Primary election day Saturday promises to command more voter interest in Floyd County than has been the case in recent years, with five contested county and precinct races on the Democratic Primary

ballot. Three candidates' names appear on the ballot in the sheriff's race, and four candidates are seeking election to the county tax assessor - collector's post.

There are six hopefuls in the contest for commissioner of precinct one and three for precinct three, and three justiceof-peace candidates are seeking to fill the unexpired term of the late Judge S. J. Handley in precincts one and four. Running unopposed in the

The second primary is scheduled for Saturday, June 3, if runoffs are necessary and it is expected that they will be. A referendum item to be in-

cluded on the primary ballots deals with public school busing and reads as follows:

"No public school student shall because of his race, creed, or color be assigned to or required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required busing of public school students and provides for equal quality education for all public school students."

Voters mark their ballots "For" or "Against" the proposition, which is worded as an "anti-busing" proposal. This means that if one if "for" forced busing of public school students to achieve racial balance, he marks his ballot "against" the proposition; and, conversely, if he is "against" forced busing, he would vote "for" in the referendum.

The Camporee is a showplace of Scouting in which parents and the general public can observe Scouting in action. Visitors are especially invit-




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ed to the Saturday afternoon program in which the participating Troops will present a Scouting in Action Fair from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m.



Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johson grass farm seems to be fighting a headache, his letter this week indicates. Dear editar:

As everybody knows, the best spot on television to advertise a headache remedy is about two-thirds way through the evening's newscast. By that time the demand for it naturally skyrockets and I have a notion that the manufacturers of the tablets know the worse the news is the higher their sales go and they're bound to smile a little, like the gas and oil people rubbing their hands in anticipation when the first cold wave of the year hits,

In this connection, the Federal Communications Commission doesn't object to pushing the sale of headache remedies right at the time when anybody who is paying attention to the news needs them the most, but it does object to one company's claiming its remedy is stronger or better than another when tests indicate they're all about the same,

Therefore it is considering adopting a rule forbidding the practice, and is even considering requiring the companies to spend 25 percent of their advertising budget over the past two years to correct all claims of superiority.


WELCOME TO RAINBOW CITY! Recreational land promotions always increase during the spring as companies selling lake lots, wilderness lots

and speculative land investments begin to advertise. Direct mail promotions for local developments encourage personal visits by the whole family by offering "discounts" off the "regular" price of the lots. Some companies conduct contests while others speak of the investment potential inherent in land - particularly their land,

If you are considering the purchase of a lake lot or a small tract of land as an investment, then you should be cautious. The following guidelines are worth reading before you sign the contract:

1. Make a personal visit to the property to see for yourself the overall condition of the land, access roads, improvements and specific plot you will be purchasing. Every year thousands of people purchase land they have never seen and are often disappointed when they later visit the land development,

2. Ask the salesman for a copy of the Property Report which many land developers are required to file with the Office of Interstate Land Sales Registration, U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Washington, D. 20411. This report will

One man's poison is another man's meat, although if too much preservative is added to comes out the same,

Don't fall for the "free lot" sales pitch or its companion the "discount check. These pitches are merely designed to encourage people to purchase a lot on their first visit to the development, Land developers are going to make a profit on the sale of their lots. If the development advertises a country club, golf course, boat marine, water district or other improvements which would enhance the value of the land, check on the status of these items to determine whether or not they are still in the "planning stage."

In summary, the most important first step you should take before purchasing land would be to make a personal visit to the land to see for

Texas Veterans

Formation of Jobs for Veterans local task forces is moving quickly in a number of Texas cities, in response to the urging of Governor Preston Smith,

He recently asked Texas mayors to lead the organization of local efforts to find jobs for the thousands of Texas veterans of Vietnam-era military service, in cooperation with the Governor's Task Force.

"In early 1972, the Texas Employment Commission had some 55,000 veterans on its active list of those seeking work. Of these, 27,369 were Vietnamera veterans, and 5,725 of the total were disabled veterans," Harold K. Dudley, TEC chairman and head of the State task force, reveals. "We have our task plainly before us. I think government and business can

join effectively in this effort, Houston set the pace earlier in the veteran job placement efforts, being judged the outstanding metropolitan Task Force in the nation. The effort resulted in an 85.6 percent increase in veterans placements in Houston, The "Golden Triangle" area - Beaumont, Port Arthur and Orange - likewise has a vigorous effort already operating.

Both Dallas and Fort Worth have taken recent action to find jobs for the returning service-

Dallas has scheduled a Veterans Career Fair May 10-11, co-sponsored by the National Alliance of Businessmen and the American Legion, Dallas area employers have pledged 6,200 jobs or more in the effort. More than a hundred employers will interview veterans at the Career Fair.

Fort Worth Mayor R. M. Stovall has named John McKissick of Big Three Industries the chairman of the veterans job effort there, with Herman Foster of the Manpower Planning Office of the North Central Texas Council of Governments as coordinator.

Sherman, Lufkin, Temple, Plainview and McAllen are other cities which recently named chairmen to handle their veterans job task forces.

Col. Charles L. Daniel was named in Sherman, C. W. Seago is chairman in Lufkin: Robert Stavinoha heads the effort in Temple; Bob Gardner is chairman in Plainview; and William C. Pratt is McAllen chairman.

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

Open heart surgery has saved the lives of many youngsters and Carla Shaw of Dallas is no exception. Today the little eight year old redhead has no restrictions on her activities, and her parents give credit to Children's Medical Center.

Carla, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Shaw of Dallas, was born with a defective heart discovered when she was three weeks old. Her parents were told that heart surgery would be necessary before her ninth birthday.

Six months after the Shaw family moved to Dallas, Carla, then six, underwent open heart surgery at Children's Medical Center. Dr. Gladys Fashena, pediatric heart specialist, was recommended to the Shaws by their doctor in San Antonio,

Her heart defect was diagnosed as a hole in the heart. During preliminary testing at the Children's Medical Center, a much more serious heart defect was discovered, in fact that and another heart disorder was discovered.

"It was only because of the thorough catherization they did on Carla that the clogged valve was discovered," Mrs. Shaw said, "They told us that none of the conditions were unique, but what was unique was the combination of the defects," she added.



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

Locally Equity Feeders and the First National Bank of Hale Center purchase the cattle, pay the feed bills to the feedlot operations, market the cattleaccording to agreement with the owner, paying by check the owners share of the profits at the marketing date.

A similar arrangement may be made with Equity Grazers, for farmers who have pasture, wheat field or other grazing acreage they would like to utilize. In this operation Equity Grazers help the farmer with purchase, healthy proglems and feeding rations.

Additional information on the plans is available from Seaton Howard at the Petersburg Coop Grain Company or from W. B. Eakin, who has a neighborhood plan for those who do not wish to invest in a complete pen but can invest in as few as 10 head.

Company Predicts Drop in Pork Prices

Pork prices may come down later in the year, according to John M. Watson, president of Tobin Co., Rochester, N.Y.

Mr. Watson said that, "While government reports on the hog population are rather pessimistic for at least the first half of calendar '72, the year as a whole is expected to yield the second largest hog crop in history. A

tremendous corn crop has been harvested and the combination of rising hog prices and plentiful feed might just entice farmers to take a second look at their hog breeding intentions." More hogs then might come to market at lower prices by the end of the fiscal year and this, he said, "would help us considerably since we buy over a halfbillion prime animals every year for processing."

County To Get Revenue Sharing Money

Governor Preston Smith released the following statement today concerning the General Revenue - Sharing Bill which was approved by the House Ways and Means Committee:

"Based on information we have received from the House Ways and Means Committee. the revenue-sharing bill approved by the Committee earlier this week will provide a total of \$202 million during the first year to cities and counties of Texas. Allocation of funds will be retroactive to January 1, 1972.

"We have worked closely with the committee and chairman Wilbur Mills to provide all assistance which would be helpful to the committee in their deliberations. As a result of this close communication. we are now receiving detailed information as to specific allocations to the various counties of the State.

"Initial estimates indicate that a total of \$143,468 will be allocated to all governmental units in Floyd County. Of that amount, the county government will receive \$113,555, the city of Floydada will receive \$19,-814.

"The balance will be distributed to other cities and towns within the county.

"It would appear from these early estimates that the bill, if finally enacted, will provide substantial fiscal relief to the hard-pressed cities and counties of Texas. At the same time it will afford a real opportunity to improve and expand on those services which the people feel are most critically needed.

"I have strongly advocated approval of these funds to our cities and counties and I will continue to support these provisions until final Congressional approval is received."

Rural Development Commission To Improve Living Conditions

Governor Preston Smith charged the newly-created Texas Rural Development Commission Saturday with responsibility for finding methods to improve living conditions in the State's rural areas.

In remarks prepared for delivery at the opening meeting of the Commission in the House Appropriations Room at the Capitol, the Governor told the 25 members that the State's efforts have recently been directed more toward solving urban problems, than those of our rural areas.

"Our rural work force has declined, the countryside is being drained of its young, and the economies of our small towns and cities are suffering," Governor Smith said. The Governor named Roy Davis, a Lubbock businessman, as chairman. The other 24 members were also appointed by Governor Smith, based in part on recommendations from the Texas Department of Agriculture. The Governor and the Agriculture Department are cooperating in funding the Commission.

The Rural Development Commission, in addition to studying strictly rural problems, will also address itself to the relationship of rural and urband areas.





men are getting hooked on cigarettes. At earlier and earlier ages.

In 1970, the percentage of girls in the 12-to-18 bracket who smoked had shot up to 11 percent, 3 full points higher than in 1968. And the sharpest increases were at very young ages: 13, 14 and 15. Why?

A recent article in SEVEN-TEEN, called "Beating the Cigarette Habit," interviewed teenagers in-depth. One teenager who had started smoking at 15 said, "You think it's neat, cool, older-looking, decadent, so you have to smoke, too," she explained; "My first boy friend smoked, and Ilearned from him." Surveys show that teenage girls rarely buy their own first pack of cigarettes. They are almost always offered to them or even urged upon them.







An even richer meaning is suggested if those words of Paul are interpreted in the light of his later letters. The letters to the Colossians and Ephesians express a vision of life that sees Christ at the center of of reality: "In Him everything continues in being." (Col. 1:17).

Paul saw Christ so much at the heart of all reality that in a very real sense "life" could be identified with "Christ," Without Him there would be no life. Without knowing Him the deepest dimensions of life elude man's search for meaning,

Paul gradually discovered such a profound relationship between his faith in Christ and his daily experience, that his letters exemplify that goal of Christian understanding. We also must understand the deepest meaning and value of all creation, and how to relate it to the praise of God.

Like Paul before them. Christians are called to learn that religion is not a separate category of existence but the deepest dimension of ordinary life. "To me, 'life' means Christ."

Adults, adolescents and children, each on his own level of maturity and experience, are to be assisted in learning to discern the presence of Christ in life and through that knowledge of Him discover the meaning of human existence.
