Crosbyton Hosts Green And White

The Floydada Whirlwinds kick off the 1972 grid season tomorrow night at Crosbyton, tangling with a big, tough bunch of Chieftains in an 8 p.m. non-district encounter.

The Chiefs tied for the District 4-A title last season with powerhouse Petersburg and New Deal, and they're picked as contenders for the title again this year... and they are not lightly regarded by the Whirlwinds.

CHIEFS' LINE BIG
"Crosbyton has a real big line and fast, aggressive backs. They can go all the way at any time," Whirlwind head coach L. G. Wilson said this week. The big, experienced line ranks as the Chiefs' strong point, according to pre-season writings. Five linemen return from last year, including a couple of 200-pound-plus tackles, Ruben Acevedo (5-10, 207) and Kris Ellison (6-4, 215). Buddy Brown (5-11, 160) and Roger Freeman (6-0, 178) return at offensive end positions, and Mike Hodges, a 5-11, 187-pound guard, is back from last year's championship team.

QUARTERBACK CAN THROW
They'll be in front of quarterback Bill Johnson, (5-11, 167) another Chieftain back from a starting spot last year. "Johnson is a fine passer, and they will probably throw a lot against us," Wilson said, "so our defensive line will really have to put on a big rush." "We'll be looking for Crosbyton to put the ball in the air a lot and try to run wide on us," Wilson continued.

CROSBYTON DEFENSE
Defensively, the Chiefs field a team similar to Tahoka, whom the 'Winds faced in a scrimmage last Friday. "They will probably try to copy what Tahoka did," Wilson said. The Bulldogs, fired up for the scrimmage here Friday, looked sharper than the 'Winds, who seemed flat after a good showing the previous week against Brownfield.

'WIND SCRIMMAGE
Although the 'Winds, as a team, lacked consistency and alertness in the final scrimmage, several good individual performances came out of the workout. All-state tackle Ter-

ry Bunch did another fine job, according to the Whirlwind coach, as did linebackers Tony Goen and David Marricle. Jay Jones and Erick Jones looked good in the Whirlwind defensive secondary.

"Offensively, Drew Lloyd did a fine job blocking in the line," Wilson added, "and Mark Vinson and Jerry Hearon seem to be coming around running the ball."

Several personnel changes were made in the Whirlwind lineup after the Tahoka scrimmage, which the Floydada coaching staff feels will help the team's performance both offensively and defensively.

If the 'Winds can shape up their offensive blocking, pass protection and backfield timing, they should be able to move the ball in the season opener tomorrow, and if the defense can come up with a more aggressive game, they may be able to contain what could be a wide-open offensive show by the Chieftains.

'WINDS HIT BY FLU
The Floydada team had no serious injuries earlier this week, but several players had missed practice after being hit by a "flu bug," coaches said. Game captains for the Crosbyton battle will be Tony Goen and Jerry Hearon. Permanent captains will be selected before the first conference game October 20. 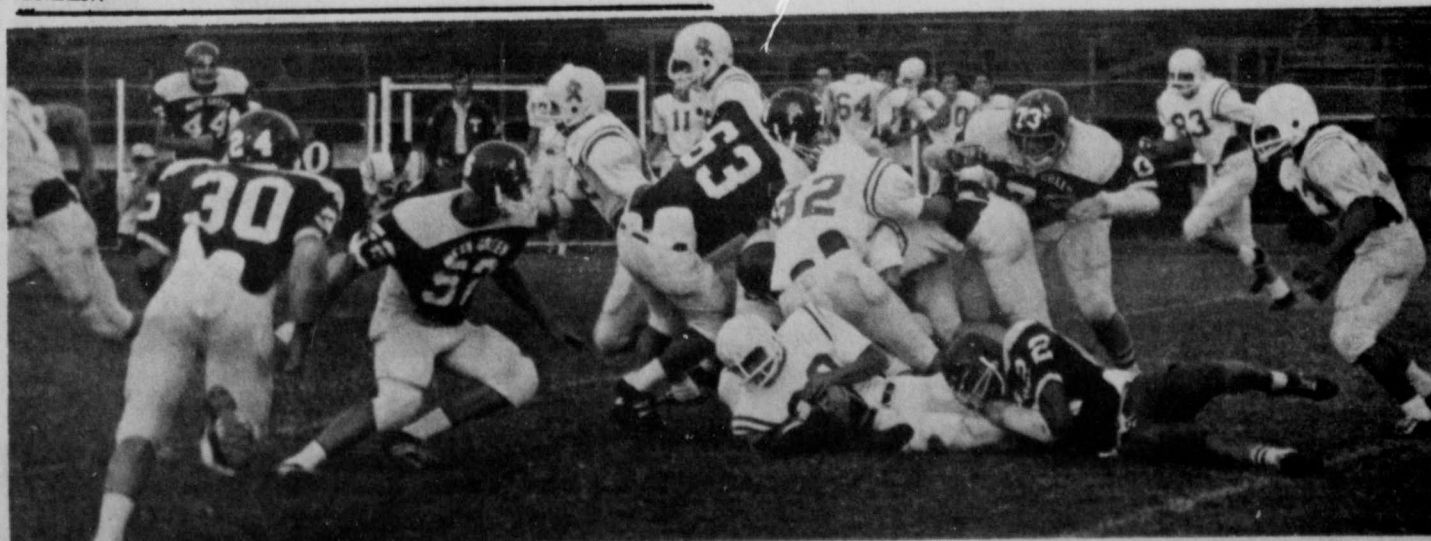

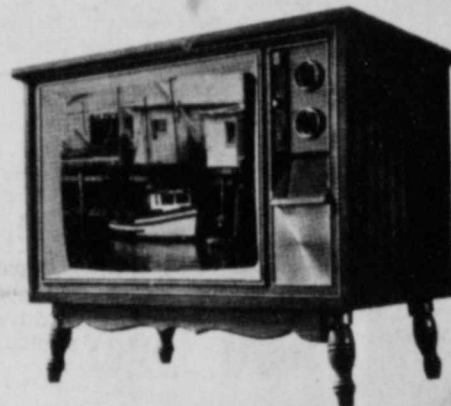
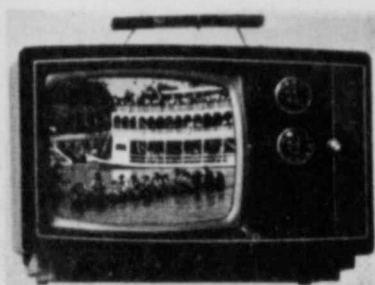

Weevil Control Program Begins

Plades took to the air August 20 to initiate the ninty year of insecticide applications in the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program. Field surveys, underway for the past seven weeks, indicate that over 31,000 acres in 519 fields will require treatment in the first of this season's containment efforts.

According to Ed Dean, field service director for Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the organization responsible to cotton producers for the program, cotton fields below the Caprock are being sprayed this year when punctured square counts reach

the 10 per cent level. Cotton above the Caprock, the protection of which is the program's primary goal, will be sprayed when weevil damage approaches five per cent, he said.

In previous years all cotton in a prescribed control zone was treated with insecticide on a set schedule. But it has been found more economical and just as effective to survey all fields weekly and spray only those which meet the 10 per cent and five per cent criteria.

"Our objective is to prevent weevils in infested fields below the Caprock and along its edge

from migrating westward onto the High Plains," Dean said. "and seven years of experience in this program has convinced us that the job can be done with this spray-as-needed approach."

The Control Program was begun by PCG in 1964 when overwintering of weevils above the Caprock made it obvious that a concerted effort was necessary

to prevent prohibitive insecticide costs and devastating crop losses to all High Plains farmers from the Caprock to the New Mexico line and beyond.

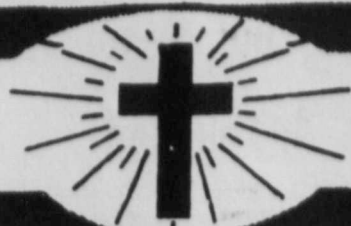

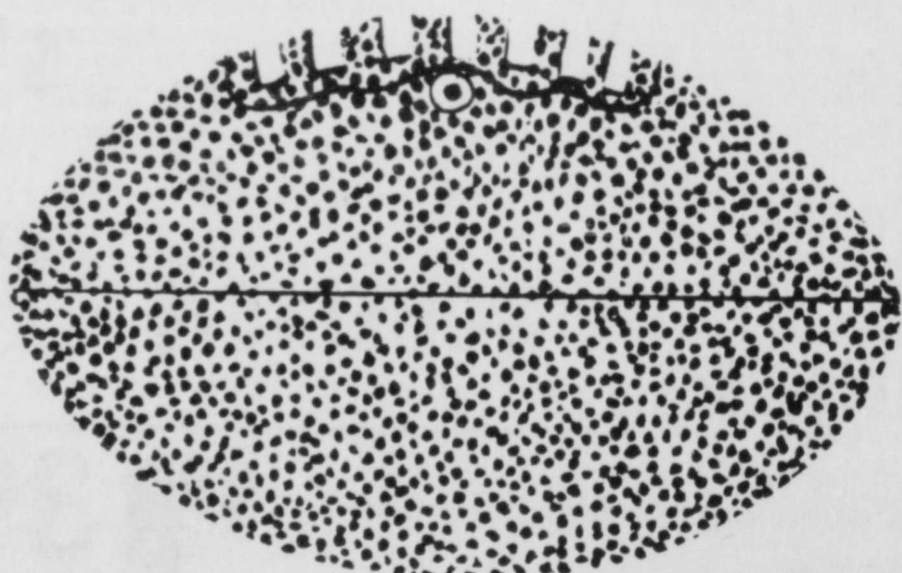

Free License Plates For Veterans

In May, 1971, the 62nd Texas Legislature passed H.B. 615 authorizing free automobile license plates for Texas Veterans who are shown to have service-connected disabilities which are rated 70% or more by either the Veterans Administration or the Department of Defense. Governor Preston Smith later signed the bill into law, and it went into effect with the issuance of the 1972 license plates.

The Texas Highway Department, responsible for the manufacturing and the issuing of automobile license plates in Texas, has advised that applications are now being accepted from eligible veterans for 1973 license plates. All such applications must be received by the Department by October 1, 1972. The application form, Form D-12-615, may be obtained from the local Tax Assessor-Collector in each county, or ordered direct from the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, 40th and Jackson Avenue, Austin, Texas 78703. These application forms should NOT be ordered from the Veterans Administration Regional Offices. They are not VA forms, and the VA does not stock them for distribution.

Every eligible veteran who desires to apply for the free license plates should be cautioned to complete the application form in its entirety. The Highway Department reports that they have in the past received many forms which were incomplete. In such cases, the form must be returned to the veteran for completion, thus delaying the determination of eligibility. The veteran must complete ALL of Section 1 of the form, including all of the identifying information relative to the vehicle for which he is requesting free license plates. Section 2 of the form must be completed by the Veterans Administration or the military service from which the veteran is retired. If a veteran has been disability retired from the military service and has not filed a claim with the VA, he may support his application with a copy of his Retirement Order or other military evidence of his Disability Rating of 70% or more.

Free License Plates For Veterans

Also accompanying application must be a statement of \$1.00. Once a veteran has the free license plate name is placed on a slip each year. The card will advise the steps necessary to free license plate, or trades his vehicle, or remove the license, in contact his local Tax Assessor-Collector. 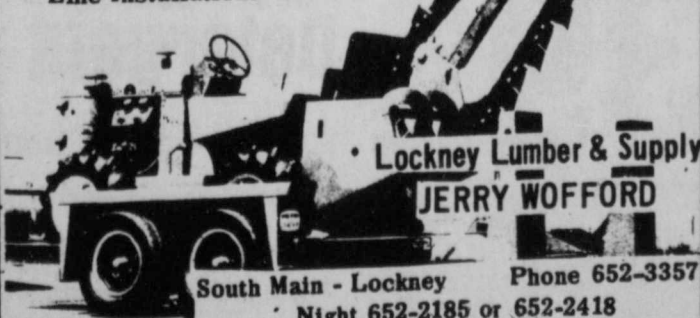
