## FLOYD PHILOSOPHER Hopes Ban On Exaggerated Claims For Headache Tablets Doesn't Spread



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm seems to be fighting a headache, his letter this week indicates.

Dear editor:  
As everybody knows, the best spot on television to advertise a headache remedy is about two-thirds way through the evening's newscast. By that time the demand for it naturally skyrockets and I have a notion that the manufacturers of the tablets know the worse the news is the higher their sales go and they're bound to smile a little, like the gas and oil people rubbing their hands in anticipation when the first cold wave of the year hits.

In this connection, the Federal Communications Commission doesn't object to pushing the sale of headache remedies right at the time when anybody who is paying attention to the news needs them the most, but it does object to one company's claiming its remedy is stronger or better than another when tests indicate they're all about the same.

Therefore it is considering adopting a rule forbidding the practice, and is even considering requiring the companies to spend 25 percent of their advertising budget over the past two years to correct all claims of superiority.

Recreational land promotions always increase during the spring as companies selling lake lots, wilderness lots

and speculative land investments begin to advertise. Direct mail promotions for local developments encourage personal visits by the whole family by offering "discounts" off the "regular" price of the lots. Some companies conduct contests while others speak of the investment potential inherent in land - particularly their land.

If you are considering the purchase of a lake lot or a small tract of land as an investment, then you should be cautious. The following guidelines are worth reading before you sign the contract:

1. Make a personal visit to the property to see for yourself the overall condition of the land, access roads, improvements and specific plot you will be purchasing. Every year thousands of people purchase land they have never seen and are often disappointed when they later visit the land development.

2. Ask the salesman for a copy of the Property Report which many land developers are required to file with the Office of Interstate Land Sales Registration, U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Washington, D. C. 20411. This report will

furnish information regarding the existence of liens on the property, availability of recreational facilities, availability of water service and utilities, the type of title the buyer will receive and the distances to nearby communities over paved or unpaved roads.

3. Determine a fair price for the land on the basis of land near the development rather than accepting a false value the salesman's claims of rapid appreciation of land values in the area.

Don't fall for the "free lot" sales pitch or its companion the "discount check. These pitches are merely designed to encourage people to purchase a lot on their first visit to the development. Land developers are going to make a profit on the sale of their lots. If the development advertises a country club, golf course, boat marina, water district or other improvements which would enhance the value of the land, check on the status of these items to determine whether or not they are still in the "planning stage."

In summary, the most important first step you should take before purchasing land would be to make a personal visit to the land to see for yourself what you are buying. But just as important would be to ask the right questions regarding the availability of the items necessary to insure your enjoyment of the property. If good quality drinking water is not available at an economical rate, septic tanks are not permitted, or electric power cannot be obtained at a reasonable cost, then the progress of the development may be very slow. Think about these problems before signing up for a lot in Rainbow City.

## Jobs Sought For Texas Veterans

Formation of Jobs for Veterans local task forces is moving quickly in a number of Texas cities, in response to the urging of Governor Preston Smith.

He recently asked Texas mayors to lead the organization of local efforts to find jobs for the thousands of Texas veterans of Vietnam-era military service, in cooperation with the Governor's Task Force.

"In early 1972, the Texas Employment Commission had some 55,000 veterans on its active list of those seeking work. Of these, 27,369 were Vietnam-era veterans, and 5,725 of the total were disabled veterans," Harold K. Dudley, TEC chairman and head of the State task force, reveals. "We have our task plainly before us. I think government and business can join effectively in this effort."

Houston set the pace earlier in the veteran job placement efforts, being judged the outstanding metropolitan Task Force in the nation. The effort resulted in an 85.6 percent increase in veterans placements in Houston. The "Golden Triangle" area - Beaumont, Port Arthur and Orange - likewise has a vigorous effort already operating.

Both Dallas and Fort Worth have taken recent action to find jobs for the returning servicemen.

Dallas has scheduled a Veterans Career Fair May 10-11, co-sponsored by the National Alliance of Businessmen and the American Legion. Dallas area employers have pledged 6,200 jobs or more in the effort. More than a hundred employers will interview veterans at the Career Fair.

Fort Worth Mayor R. M. Stovall has named John McKissick of Big Three Industries the chairman of the veterans job effort there, with Herman Foster of the Manpower Planning Office of the North Central Texas Council of Governments as coordinator.

Sherman, Lufkin, Temple, Plainview and McAllen are other cities which recently named chairmen to handle their veterans job task forces.

Col. Charles L. Daniel was named in Sherman. C. W. Seago is chairman in Lufkin; Robert Stavinskas heads the effort in Temple; Bob Gardner is chairman in Plainview; and William C. Pratt is McAllen chairman.

Other cities are making plans to be active in the effort to help veterans find their places in the labor force.

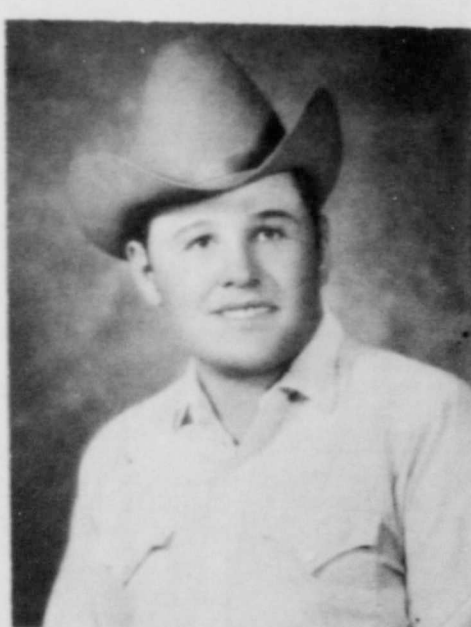

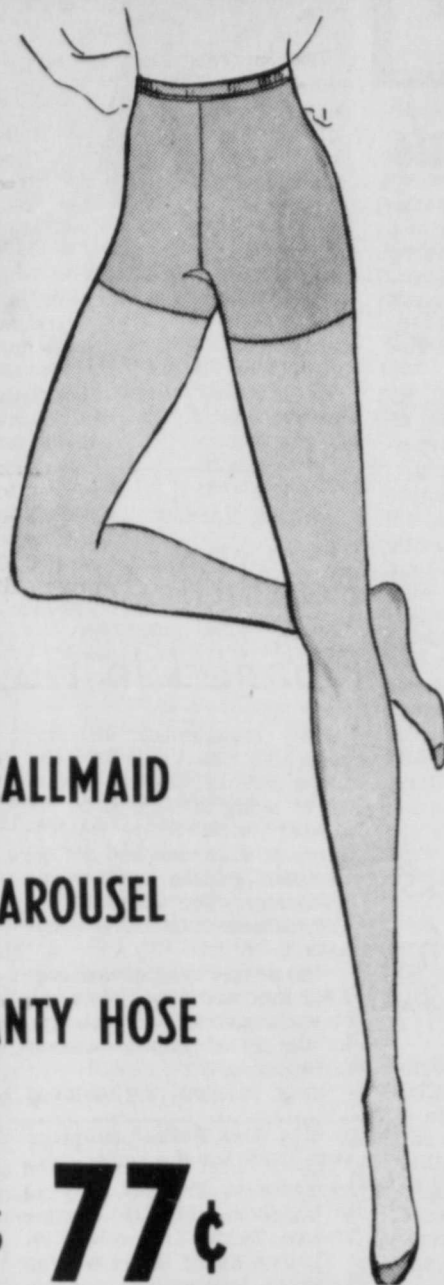

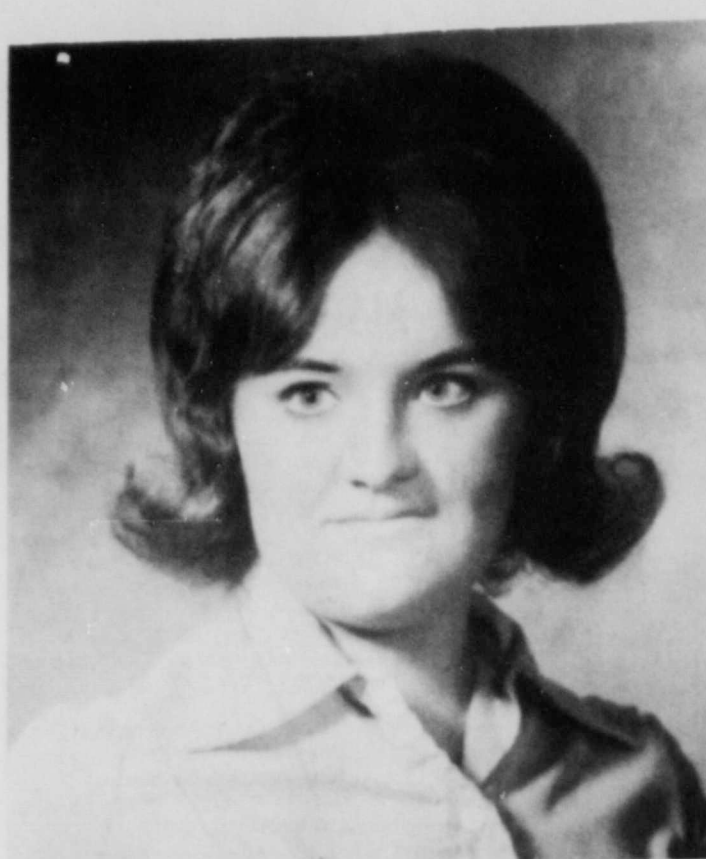

WHETHER in favor or not, we turned our clock forward an hour Sunday morning. I read in other news sources that time change really didn't materialize in 1966 during the Johnson's administration, Ben Franklin started it all. He discovered that crossing the international dateline and crossing other time barriers, a traveler became more tired. If old Ben were around today some who are disgruntled with Daylight Saving Time (DST) might tell him to go fly a kite. Daylight Saving Time was first originated in the second

year of WWI when every European country adopted the idea of moving the clock hands forward one hour during the spring, summer and autumn months. This motive however was not for pleasure, it was to save fuel for lighting and heating by getting people up, and getting them to bed one hour earlier.

It wasn't until after the outbreak of the first world war that the United States showed interest. In 1917 Congress passed an act to make the time change effective on the last Sunday in March, 1918. The act lasted one year and was repealed over the president's veto in 1920.

Intermittent legislation followed, but nothing was done until 1942 when war time brought the change again that continued through 1945. The DST of today became law in 1966. A referendum of public opinion which has no binding effect on this law, is on the Republican Voting Ballot this year.

Athletic director Preston Watson was master of ceremonies. Student council president Jim Dempsey gave the invocation.

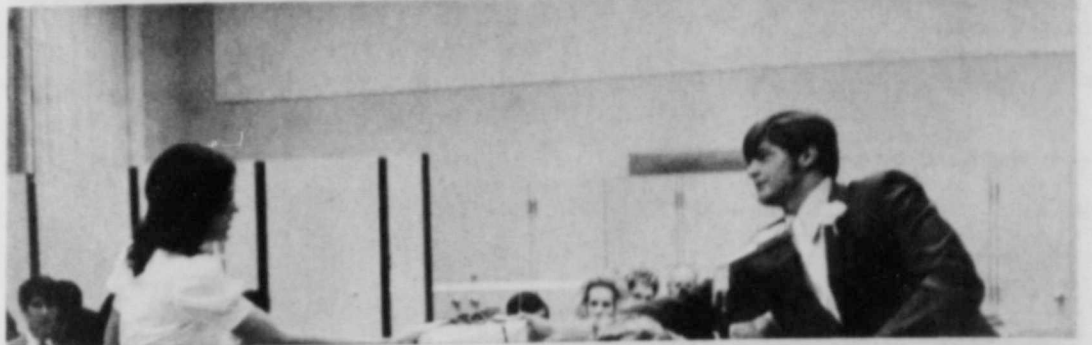

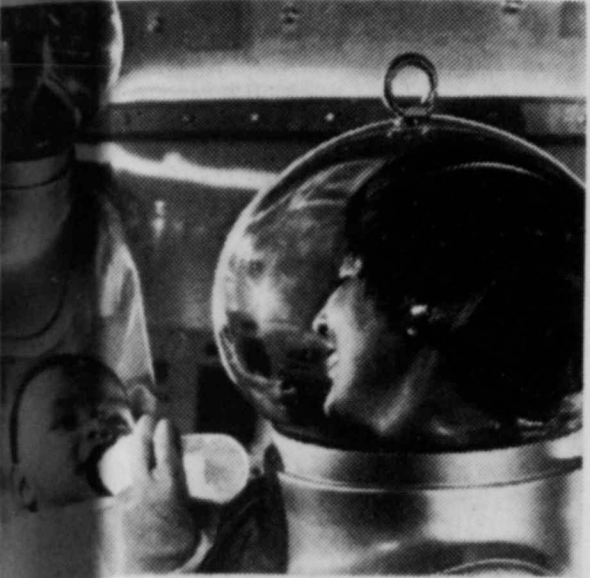

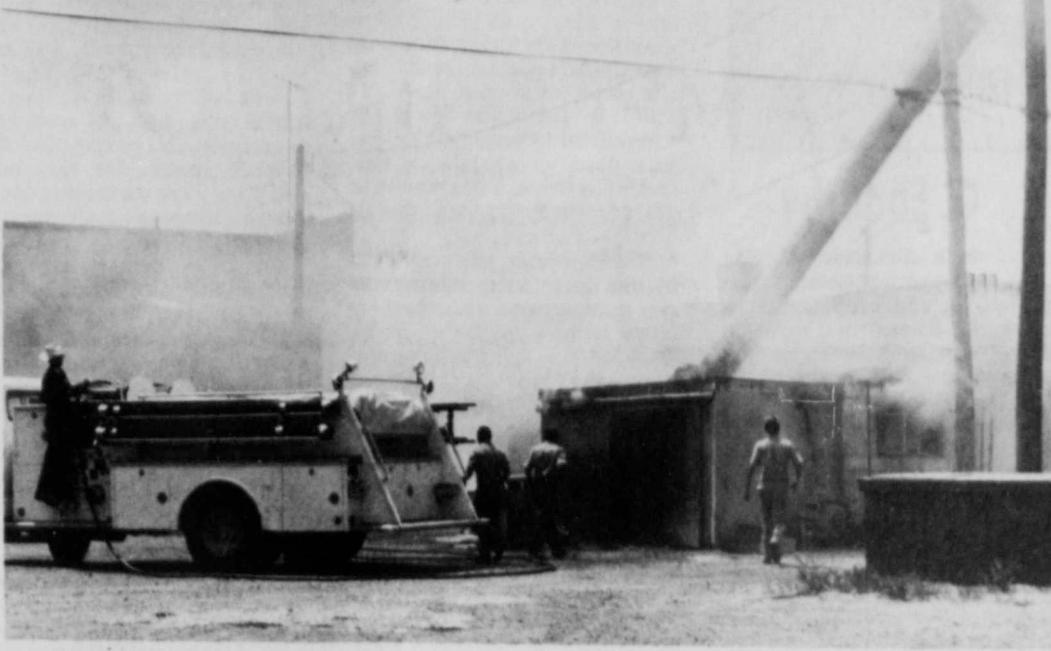

## Company Predicts Drop in Pork Prices

Pork prices may come down later in the year, according to John M. Watson, president of Tobin Co., Rochester, N.Y.

Mr. Watson said that, "While government reports on the hog population are rather pessimistic for at least the first half of calendar '72, the year as a whole is expected to yield the second largest hog crop in history. A

tremendous corn crop has been harvested and the combination of rising hog prices and plentiful feed might just entice farmers to take a second look at their hog breeding intentions." More hogs then might come to market at lower prices by the end of the fiscal year and this, he said, "would help us considerably since we buy over a half-billion prime animals every year for processing."

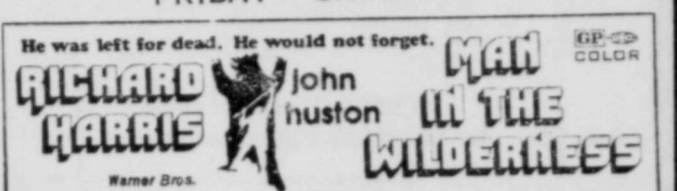

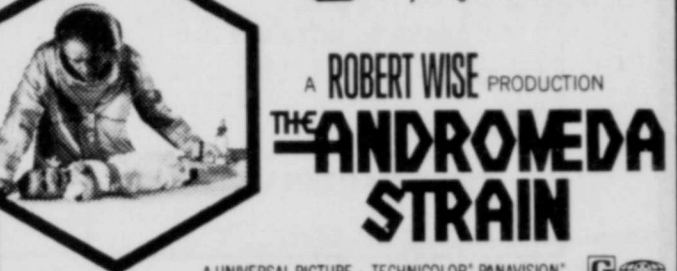

## City Police Investigated 101 Wrecks

From April 1, 1971 through March 31, 1972, the City of Floydada Police Department investigated and worked 101 automobile accidents within the city limits.

No deaths resulted from any of the city wrecks, city manager Bill Feuerbacher announced this week.

The total number of fines collected in Floydada's corporation court during the same period was 250. Fines collected totaled \$4,598.

The largest number of violations, 42, was for driving without a license. Speeding tickets accounted for 33 fines, and there were 37 fines paid for "disturbances." Persons arrested for "drunk in public" accounted for 35 of the 250 fines paid in the city court during the year-long period.

Next biggest law violation in Floydada for the year reported was minor in possession, for which 11 fines were paid. Ten drivers paid fines for "following too close," nine ran stop signs, and six made an improper turn.

## Absentee Vote Indicates Large Primary Turnout

The number of registered voters qualified to vote in the May 6 primaries in Floyd County is 4,399 this year, nearly 500 less than in 1968, the last presidential election year, when 4,820 county citizens registered.

For the first time this year, Texans are eligible to vote if they have registered 30 days prior to the election. In 1968, the old register-by-January-31 law was in effect.

Floyd County voters must have been looking ahead to the state and national elections in 1968, because only one contested county race, Precinct 1 Commissioner, appeared on either party's primary ballot.

The 1972 first-primary absentee vote was greater than in '68, with the County Clerk's office this year reporting 143 absentee ballots cast in the Democratic primary and three in the Republican, "probably" a record, according to the Clerk's office. There were 126 absentee votes in 1968.

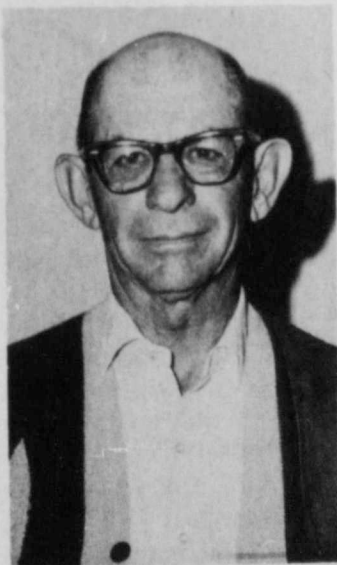

## County To Get Revenue Sharing Money

Governor Preston Smith released the following statement today concerning the General Revenue-Sharing Bill which was approved by the House Ways and Means Committee: "Based on information we have received from the House Ways and Means Committee, the revenue-sharing bill approved by the Committee earlier this week will provide a total of \$202 million during the first year to cities and counties of Texas. Allocation of funds will be retroactive to January 1, 1972.

"We have worked closely with the committee and chairman Wilbur Mills to provide all assistance which would be helpful to the committee in their deliberations. As a result of this close communication, we are now receiving detailed information as to specific allocations to the various counties of the State.

"Initial estimates indicate that a total of \$143,468 will be allocated to all governmental units in Floyd County. Of that amount, the county government will receive \$113,555, the city of Floydada will receive \$19,814.

"The balance will be distributed to other cities and towns within the county.

"It would appear from these early estimates that the bill, if finally enacted, will provide substantial fiscal relief to the hard-pressed cities and coun-

ties of Texas. At the same time it will afford a real opportunity to improve and expand on those services which the people feel are most critically needed.

"I have strongly advocated approval of these funds to our cities and counties and I will continue to support these provisions until final Congressional approval is received."

## Farm Loans Increase \$38 Million

WASHINGTON - The Administration has released \$38 million in new loan funds to help family farmers put in their 1972 crops, Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz announced today.

This raises the operating loan program of the Farmers Home Administration to a new high of \$313 million, Mr. Butz said.

Funds may be used to buy seed, feed, fertilizer, livestock, tractor fuel and other equipment and facilities needed to run a successful family farm operation. Loans will be handled through some 1,750 county offices of FHA.

"Not only is the operating loan program at record levels, funding of the \$350 million farm ownership and \$140 million emergency loan programs of Farmers Home Administration is also at a peak," James V. Smith, agency administrator said.

"Add the more than \$200 million that is being provided our borrowers from private credit sources through our joint lending efforts, and the total available to FFA family farmers this year will easily exceed a billion dollars, surpassing the previous all-time high record of service by some \$300 million," he said.

The USDA agency supplies supplementary credit to family farmers who are unable to ob-

tain conventional credit from regular sources at reasonable rates and terms.

## Community Action Council Gets Family Planning Grant

Governor Preston Smith today announced his approval of a community action grant of \$59,983 in federal funds to Community Action Council of Floyd, Crosby, Dickens and Kent Counties in Crosbyton for General Community Programming and Family Planning.

The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is effective May 1, 1972, through April 30, 1973. Of the funds allocated, \$44,983 are for General Community Programming and \$15,000 are for Family Planning.

Five neighborhood centers will be operated through General Community Programming. Projects to be offered in the centers include employment agencies, assisting indi-

viduals with obtaining loans for new homes or repairs for existing structures and cooperating with school districts to provide adult basic education. 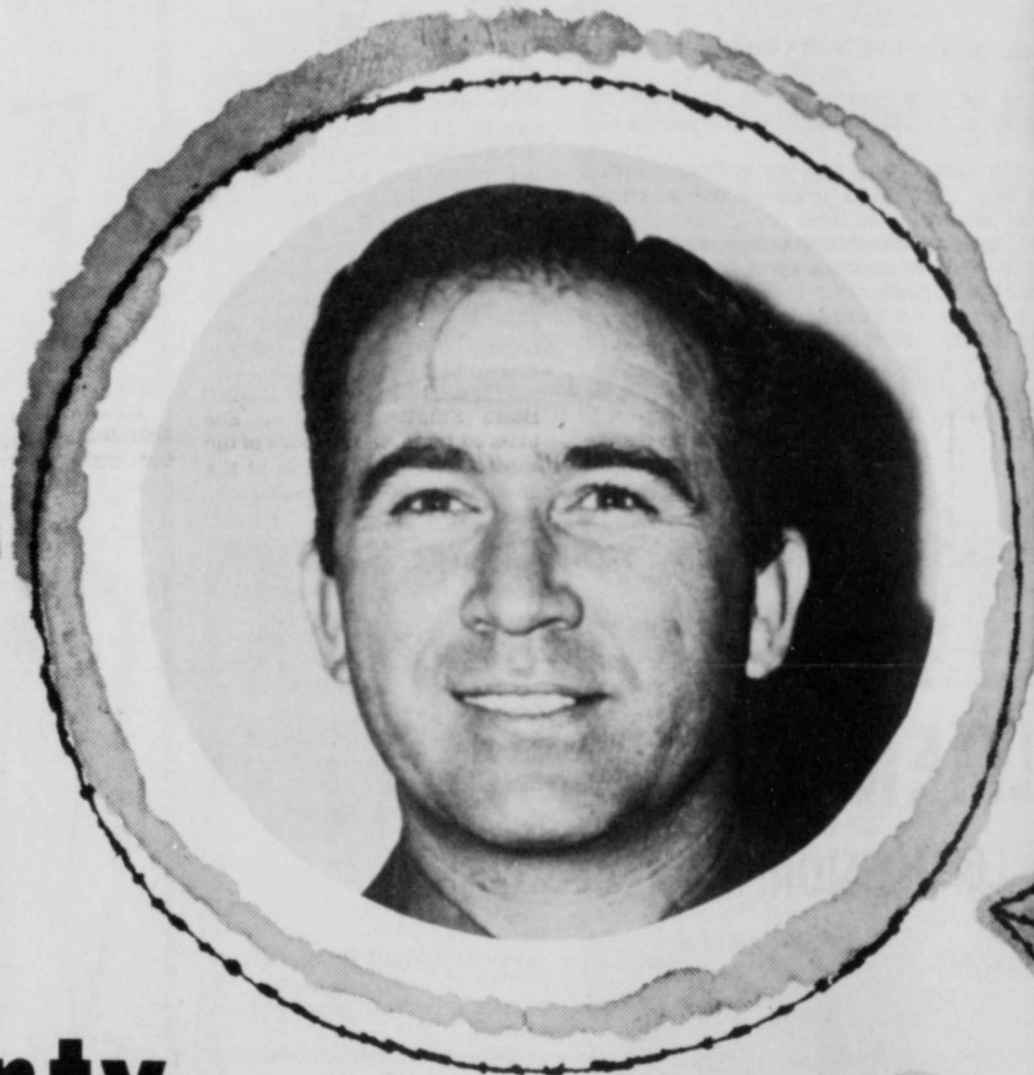

## March Bond Sales \$4051

In releasing Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman J. C. Webb, III, announced that sales of United States Savings Bonds in Floyd County during March totaled \$4,051. During the first quarter of 1972, sales were \$45,574 for 25 percent of goal achieved.

Texans purchased \$18,288,542 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to March 1971 sales of \$17,180,080 - an increase of 6 percent. Quarterly sales totaled \$56,927,138 for 28 percent of the state's goal of \$202.3 million.

National sales of E and H Bonds amounting to \$582 million were reported for March, 13.3 percent above 1971 sales of \$513 million. Sales for the three-month period totaled \$1,640 million - 31 percent of the national goal of \$5.3 billion.

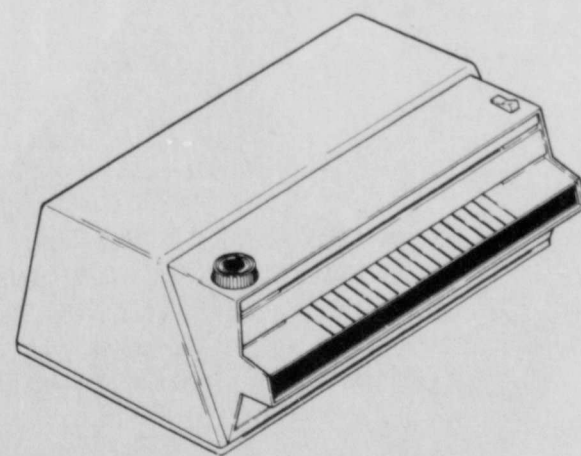

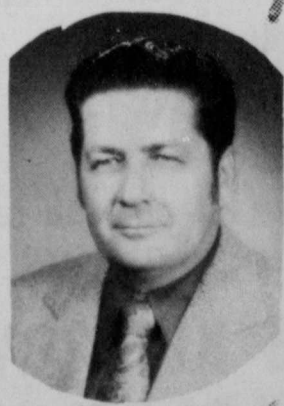

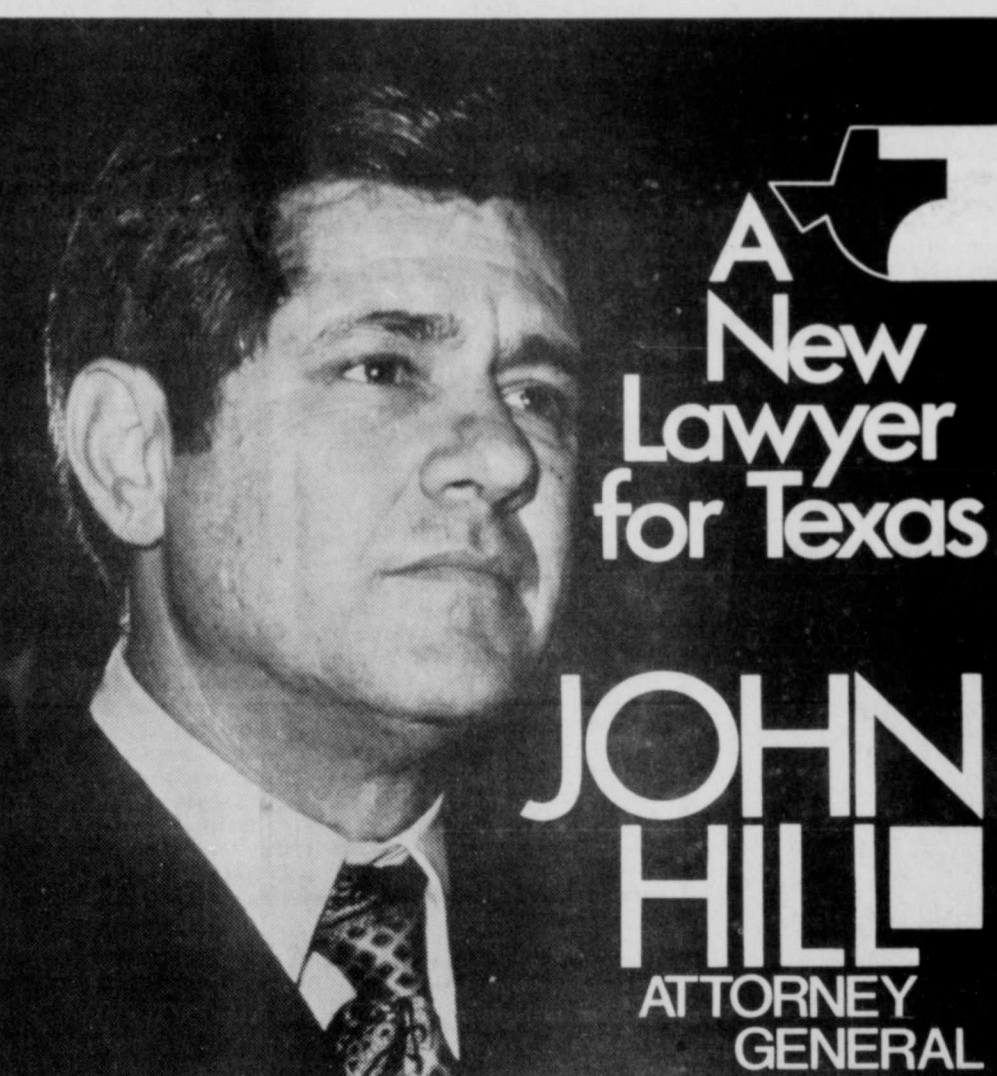

I am now serving my second term as Governor, and previously served six years as Lieutenant Governor, six years as State Senator, and six years as State Representative. ## "Life To Me, Of Course, Is Christ"

"To me, 'life' means Christ", wrote St. Paul in his letter to the Christians at Philippi (Phil. 1:21). This statement is startling. Otherwise put, another translation, "Life to me, of course, is Christ." In one sense, Paul probably means that as long as he lived, all his energy would be absorbed in the preaching of Christ. Christ would be the preoccupation of his life, much as a man today might say, "For me, my life is my work," or as a mother would say "For me, 'life' is my husband and my children." Paul claims that his life is wholly taken up with Christ and His work.

An even richer meaning is suggested if those words of Paul are interpreted in the light of his later letters. The letters to the Colossians and Ephesians express a vision of life that sees Christ at the center of reality: "In Him everything continues in being." (Col. 1:17).

Paul saw Christ so much at the heart of all reality that in a very real sense "life" could be identified with "Christ." Without Him there would be no life. Without knowing Him the deepest dimensions of life elude man's search for meaning.

Paul gradually discovered such a profound relationship between his faith in Christ and his daily experience, that his letters exemplify that goal of Christian understanding. We also must understand the deepest meaning and value of all creation, and how to relate it to the praise of God.

Like Paul before them, Christians are called to learn that religion is not a separate category of existence but the deepest dimension of ordinary life. "To me, 'life' means Christ."

Adults, adolescents and children, each on his own level of maturity and experience, are to be assisted in learning to discern the presence of Christ in life and through that knowledge of Him discover the meaning of human existence.

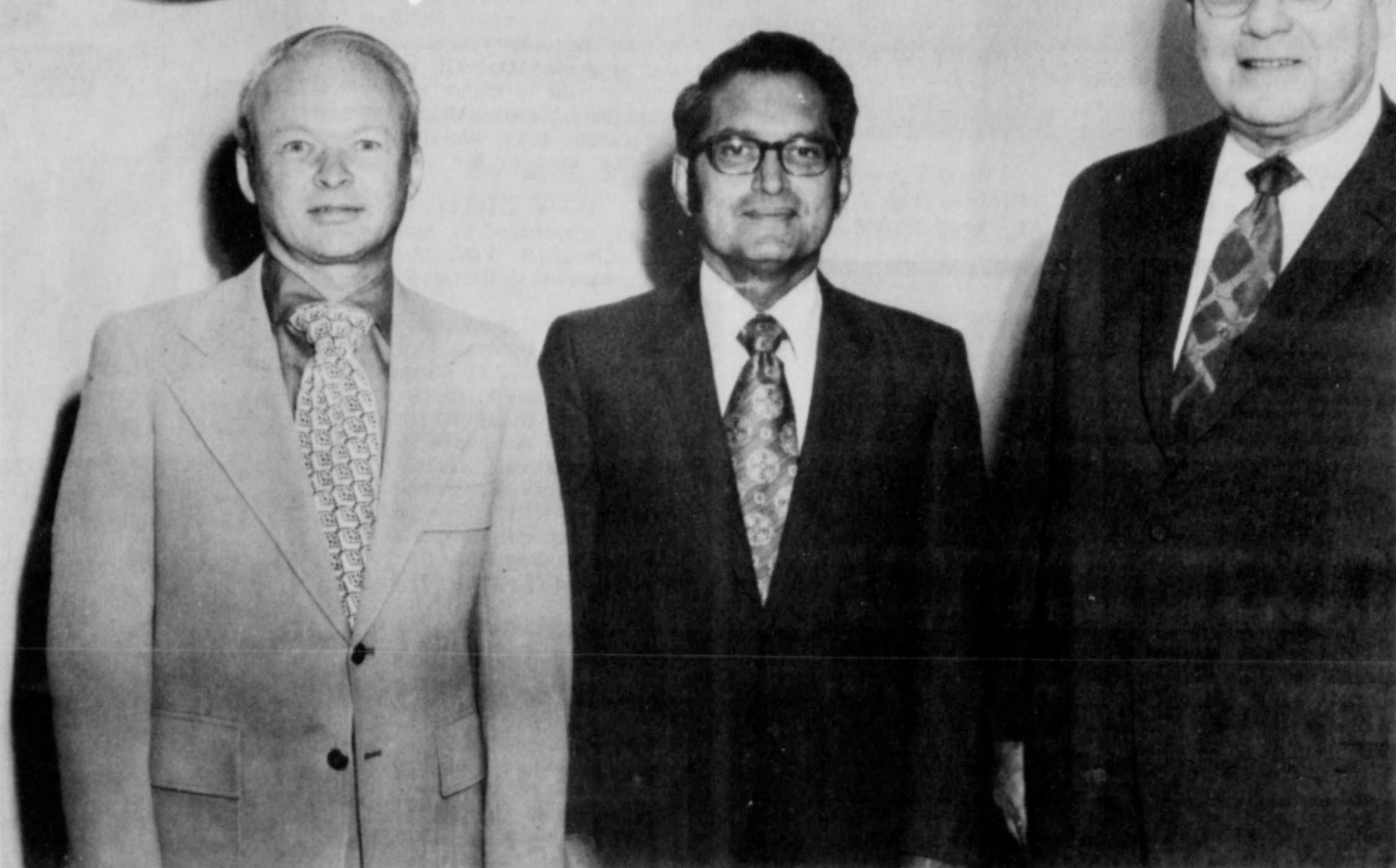

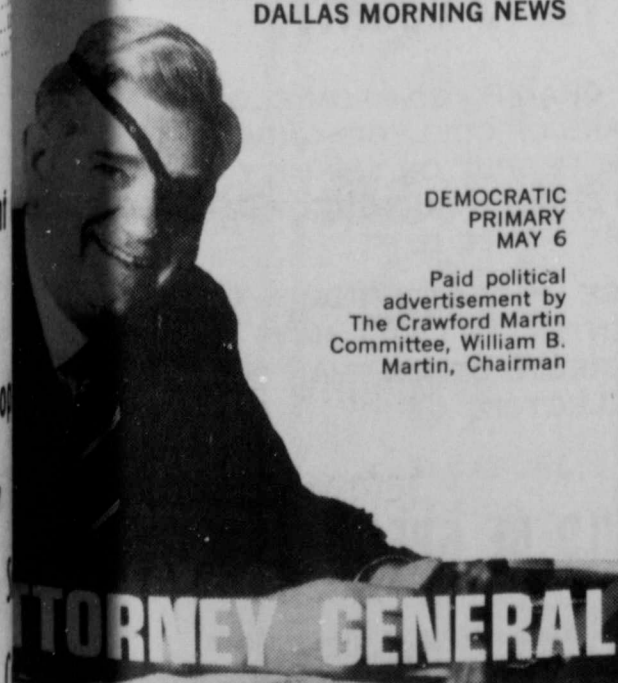

# 1,854,000 Fed Cattle Reported For Texas

Cattle being fed for slaughter market totaled 1,854,000 head on April 1, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

This is 19 percent above the 1,563,000 head on feed a year earlier, 1 percent above the 1,844,000 head

on feed March 1, and 4 percent above the 1,781,000 head on feed January 1.

"Large" feedlots - those with 1,000 plus capacity in size - numbered 285 and

held 1,814,000 cattle on feed for slaughter market. Of the 285 large feedlots,

204 (72 percent) reported cattle on feed April 1, while the other 81 reported their feedlots as empty.

Capacity for all 285 large feedlots totaled 2,567,900 head and shows a 71 percent occupancy. Capacity of the 204 active feedlots was 2,353,400, compared to a capacity of

214,500 reported by the 81 empty feedlots.

"Small" feedlots - those with less than 1,000 capacity - head 40,000 head.
