

The destruction of the grub stage of the heel fly, the USDA reports, not only reduces annoyance by the heel flies during the spring, but prevents the cattle from having many grubs the following winter. Feeder animals previously treated for cattle grubs show a gain over untreated animals of about onehalf pound a day.

Its worry that makes Bessie and the heel fly that makes Bess worry most.

A hide containing no more than five cattle grub injuries is classed as a No. 1 hide, and this grade brings the highest price. To produce such a hide, it is necessary to kill the grubs 2 to 3 months before the animals are to be slaughtered.

Stockmen agree, says the USDA, that whatever method of treatment is chosen, enough material should be used to insure effective results . . . that is, to reduce the number of grubs to the point that will insure No. 1 hides, the greatest gain in weight, and freedom of some 461 vehicles, the largest from annoyances during the heel fly season.

Fertilized Legumes for Improving Soil Urged by A & M Agronamist

COLLEGE STATION, Septembe 20-Results of experiments and demonstrations in Texas and vegetable community pric- are convincing evidence that it pays to plant fertilized and in-OPA control, the district OPA oculated legumes for soil improvement.

As legume planting time is near, E. A. Miller, agronomist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, points out to Texas farmers that the use of inoculated seed and fertilizer will enable them to get the most out of a legume crop.

To illustrate that fact, Miller points to a demonstration carried on at the Agricultural Experiment Station at College Station. The yield of cotton following vetch that was not fertilized or inoculated was increased only five pounds of lint an acre. On another plot, however, where the vetch was fertilized and inoculated, the cotton yield was improved on an average of 59 pounds of lint an At experiment substations at







In Korea our forces occupied he southern half with the Russian forces in the northern half. The Russians put our forces on notice they were not to come north of 38 degrees, a boundary which is the dividing line of the ocupation forces. While the Commanding Officer informed us there had been no recent conflicts between the two forces, we were given to understand that the entrance of any of our people into the Rusian Zone would be most vigorously opposed. It is important to point out that the USSR has an occupation force of better than two hundred thousand soldiers plus a strong air force, in their zone compared to the handful

we have in the American Zone Leaving Korea, our next scheduled point was Nagasaki on the southwestern tip of the Japanese chain of islands. We had hoped to see where one of the two atomic bombs was dropped However, the weather was very bad over Nagasaki so we turned north to Hiroshima and saw where one single atomic bomb had killed at least sixty thousand people. Save for a few concrete and steel buildings, absolutely nothing was left of Hiroshima in the area where the bomb hit. I have seen the shambles left in several of the big German cities but the destruction there was not as complete as the destruction of Hiroshima. in addition, the German cities were destroyed by thousands upon thousands of block-busting bombs and incendiaries whereas Hiroshima felt force of only one bomb. should of course be borne in mind that the construction in Japan is entirely different from the modern German towns but
