accentuated the kick-off of the Mackenzie Dam construction project Saturday afternoon as the ground breaking ceremonies were attended by interested persons from all over the

Most of the crowd was made up of officials and residents of Tulia, Lockney, Silverton and Floydada. The dam will serve these four cities with water in the future.

As the crowd stood on Tule Canyon's north rim to dedicate the dam, it was the biggest gathering in that vicinity since Gen. R. S. Mackenzie trapped the last of hostile Kiowas and Comanches there in 1874.

Texas Water Rights Commission impressed upon the crowd what effect the Mackenzie Water Project will have on future generations.

Judge Dent looked out over the deep canyon and envisioned scenes of fishing, hiking, camping and skiing that will spring up between the steep red canyon walls at a site eight miles northwest of Silverton. It will mark the first ma-

jor change of the creek bottom since Indians disappeared, leaving the rugged and beautiful terrain to grazing cattle. Dent told onlookers he believes water preservation is

NEED WATER

"We know we have to have water on the high plains if we are to sustain the economy we have built. And although we may not need all the water it will provide at the moment, this area's 6,500 school children will need the water from this reservoir."

Dent said the Mackenzie dam project will open up new avenues and will be a tremendous boost for the area.
"This is a beginning that may

bring our boys and girls back here to live," he said. "It will have influence in bringing our youth back. It will life more pleasant.

As he spoke, residents from miles around surmised on what the project will mean to them besides being the future water reservoir for four cities.

Officials said the earthen dam should be completed in an estimated 265 working days. Clayton Keller, project man-

ager, estimated it will take 18 months until final completion of the dam. At completion, the dam will span the canyon, standing 168 feet high, with a base width of 1,000 feet.



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Commissioners Court Approves Floyd 1973 Budget

The Floyd County Commis-sioners' Court approved the 1973 county budget in its regular monthly meeting September 11, and granted a five-percent increase to all county employees, effective January 1, 1973. Fred Robertson was hired in Precinct IV, effective Septem-

The 1973 budget is based on a county tax rate of 90¢ per \$100 evaluation, same as the 1972 rate. The state tax rate of 27¢ per hundred also remains unchanged from 1972. The only changes shown in

ber 1.

the 1973 county budget, besides the salary increase, include \$6,000 in the general fund for garbage pits, the money to be divided between Floydada and Lockney, and \$6,000 for ambulance service subsidy, also to be divided between the two

The county will pay off \$36,000 in bonds in 1973, leaving \$12,000 to be paid off in 1974. No tax rate was set to cover the bond payments, as the money is already available. The total evaluation, as re-

ported by tax collector Ethel Graham, amounts to \$34,773,-800. If taxes on the total amount are collected, the County of Floyd will receive \$312,964 in tax money. Probably 96 to 97 percent of the total will be collected. The County Tax Assessor-

Collector's office collects, in addition to the county and state taxes, taxes for the High Plains Water District, the Floyd County Weed control District, Caprock Hospital District, and the two Floyd County rural schools. The County of Floyd the tax money collected over the Tax Collector's counter. Of the taxes to be paid at the Tax Collector's office, the county will distribute funds to the other districts thus in 1973:

High Plains Water District-\$16,940; Floyd County Weed Control District - \$18,796; Caprock Hospital District-\$166,009; Dougherty School -\$48,952; South Plains School -\$54,902.

The County will collect \$8;,-803 in state taxes in 1973.





ors the man whose name is inscribed and includes the date he was lost. VIVA asked that you not wear the bracelet unless you want to get involved. When one assumes the one-toone bond with a stranger whois unable even to ask for your concern, and to enter the pain of his family, something happens to you.

A number of Floydada students purchased the bracelets at the Lubbock Fair Monday. Others in Floydada have secured them through Dallas Cares, Box 22314, Dallas, Texas, 75222; from Mrs. Jo Murphy, 5208 8th, Lubbock, Tex.; Mrs. Don Daniel or Mrs. Don Hardy in Floydada.



City Auto Vending Machines Robbed



about 3 a.m. Sunday.


