The disease is more widely known as cattle scab.

George W. Apple Sr., chairman of the Texas Animal Health Commission, ordered the quarantine Friday following an outbreak of the disease.



explain politics. Homer remembers he was the champion cotton chopper and picker for his size in or near the village of Pottsville, where he began his school career. His father was postmaster in Pottsville when Homer was born, but due to changing politics or some reason he doesn't recall, Homer's earliest experiences were in a cot-

Homer continued his schooling in Floydada. "You didn't graduate at elaborate ceremonies in those days," he declared. "The principal just told me I had finished school, I didn't even get a diploma." Claude V. Hall established

the Hesperian-Gazette in 1896. Homer's brother, Carl T. Steen, worked for Hall one year to start the flow of printers ink in the blood of the Steen family.

Hall later sold his publication to Cree and Adair. They in turn, sold to Petitt and Gutherie and this duo sold out to Homer's father, "just to please Carl" who was manager of the paper one year in 1906. Too, Carl had given Homer a job, but Homer worked for him only eight months.

Homer remembers his father wanting him to establish a paper in Lockney, "and somehow I managed to finance myself during 1907 and 1909 to establish the Lockney Beacon". He leased his Lockney paper to a man by the name of

"Do you remember what date the west side burned?" Homer asked. She told him. Yet, he couldn't figure out the wedding date. He finally admitted as much in asking:

"Can you remember what day in August we were mar-ried?" he implored.

The date was August 16, 1911. Members of the wedding party included Beatrice Henry Smith, Clarence Foster and the late Frank Harmon.

Following his marriage, Homer became editor of the Floyd County Hesperian. He says he did so because brother Carl was going to be a doctor and also because "two people cannot live as cheaply as one - if both like to eat." He became editor, publisher and general manager of the Hesperian, which was located in a nice, shiny sheet-iron building.

The Hesperian building burned in March, 1912, destroying all of the old files. "Fire seems to have played an

Steen has stated.

But he rebuilt on the same location, staying there until 1925 when he moved into a spacious, modern, brick building.

Steen trained and aided many newspaper men. Roy Haynes, Van Ezell, Ben Ezell, Bill Hams and Douglas Meador are but few who owe their start to Homer Steen. The Hesperian published the first seven issues of the Matador Tribune when Doug Meador had only a pencil and paper as assets for his new publication.

Steen was a a Rotarian, a Woodman of the World, and a member of the Methodist Church. Probably his most active membership was in the Floydada Chamber of Commerce of which he was the last charter member. He had a passion for doing anything which would develop and improve agricultural programs, better roads and the future for Floydada and Floyd County. His friends called him 'the work horse type of editor."

At one time he said there is only one secret for the success of any weekly newspaper: "Fill the pages with names and spell each of 'em right''.

By the time Steen had retired May 1, 1962, he had served the Panhandle Press Association twice as president, was a director; had been awarded top honors in several fields of journalism; was a member of the West Texas Press Association; was a member of Sigma Delta Chi of West Texas: was a charter member and twice president of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce and also had served as secretary and director: charter member and twice president of the Floydada Lions Club where he held a lifetime membership; was a charter member and one time president of the Floydada Rotary Club and at one time served as chairman of the Democratic

May 31, 1962 was declared Madeline and Homer Steen Day by Mayor S. W. Ross. The town honored the couple with a banquet as a special recognition to

"The present rates established in 1959 are simply too low to meet the company's cost of doing business today," Stevens said. "In the past 12 years, wages, taxes and the company; s investment in Floydada have grown to the extent that we must seek this increase.

Stevens stressed that the company has been able to hold the line on basic rates over the last 12 years by continued and increased sales activities and use of numerous technological advances in equipment and facilities. These factors, he pointed out, allowed the company to meet some of the increased cost of doing business without asking an increase.

"The company has done all it can to keep expenses here as low as possible," Stevens said. but the only solution is to request a reasonable increase in rates in line with today's higher costs. We hope the request will receive prompt and favor-

crops of wheat and feed grains. Representative Bob Price (R. Texas) one of two dozen Republican House Representatives supporting the measure

"I did so because Ifeel grain farmers badly need help.

"There were several features of the bill that Ithink are not desirable, but on balance I feel this action by the House is better than not doing anything."

The bill directs the Secretary of Agriculture to buy up to 300 million bushels of wheat and 25 million tons of feed grain in the open market and then store these grains indefinitely.

The loan level boosts under the bill would raise corn from \$1.08 to \$1.35 per bushel, milo from \$1.73 to \$2.16 per hundred weight, wheat from \$1.25 to \$1.57 per bushel, oats from 81¢ to \$1.01 per bushel and barley from 50¢ to 68¢ per bu-

"I tried to get the House to adopt two amendments to improve the bill," Price said. One of these amendments would have directed the Secretary to place all grain in the reserve in farmer storage facili-

"I think farmers could use, and need, the \$215 million in annual storage fees," Representative Price said.

The second amendment would have prevented the government from dumping the grain acquired for the "strategic reserve" at prices less than 100% of parity.

"In order to have a true reserve insulated from the market, I felt the 100% of parity amendment was needed,' Price said.

"I am hopeful, however," Price continued, "that the Senate can improve the bill before sending it to the President. I feel my amendments would go a long way to making a better bill for farmers," Price con-


