The following special recipe in chart form comes from the National Broiler Council. This recipe accommodates everyone from the live-aloner to the bursting-at-seams family, or the family that entertains.

Sprinkle chicken quarters with salt and pepper. Place skin side up in shallow baking pan just large enough to hold amount of chicken in a single layer. Melt butter in small saucepan; add remaining ingredients and spoon over chicken.

Bake uncovered at 375 degrees F. for an hour or until chicken is tender. Spoon sauce over chicken occasionally during baking.

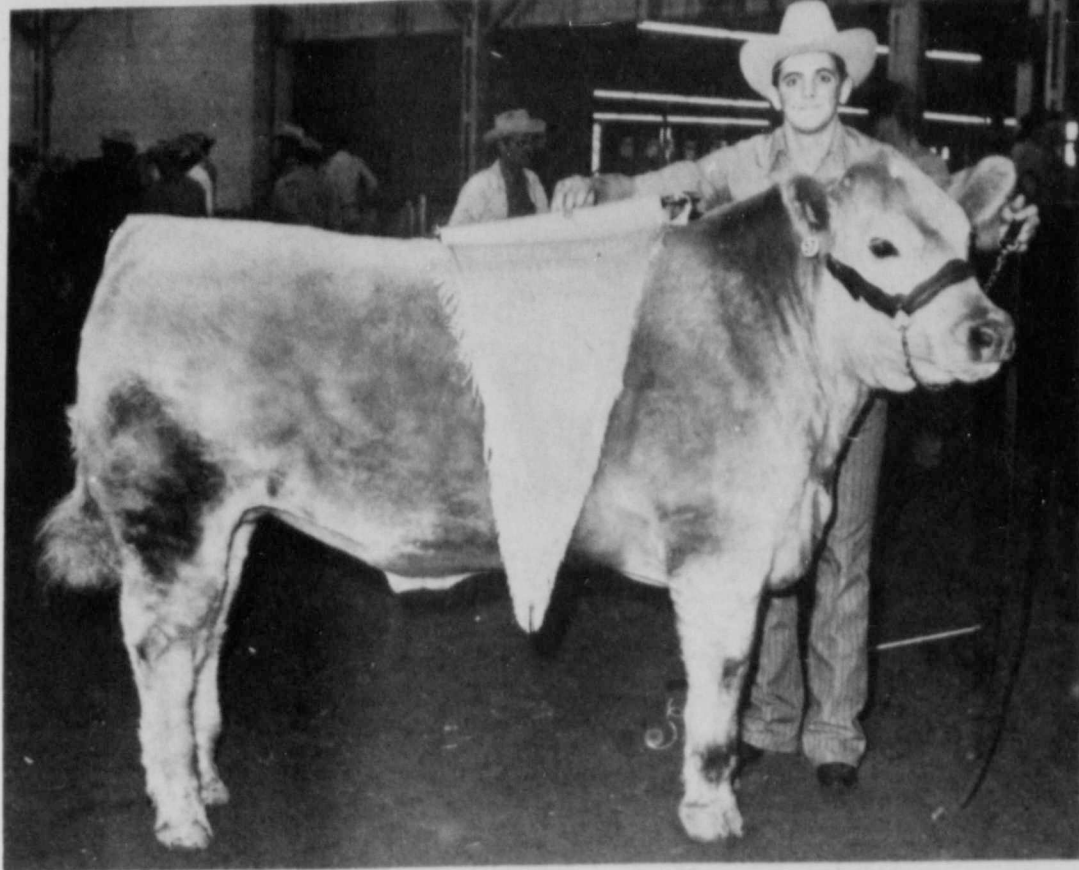
Delicious chicken buttered, herbed, and baked is nice for anyone to come home to.

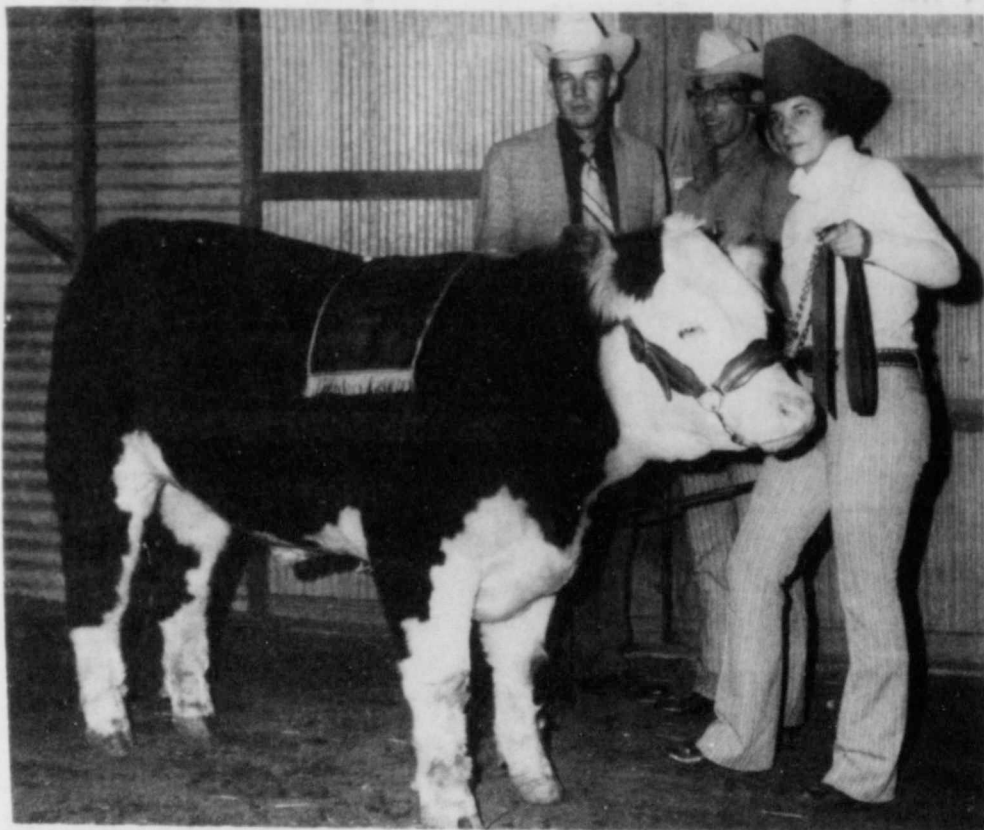

The big family-size boxes will sell for \$1.00 per box and will provide more Council profits for building and improving Camp Rio Blanco, the established Girl Scout camp northeast of Crosbyton, Mrs. Hagood explained.

Girl Scouts in the 18-county Caprock Council will be selling the cookies through March

11; the same five favorite flavors may be bought: Assorted Sandwich, Mint, Butter Shorties, Peanut Butter, and Pecanette. Mrs. Hagood received 375 cases of cookies Monday, which have been distributed through the troop chairmen and to the girls for the sale beginning tomorrow afternoon. Sound like a lot of cookies?? It is!! But Floydada girls have topped cookie-selling records in and around Floydada for the past three years, and they are just as enthusiastic this year. The girls will be wearing their uniforms, or will be wearing their Girl Scout pins to identify them when selling. The troop profit per box will be doubled this year. 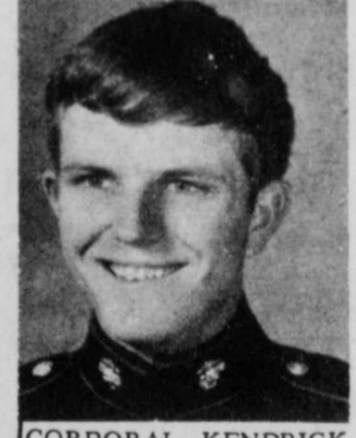

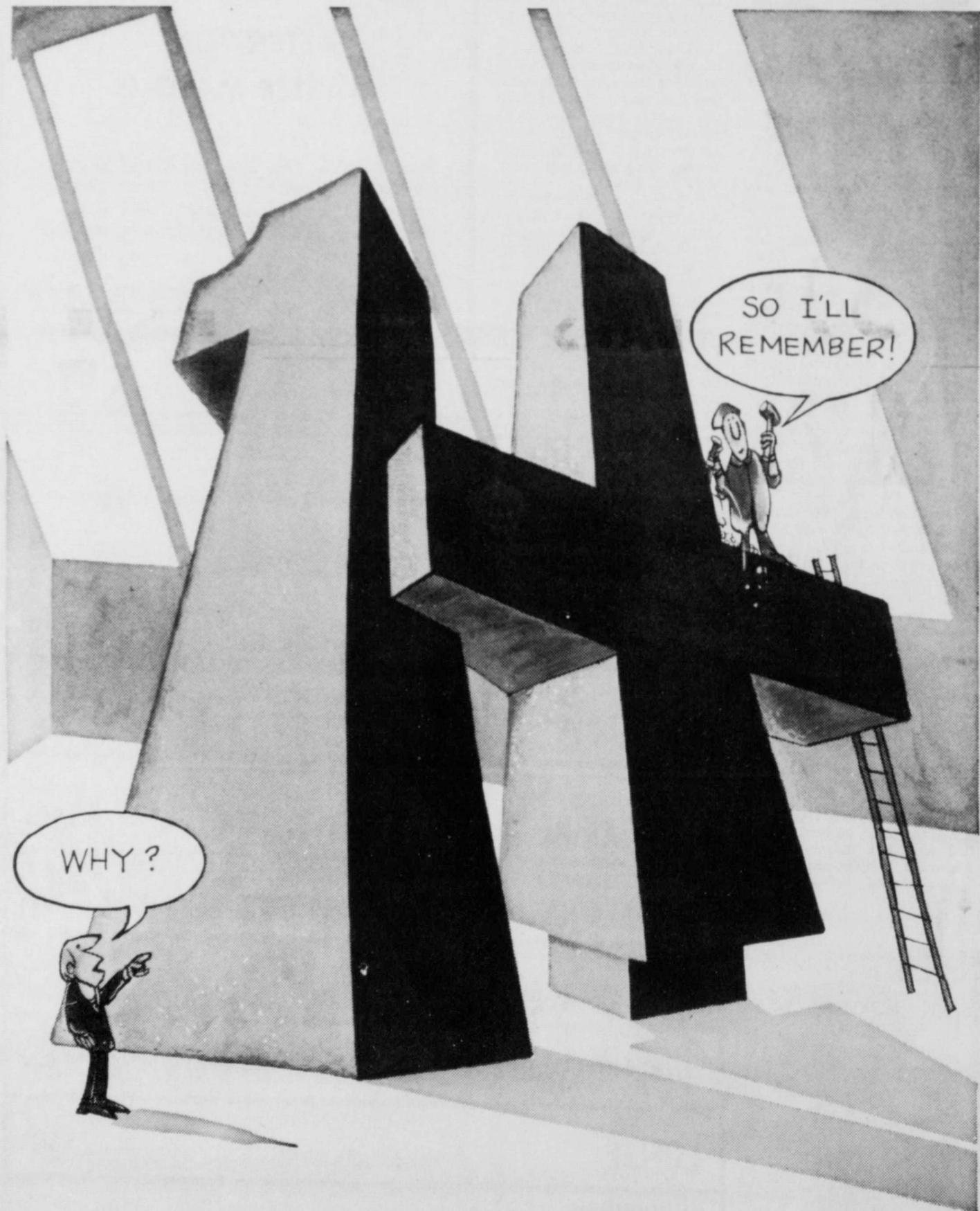

Even though food prices are expected to go up four percent this year and net farm income is expected to set a record, the farmer still is less than three-fourths as well off financially as the city dweller, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said. White said charges that the farmer is responsible for the expected food cost increase "is sheer nonsense." He said par-

ty - the measuring stick that shows how agriculture is faring in comparison with the rest of the economy - is at 72 percent. "This means that agriculture will have to increase its income 28 percent to just be even with the rest of the economy," he said. Expected increases in net farm income this year "is welcome news, not just for agriculture but for the rest of the

economy, too. Farmers are big spenders when they have the money to spend, and a dollar of farm income generates five to seven dollars in new spending throughout the economy," White said. Some members of Congress have asked for a ceiling on prices paid for agricultural products. White suggested that farm prices be "rolled back to levels of 22 years ago." If

that were done, he said, the farmer would be getting more money than he now is.

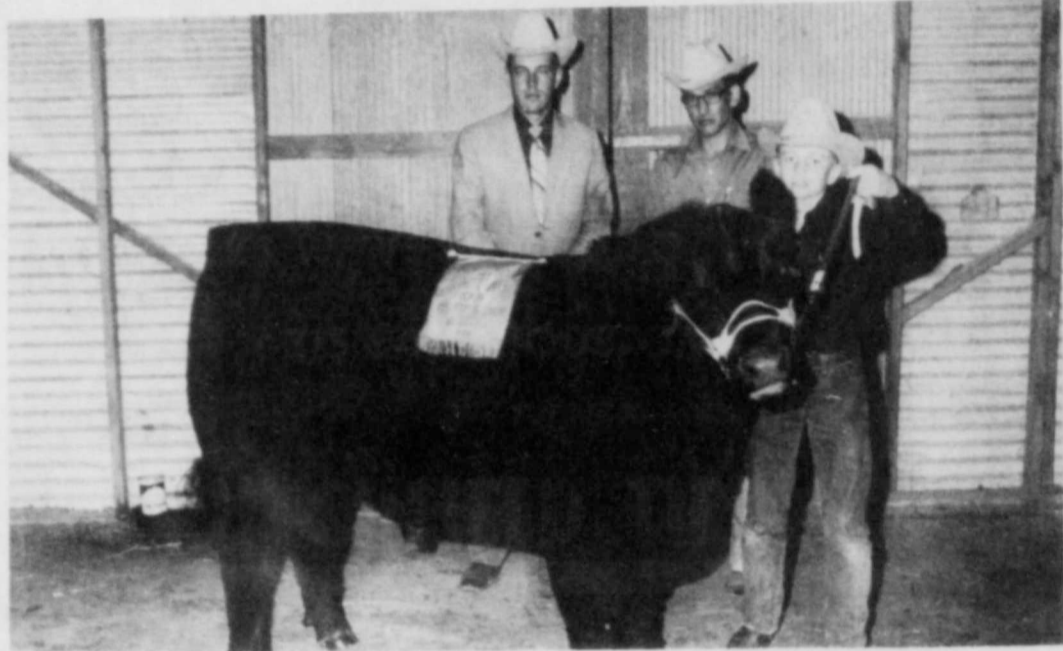
