Three Schools In Motley County To Consolidate

(Special To The Avalanche-Journal) **MATADOR** — In a majority opinion Tuesday, the Motley County School Board voted to eliminate the Matador, Roaring Springs and Flomot independent school districts and to consolidate all three schools into a single Motley County Independent School District. No location or opening date for the new school was announced. The proposal pointed out the declining enrollment in all three schools — from 667 to 445 in the past 10 years — making it extremely difficult to maintain adequate programs in the separate schools. Rapidly rising school costs have created mounting financial problems in all of the schools, trustees said. It also was pointed out that more than \$70,000 could be saved annually in school costs under a consolidated arrangement. The enlarged district will be eligible to receive as much as \$700,000 from the state over the next 10 years in "incentive aid" funds for construction and paying off bonded debts. There is very little indebtedness in any of the districts. Boundary lines of the new Motley County school district will coincide with county lines except for a small area in the northern part of the county, which is in the former Turkey district, and a small area of eastern Floyd County which will be in the Motley district.

Matador Slates Sales Tax Vote

MATADOR (Special) — Mayor Kirby Campbell announced this week a city election June 27 to levy a one per cent sales tax. A similar measure was defeated here in April 1968. City officials pointed out that the city had had no tax increase in a decade, that water rates

were the same as those in 1960, and that city property had not been appraised in a quarter-century.

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OLD COIN . . . 1786 cent minted in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, discovered by Fred Warren.

Early Coin Is A Puzzler

A copper coin apparently dated 1786, minted by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, was brought in to the Hesperian office last week by Fred Warren, of 411 Houston. The coin is a penny, although it's about the size of a US half dollar.

Warren told the Hesperian he found the Massachusetts cent near an old house on Crockett Street 15 years ago.

We say "apparently" dated 1786 because the "Red Book" of United States coins lists no such mint date for the coin. According to the Red Book, "An Act for establishing a mint for the coinage of gold, silver and copper was passed by the Massachusetts General Court October 17, 1786. The next year the Council directed that the

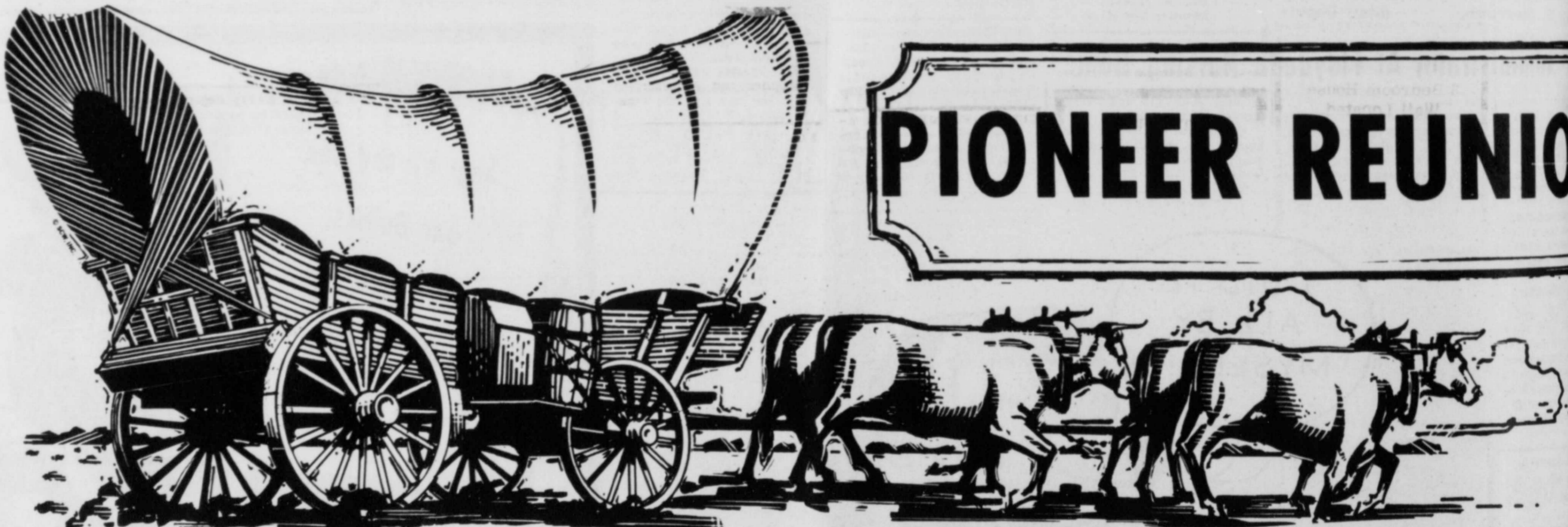
design should be a figure of an arm holding a sword, with the word 'SIGILLUM REIPUBLICAE MASSACHUSETTENSIS' around the edge. The design of the coin was to be dated 1780, but the coin was dated 1786. 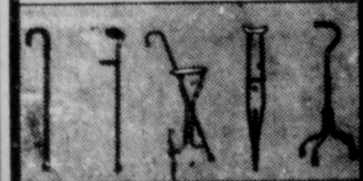
