Some dryland wheat is running much above expectations on yield - yields of 15 to 18 bushels per acre have been reported on dryland wheat that received only one good rain, that coming too late to do much good, according to one local elevator man.

The good yield on dryland crops is coming despite the dry conditions, greenbugs and late grazing.

Combining of irrigated wheat in the county is starting, with some fields promising up to 50 bushels per acre. Harvest of dryland wheat in the area is practically complete.

The 1972 wheat allotment for Floyd County is 45,477.6 acres, according to the ASCS office. The ASCS office figures reveal that about 100,000 acres of wheat were planted in the county, some of it on feed grain and barley allotments.

The 30,000-acre estimate on the harvest would mean that 70,000 acres of grain in Floyd County has been lost to weather, abandoned, grazed into the ground or plowed up. Last year about 40,000 acres were

harvested in the county. Elevators reported wheat prices of \$1.37 per bushel

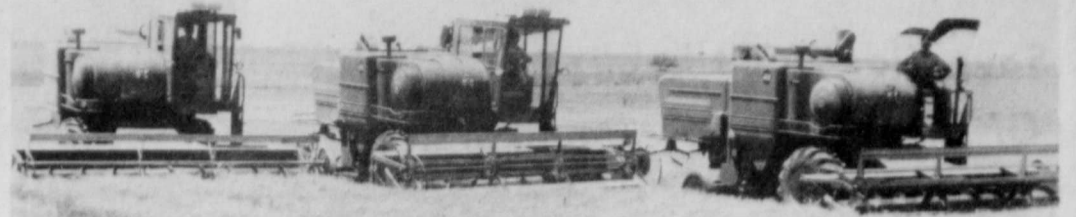
earlier this week. Row crops in the area are reported growing nicely, although some are late.

Milton, Carthel, Mrs. Fawver Win County Nominations

Mrs. Jonelle Fawver won the Democratic nomination for Floyd County Tax Assessor-Collector Saturday in a close runoff with G. B. Johnston, Jr. Mrs. Fawver received 1178 votes to Johnston's 1127 in the second primary balloting.

In the Democratic race for County Commissioner of Precinct 1, Aaron Carthel won the Democratic nomination over Leonard Matsler, 387-307.

In Precinct 3, Grigsby (Doodle) Milton unseated incumbent W. C. Plumlee by a vote count of 275-240.

Milton, Carthel and Mrs. Fawver face no Republican opposition in the general election in November.

Floyd County Democrats went along with the statewide vote in favoring Barefoot Sanders over Ralph Yarborough for the U. S. Senate nomination. The vote in Floyd County was 1410 for Sanders, 848 for Yarborough.

Floyd voters followed the statewide trend in the governor's race, giving Dolph Briscoe a lopsided victory over Frances Farenthold, 1730-577. Briscoe faces Republican Henry Grover in the general election.

The Floyd County Democrats went for Wayne Connally for Lieutenant Governor, although Bill Hobby won the state nomination. Connally polled 1449 votes to Hobby's 795 in Floyd County. Hobby is unopposed in November.

Robert S. Calvert outpolled James Wilson in the Floyd County vote for Comptroller of Public Accounts, 1224-937.

Floyd County Republicans voted for Albert Fay over Henry Grover for the Republican nomination for Governor. The County vote was 24-7 for Fay. Grover won the Republican nomination.

He was honored with a worship type service, led by pastor C. B. Melton. A solo, "The Holy City" was sung by Mrs. David Battey Jr., accompanied on the organ by Sharron Huggins.

The service was a service of praise to God for his goodness, services included the affirmation of faith, the Gloria Patri, scripture reading and singing by the congregation.

Masonic graveside services were also conducted.

Willson died at 3:52 Monday afternoon in Caprock Hospital following a brief illness. The well known founder of the Willson Lectures sustained a fall breaking a hip the early part of April, and had never recovered.

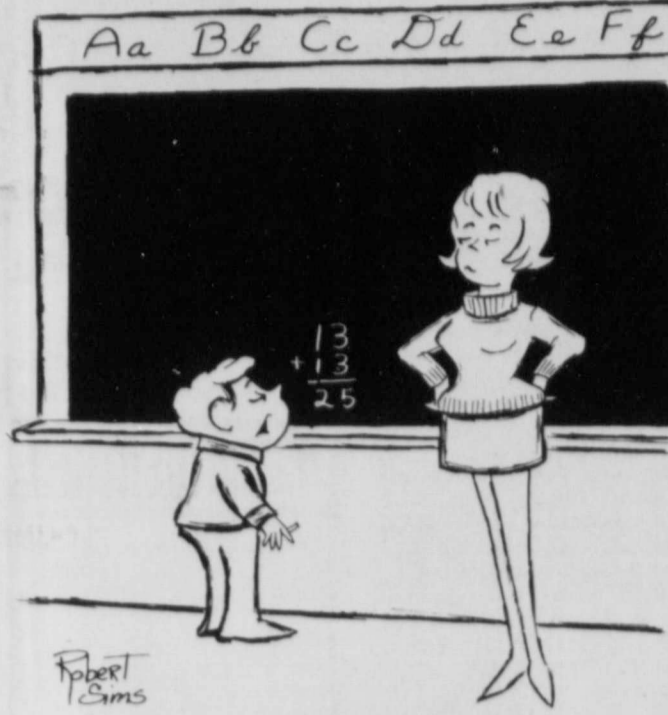

Willson was a recipient of the George Washington Award from Freedom Foundation at Valley Forge, the Foundation's highest honor. In 1965 the Texas State Senate passed a resolution giving high praise to Mr. and Mrs. Willson for their many contributions to church, community, civic and educational endeavors.

In earlier years Willson served on the board of trustees of Floydada Independent School District and held membership in the City Council. Survivors include his wife; two sons, Jimmy M. Willson Jr., of Floydada and David Richard Willson of Plainview; two daughters, Mrs. Robert N. Arnold of Lubbock and Mrs. William R. Addis of Denton; 12 grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

"MILK WAY"

June is Dairy Month. The "Milk Way" is the right way to good eating this June and anytime during the year. Milk and dairy products top the list of foods reported in good supply. Other foods on the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Services include broilers, eggs and split peas. Milk shakes and other refreshing milk desserts and snack items are especially appealing during the warm weather months. Vary your milk drinks by adding some favorite seasonal fruits in the mixing. Strawberries and peaches, for instance, blend deliciously in shakes and other drinks.

Serve milk and dairy products to your family often. Milk is high in protein and minerals needed daily for proper body growth.

Following are some tips on food and camping that might be helpful to you in planning a camping trip or cookout:

Stores offer many kinds of puddings, breads (date or brown bread) and even cakes in cans that make excellent take-a-longs. Also select cheese in jars or cans that keep almost indefinitely prior to opening.

For closer-to-home cookouts, pack several pint-size hibachis. These are great for individual grilling of sausages, nibblers and marshmallows. Prevent pots from blackening over the campfire by rubbing outside with soap, keep biscuits warm by placing them on a rock preheated in the campfire, squelch sudden and dangerous grease fires by suffocating the flames with baking soda or salt.

Hot scrambled eggs will entice even the sleepiest camper to greet the day with a hearty breakfast. To prevent eggs from breaking en route to the campsite, break them yourself at home, pour into a plastic container and store in the

ice chest. When morning comes, shake the container, transfer beaten eggs to a hot skillet and scramble.

A varied assortment of canned meats stock most market counters. Look for canned roast beef, beef steaks, corned beef, ham, meat balls, chicken, turkey or chicken fricassee. Also try tuna fish, crab, shrimp, salmon, chili and spaghetti. A few cooking tricks can add variety to canned meals. Spoon chili on carne over toasted cornbread squares. Chopped ham loaves can be sliced and served cold with salads or sandwiches, or can be sliced and broiled or fried. For a special treat, top chopped ham with brown sugar, molasses or honey and stud the meat with whole cloves.

Proposed Labor Cost Increases Alarm Grain Sorghum Producers

Grain sorghum farmers are concerned over increased labor costs that will be forthcoming if a proposed bill passed recently by the Senate Labor Committee becomes law. The bill would raise current \$1.60 minimum wages per hour to \$2.00 in 60 days, and \$2.20

in one year. Elbert Harp, Executive Director, Grain Sorghum Producers Association, expressed this concern in a letter sent to each U.S. Senator this week. Harp stated in his letters that, "This proposed legislation would accelerate the bankrupt-

cies of farmers by a staggering number. Unless action is taken at the same time to guarantee an increase in prices for farm products, farmers will be forced out of business."

Cost of labor is a significant part of the total cost of production of grain sorghum. The proposed wage hike, if passed by Congress, would increase grain sorghum production costs considerably.

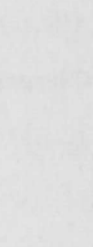

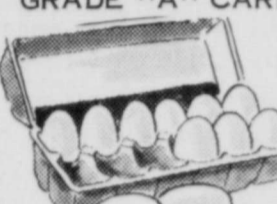

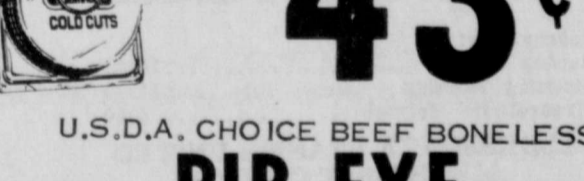

Our Worship Habits

I have heard it said by many people that Floydada is one of the finest towns they have ever known for people to attend church. Probably, you have heard a like statement many times. In comparison to other towns this might be true, but in the light of our potential, I wonder how good it really is. There are near 4,000 people within the city limits. Would it not be safe to say that within our trade territory there are 3,000 others? This gives us at least 7,000 people in our area. When we realize that the year around we probably average no more than 1,750 in the Sunday morning services it doesn't look so good, does it. About one out of four attending any church on Sunday morning. (Far less on Sunday evening.)

We ought to attend worship services every Lord's Day because it is a sin not to do so. "Therefore to him that knoweth to do good, and doeth it not, to him it is sin." (James 4:17) If it is right to attend church, then, it must be wrong not to do it. There is no middle ground with God.

We ought to attend worship services every Sunday because it is the best place I know to worship the Lord, I'm sure it has been said to every pastor, "Preacher, I can worship God at the lake on Sunday morning just as good as any place." It's true that a person can worship God anyplace if they want to, but I never knew of a person going to the lake or any other place of worldly amusement on Sunday to worship God. A person goes to these places on Sunday for pleasure, not to worship God. Others offer the excuse of listening to a radio or watching television. This is wonderful for a person who cannot attend regular services, but I am reminded of the dear old lady who was bedfast and her pastor asked her how she liked the radio message from the church. "Just fine," she replied, "but preacher, I sure miss shaking hands with the people." Surely, Christian fellowship is a very important part of worship.

We, as Christians, ought to attend church services every Sunday because we are then setting the right example before a lost world. Someone is watching our lives. We are their Bible, the best Christian they know. As we follow the examples left in God's Word concerning worship, we are also leaving the correct example before our children and the entire world.

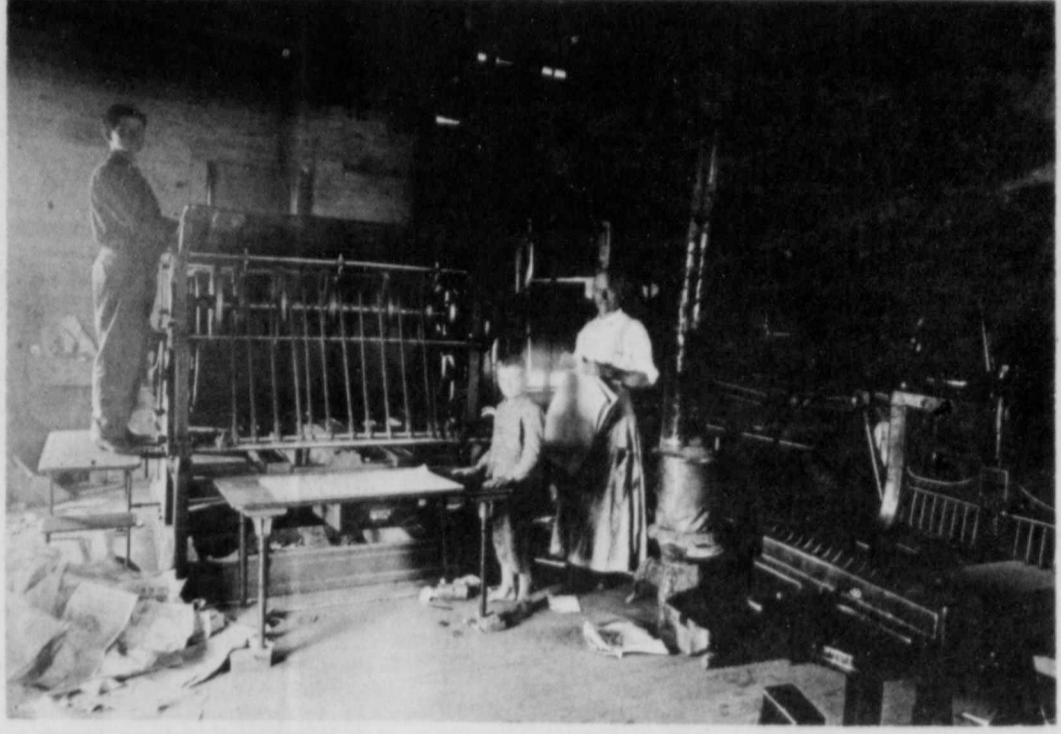

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

This is the time of year when many school teachers are beginning their summer vacations. This is especially significant to teachers who are eligible for social security checks for months when their earnings are \$140 or less, Mancel King, manager of the Plainview social security office, said today.

Some teachers are eligible for retirement or survivor benefits but the benefits cannot be paid every month because their earnings are considerably more than the exempt amount, King said. However an eligible teacher can receive his social security check for any month of the year when he does not earn more than \$140 and does not work in a business that he may own or operate, such as a farm or seasonal resort facility.

Many teachers are paid a salary for 9 or 10 months of the year but the annual salary is paid equally in each of 12 months. Therefore if the eligible teacher works from mid-

August to mid-May of the following year for the annual salary and no work in June or July, normally he can collect social security checks for June and July. He can notify his social security office during the summer or he may wait until he files his annual report of earnings with social security by April 15 of the next year to collect for the non-work months.

Until a few years ago, King said, most teachers were not required to work in August and three months of social security benefits could be paid, i.e., for June, July, and August. However when a teacher is required to work enough in August, or any other month, that his earnings are more than \$140 for the work performed during that month, no social security benefits can be paid for that month.

King says if you need help in making a decision as to whether or not you may qualify for one or more month's checks during the year or need to make a report, you may call the Plainview social security office at 293-4371.

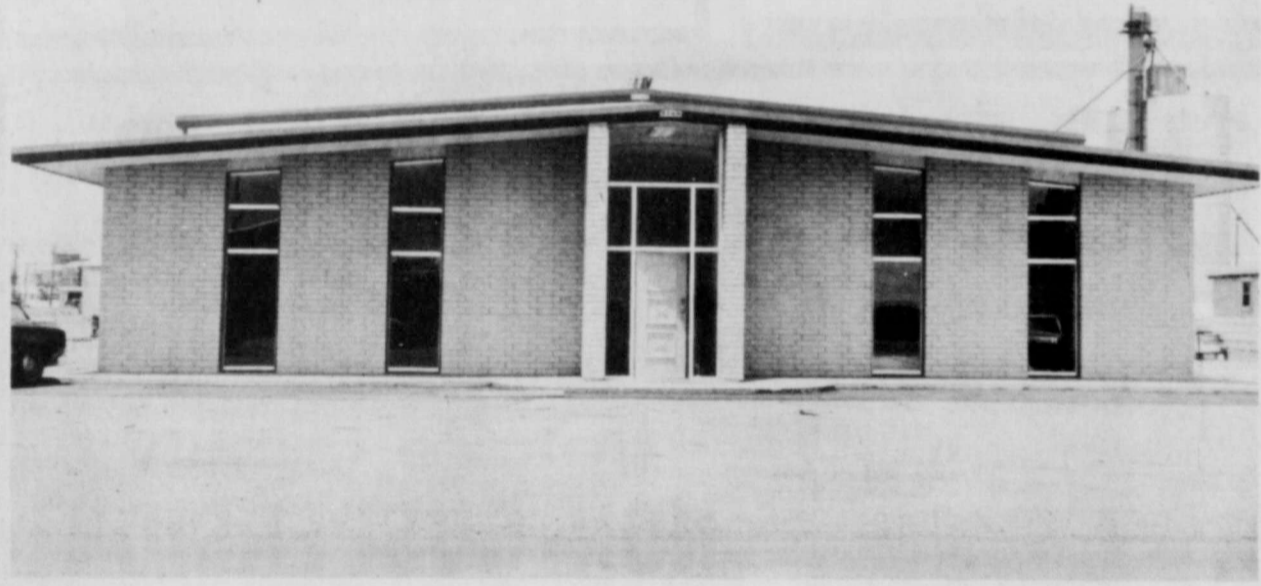

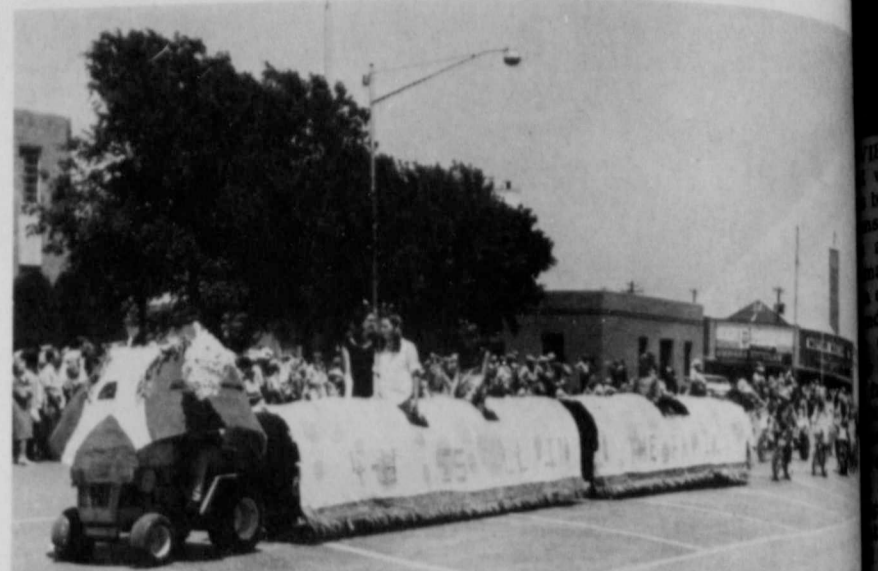

Q. I have heard that women can collect some social security payments at the age of 60. Is that correct?

Yes, a widow may receive reduced benefits at age 60. The amount is 13-1/3% less than the widow's benefit at age 62, and the amount is not later increased. A widow who is disabled for work may receive payments as early as age 50. In this case, her payment is only 50% of her deceased husband's amount figured at the time of his death. This applies to widows only.

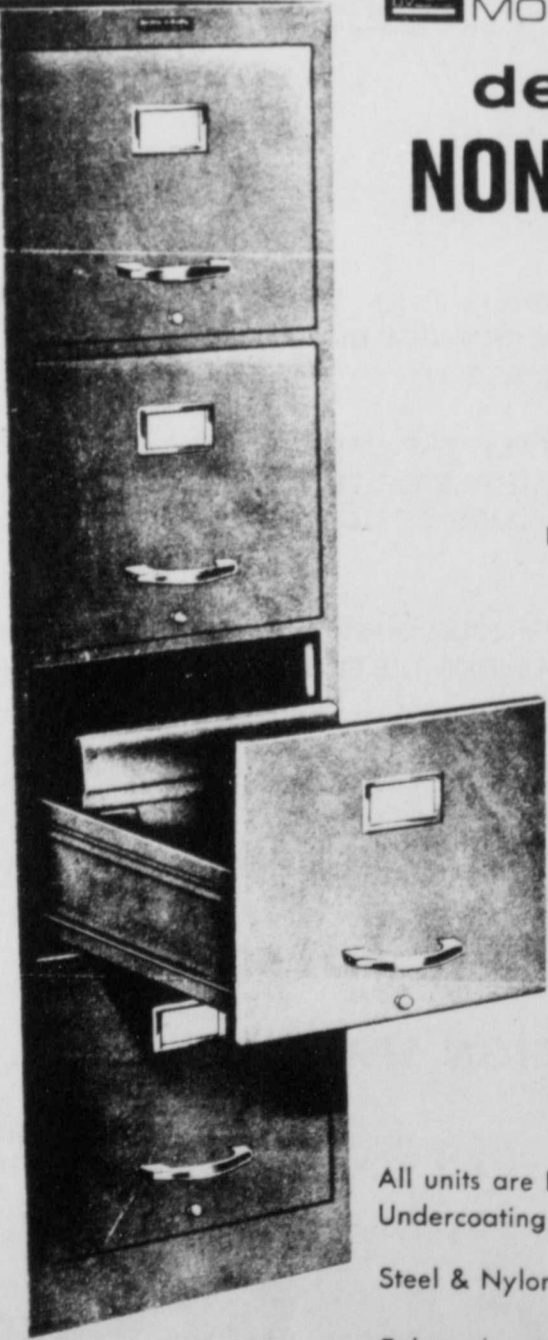

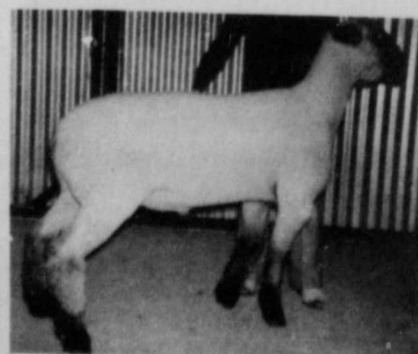

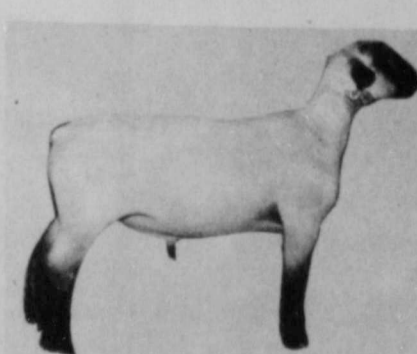

Q. As a working mother do my children have any social security protection if anything should happen to me?

A. Yes. If either insured parent retires, becomes disabled or dies, unmarried children can receive monthly payments until they are 18, and payments will continue to age 22 for a child who remains in school. 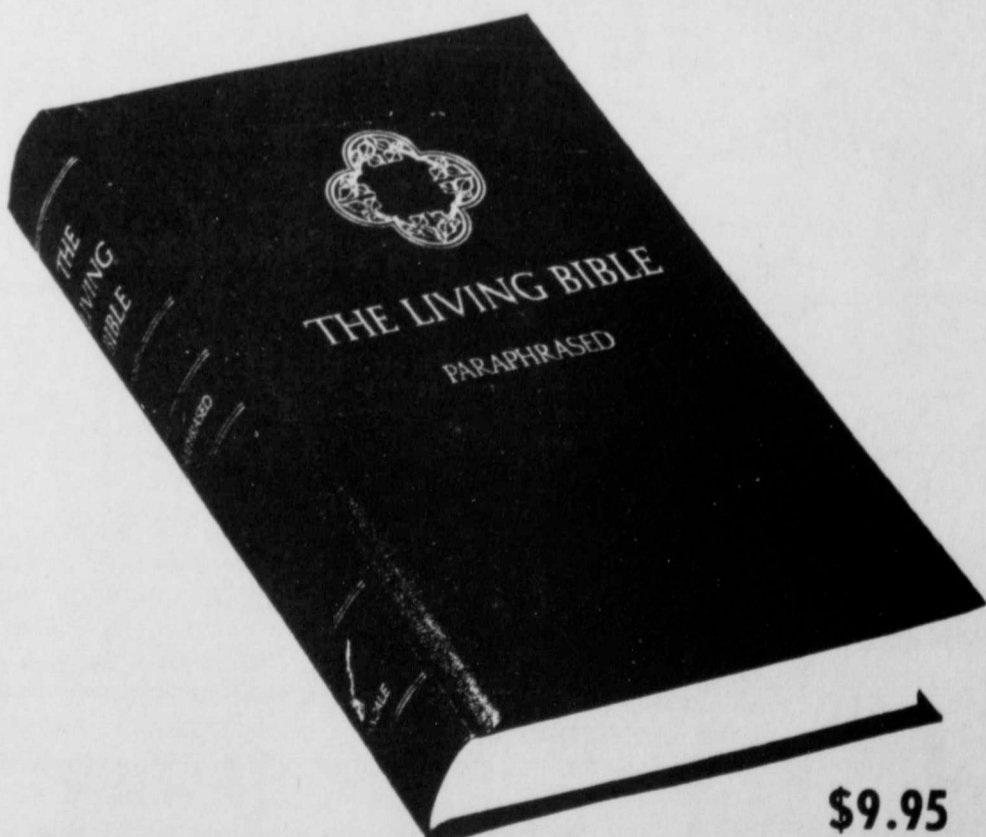

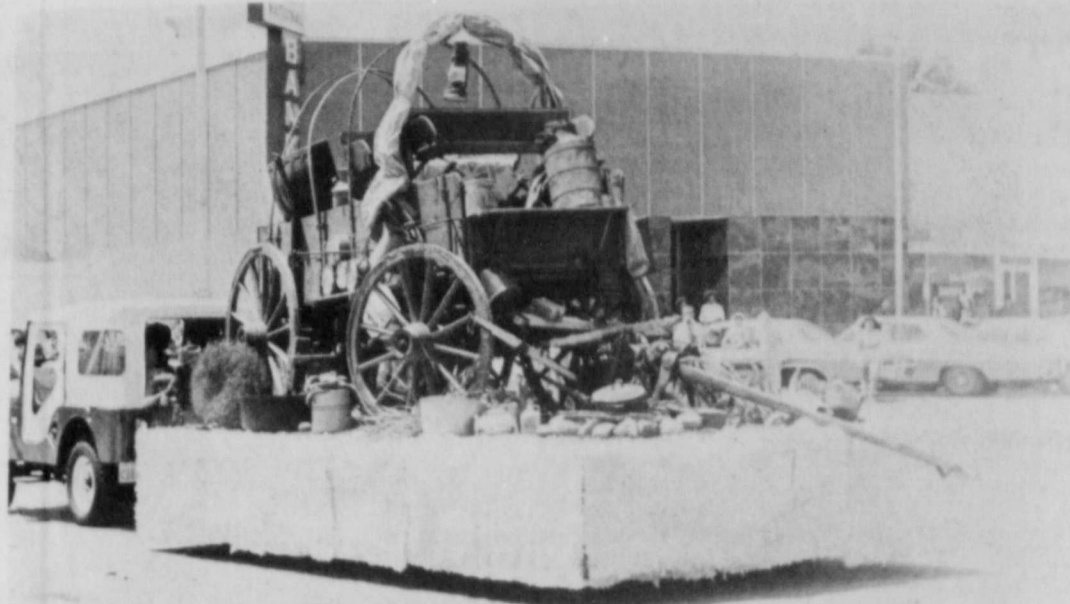

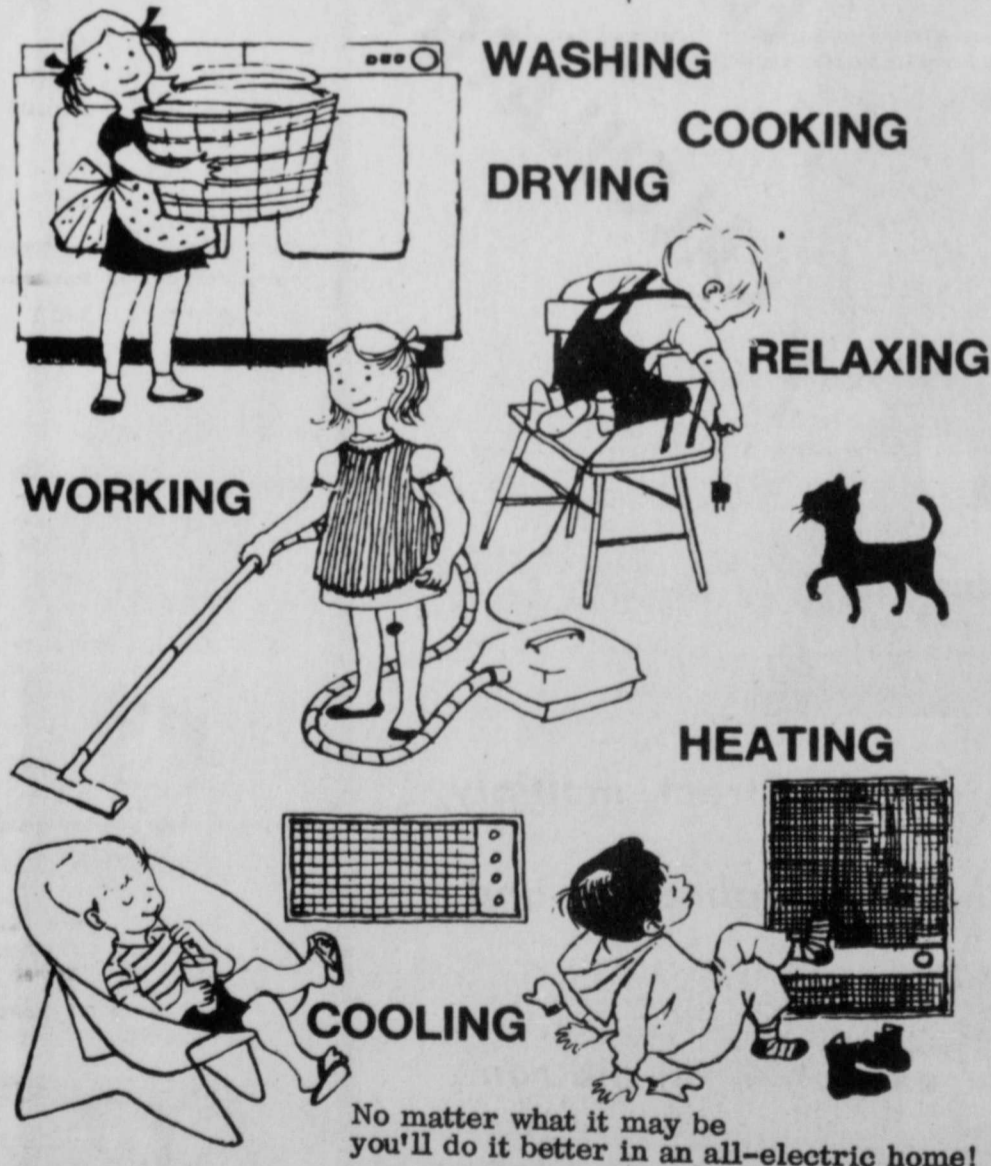
