

Over 300 Attend Mackenzie Ground Breaking

An attendance of over 300 accentuated the kick-off of the Mackenzie Dam construction project Saturday afternoon as the ground breaking ceremonies were attended by interested persons from all over the state.

Most of the crowd was made up of officials and residents of Tulla, Lockney, Silverton and Floydada. The dam will serve these four cities with water in the future.

As the crowd stood on Tule Canyon's north rim to dedicate the dam, it was the biggest gathering in that vicinity since Gen. R. S. Mackenzie trapped the last of hostile Kiowas and Comanches there in 1874.

With that comparison, keynote speaker Otha Dent of the Texas Water Rights Commission impressed upon the crowd what effect the Mackenzie Water Project will have on future generations.

Judge Dent looked out over the deep canyon and envisioned scenes of fishing, hiking, camping and skiing that will spring up between the steep red canyon walls at a site eight miles northwest of Silverton.

It will mark the first major change of the creek bottom since Indians disappeared, leaving the rugged and beautiful terrain to grazing cattle. Dent told onlookers he believes water preservation is

essential to future generations of the Texas Panhandle.

NEED WATER

"We know we have to have water on the high plains if we are to sustain the economy we have built. And although we may not need all the water it will provide at the moment, this area's 6,500 school children will need the water from this reservoir."

Dent said the Mackenzie dam project will open up new avenues and will be a tremendous boost for the area.

"This is a beginning that may bring our boys and girls back here to live," he said. "It will have influence in bringing our youth back. It will

strengthen the economy, bring in more industry, and make life more pleasant.

As he spoke, residents from miles around surmised on what the project will mean to them besides being the future water reservoir for four cities.

Officials said the earthen dam should be completed in an estimated 265 working days.

Clayton Keller, project manager, estimated it will take 18 months until final completion of the dam. At completion, the dam will span the canyon, standing 168 feet high, with a base width of 1,000 feet.

Comments of several individuals represent expectations of residents.

"It will be a good fishing hole, a place to swim, and good for recreation," said Bill Borchardt of Tulla.

Located six miles north of Rock Creek on SH 86, Mackenzie Dam will be built first. The water treatment plant will be constructed at a future date.

The speaker, Otha Dent, of Littlefield, was introduced by Lon Davis, Jr., of Floydada, president of the Mackenzie Water Authority Board.

Other distinguished platform guests included Marvin Shurbet of Petersburg, member of the Texas Water Development

Board; George Dewald of Amarillo, named resident engineer for the project; Jim Nichols of Fort Worth, designing engineer; and R. A. Thompson III, of Fort Worth, director in charge of construction for the engineering firm; Don Bookout of Tulla, project attorney and Clayton Keller of Tulla, project manager.

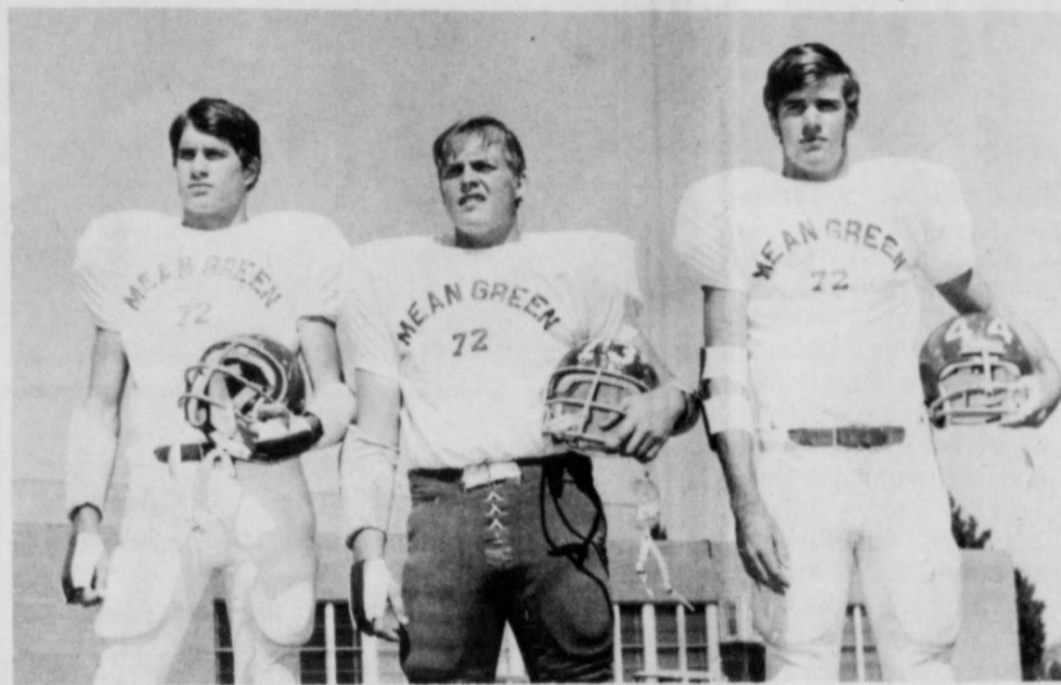

Whirlwinds To Host Olton Mustangs In Home Opener

The Floydada Whirlwinds entertain the Olton Mustangs Friday evening in the home opener for the Green and White gridgers. Kickoff at Wester Field is scheduled for 8 p.m. It will be a non-district game for the first time in several years, as the 'Winds moved to 4-AA this season.

The Whirlwinds enter the game off a narrow 20-15 victory over Crosbyton on opening night. Floydada spotted Olton to a 13-0 lead last year, then came back to win 28-13 in a District 3-AA contest.

Olton's Mustangs stand 0-3 for the season, including losses by narrow margins to District 4-AA favorite Tulla (12-6) and to Lockney (14-6), and a 21-8 loss to triple-A Muleshoe.

The Mustangs outgained the Mules, 316 to 216 in total yards, and in first downs, 17-13, but fumbled twice and allowed a couple of easy touchdowns. They led the Hornets until the final period, when Tulla pulled ahead following a pass interception. The Mustangs ran into more turnover problems last week against Lockney, when they lost three fumbles and were intercepted twice, one pass theft leading to a Longhorn touchdown.

Olton is without the services of graduated super quarterback Steve Stockdale this year, but powerful fullback Keith Workman is back. Workman

(6-0, 210) rushed for 120 yards against Muleshoe and scored eight points.

Also showing good running power for Olton is Tim Givens, a six-foot, 165-pound tailback who owns the rest of the Mustangs' scoring. Givens broke loose for a 61-yard touchdown sprint against Tulla and scored from seven yards out to provide Olton's only points against Lockney.

Freshman halfback Glenn Johnson provides more power for the Ponies' ground game. Johnson picked up good yardage Friday against the Longhorns.

Vic Allcorn, Stockdale's replacement at quarterback, hails from a long line of well-known athletes at Olton. Allcorn, a six-foot, 140-pounder, is a junior.

Olton, always noted for a tough defense, should prove no exception when they meet the Whirlwinds tomorrow. The big defensive line is led by tackles Gale Long (5-10, 200) and Jimmy McCurry (5-9, 190), both starters for their third season. Dan Deberry, 5-0, 215, is another returnee from last year's line.

Olton's starting offense lists seven seniors, three juniors and one freshman. The defense, a younger unit, shows five seniors, three juniors, two sophomores and a freshman.

Whirlwind head coach L. C. Wilson, pondering the 'Winds' upcoming opponents, said Monday: "Olton has been in all their games, and with a bounce of the ball could be 3-0 right now instead of 0-3". Olton could prove a rough test for the Whirlwinds, although the Mean Green are tabbed as the favorites.

At the time of this writing, Wilson said the 'Winds had looked "pretty good" in workouts, with no serious injuries suffered in last week's game at Post. ". . . but a few bruises and minor hurts have hampered our offensive workouts some," Wilson added. Both quarterbacks have missed workouts this week. Mike Hale with the flu and John Cagle with a sprained wrist, and halfback Rex Rose has been slowed by a pulled back muscle. The other Whirlwind backfield starters, Mark Vinson and Jerry Hearon, are healthy.

Wilson had a couple of surprises in tentative starting lineups issued early this week. Personnel changes hinted at after the Post game, may move Cagle into a starting role at quarterback and shift Mike Hale to left end to provide a taller target for the 'Winds' passes.

Defensively, the 'Winds have looked good in this week's workouts, and Wilson looks for his defense to turn the ball over to the offense more as they iron out some problems.

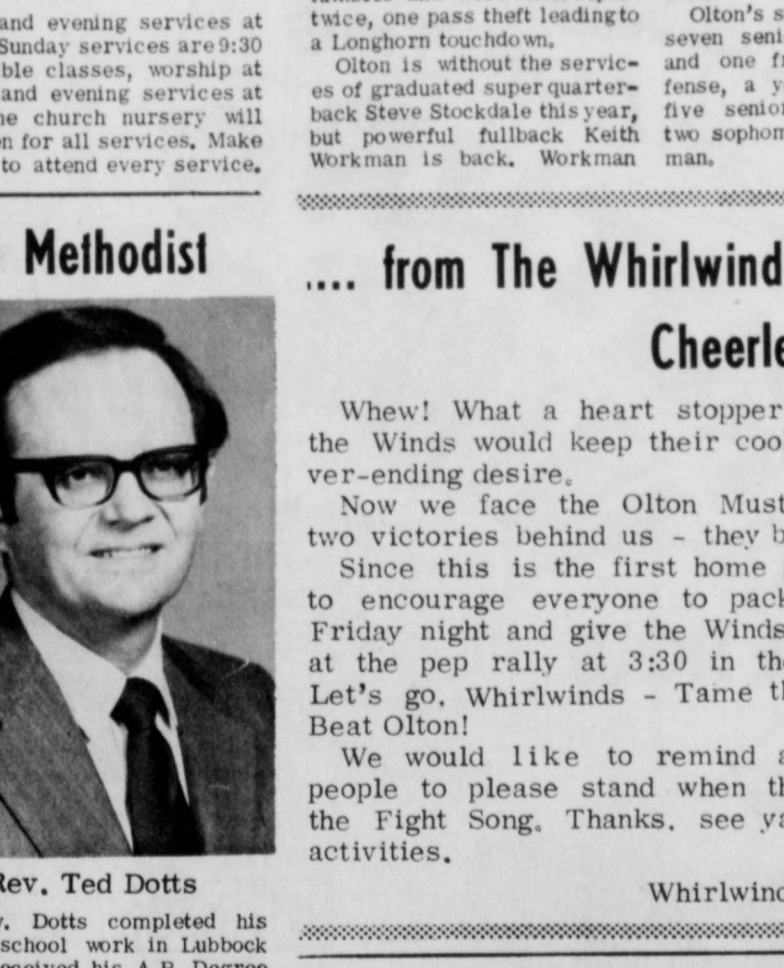

Commissioners Court Approves Floyd 1973 Budget

The Floyd County Commissioners' Court approved the 1973 county budget in its regular monthly meeting September 11, and granted a five-percent increase to all county employees, effective January 1, 1973.

Fred Robertson was hired in Precinct IV, effective September 1.

The 1973 budget is based on a county tax rate of 90¢ per \$100 evaluation, same as the 1972 rate. The state tax rate of 27¢ per hundred also remains unchanged from 1972.

The only changes shown in the 1973 county budget, besides the salary increase, include \$6,000 in the general fund for garbage pits, the money to be divided between Floydada and Lockney, and \$6,000 for ambulance service subsidy, also to be divided between the two towns.

The county will pay off \$36,000 in bonds in 1973, leaving \$12,000 to be paid off in 1974. No tax rate was set to cover the bond payments, as the money is already available. The total evaluation, as reported by tax collector Ethel Graham, amounts to \$34,773,800. If taxes on the total amount are collected, the County of Floyd will receive \$312,964 in tax money. Probably 96 to 97 percent of the total will be collected.

The County Tax Assessor-Collector's office collects, in addition to the county and state taxes, taxes for the High Plains Water District, the Floyd County Weed Control District, Caprock Hospital District, and the two Floyd County rural schools. The County of Floyd actually receives less than half the tax money collected over the Tax Collector's counter.

Of the taxes to be paid at the Tax Collector's office, the county will distribute funds to the other districts thus in 1973:

- High Plains Water District - \$16,940
- Floyd County Weed Control District - \$18,796
- Caprock Hospital District - \$166,009
- Dougherty School - \$48,952
- South Plains School - \$54,902

The County will collect \$8,-803 in state taxes in 1973.

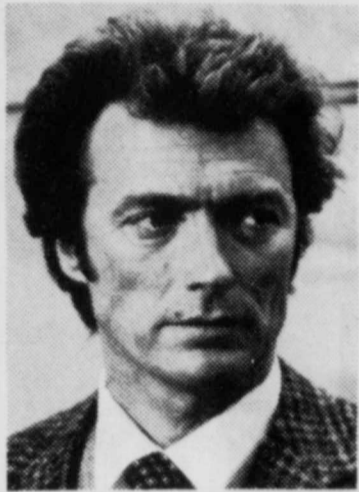

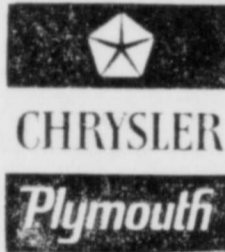

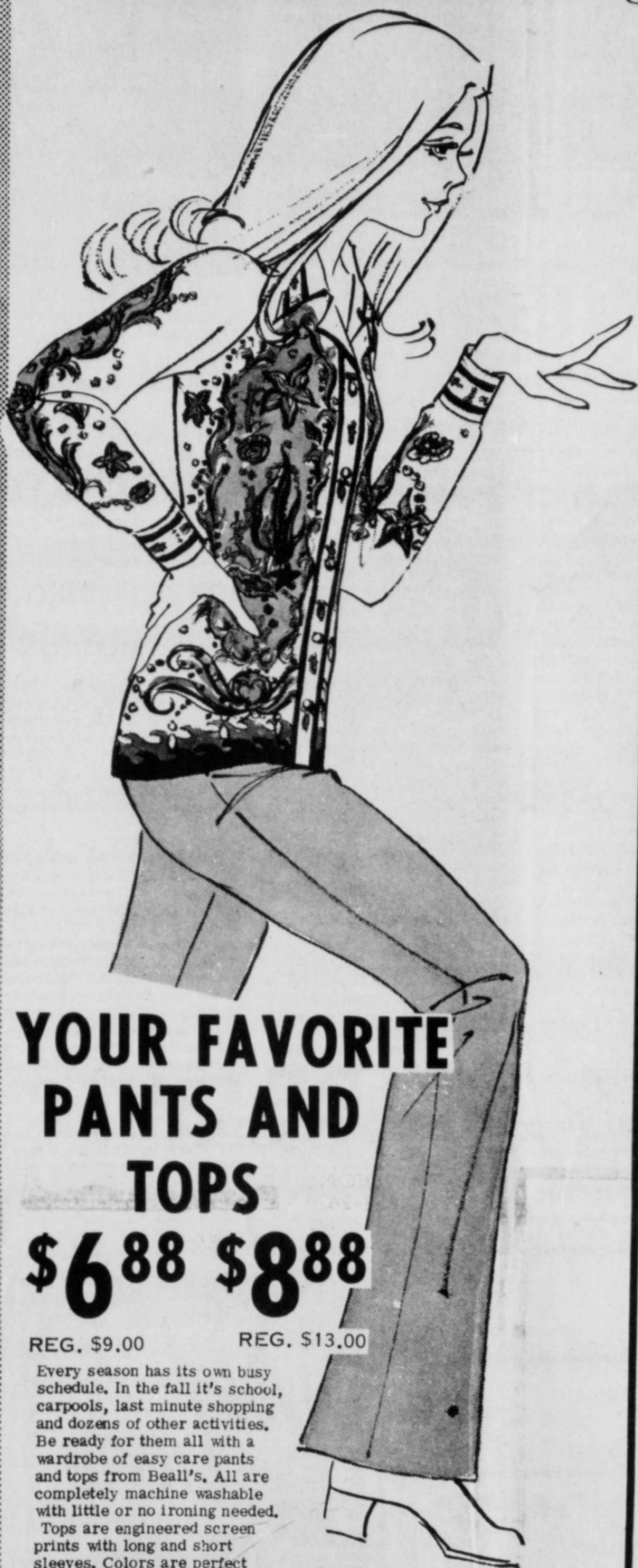

Floydada Youth Concerned Over Men Who Are P.O.W.

Floydada youth are concerned over our servicemen who are P.O.W. - M.I.A. (Prisoners of War - Missing in Action) and are purchasing bracelets which honor the men whose name is inscribed with the date taken prisoner or lost.

Over 1500 Americans are either Prisoners of War or Missing in Action in Southeast

Asia. An organization known as VIVA (Voices in Vital America) have been distributing P.O.W.-M.I.A. bracelets over the U. S. for the past several years for a minimum donation of \$2.50 for nickel plated bracelets or \$3 for copper. All donations are tax deductible.

VIVA says aside from the inhumane treatment witnessed by the few prisoners who have returned, the most tragic aspect is that most of the families of these men do not know their sons, husbands or fathers are alive or dead.

The simple metal band honors the man whose name is inscribed and includes the date he was lost. VIVA asked that you not wear the bracelet unless you want to get involved. When one assumes the one-to-one bond with a stranger who is unable even to ask for your concern, and to enter the pain of his family, something happens to you.

A number of Floydada students purchased the bracelets at the Lubbock Fair Monday. Others in Floydada have secured them through Dallas Cares, Box 22314, Dallas, Texas, 75222; from Mrs. Jo Murphy, 5208 8th, Lubbock, Tex.; Mrs. Don Daniel or Mrs. Don Hardy in Floydada.

Mrs. Murphy's husband is among the Missing in Action as of June 8, 1972. One bracelet worn by its Floydada owner shows a particular man a prisoner since 1966.

Bracelets purchased through Mrs. Murphy and the Floydada women, will bear names of men of this area who are prisoners or missing. An address will be enclosed in the package should purchasers desire information on the individual.

Mrs. Daniel says she has several bracelets in her possession at the present time, should anyone desire one or more. She also related that Mrs. Murphy is available for talks to any organization or groups and that she or Mrs. Hardy will be happy to contact the woman for this purpose.

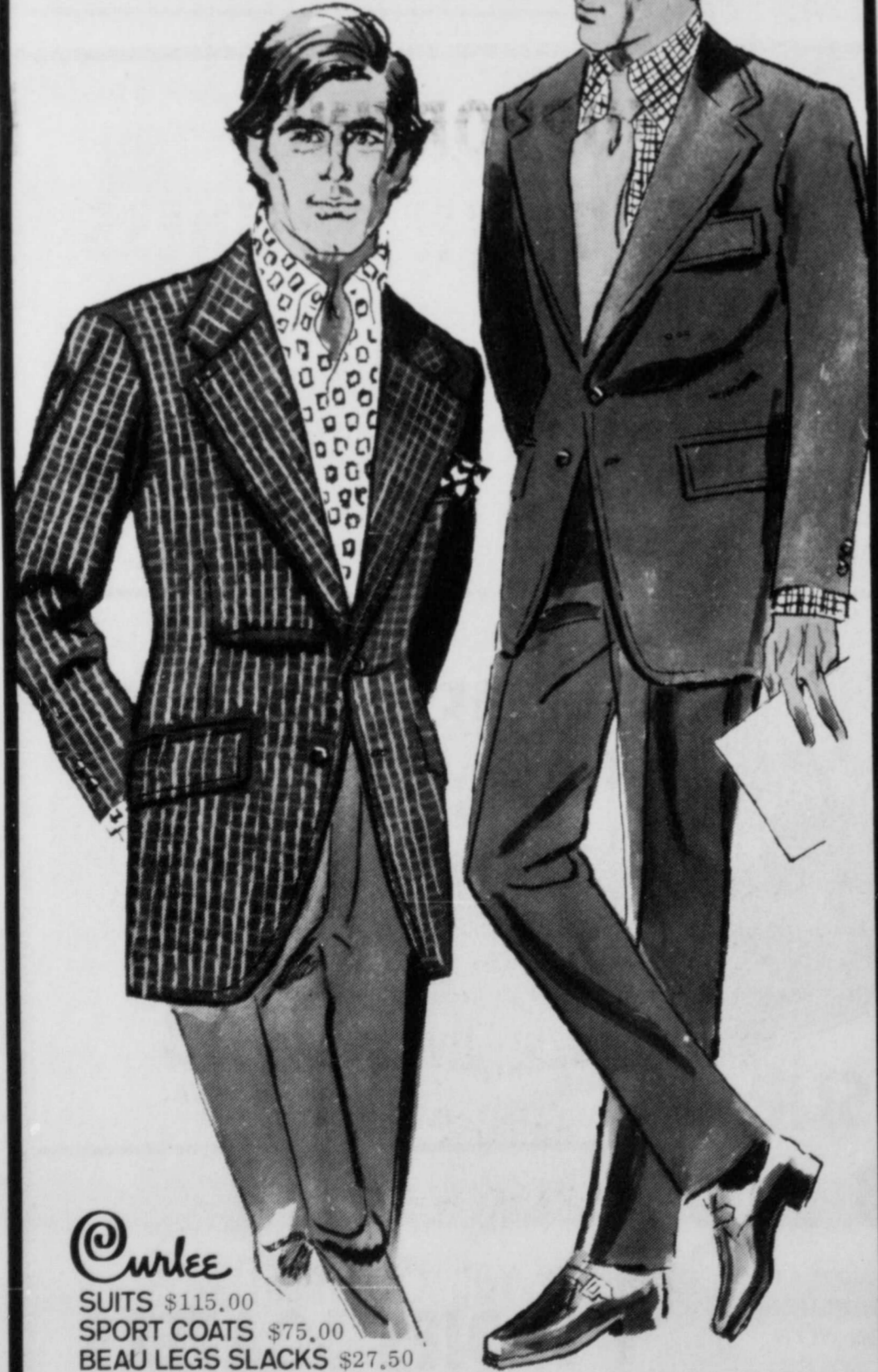

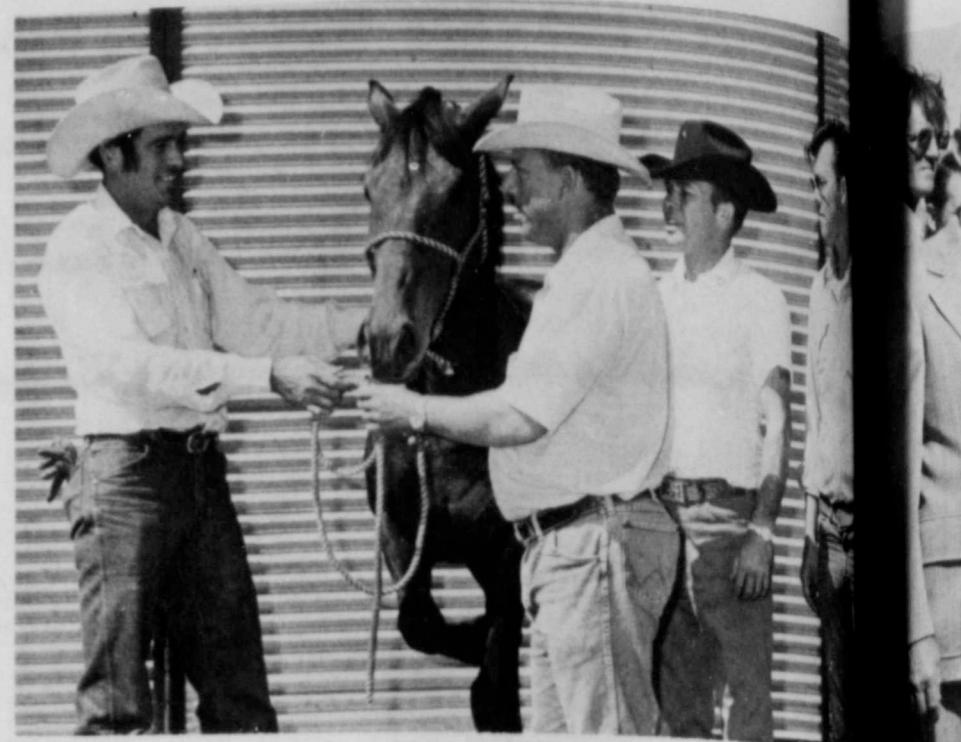

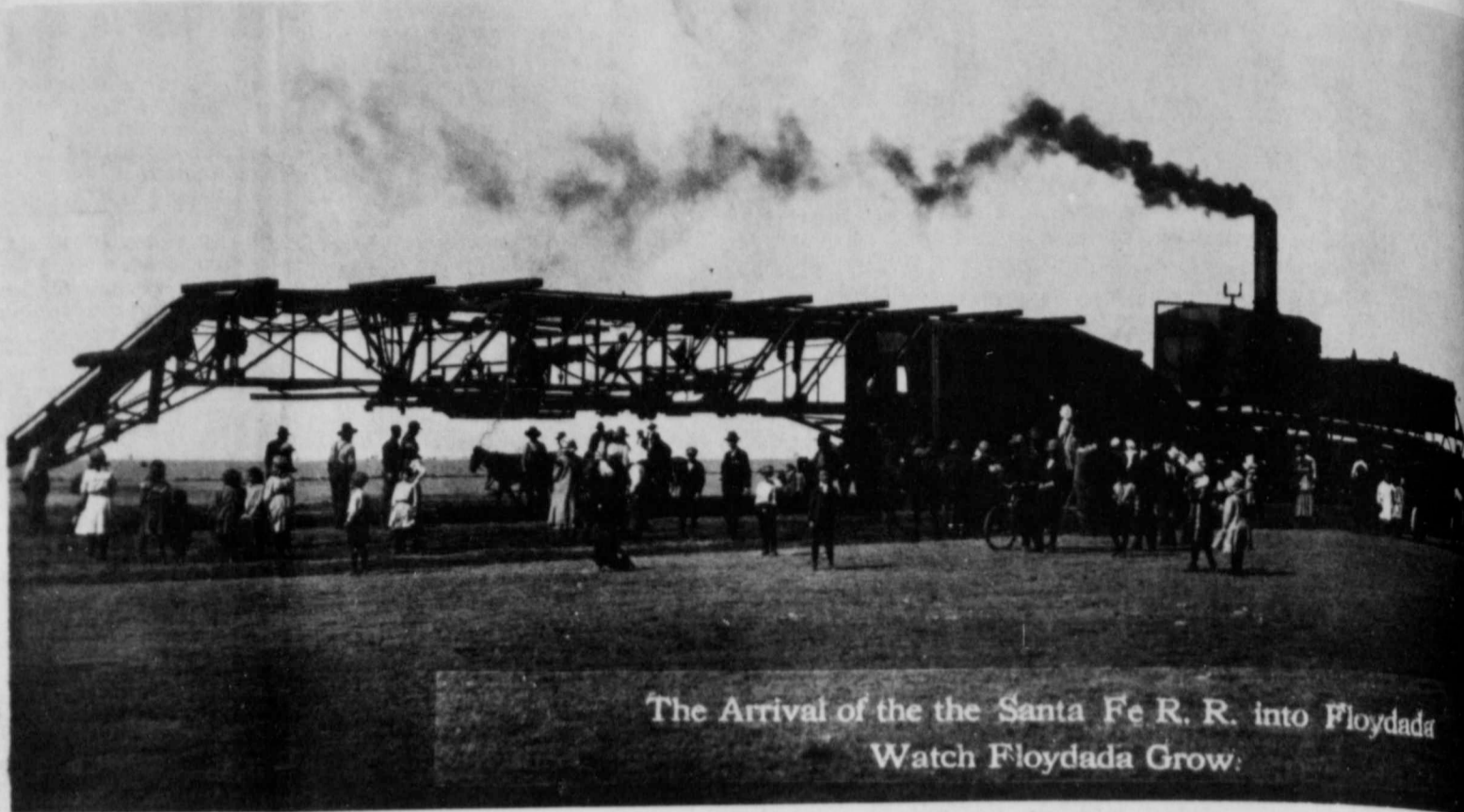

Senator Jack Hightower Again On Administration Committee


State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon has again been appointed to head up the powerful Administration Committee for the Texas Senate.

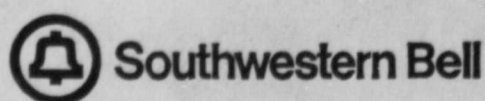

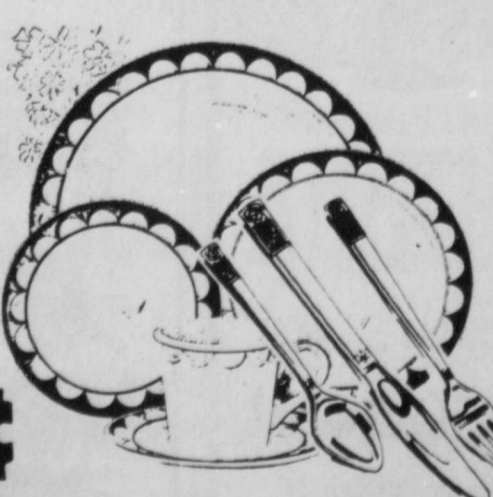
