

— a duo from Hamlin — in the first round Friday at Odessa, winning 6-4, 6-0, but lost Saturday to the eventual regional champions.


Teresa Beck and Sheila Patterson from Spearman defeated Denice and Karla 6-0, 6-3, then went on to take the regional crown for the third year in a row.



The services at First Baptist Church will be conducted this Sunday morning on Central Standard Time. The membership is asked to not change the clock Saturday night as customary, but to wait until the close of the morning service, and the entire congregation will move the clock ahead one hour.

Many churches in other areas have found this to work very effectively and conveniently for this first Sunday of the time change; so, the slogan is, "Don't touch that clock until 12 Sunday noon."

The services will be conducted at the usual time. Sunday School is at 9:45 a.m. and the preaching service is at 11 a.m.

**April 30 Deadline For Filing Wage Reports**

A tax deadline that is new to thousands of Texas employers arrives April 30, 1972. For an estimated 72,000 employers who became "covered" employers by act of the last legislature, April 30 is the deadline for filing wage reports with the Texas Employment Commission and paying unemployment taxes for the first quarter of this year.

"Those who have not yet filed this quarterly report should do so at the earliest opportunity," W. S. Birdwell Jr., commissioner representing employers, urges. Employers who are new to coverage have been notified by mail, and have been sent the forms and instructions for making the employers' quarterly report. Some of the quar-

terly reports received have omitted the wages list containing employees' names and wages. These must be included, along with the taxes due. Employers brought for the first time under coverage of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act by the legislature are mostly those who have one to four employees. The "new" employers this

year receive a tax rate of 1 per cent. The law requires employers who have one or more workers in 20 weeks of a calendar year on the payroll, and employers who pay \$1,500 or more in wages in a calendar quarter, to pay the unemployment insurance tax. Certain nonprofit, charitable and educational organizations are subject only if they have four or more workers. Wages up to \$9,000 must be reported to the Commission


in order to calculate unemployment benefits. The tax, however, is based on wages paid each employee in a calendar year. The tax is due on the first \$4,200 paid to each employee. Those employers who became liable for the tax for the first time in 1972—with the exception of the successor in a change of ownership—are assigned an entrance tax rate of 1.0 per cent.

The Floydada Riding Club met for the monthly meeting April 21. G. L. Fawver called the business session to order. Parade invitations were discussed and a club outing was proposed.


There were 23 members and guests present. Light refreshments were served and progressive 42 was played. A good time was had by all.

**ENJOY FRESH STRAWBERRY DISHES**  
People eat first with their eyes, then with their taste buds. That's one reason the fresh strawberry season is such a delightful occasion in good eating. The bright, juicy and tasty berries catch your eye in the field, the market or the moment they are brought into your home. Their appeal grows as the berries are transformed into attractive, simply prepared dishes of strawberries'n cream, short cakes, cereal toppings, pies, sauces and cakes.

In earlier years the strawberry season lasted only a short time. Homemakers had to work hard and fast to preserve the berries for winter use.

Things have changed a bit. We now have fresh berries available to some extent, the year round. Still the excitement over the first berries - luciously ripe from vines in nearby gardens - can't be excelled.

A hidden bonus in strawberry eating lies in the nutritive value. Fresh or frozen, they rate high in Vitamin C. A half-cup of strawberries - a dish of strawberries and cream, or a large piece of strawberry pie - provides the minimum daily dietary needs of this important vitamin. And strawberries that ripen on the plant contain more Vitamin C than those picked half-red and held until fully ripe.

So now's the time to enjoy full glow of eye-catching, tasty and nutritious fresh spring strawberries from nearby production centers.

When buying strawberries, look for berries with full red color and bright luster. The flesh should be firm and the cap stem still attached. The berries should be dry and clean. Usually medium to small sizes have better eating quality than the large ones. It's wise to avoid buying berries with large uncolored or "seedy" areas. These are signs of poor flavor and texture.

A dull, shrunken appearance or softness are signs of over-ripeness or decay. Also, watch for berries with mold which can spread rapidly from one berry to another. Because fresh berries are so delicate, handle them carefully to avoid bruising. Empty the berries into a shallow tray, and sort out the damaged or decayed ones. Cover loosely with wax paper and store in the refrigerator.

Just before serving, wash the berries in cold water and drain dry. Remove caps after the berries are clean and dry. Serve them as soon after purchase as possible - within one or two days.




