





The only possible exception is in the case of a professional woman who wishes it to be known that she is married but does not wish her husband's name to appear. In that case she may put 'Mrs.' in parentheses before her sig-

The Emily Post style is the most widely used by women for legal documents, correspondence and signatures. In that case she may put 'Mrs.' in parentheses before her signature,"

The Emily Post style is the most widely used by women for legal documents, correspondence and signatures. But for a newspaper, this style is sometimes frustrating. A credit transaction is based on trust. We have an obligation to repay money which we borrow. Credit is the present use of future income. Using credit means using someone else's

To figure what you can afford, list categories of spending and record your expenditures for a period of time. Weigh the amount you are spending against your income. Is there money left for additional payments? Plan future expenditures based on what you spend now. Allow for the unexpected expenses.

In deciding whether or not to use credit ask yourself these questions: Is this item worth the added

Will the item last longer than the payment period? Could I save now to pay cash

- What is the difference between the cash price and the credit price?

- Could I pay less by choosing another form of credit? - Could I make a larger down payment without upsetting the family spending plan?

Do I pay off debts as quickly as possible? - Can I meet this payment plus

all other monthly expenses? Credit can be helpful if handled in the right way. 


