Onion Harvest Half Over

The onion harvest in Floyd County is about half complete, according to Chuck Holmes at the Barwise Onion Shed.

About 60,000 hundred-pound bags of grano onions have been processed at Barwise and another 60,000 bags of Spanish onions will be shipped from there by August 10. The harvest of the Spanish onions is due to begin in about another week, Holmes said.

The Barwise shed is the only one operating in Floyd County this year, Holmes told the Hesperian. Only about 200 to 225 acres of onions were planted in the county this year, compared to some 700 to 800 acres in 1971 and in previous years.

The price is up this year, however, to \$3.50-\$4.00 a sack. Last year's average was \$2.00 to \$2.50/sack.

Floyd Farmers Receive **Set-Aside Payments**

ricultural producers are receiving farm setaside program payments totaling \$1,-395,000 this week, according to Thomas E. Moore, County Executive Director of the Floyd County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The mailing of the set-aside program checks was completed earlier this week.

Moore said that by mid-August, the total set-aside payments mailed to Floyd County farmers would be approximately \$13,000,000. August 1 is the final certification date for set-aside acreage.

Payments under the setaside programs are made to farmers who agree to set aside part of their land from production in order to meet a national objective of balancing supply and demand in certain commodities.

These payemtns help to offset the loss of returns from cropland that otherwise would be used for income-yielding production, and on which the farmer is obliged to continue to pay taxes and apply needed conservation steps, according to officials of the U.S. Department limited to \$55,000 per person

for each of three crops - feed Payments to producers are grain, wheat and cotton-under the Agricultural Act of 1970.

Cost Of Local Accidents High

(Special to the Hesperian) NEW YORK - What kind of a safety record has Floyd County been producing in the last few years?

For the average person, is living in the local area more hazardous or less so, from the standpoint of accidents, than in other localities?

According to figures released by the U.S. Public Health Service during the past three years in connection with its annual vital statistics reports, the accident rate in the local area is relatively high.

They show an average of 11 fatalities per year, attributable to accidents, among residents of Floyd County. Of this number, 6 were due to automo-

The figures refer to all types of accidents, whether they took place in the home or at work or while driving, swimming, boating or hunting. Covered are all accidents

in which local people were involved, wherever they took place. Not included, however, are accidents in the local area affecting non-residents. From the standpoint of popu-

lation, Floyd County's toll was above average. It was equivalent to a rate of 104 fatal accidents per 100,000 popula-

tion. By way of comparison, the rate throughout, the rest of the United States averaged 56 per 100,000. It amounted to 68 per 100,000 in the West South Central States.

This tells only part of the story, however. Another 10,-800,000 suffered disabling, but not fatal, injuries in the course of the year.

Thus, for every one who was killed, there were another 95 who were injured.

According to the council's estimate, the economic loss in the year caused by accidents reached \$27.7 billion. Counted in this figure are loss of wages, medical expenses, property damage and the like. Floyd County's share of this

bill, applying the average cost per accident to the local area, comes to approximately \$2,-321,000.







Achemical company is experimenting with using the ground-up currency, turned into a thick slush, as mud in the well drilling process. Another idea not yet tested to the extent of approval, is converting the old greenbacks into a roofing material. There have been experiments in making ceramics from the old money, because the green color that seems to remain in the paper regardless, may add value of the product. If the roofing material idea works. . .it could become quite a slush fund and go a long way to putting money on the roof for overhead protection. That would be a good slogan as


