Disabled Veterans May Be Due Refund On Cars

Veterans disabled from military service may find it cheaper to buy a specially-equipped new car this year than it was two years ago, Jack Coker, Director of the VA Regional Office in Waco, advises. Coker explained that those who purchased a car with special adaptive devices since January 1, 1971, may find they have money coming from the Veterans Administration.

This reminder was issued by the Veterans Administration to call attention to new VA authority contained in Public Law 91-666.

The 1971 law raised the amount of the VA grant for purchase of a car to \$2800.00, and for the first time gave VA authority to pay for replacing and maintaining adaptive equipment on automobiles previously acquired by disabled veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict.

To be eligible a Veteran must have suffered the loss, or loss of use, of one or both hands or feet or both eyes in the military service.

Such items as power brakes, automatic shift, hand dimmer switch, and hand controls are among provisions of the law.

Veterans should contact their nearest VA office, Veterans County Service Officer, or a Veterans service organization representative to expedite payment of their claims under this provision.

Cost Of Local Accidents High

NEW YORK - What kind of a safety record has Floyd County been producing in the last few years?

For the average person, is living in the local area more hazardous or less so, from the standpoint of accidents, than in other localities?

According to figures released by the U.S. Public Health Service during the past three years in connection with its annual vital statistics reports, the accident rate in the local area is relatively high.

They show an average of 11 fatalities per year, attributable to accidents, among residents of Floyd County. Of this number, 6 were due to automobiles.

The figures refer to all types of accidents, whether they took place in the home or at work or while driving, swimming, boating or hunting.

Covered are all accidents in which local people were involved, wherever they took place. Not included, however, are accidents in the local area affecting non-residents.

From the standpoint of population, Floyd County's toll was above average. It was equivalent to a rate of 104 fatal accidents per 100,000 population.

By way of comparison, the rate throughout the rest of the United States averaged 56 per 100,000. It amounted to 68 per 100,000 in the West South Central States.

This tells only part of the story, however. Another 10,-800,000 suffered disabling, but not fatal, injuries in the course of the year.

Thus, for every one who was killed, there were another 95 who were injured.

According to the council's estimate, the economic loss in the year caused by accidents reached \$27.7 billion. Counted in this figure are loss of wages, medical expenses, property damage and the like.

Floyd County's share of this bill, applying the average cost per accident to the local area, comes to approximately \$2,-321,000.

Case Brown Tractor Merger Revealed

Tenneco Inc. has announced that it has reached an agreement in principle to acquire David Brown Tractors Ltd., a subsidiary of The David Brown Corporation Ltd., England. The announcement was issued jointly by N. W. Freeman, chairman and president of Tenneco, and Sir David Brown, chairman of the David Brown Corporation Ltd. Pending finalization, details of the transaction were not released.

The agreement, which is subject to necessary approvals by the British Government, calls for David Brown Tractors Ltd. to become an operating division of J I Case Company, a Racine, Wisconsin-based subsidiary of Tenneco. The David Brown Tractors Division will be staffed and managed by the present David Brown personnel and management and will be directly responsible to the president of Case.

David Brown Tractors Ltd. had gross sales of \$80 million in 1971 while Case had corporate sales of \$436.3 million in the same year. Case, in addition to being a major manufacturer of large horsepower agricultural tractors, is a leading manufacturer of construction equipment and has the longest line of digging, trenching and excavating equipment in the industry. Tenneco is a multi-industry, multi-national company with major operations in manufacturing, natural gas pipelines, oil, chemicals, packaging and agriculture and land development.

Several national authorities will be in session leaders at the seminar.

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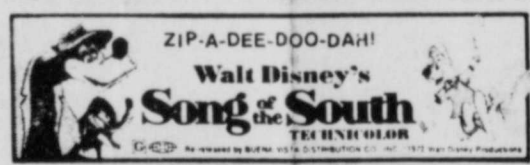

iods of time. Freezing doesn't kill salmonella bacteria but simply transforms it into a dormant state, the specialists say. Therefore they warn, do not thaw frozen meats and poultry at room temperature. Instead, thaw them in the refrigerator, under cool running water in the freezer wrappings, or by cooking them frozen.

WOULD you believe the Federal Government has money to burn. Actually, old currency is burned at each of the 12 Federal Reserve Banks. Since the country has become so environmentally conscious, other methods of doing away with unusable paper money is being investigated. Federal Reserve Banks are now beginning to grind up cash since the cities where they are located have anti-burning laws, but they don't know what to do with the fine, light green fluff left after it is pulverized. One idea is to recycle it into stationery but that was ruled out because of secret service regulations. They say someone might get the idea to possibly reconstruct the bills for the benefit of counterfeiters.

The Federal Reserve Bank in Dallas has found a customer for ground-up greenbacks for a price of \$10 a ton, a well drilling company in Kansas. A chemical company is experimenting with using the ground-up currency, turned into a thick slush, as mud in the well drilling process. Another idea not yet tested to the extent of approval, is converting the old greenbacks into a roofing material. There have been experiments in making ceramics from the old money, because the green color that seems to remain in the paper regardless, may add value of the product. If the roofing material idea works, it could become quite a slush fund and go a long way to putting money on the roof for overhead protection. That would be a good slogan as well.

SENATOR Lloyd Bentsen says he's pleased the Army has acted to permit girls to participate in high school ROTC program. But, Bentsen added that he doesn't feel the Army's action went far enough, and he urged Congressional approval of his bill to completely abolish sex discrimination in Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps programs. Bentsen, a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, introduced legislation last year to amend the present law, which allows only "physically fit male" students to be counted in eligibility criteria for establishing ROTC unit. Recently the Army announced that Junior ROTC programs in high school will be open to girls beginning with the new school year in September. As far as we could determine no info-

mation on this program is known here, but we'll need to check further into this just in case some young girl would be interested. Girls taking part in the JROTC will incur no obligation to join the Army upon graduation, Sen. Bentsen said.

1/2 c cats-up
2 T chili sauce
1 t salt
1 can (3 cups) pineapple pieces, drained. Reserve juice
Melt margarine in pan. Add brown sugar, cornstarch, seasonings and pineapple juice. Cook slowly over low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Add pineapple pieces. Spoon over chicken, cover and bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees.

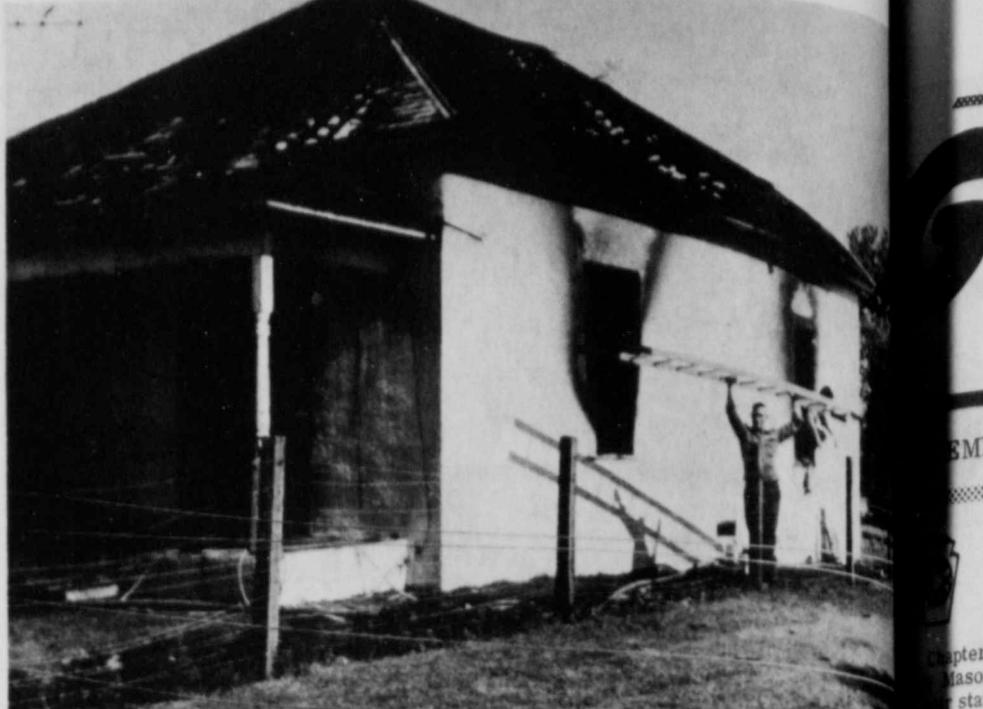

TEC Refers Many To Training Programs

National emphasis on job training has been felt for some time by the Texas Employment Commission, which refers the Texas jobs to training opportunities.

"The Commission is involved in administering many pro-

grams other than the traditional job placement and payment of unemployment insurance," says Harold K. Dudley, chairman and executive director of the TEC. "One of these is the referral of persons to training to make them more employable. This is another service to the public performed by TEC, had 5,600 trainees in 1971. More than 440 state contracts were in operation. This program is possible for the employed and the unemployed to receive training.

The training is aimed at preparing applicants for the jobs that are available in today's economy.

During the last federal fiscal year TEC had 57,400 enrollment opportunities for persons in federally-funded training programs. The agency referred applicants who lack job skills to one of these training programs.

Federal money to finance these programs in Texas exceeded \$64 million.

More than half of these enrollment opportunities or "slots", were created as summer jobs for youth under the Neighborhood Youth Corps, (NYC), which provides work training for youth from low income families.

During the state fiscal year, Texas had 77 regular institutional training projects, including four Skills Centers in metro areas, approved for MDTA training for 3,206 trainees. Training was conducted in 60 different occupations, with emphasis on health and environmental-control occupations. This program was conducted in 53 communities in the state.

Last year more than 15,000 training slots were offered under the Manpower Development and Training Act (MDTA). TEC determines the needs, selects and refers applicants, makes training allowance payments, makes placements and con-

ducts followup. The occupational training education for adults to meet shifting labor market demands.

"Job Opportunities Business Sector" is a federally-funded and the National Alliance businessmen in cooperation with TEC, had 5,600 trainees in 1971. More than 440 state contracts were in operation. This program is possible for the employed and the unemployed to receive training.

More than a thousand chronically unemployed poor were given work and employment training Mainstream. The contribute in this betterment and help of the communities they serve.

Public Service (PSC) was authorized 1,700 training slots in fiscal year. This prepares unemployed adults for career public service, as well as personnel with general, state or local agencies, or private organizations.

TEC also refers to the Job Corps and concentrated Employment program, but these are not included in the fully total, for several reasons.

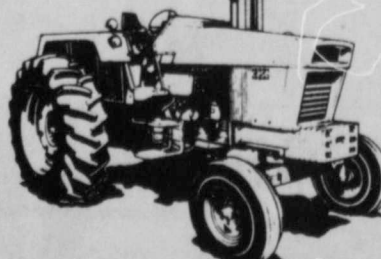
