SS Recipients Get Automatic Increase

Social security beneficiaries need not apply for the 20 percent benefit increase signed into law by President Nixon on July 1. Social security manager Mencie King said today that all social security beneficiaries who are on the benefit rolls in September will receive the increase automatically. The increase is effective beginning the payments for the month of September, which will be due October 3.

The average monthly benefit for a retired worker goes up from \$134 to \$162; for a retired couple from \$224 to about \$271. A widowed mother with two children will receive an average social security benefit of about \$386, up from \$332. For a disabled worker with a wife and one or more children, the new average monthly payments that are made to certain individuals age 72 and over who are not insured for regular social security case benefits will also be increased by 20 percent, from \$48.30 to \$58.00 for an individual and from \$72.50 to \$87.00 a couple. The new law also includes a provision for automatic annual increases in social security benefits as the cost of living rises in the future - a recommendation made by President Nixon in his 1969 message on social security.

Under the new law the contribution and benefit base - the maximum amount of annual earnings that is counted for benefit and contribution purposes - will rise from the present \$9,000 a year to \$10,800 in 1973 and to \$12,000 in 1974. Thereafter, this amount would be adjusted automatically to keep pace with rising wages. This means that as earnings rise workers whose earnings are at or above the level of the maximum earnings base will pay contributions on higher earnings - but they also will have those additional earnings counted toward the benefits that will be payable to them and their families in the future.

Community Action Gets Extra Grant

Governor Preston Smith today announced his approval of a supplemental community action grant of \$5,000 in federal funds to Community Action Council of Floyd, Crosby and Dickens Counties in Crosbyton for Family Planning.

The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is effective July 1, 1972 through April 30, 1973. Funds will be used to upgrade and improve health care provided for Family Planning participants. This includes urinalysis, hemoglobin, pap smears, gonorrhea smears and serology for syphilis.

That evening Mrs. Carr's children, grandchildren and great grandchildren brought a picnic supper to her home, complete with home-made ice cream and cake.

She is the former Annie Almeda Allen, born July 14, 1886 in Coryell County, Texas. She moved with her parents, George and Ollie Allen, to Greer County, Okla., when a baby and lived there and in Washita County until the age of 15.

The Allens moved to Lockney in 1902 where on August 26, 1903 Annie and Mather Carr were married. Her husband was the son of Rev. and Mrs. W. H. Carr, a pioneer Methodist preacher and circuit rider. He pastored Carr's Chapel Church which was named for him and Grandmother Carr when it was dedicated in 1914. Annie Carr is the only living charter member of the church organized in 1904 in the Harmony community.

Mrs. Carr and her late husband's romance actually began when she was still a baby. When Annie was born, Grandmother Carr, who lived in Levita, in Coryell County, took her young son, Mather, to visit the Allens and their newborn. Mather told his mother at the time "That is the girl I am going to marry -omeday", and this promise came true years later.

The young couple lived in a half dug-out in Harmony community during their early married years on the quarter section of land Mrs. Carr still lives on. Lumber and material for their dug-out was freighted by wagon from Canyon where the nearest railroad was at the time. It was in this dugout that

their first son, Wesley, was born.

The Carrs later built a house near the dugout site where their other two children, Horace and Almeda Maye were born. The house was moved years later near the Wesley Carr home and Mrs. Carr and her husband bought a new home and had it moved to the same location.

The Carrs' first house still has its original structure with additions and remodeling. A grandson, Charles Carr and his wife, Ann, lived in the house for a short period and at present another grandson, Bill Carr and wife, Darlene, are residing in the house.

Since her husband's death Nov. 23, 1945, Mrs. Carr has lived alone, doing her own housework and until recently did most of her own gardening and yardwork. She still enjoys attending church, going to community affairs and club meetings, although impaired by poor hearing and eyesight.

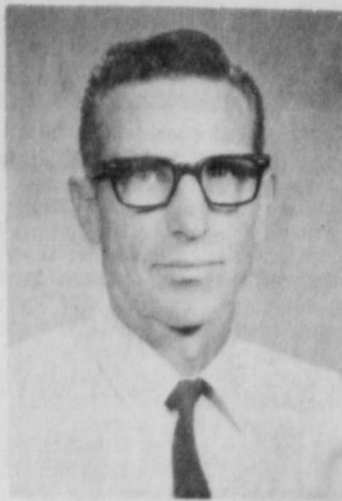

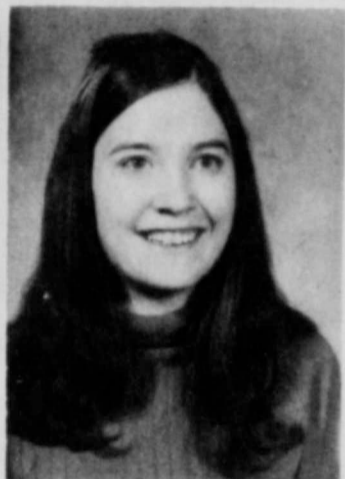

10. You must wear at least two peacoats.

12. To keep the school room neat and clean, you must: sweep the floor at least once daily; scrub the floor at least once a week with hot soapy water; clean the blackboards at least once a day; and start the fire at 7 A.M. so the room will be warm by 8 A.M.

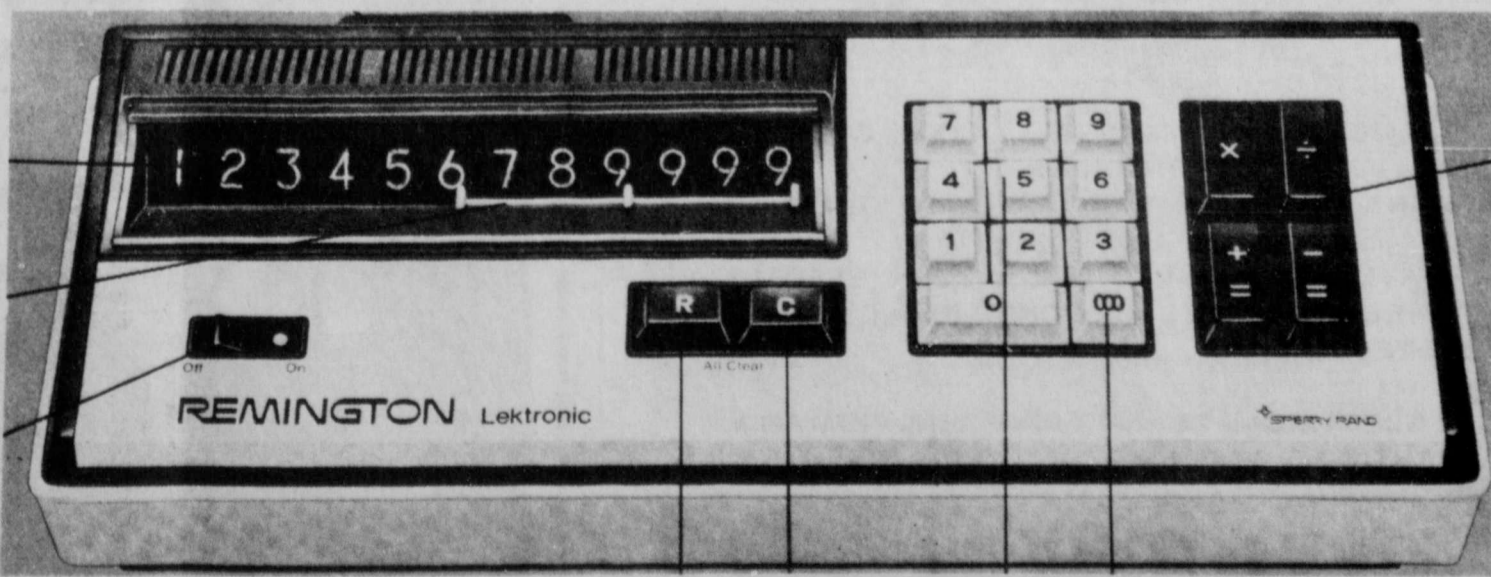

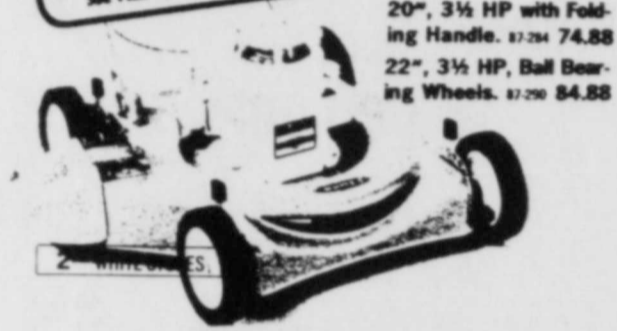

Home Boasts 92 Year Old Gardener

Roy Handley, a 92-year-old resident of Floydada Nursing Home, is the home's official gardener and self-appointed groundskeeper. The flower beds in front of the rest home are the work of Handley, who also has made it his job since he has been there (nearly four years) to keep the porch, walk, and back porch swept and "looking decent."

"I don't claim to be extra-industrious," Handley told a Hesperian reporter, "but I want to DO something."

At 92, Handley says he will match internal ailments with anybody in the place, but he still pushes other residents in their wheelchairs.

He doesn't know the names of many of the flowers he grows—"That was my wife's department," he says (Mrs. Handley died in 1966) - but says he is especially proud of his roses. "I'm proud of all my flowers," Handley told the Hesperian, "and I would appreciate people respecting the flowers by giving two feet of space between the car and the curb when parking." (On the east side of the building.) Visitors to the home sometimes break the plants when parking there. He attributes the damage to thoughtlessness rather than a deliberate "mean streak" in drivers.

Handley has three sons - E. F. Handley of Vernon, who will retire soon from working on the

Wagoner Ranch there; Harmon Handley, who lives southwest of Lockney; and Owen Handley, who lives near White Face; a daughter, Mrs. Frank (Reva) McNeill of Amarillo; and, "the last time I counted," seven grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

He credits his daughter and son-in-law with helping to get him started on the flower-gardening project at the home - they furnished bulbs, seeds and plants.

Handley, born in Crenshaw County, Alabama in 1880, came to Texas in 1893, and moved to Floyd County in 1926. His first home in the county was about a mile and a half west of where the rest home is now located, he told the Hesperian. From 1939 to 1966 he lived in Lockney, where he worked as a carpenter and school janitor.

Handley lived with his children for a while after his wife's death in 1966. "I wouldn't live with my children without paying board," he explained, and finding that he didn't have enough money left after paying board and drug bills, he moved to the Floydada Rest Home in 1968.

"The children didn't run me off," he states. "I just couldn't afford it."

Although he has been unable to use a broom or hoe for about a week, due to a catch in his hip, Handley plans to resume his gardening and clean-up chores soon.

I had the privilege of being one of the campers at Moody. This year the campsite was the Episcopal Center northeast of Amarillo. The camp, its site, is thus named for the Moody Foundation. The camp is as comfortable as the camp possible. It is supplemented from area chapters of the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America, and is staffed with volunteers who are children from the Lubbock-Amarillo area as well as Abilene, Santa Fe, and Albuquerque.

Approximately fifty-five patients (affectionately "the kids") and at least one attendant for each child, larger boys required two attendants. The kids were confined to wheelchairs. Their attendants required lifting, dressing, bathroom assistance in eating, and a large measure of patience in giving care from their attendants. Because his arms and legs for one glorious week, the afflicted child to enjoy a full week of camping and outdoor activities, including, riflery, swimming, arts and crafts, archery, stunts, and races. Activities are adapted to the ability of each child.

Myastrophy is a progressive disease which destroys muscle and eventually disables its victim and renders him helpless. Anyone regardless of age, sex, or race MD, but it primarily a disease of children, and most children are young boys. Many of the sisters of the afflicted produce sons with MD. It is not transmitted from one child to another. Neither is it curable, as its cause has not been discovered. It is a fatal disease. It so severely affects the victims that even a simple cold could lead to death. Those afflicted with MD rarely survive to maturity, and how important it is to give these kids one week of camp.

The purpose of this letter is dual, both to inform you on the camp and as much to say a word about the thankless job of attendants. They are boys and girls from ages 14-20, who are long and hard, but in giving an extra measure of care they certainly receive the same tenfold. Each one usual kind of love affair going with his or her boy or girl through the year. Departure from camp is always sad because we know there will always be a few who will not return next year's camp. I personally wish everyone who attends to be distasteful or troublesome could see these attendants during this particular week, and experience the lumps in the throats at departure on Saturday, and you that teenagers are good. They are sensitive and involved with any and all causes that require compassion. Floydada we had Brian Vickers, Greg Bond, David Becky Bertand, and Bill Christian. They all did out-standingly.
