Mackenzie Board Ready

ABOUT JUNE 27

Mackenzie Water Authority board members and city council members from Lockney, Silverton, Tulia and Floydada met in Floydada in the bank community room last Wednesday night to finalize plans for letting bids on contracting building of the dam on Tule creek, seven miles northwest of Sil-

President of the board Lon Davis called upon representatives of the engineer company to brief the group on the steps that have been taken leading to offering plans to contractors for bids on June 27.

FLOYDADA MAYOR SEEKS NEW ESTIMATES Floydada mayor Jimmy Seay told the group that the Floydada city council had recently received a letter from the engineers and bonding firm that prices had risen "appreciably" on the cost of the transmission pipe line from the dam to Lockney and Floydada.

To Let Dam Bid

"We are in favor of the Mackenzie project, but we would feel a lot better if we could have an up-to-date estimate on the cost of the pipeline on which Lockney and Floydada will be sharing the cost," the mayor told the group.

The engineer assured the board that he could have an extimate in about ten days. "Since this will not delay our plan of submitting plans to the bidding contractors on June 27,

I would entertain a motion that Floydada be granted time to get the new piping estimate," Davis told the board. Motion was made and seconded to that effect, and the board approved the Floydada request.

PIPELINE BACKGROUND The pipeline from the treatment plant at the dam is approximately 34 miles from Floydada and the engineers have estimated the need for a 20" pipe from the plant to Lockney and a 16" inch line from Lockney to Floydada. Right-of-way for the pipeline is planned by highway north of Lockney and by railroad from Lockney to Floydada.

The next board meeting is set for May 24 in Lockney.

Weather Station Hail Gauge Installed

(By James Huggins) The descriptive terms for the size of hail common (unfortunately) in the West Texas area, such as "golf-ball-"marble-size" or (heaven forbid) 'baseball - size' may soon be replaced by a three-digit number that will have a definite meaning (to meteorologists, anyway.)

The gadget that may make it possible is a Newton Hail Recorder, and one was installed this week at the official National Weather Service recording station at Producers Elevator here. The Newton Recorder, invented by Oliver H. Newton, a NWS official with the Texas A&M Research Center in Lubbock, measures the size of the hailstones that fall on it. their intensity per square inch and the velocity of the wind that drives them.

A piece of aluminum foil is placed on a curved holder in such a way that, when a "wea-therman" inspects the sheet after a hail, he can "read" it, and with the aid of charts and formulas developed by Newton, discern all the above information. Impressions made by hailstones in the soft aluminum sheet leave all the evidence the meteorologist needs to tell the hail's size and intensity and the driving wind velocity.

Producers here Tuesday, said that the wind that accompanies a hailstorm often contributes to or to a large extent even determines, the damage done to crops. Hudson said many times a very small hail driven by a strong wind literally shreds crops, wherealarger hail with no wind might not do as much damage.

The hail recorder placed at Producers Tuesday is one of 30 which are being established in this agricultural area, a circle around Lubbock, Normally, Hudson said, one is placed in each county.

The recording station at Producers is the only official National Weather Service temperature recording station in Floyd County, although there is an official NWS rain gauge at the Milton Harrisons at Lake-

two minutes later it would have caught the entire fifth and sixth grade classes in the room. Townsend, who was standing in the doorway of the room when the blast occurred, was hurled ten feet into the hall against another teacher. Neither was hurt, however, and his greatest concern was seeing to the in-

Townsend said there was little hysteria from the youngsters in the confusion and teachers said those uninjured filed out of the building in a very orderly manner, while others assisted in removing the injured from the classroom.

Townspeople from Dougherty as well as Floydada and surrounding areas came to the site and worked in any way possible following the blast. The injured were removed by ambulances from Moore-Rose, Carter in Lockney, and private

Within two hours following the blast the east wall of the school was boarded up where five big windows were blown out; refrigerated foodstuff was moved to local residences in Dougherty and electricity shut off for precautionary mea-

This week members of the school board and volunteers are still working at the school picking up debris and removing damaged materials. A spokesman for the school board said they had not been able to meet so far this week to determine if the building could be re-modeled but at this time he did not wish to make a comment.

Engineers from the Pioneer Natural Gas Company out of Amarillo said the best they could determine, gas leaked from underground lines, collected under the reading room and ignited. They surmised that a pilot light in a wall heater, thermostatically controlled, may have ignited the escaping gas, or there is the possibility that when a light switch was flipped on in the room, it could have caused the blast. "but we may never know." Bob Mills, public relations man for Pioneer said.

The closest lines feeding the building's heater system are buried plastic lines, according to Mills, but he said they encircle the building about six to eight feet from the outer foundation, and do not pass underneath the room.

Officials have found a leak in the lines some eight feet from the classroom and just east. A spokesman said how escaping gas settled beneath the room was not known. No lines run beneath the double

wood flooring of the room and the wall heater lines come through the wall some twelve feet above the floor.

The explosion caught 5th and 6th grade students during a break after a film showing in the school auditorium. Those injured were the ones who had already entered the classroom. Students from the first through the fourth grades were still in the auditorium, possibly minimizing the number injured. They said they felt the build-ing "shake" and knew it was an explosion of some sort, The youngsters were guided from the building by Mrs. David Townsend, who teaches the first and second grades and Billy Joe Cross, who teaches grades two and three.

One of the youngsters in the classroom said he heard a loud "boom" and felt the floor

Evidence at the scene indicated the flooring rose and splintered, and boards entangled in overturned desks. An odor of charred wood was also evident. The ceiling displayed a large hole, fluorescent light fixtures were battered and glass broken as the pressure of the exploding gas sent projectiles upward. Damage to the school was said to be extensive, how-

ever no estimate was available. Bob Vickers, a school board member, was the first to reach the blast site. He had just walked outside east of the school building, when the explosion occurred. Mrs. Ruth Daniel, Dougherty school bus driver, was the second one to the scene and she rushed to students' homes to inform their parents of the accident, Vickers, meanwhile, used a twoway radio to call into Floydada for assistance.
