

# Farmer Claimed Not Responsible For Increase In Food Prices

Even though food prices are expected to go up four percent this year and net farm income is expected to set a record, the farmer still is less than threefourths as well off financially as the city dweller, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said.

White said charges that the farmer is responsible for the expected food cost increase "is sheer nonsense." He said par-

ity - the measuring stick that shows how agriculture is faring in comparison with the rest of the economy - is at 72 percent. "This means that agriculture will have to increase its income 28 percent to just be even with the rest of the economy," he

Expected increases in net farm income this year "is welcome news, not just for agriculture but for the rest of the

economy, too. Farmers are big spenders when they have the money to spend, and a dollar of farm income generates five to seven dollars in new spending throughout the economy," White said.

Some members of Congress have asked for a ceiling on prices paid for agricultural products. White suggested that farm prices be "rolled back to levels of 22 years ago." If

that were done, he said, the farmer would be getting more money than he now is.

"Livestock prices are as close to full parity now as any other commodity. Yet, livestock prices today to the producer are no higher than they were 22 years ago," he said.

"The average wage earner today makes about three and a half times more than he did 20 years ago; net farm income is

about the same as two decades ago," he said.

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


