## Former Wilson Player Named To Wind Staff

Jimmy Adams, a Winters High School football player under Coach L. G. Wilson in 1961-62, will join Wilson's coaching staff here this fall, according to an announcement by the Whirlwind head coach.

Adams will coach the Whirlwind defensive secondary, and, in addition to his football duties, will be the junior varsity basketball coach and head golf coach.

Adams was a member of Wilson's state semifinalist football team of 1962 and bi-district champs of 1963, and was named all-district offensive wingback and defensive

halfback his senior year at Winters.

He was a member of the Winters regional finalist basketball team of 1965, and made all-district, all-area and all-state teams.

Adams attended McMurry College, Abilene, on a basketball scholarship, and lettered four years under Coach Hershel Kimbrell. He was selected All Lone Star Conference his sophomore, junior and senior years at McMurry, was named the college's most valuable player in 1967 and 1968, and received honorable mention on the UPI All-America team his senior year.

He served for one year as assistant basketball coach at McMurry prior to entering the U.S. Army in May of 1970. The new Whirlwind coach is married to the former Jackie Hall of Winters. They have a 20-month-old daughter, J'Lynn.

## Floydada Mail To Be Processed At Lubbock

The newest innovation of the United States Postal Service - Area Mail Processing - is to be installed at the Childress, TX Post Office on Saturday, July 1.

Beginning on that date, mail from Floydada and the Childress Sectional Center Area will be processed for outgoing dispatch through the Lubbock Post Office.

This was announced today by Carl C. Ulsaker, Regional Postmaster General, Southern Postal Region, which covers the Southern United States from Texas to Florida.

"The program is intended to speed the ultimate delivery of the mail and to gain maximum efficiency and economy through full utilization of Lubbock's mechanized post office," Ulsaker said.

The Lubbock Post Office is equipped with one 6-operator position letter sorting machine capable of sorting 25,600 letters an hour, and an automatic cancelling machine capable of facing and cancelling 30,000 letters an hour.

Area Mail Processing is a plan whereby virtually all mail originating within a Sectional Center Area, including any or all of the associate offices of Sectional Center Facility, will be consolidated at the SCF for complete preparation and processing for outgoing dispatch.

In this case, mail from the Childress SCF and its associate offices will be consolidated at the SCF, moved to the Lubbock Post Office and processed for outgoing dispatch.

All mail deposited in street letter boxes or the out-of-town letter drops at the associate offices will be transferred to the SCF for processing and will bear the postmark designated for the SCF area.

The postmark for the Childress SCF will read, "U.S. Postal Service, TX 793", along with the date and AM-PM designation. The city postmark of Childress and each individual associate office will not be changed.

Mail deposited in a designated drop unit at a post office or a letter box labeled "For Local Cancellation Only" will be postmarked at the local office. SEE MAIL, PAGE 3

on July 18 to get approval of some changes in the dam construction and the overall plan in order to stay within the voted bond money.

The job of alterations will go to the water system's designers, Freeze, Nichols and Endress of Fort Worth. The engineers present at the bid opening in Tulsa Tuesday were non-committal on the completion date for construction under the revised plans.

But Bob Thompson of the firm told the gathering that his company was optimistic that plans could be altered and still be approved by the state water board.

Glavin-Terrell then began removing the clay from the canyon walls toward the dam site, located west of Tule Creek bridge on FM 284, about 7 miles northwest of Silverton and 21 miles east of Tulsa.

A partial water infiltration system also is included in the first phase of the project to eventually provide municipal water for Tulsa, Floydada, Lockney and Silverton, cities that voted overwhelmingly in 1969 for the project.

The board, composed of two representatives from each of the four towns, in other action officially named the project Mackenzie Dam and Reservoir. The board also appointed a board of equalization for the authority. Named to the board are Bud Couch of Silverton, Barry Barker of Lockney, Carl Minor of Floydada and Norman Singer of Tulsa.

**THE MONEY PICTURE**  
Back in September of 1969 the residents of Floydada, Lockney, Tulsa and Silverton voted a bond issue of \$4,615,000 to cover cost of building dam, treatment plant and purchase of land.

It is estimated that the dam and enough treatment plant for Silverton would cost \$3,800,000. An additional \$815,000 would be needed to finish the treatment plant later when the other cities began use of the dam water. The land cost around \$300,000.

Of course there's another \$200,000 for engineering and bonding company fees. . . and this is about the amount of money needed to adjust in order to get everything in the voted \$4,615,000 bonds.

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


piece of origin with the name of that office. Each postmaster will have deposit boxes and letter drop units designated for this purpose. All metered mail will bear the postmark of the office of origin.

calves.

2. Manage live: tock to reduce injuries. Avoid surgery or any treatment that may create a wound.

3. Collect larvae and egg masses for identification. Search deep in wounds for screwworms. Send samples to Screwworm Eradication Program, P.O. Box 969, Mission, Texas 78522

4. Treat all wounds with a wound dressing. Follow directions on the label. Reinspect wounds until healed and re-treat when necessary.

5. Spray or dip herds with approved pesticides. Follow directions on the label.

6. Know positively that purchased animals are screwworm-free at point of origin.

7. Tell your neighbors about the screwworm threat. Encourage them to follow these precautions.

8. See your local county agricultural agent for screwworm mailing tubes and additional information.

Screwworm flies, according to Dr. Clymer, have a long flight range and it is very important to determine where infestations are occurring. This can only be accomplished through the cooperation of all concerned. Therefore, producers are urged to follow the points outlined to prevent the re-establishment of this damaging pest.

Collection and shipping vials are available at the county agent's office in the agricultural building on the southeast corner of the square, Floydada or call 983-2806. Extension Agents and Texas Animal Health Inspectors will assist in collection as time permits.

Several possible cases of Screwworm are suspected in Floyd County at this time.

# Net Worth Locally \$57,800 Per Family

(Special to the Hesperian) NEW YORK - How well off are Floyd County residents financially? Are they richer than they think?

Taking into account the cash savings of the average local family, together with the equity in its home, its car, personal property, furniture, insurance, pension reserves and other assets, what is its net worth?

A family balance sheet, with assets listed in one column and liabilities in another, may provide a pleasant surprise, since most people have never taken stock of how much they have acquired over the years.

Some guidance in this direction is available now, based upon local figures and upon national studies made by the Federal Reserve Board and others.

They show, as would be expected, that there is a direct relationship between a family's average earnings and its net worth. Those in the high income brackets have assets equal to several times their annual income while those with modest incomes have accumulated proportionately less.

Applying the national yardstick to Floyd County and to the earning levels in the area, the indicated net worth of the average local family comes to approximately \$57,800.

It compares favorably with net worth in most parts of the United States, \$29,000 per family, and with \$26,400 in the State of Texas.

The figures apply to the so-called average family. Lumped together are all age groups - the older ones, who have been adding to their assets over the years, as well as the younger ones, who are on the way up.

For typical families in specific brackets, the estimates are as follows: those with after-tax incomes of \$6,000 to \$8,000, a net worth ranging from about \$13,000 to \$18,000, those with \$9,000 to \$12,000, from \$21,000 to \$38,000, and those in the \$15,000 to \$20,000 bracket, assets ranging from \$68,000 to more than \$140,000.

For the entire Floyd County population, on this basis, the total net worth is approximately \$184,800,000.

On the plus side is the market value of all real estate, business interests, bank deposits, jewelry, household furnishings, clothing, appliances and other property.

Deducted from it to arrive at net worth are mortgages, installment debt, medical bills, bank loans and all other obligations.

## Bond Sales \$8,361 In May

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$8,361 in Floyd County were reported today by County Bond Chairman J. C. Webb, III. Sales for the five-month period totaled \$60,478 for 33% of the 1972 goal of \$180,000.

Sales for the state of Texas during May were \$17,314,314 - a 5% increase over May 1971 when sales were \$16,476,145. January-May sales totaled \$91,572,743 with 45% of the \$202.3 million 1972 goal achieved.

Nationally, sales of E and H Savings Bonds amounting to \$573 million were reported during May - 24% above 1971 sales of \$462 million. Total sales for the five-month period amounted to \$2,715 million - 18% above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for Series H Bonds totalling \$142 million were reported for the first five months of 1972 - 36% above the \$105 million exchanged in 1971.

## Finley Gets 4-H Scholarship





### NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

Most accidents happen in the home. The kitchen is a potential accident area.

"To make your kitchen hazard free, follow the guideline to safety."

"Turn pot handles away from the edge of the range to prevent snagging on clothing. But be careful not to put the handle over another burner or an exposed pilot light."

Put out a fire in the broiler or oven by pouring baking soda, or salt over the grease. Also keep a fire extinguisher handy.

Never pick up broken china or glassware with fingers. Use dust pan and brush or dampened paper to sweep up any jagged pieces and sharp bits."

Put sharp knives in a rack or some place where children can't reach them. Store them so you can grasp the handles. When using a knife, always work on a board, and cut away from yourself.

Unplug an appliance that is not in use. Always dry hands before using or you're risking the chance of an electrical shock. When buying an appliance check for the UL label.

Never poke a knife or fork into a toaster. Unplug the toaster then remove the troublesome slice of bread.

Keep the cabinet doors and drawers closed to prevent bumps and bruises, and use a sturdy step stool or ladder instead of a wobbly chair to reach high shelves.

The agent suggested preventing unnecessary falls by wiping clean spilled food, liquids and grease immediately, and by using nonskid wax on the floor.

Don't lean mops and brooms against a wall where they can slide, causing accidents. Store cleaning compounds in a locked cupboard or another place inaccessible to children. Never store them near food items.

Double check the refrigerator door. If it's not tightly closed, a curious child could crawl inside. Make a check list to see if your home is a safe place. Stop and think about the near accidents you have had, and how you could have prevented them. Avoid accidents in the home. Follow a few simple rules.

## August Draft Call Announced

AUSTIN - The August Draft Call was announced today by Colonel Melvin N. Glantz, the State Director of Selective Service for Texas. Men in the First Priority Selection Group with numbers of 75 or lower will be subject to induction in August. This priority group is made up of men born in 1952 or older men who have lost a draft deferment during calendar year 1972 and who are classified in Class 1-A, 1-A-O, or 1-O.

Glantz noted that this is an increase of 25 in the lottery number for induction from the July draft call.

There is also an increase in lottery numbers for pre-induction Armed Forces Examinations from 90 in July to 100 in August. Men in the First Priority Group are those who are subject to examination orders.

The August Induction Orders

will be issued between July 3 and July 28, with 30 days notice from the date of mailing.

Under the Uniform National Call system there is no quota for Texas; however, Glantz indicated that he expects approximately 500 men to be inducted in Texas in August.
