his schooling in Floydada. "You didn't graduate at elaborate ceremonies in those days," he declared. "The principal just told me I had finished school. I didn't even get a diploma." Claude V. Hall established

the Hesperian-Gazette in 1896. Homer's brother, Carl T. Steen, worked for Hall one year to start the flow of printers ink in the blood of the Steen family.

Hall later sold his publication to Cree and Adair. They in turn, sold to Pettit and Guthrie and this duo sold out to Homer's father, "just to please Carl" who was manager of the paper one year in 1906. Too, Carl had given Homer a job, but Homer worked for him only eight months.

Homer remembers his father wanting him to establish a paper in Lockney, "and somehow I managed to finance myself during 1907 and 1909 to establish the Lockney Beacon". He leased his Lockney paper to a man by the name of

Foster in February, 1910, and later sold out to Ben F. Smith, "the original Jim Ferguson supporter."

Steen became a traveling newspaper man the next year, working for papers in Clovis, Silverton, Amarillo and Plainview before returning to Floydada in 1911 to enter the fire insurance business.

July 4, 1911 the entire block on the west side of the courthouse square burned. Homer, in a merriment gesture, said he used the date of the fire to figure out his wedding anniversary.

One time when asked what date he married the former Miss Madeline Potter, daughter of "Floydada's most charming milliner who moved here from Dallas," Homer started talking about the fire and guessing the date. Warned that guessing an anniversary date was indeed as dangerous as a fire, the publisher telephoned his wife.

"Honey, are you in a good humor?" he introduced the conversation. She said she guessed she was.

"Do you remember what date the west side burned?" Homer asked. She told him. Yet, he couldn't figure out the wedding date. He finally admitted as much in asking:

"Can you remember what day in August we were married?" he implored.

The date was August 16, 1911. Members of the wedding party included Beatrice Henry Smith, Clarence Foster and the late Frank Harmon.

Following his marriage, Homer became editor of the Floyd County Hesperian. He says he did so because brother Carl was going to be a doctor and also because "two people cannot live as cheaply as one - if both like to eat." He became editor, publisher and general manager of the Hesperian, which was located in a nice, shiny sheet-iron building.

The Hesperian building burned in March, 1912, destroying all of the old files. "Fire seems to have played an important role in my career,"

Steen has stated.

But he rebuilt on the same location, staying there until 1925 when he moved into a spacious, modern, brick building.

Steen trained and aided many newspaper men. Roy Haynes, Van Ezell, Ben Ezell, Bill Hams and Douglas Meador are but few who owe their start to Homer Steen. The Hesperian published the first seven issues of the Matador Tribune when Doug Meador had only a pencil and paper as assets for his new publication.

Steen was a Rotarian, a Woodman of the World, and a member of the Methodist Church. Probably his most active membership was in the Floydada Chamber of Commerce of which he was the last charter member. He had a passion for doing anything which would develop and improve agricultural programs, better roads and the future for Floydada and Floyd County. His friends called him "the work horse type of editor."

At one time he said there is only one secret for the success of any weekly newspaper: "Fill the pages with names and spell each of 'em right!"

By the time Steen had retired May 1, 1962, he had served the Panhandle Press Association twice as president, was a director; had been awarded top honors in several fields of journalism; was a member of the West Texas Press Association; was a member of Sigma Delta Chi of West Texas; was a charter member and twice president of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce and also had served as secretary and director; charter member and twice president of the Floydada Lions Club where he held a lifetime membership; was a charter member and one time president of the Floydada Rotary Club and at one time served as chairman of the Democratic Party.

May 31, 1962 was declared Madeline and Homer Steen Day by Mayor S. W. Ross. The town honored the couple with a banquet as a special recognition to

be \$5.05 monthly for residence 4 party service and \$10.15 monthly for business 4 party service.

In addition, some miscellaneous rate changes also are involved.  
"The present rates established in 1959 are simply too low to meet the company's cost of doing business today," Stevens said. "In the past 12 years, wages, taxes and the company's investment in Floydada have grown to the extent that we must seek this increase."

Stevens stressed that the company has been able to hold the line on basic rates over the last 12 years by continued and increased sales activities and use of numerous technological advances in equipment and facilities. These factors, he pointed out, allowed the company to meet some of the increased cost of doing business without asking an increase.

"The company has done all it can to keep expenses here as low as possible," Stevens said, "but the only solution is to request a reasonable increase in rates in line with today's higher costs. We hope the request will receive prompt and favorable action."

crops of wheat and feed grains. Representative Bob Price (R. Texas) one of two dozen Republican House Representatives supporting the measure said.  
"I did so because I feel grain farmers badly need help."  
"There were several features of the bill that I think are not desirable, but on balance I feel this action by the House is better than not doing anything."

The bill directs the Secretary of Agriculture to buy up to 300 million bushels of wheat and 25 million tons of feed grain in the open market and then store these grains indefinitely.

The loan level boosts under the bill would raise corn from \$1.08 to \$1.35 per bushel, milo from \$1.73 to \$2.16 per hundred weight, wheat from \$1.25 to \$1.57 per bushel, oats from 81¢ to \$1.01 per bushel and barley from 50¢ to 68¢ per bushel.

"I tried to get the House to adopt two amendments to improve the bill," Price said.

One of these amendments would have directed the Secretary to place all grain in the reserve in farmer storage facilities.

"I think farmers could use, and need, the \$215 million in annual storage fees," Representative Price said.

The second amendment would have prevented the government from dumping the grain acquired for the "strategic reserve" at prices less than 100% of parity.

"In order to have a true reserve insulated from the market, I felt the 100% of parity amendment was needed," Price said.

"I am hopeful, however," Price continued, "that the Senate can improve the bill before sending it to the President. I feel my amendments would go a long way to making a better bill for farmers," Price concluded.

**Career Planning Profile Schedule At High School**

Three Saturday mornings during the next several months could be especially important to many Floydada High School students who are undecided about their future or are interested in vocational-technical education after graduation.

The dates of Feb. 26, April 22, and July 15 are the three times during the remainder of the present academic year that students will have an opportunity to take the new ACT Career Planning Profile on a "national date," announced Mrs. Emily Potts, Counselor.

The ACT Career Planning Profile, which takes about 3 1/2 hours to complete, is a three-part examination and questionnaire that assesses a broad range of vocational interests and abilities. It forms the basis of the new national guidance program, ACT Career Planning Program, which is designed for use by persons interested in some form of career education beyond high school.

Registration periods for the 1971-72 dates on which the assessment profile will be administered on a nation-wide basis are: Feb. 26 (Nov. 29-Jan. 31), April 22 (Feb. 14-March 27), and July 15 (April 10-June 19).

As part of the overall ACT Career Planning Program, persons who take the new assessment profile will receive a report relating their characteristics to major "clusters" of occupations. In addition, forecasts of performance in vocational, technical, and two-

### New Immunization Law Enacted

Age 11\*

\* None required after 12th birthday.

If the number of doses required have been received, but last dose was before time stated, then an additional dose of POLIO, DIPHTHERIA/TETANUS is required.

All immunizations should be completed by the time school is entered. However, if this is not possible, all students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the summer and fall 1971 terms, with the provision that their immunizations against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by January 1, 1972 and all completed as soon as medically feasible.

Since many types of personal immunization records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received by year will be acceptable during the 1971-72 school year for either initiating or updating school immunization records.

Signature or rubber-stamp validation of personal records by physicians or public health clinics is recommended but not required until the summer 1972 semester, after which validation of new records is required.

A new standard Certificate of Immunization form is being developed; however, compatible documents will always be acceptable.

If you have any questions, contact your family physician or local health department. We suggest that you take this letter with you if you contact them in person.

A combined Measles-Rubella Vaccine is now available which requires only one injection. The age criteria for this vaccine is the same as indicated in the above information for Measles (Rubella) and Rubella.

Smallpox vaccination is no longer required.

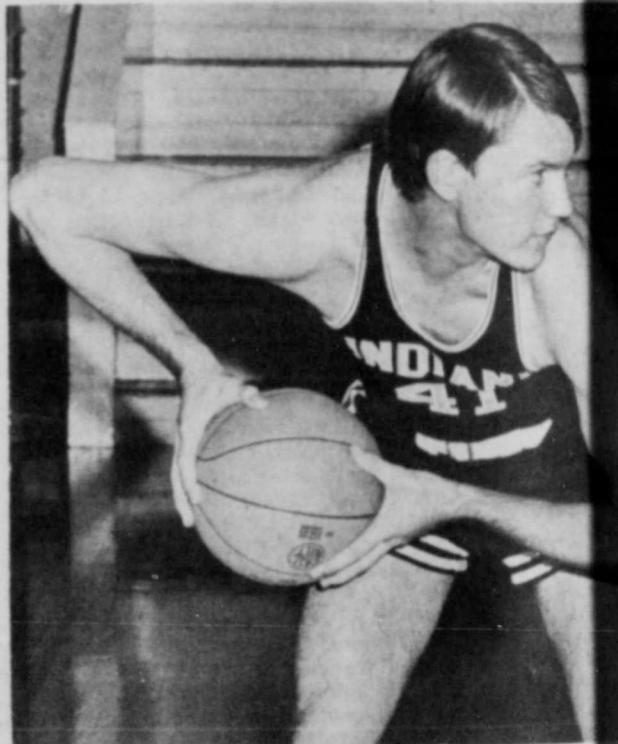
## Seven Delivery Days Until Christmas

It's later than you think. The days are slipping by and Ole Saint Nick will be here for his appointed rounds before we are ready.

The local Post Office can tell it's "The jolly time of the year" yet the mailing hasn't begun as it did in the last two years. The increase in postage from 6¢ in 1969 and 1970 to 8¢ this Christmas will make some difference in Christmas cards but the increase in parcel post will usually not affect the mailing of packages. The Postmaster is concerned about arrival time on Christmas packages. All out-of-state packages mailed this late should have some priority placed on them by mailing them

Air Mail, Priority Mail or Special Delivery. Inquiries should be made at time of mailing; a clerk will assist you.

The Postmaster says he does not have any control over incoming mail until it reaches Floydada. Once it's here, it will be delivered the day it arrives. If you are not home, a notice will be left in your mail box and the package will be returned to the Post Office for you to pick it up. Please read the card - abide by the instructions, and bring it with you to the Post Office. All parcels will be delivered on Saturday, December 18. If you receive a card Saturday, you may pick up the package Monday after 8:30 a.m.
