Application Made For 40 More Low-Rent Housing Units Good For Elderly People

Representatives of the Federal Housing Authority Bill Hale and Dale Goen met with the city council Monday night in regard to making application for 40 more low rent federal housing units for Floydada. The council reaffirmed its approval for the units which was made in 1960 when application was made for the first 40 units that were built in 1962. Now the council will meet with the local Federal Housing Authority board and an architect at the bank community room at 10 a.m. Thursday. "We want every elderly person who thinks he or she might be interested in living in one of the low cost rent units to come into our office and so indicate to Raymond Williams," Hale told a Hesperian reporter Tuesday. "This will help our application being approved by government officials as we show how much interest there is in the 40 new units," he continued. The office is located at 302 E. Tennessee Street. There is no cost to the city for the units, as the money comes from the government and payout is through the rent arrangement.

Other Council Business After meeting with Hale and Goen, the council heard a request from Alton Higginbotham to fence in the Lighthouse Electric pole yard east of the tracks. The council approved his request to go across an alley with the fence. At this point the council devoted about an hour to discussion of Pioneer Natural Gas Company's request to increase natural gas rates to the city's power plant some 20.8%. This does not include the home user of gas, but the city's electric power plant. It is estimated that the increase will amount to some \$12,000 over the next year. Mayor Jimmy Seay questioned the rate going up 20.8%, while the company only increased Lubbock Power and Light's rate by 11.4%. It appears that Pioneer wants to make the new rate effective January 1, 1973. The council voted to allow the mayor to negotiate and sign a new contract. The council then appointed five Floydada citizens to the planning and zoning commission: Louis Anderson, Ray Gene Ferguson, Clinton Fyffe, Wayne Russell and Richard Burns. The council devoted a considerable amount of time looking over a list of water customers who live outside the city limits. The list included their new water rates as computed by city secretary Jimmie Lou Stewart. They decided that the rates were fair to all concerned. Five insurance companies had submitted hospitalization insurance programs for the city's 30 employees and the council discussed these. The city pays for hospitalization for its employees, but the employee pays for his family's insurance. Companies submitting bids from Floydada included: Hale & Hale, Floydada Real Estate and Insurance, Baker Insurance Company, and Goen & Goen. Two Lubbock companies submitted bids: Sentry and Travelers Insurance. The council tabled decision until study could be made of the benefits under each program. Scout troops 355 and 357 (about 30 boys) along with scoutmaster Wilson Bond attended the council meeting and received credit on their citizenship merit badge work. All councilmen were present: Boone Adams, Johnny Bill Sue, Gayle Baucum, Frank Goen and Ed Hammond.

Whirlwinds Vs. Lobos Here Friday, 7:30 p.m.

The Lobos of Levelland come to Floydada's Wester Field Friday to test Coach L.G. Wilson's Whirlwinds in a 7:30 p.m. grid battle that pits the winless against the undefeated. Although the Lobos of 1-AAA have lost some contests by sizable margins this year, they have been "in" most of their games until halftime, and Whirlwind coaches rate them a "dangerous" ball club that can be tough if things are going right for them. The young Lobos led Brownfield 13-12 at the half but lost to the Cubs 34-13. They led Seminole 18-8 at halftime before bowing 32-18. Against Tahoka, the Lobos allowed four touchdowns in the first quarter and were never in the game. Littlefield, whose Wildcats fought to the finish before losing to the Whirlwinds 3-0 last week, beat the Lobos 34-6. The Whirlwinds will have to be ready to play heads-up football, Floydada coaches believe, to avoid an upset Friday night. Levelland starts four seniors, four juniors and three sophomores on offense. They are a young club, but they have looked like "old pros" at times, according to scouting reports, and can't be taken lightly. Junior halfback Sam Mitchell, a 150-pounder, may be one

of the best running backs the 'Winds have seen all year. Mitchell is an all-the-way threat any time he carries the ball and has averaged over 100 yards per game this season. He is the big gun in an apparently explosive-but-inconsistent offense that picked up more ground against Littlefield than Floydada managed last week. Friday night's game will be the fourth meeting between the two teams. In three previous games, played in the forties, the Whirlwinds stand 0-2-1 against Levelland. The 'Winds lost 7-6 in 1942, managed a 13-13 tie in '43, and were edged 3-0 in '44. The 'Winds should be in top shape mentally for their final non-conference game of the season. Last week's "Revenge" victory over Littlefield "put the icing on the cake" for the Whirlwinds, and coaches and players feel the team can handle any situation, as the boys have "just the right amount of confidence." Physically, the 'Winds should be in "pretty good" shape for the contest, according to Wilson, though a few

players are nursing aches and bruises. Mike Hale and Rex Rose are still bothered by back muscle pulls, but fullback Jerry Hearon should be able to go full speed. Hearon was hobbled last Friday by a charley-horse received in workouts Thursday afternoon. Against Littlefield, the Whirlwind defense and kicking game was of "championship caliber," Wilson said, and the offense showed good potential. In workouts this week, the 'Winds have concentrated on the offensive line and backfield, trying to eliminate little mistakes and put together a more explosive offense than they have exhibited in the last few games, Wilson told the Hesperian. 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Price Support Is Requested For Cottonseed

Texas Farm Bureau President J. T. (Red) Woodson has requested Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz to authorize a price support program for cottonseed to assist in the marketing of this year's crop.

Present farm legislation provides authority for such price supports, but the program is not now operative.

"Cotton producers are having problems with marketing their 1972 crop," Woodson wired Secretary Butz. "In addition to the depressed market for fiber, the price to farmers for cottonseed appears to be out of line when compared to the cost of cottonseed meal for livestock feed."

The president of the 130,000-

member farm organization urged Butz "to exercise your authority to offer a price support program for cottonseed to producers in order to provide more orderly marketing for the 1972 crop."

If the Secretary decides to provide supports for this commodity, he is required by law to set the price support at a level that is competitive with other oilseed crops.

Texas cotton farmers received an average of \$44 per ton for their cottonseed in late September, according to the USDA. This amounts to 52.6 percent of parity.

Orderly Grain Marketing Is Encouraged

"Orderly marketing" works. By spreading the sales of grain throughout the year, farmers are able to take advantage of the highs in the market, and average these with what they sell during the lower price season.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association encouraged farmers in 1971 to practice "orderly marketing." A majority of farmers followed this advice. As soon as they started this practice, the market price decline stopped and prices have remained fairly stable since. Now that market prices are higher, farmers are reaping the benefits.

There is much concern at the present time whether or not to sell while market prices are high, or to hold for even higher prices. No one will ever be able

to sell all his grain on the peak market every year. Conditions and attitudes change from one year to the next, so the peak seasons do not always come at the same time each year.

"We believe that following the practice of distributing the sale of grain throughout the year will help to average out the highs and lows. This way farmers will not be hurt too badly by selling at the wrong time," stated Elbert Harp, GSPA executive director.

GSPA encourages "ORDERLY MARKETING"—selling some grain at harvest time, but scattering the bulk of the sales throughout the entire year. This is why we continue to work for a decent government loan program that will allow farmers the advantage of holding their grain until they can reap the benefits of market price increases.

GSPA Asks USDA To Continue 1972 Present Level Of Feed Grain Set Aside For 1973

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has appealed to Secretary Butz to retain the 1972 level of set-aside. Fear that the increased grain sales to Russia and other buyers would cause the USDA to reduce too many 1973 set-aside acres, thus again resulting in grain surplus and low market prices, is the reason for the GSPA concern.

In a letter to Secretary Butz, GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp says, "The tendency may be to reduce the set-aside program. However, we urge you to consider all the facts

before making such a decision. We oppose such a cut-back because it would create another surplus and, by so doing, would cause an extreme hardship on American farmers."

Harp justified his request by adding, "Recent cost of production studies have shown that American farmers cannot afford a price decline, as few are barely breaking even with prices at the present level."

"We strongly appeal to you not to allow a repeat of the 1967 and 1971 grain surpluses," Harp concluded.

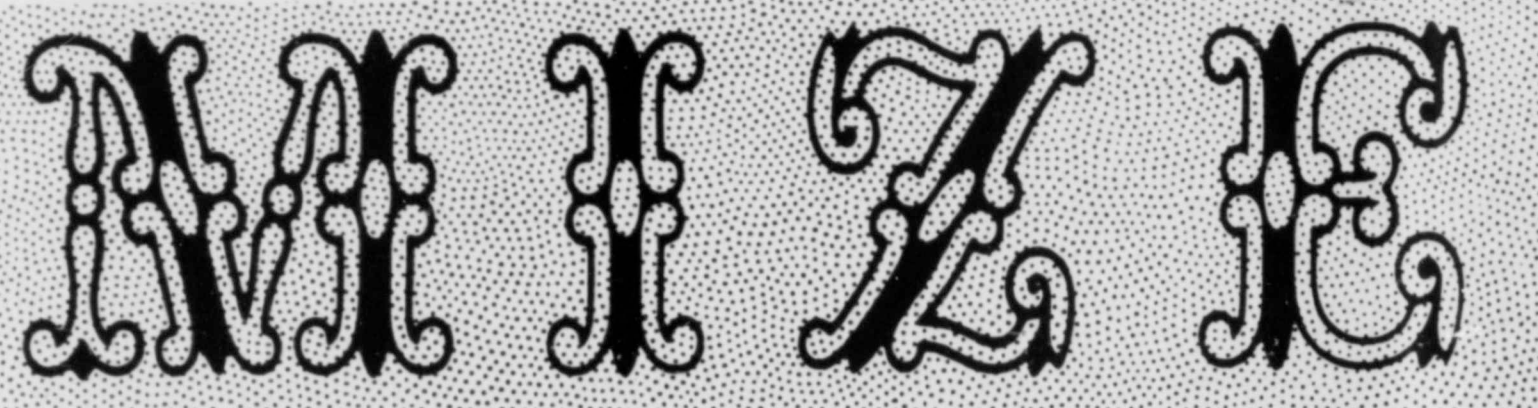

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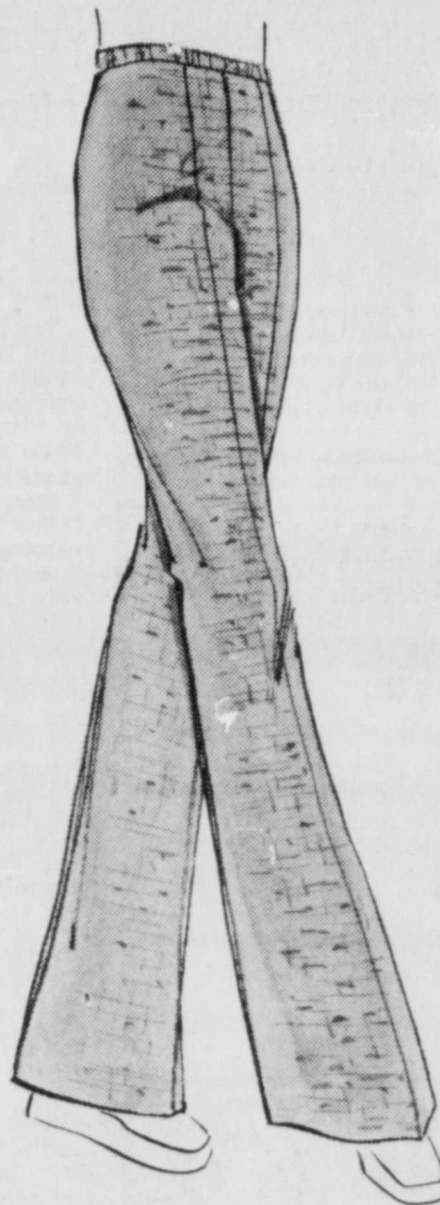

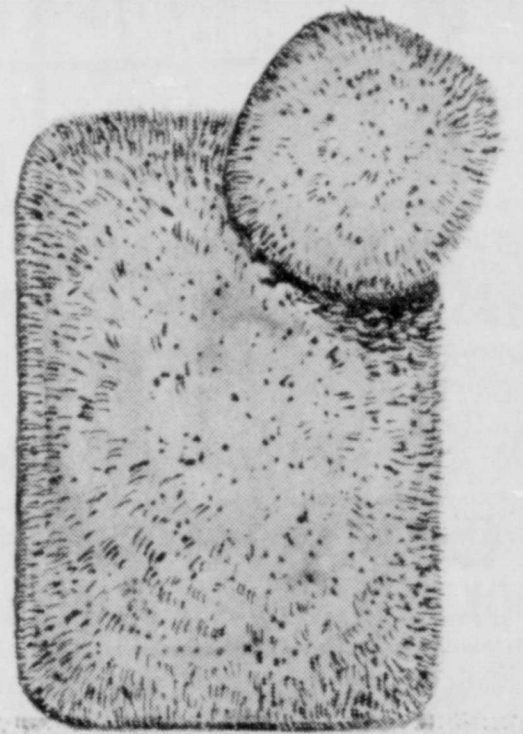

Plainview Farmer Says USDA Misled Cotton Farmers

Plainview farmer Frank Moore says cotton farmers were misled by the U.S. Department of Agriculture last spring when they were advised to plant more cotton. "The farmers followed recommendations of the USDA in the spring of this year and increased their acres of cotton considerably. Now they are blessed with a bumper crop but cursed by low prices. And after this recommendation had been followed by farmers, the Nixon Administration is doing nothing to relieve the disastrous price situation." The price on some cotton has dropped to 12 cents per pound since the record crop was announced.

Moore is co-chairman of Rural Texans for McGovern-Shriver. He said, "I see where Red Woodson, Farm Bureau president, is trying to talk Secretary Butz into authorizing a price support program for cottonseed. Not only is the price for cotton very low this year, but also, the price on seed is way down. Texas farmers are only receiving 52.6 percent parity on their cotton seed. This is a particular harsh blow because of the low price

of fiber this year." Moore said he thought farmers would be less likely to listen to the USDA in the future in light of the bad advice given on cotton and because of the wheat scandal. "They will certainly not want to listen to anyone in the Nixon administration for advice on their farms," Moore concluded.

Joining McCulloch in the entry field this week was defending World Super Stock champion Ken McLellen of Friona, Tex., who will pilot a Ford Mustang in search of his second straight World title.

More than 300 drivers in all are eligible to compete in this year's World Finals classic which will feature championships in Top Fuel, Funny Car, Pro Stock, Competition, Modified, Super Stock and Stock Eliminator categories.

The rich event, being held

for the second straight year at Amarillo Dragway, is slated to get underway Friday, October 20 with qualifying runs which will continue on Saturday, October 21 to reduce the overall entry field to the final runners in each category for the October 22 finale.

In the past nearly all cotton shipped under P.L. 480 has been under Title 1 of that law. This is a program in which foreign countries buy U. S. goods in their currencies. Under Title 2 of P. L. 480, all commodities are owned by the USDA's Commodity Credit Corp. The Title 2 program, which involved shipment of some \$350 million in commodities last year, is for such purposes as disaster relief and economic aid.

The 1972 High Plains cotton crop again is estimated at just under 2 million bales by the joint cotton estimates committee of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange.

The exact October estimate for 25 counties surrounding Lubbock came to 1,978,000 bales, 15,000 below the September 1 projection of 1,993,000 bales. Standing acreage was unchanged from September, at 2,494,500. The average per-acre yield indicated by the October estimate is therefore 381 pounds as compared to 383 pounds on September 1.

Committee spokesmen noted that weather conditions in the month of September were excellent for crop development, and there would have been cause for higher production expectations except for a high incidence of verticillium wilt in many areas and severe weed problems in others. Some fields on the Plains may not be harvested at all because of weeds, and Bill Gunter, member of the committee and District Extension Agent said there is more wilt on the Plains than ever before.

"So," said PCG Committee Chairman Joe D. Unfred of New Home, "the beneficial effects of good weather have been just about cancelled out by wilt and weeds."

The highest producing counties on the Plains, according to the estimate, will be Lubbock and Dawson, with a volume projection of 215,000 and 210,000 respectively. Some Dawson County observers are saying they may replace Lubbock County this year as the area's leading producer.

The most severe cut in county production from the September estimate shows up in Gaines County where the figure drop-

ped 30,000 bales from 180,000 to 150,000. Cotton plants in that county reported that after a re-assessment of all crop conditions, particularly fields with severe lems, "we think the lower figure is a little more realistic."

A good sized drop in estimated production was also reported by Dickens County, from a 23,000-bale guess last month to 18,000 bales now foreseen. Primary reason is given as the infestations in that area.

Unfred said value of the crop to the area economy is a question mark under currently declining market prices with anything like a reasonable price and if the quality is fairly good, its value should approach \$350 million in government payments.

The joint PCG-LCE committee will look again at the reports and issue revised estimates as of November 1, December 1.

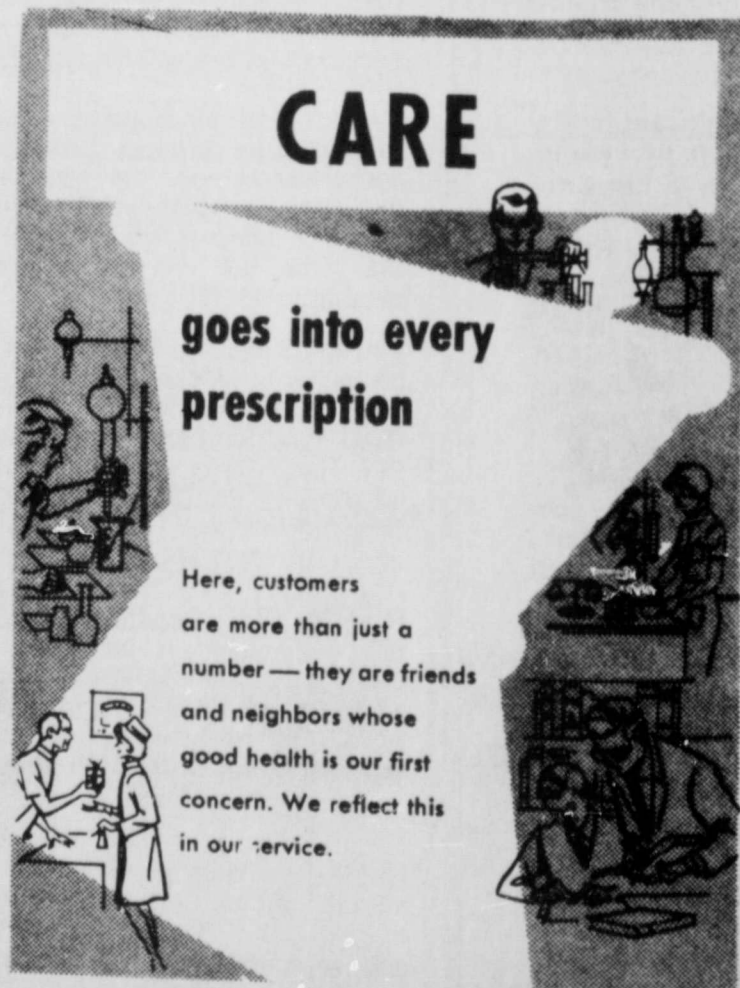



Application Made For 40 More Low-Rent Housing Units Good For Elderly People

Representatives of the Federal Housing Authority Bill Hale and Dale Goen met with the city council Monday night in regard to making application for 40 more low rent federal housing units for Floydada.

The council reaffirmed its approval for the units which was made in 1960 when application was made for the first 40 units that were built in 1962. Now the council will meet with the local Federal Housing Authority board and an architect at the bank community room at 10 a.m. Thursday. "We want every elderly person who thinks he or she might be interested in living in one of the low cost rent units to come into our office and so indicate to Raymond Williams," Hale told a Hesperian reporter Tuesday. "This will help our application being approved by government officials as we show how much interest there is in the 40 new units," he continued. The offices located at 302 E. Tennessee Street. There is no cost to the city for the units, as the money comes from the government and payout is through the rent arrangement.

The council approved his request to go across an alley with the fence.

At this point the council devoted about an hour to discussion of Pioneer Natural Gas Company's request to increase natural gas rates to the city's power plant some 20.8%. This does not include the home user of gas, but the city's electric power plant. It is estimated that the increase will amount to some \$12,000 over the next year.

Mayor Jimmy Seay questioned the rate going up 20.8%, while the company only increased Lubbock Power and Light's rate by 11.4%. It appears that Pioneer wants to make the new rate effective January 1, 1973. The council voted to allow the mayor to negotiate and sign a new contract. The council then appointed five Floydada citizens to the planning and zoning commission: Louis Anderson, Ray Gene Ferguson, Clinton Fyffe, Wayne Russell and Richard Burns.

The council devoted a considerable amount of time looking over a list of water customers who live outside the city limits.

The list included their new water rates as computed by city secretary Jimmie Lou Stewart. They decided that the rates were fair to all concerned.

Five insurance companies had submitted hospitalization insurance programs for the city's 30 employees and the council discussed these. The city pays for hospitalization for its employees, but the employee pays for his family's insurance. Companies submitting bids from Floydada included: Hale & Hale, Floydada Real Estate and Insurance, Baker Insurance Company, and Goen & Goen. Two Lubbock companies submitted bids: Sentry and Travelers Insurance. The council tabled decision until study could be made of the benefits under each program.

Scout troops 355 and 357 (about 30 boys) along with scoutmaster Wilson Bond attended the council meeting and received credit on their citizenship merit badge work.

All councilmen were present: Boone Adams, Johnny Bill Sue, Gayle Baumcum, Frank Goen and Ed Hammond.

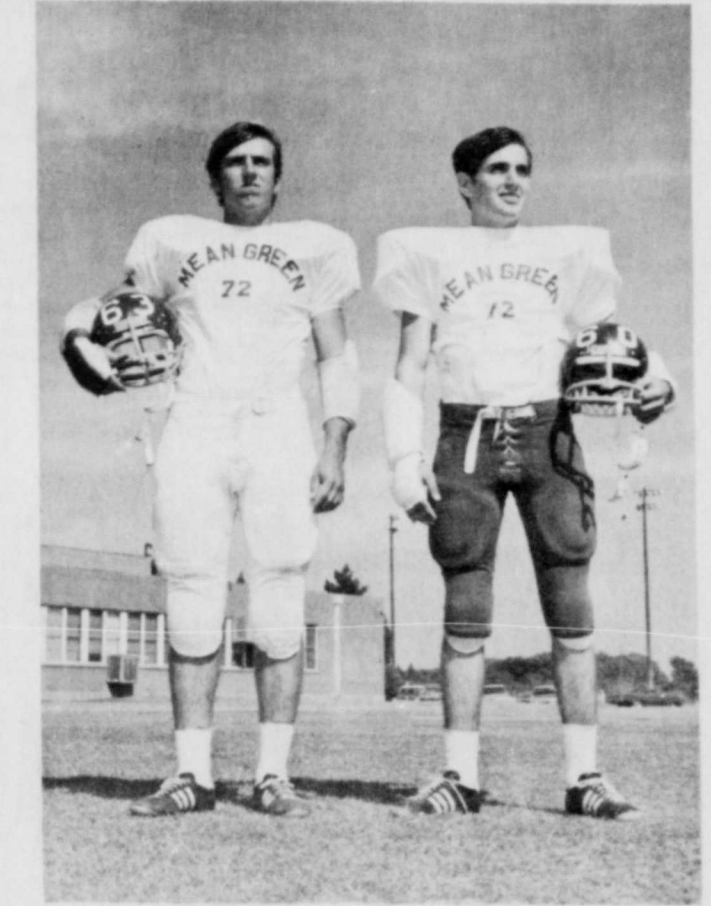
Junior halfback Sam Mitchell, a 150-pounder, may be one

Last week's "Revenge" victory over Littlefield "put the icing on the cake" for the Whirlwinds, and coaches and players feel the team can handle any situation, as the boys have "just the right amount of confidence."

Price Support Is Requested For Cottonseed

Texas Farm Bureau President J. T. (Red) Woodson has requested Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz to authorize a price support program for cottonseed to assist in the marketing of this year's crop.

Present farm legislation provides authority for such price supports, but the program is not now operative.

"Cotton producers are having problems with marketing their 1972 crop," Woodson wired Secretary Butz. "In addition to the depressed market for fiber, the price to farmers for cottonseed appears to be out of line when compared to the cost of cottonseed meal for livestock feed."

The president of the 130,000-

member farm organization urged Butz "to exercise your authority to offer a price support program for cottonseed to producers in order to provide more orderly marketing for the 1972 crop."

If the Secretary decides to provide supports for this commodity, he is required by law to set the price support at a level that is competitive with other oilseed crops.

Texas cotton farmers received an average of \$44 per ton for their cottonseed in late September, according to the USDA. This amounts to 52.6 per cent of parity.

Orderly Grain Marketing Is Encouraged

"Orderly marketing" works. By spreading the sales of grain throughout the year, farmers are able to take advantage of the highs in the market, and average these with what they sell during the lower price season. Grain Sorghum Producers Association encouraged farmers in 1971 to practice "orderly marketing." A majority of farmers followed this advice. As soon as they started this practice, the market price decline stopped and prices have remained fairly stable since. Now that market prices are higher, farmers are reaping the benefits.

There is much concern at the present time whether or not to sell while market prices are high, or to hold for even higher prices. No one will ever be able

to sell all his grain on the peak market every year. Conditions and attitudes change from one year to the next, so the peak seasons do not always come at the same time each year.

"We believe that following the practice of distributing the sale of grain throughout the year will help to average out the highs and lows. This way farmers will not be hurt too badly by selling at the wrong time," stated Elbert Harp, GSPA executive director.

GSPA encourages "ORDERLY MARKETING"—selling some grain at harvest time, but scattering the bulk of the sales throughout the entire year. This is why we continue to work for a decent government loan program that will allow farmers the advantage of holding their grain until they can reap the benefits of market price increases.

GSPA Asks USDA To Continue 1972 Present Level Of Feed Grain Set Aside For 1973

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association has appealed to Secretary Butz to retain the 1972 level of set-aside. Fear that the increased grain sales to Russia and other buyers would cause the USDA to reduce too many 1973 set-aside acres, thus again resulting in grain surplus and low market prices, is the reason for the GSPA concern.

In a letter to Secretary Butz, GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp says, "The tendency may be to reduce the set-aside program. However, we urge you to consider all the facts

before making such a decision. We oppose such a cut-back because it would create another surplus and, by so doing, would cause an extreme hardship on American farmers."

Harp justified his request by adding, "Recent cost of production studies have shown that American farmers cannot afford a price decline, as few are barely breaking even with prices at the present level."

"We strongly appeal to you not to allow a repeat of the 1967 and 1971 grain surpluses," Harp concluded.

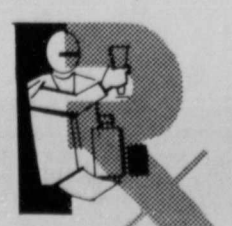
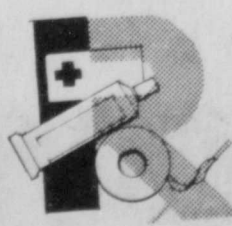


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SOUTH PLAINS NEWS by Mrs. Murray Julian

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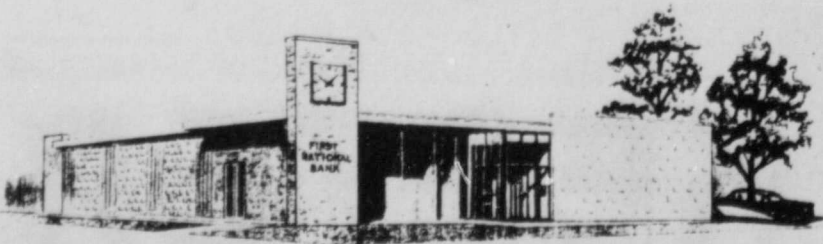
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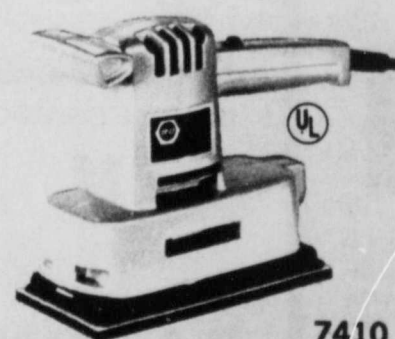
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Farm Bureaus Honor Congressman George Mahon

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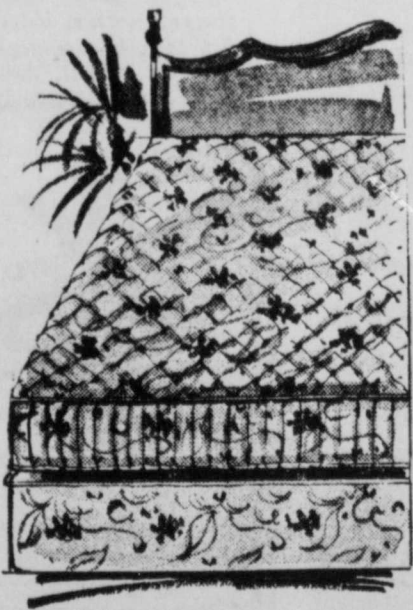

Plainview Farmer Says USDA Misled Cotton Farmers

Plainview farmer Frank Moore says cotton farmers were misled by the U.S. Department of Agriculture last spring when they were advised to plant more cotton. "The farmers followed recommendations of the USDA in the spring of this year and increased their acres of cotton considerably. Now they are blessed with a bumper crop but cursed by low prices. And after this recommendation had been followed by farmers, the Nixon Administration is doing nothing to relieve the disastrous price situation." The price on some cotton has dropped to 12 cents per pound since the record crop was announced.

Moore is co-chairman of Rural Texans for McGovern-Shriver. He said, "I see where Red Woodson, Farm Bureau president, is trying to talk Secretary Butz into authorizing a price support program for cottonseed. Not only is the price for cotton very low this year, but also, the price on seed is way down. Texas farmers are only receiving 52.6 percent parity on their cotton seed. This is a particular harsh blow because of the low price

of fiber this year." Moore said he thought farmers would be less likely to listen to the USDA in the future in light of the bad advice given on cotton and because of the

wheat scandal. "They will certainly not want to listen to anyone in the Nixon administration for advice on their farms," Moore concluded.

Bureau Wants to Move Cotton Into Export

Texas Farm Bureau J. T. (Red) Stearns, chairman of the federal government move cotton into export markets.

In the past nearly all cotton shipped under P.L. 480 has been under Title I of that law. This is a program in which foreign countries buy U. S. goods in their currencies. The United States then uses the money to pay its bills in those countries - bills associated with common defense efforts, expenses of U.S. embassies, etc.

Under Title 2 of P. L. 480, all commodities are owned by the USDA's Commodity Credit Corp. The Title 2 program, which involved shipment of some \$350 million in commodities last year, is for such purposes as disaster relief and economic aid.

The 1972 High Plains cotton crop again is estimated at just under 2 million bales by the joint cotton estimates committee of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange.

The exact October estimate for 25 counties surrounding Lubbock came to 1,978,000 bales, 15,000 below the September 1 projection of 1,993,000 bales. Standing acreage was unchanged from September, at 2,494,500. The average per-acre yield indicated by the October estimate is therefore 381 pounds as compared to 383 pounds on September 1.

Committee spokesmen noted that weather conditions in the month of September were excellent for crop development, and there would have been cause for higher production expectations except for a high incidence of verticillium wilt in many areas and severe weed problems in others. Some fields on the Plains may not be harvested at all because of weeds, and Bill Gunter, member of the committee and District Extension Agent said there is more wilt on the Plains than ever before.

"So," said PCG Committee Chairman Joe D. Unfred of New Home, "the beneficial effects of good weather have been just about cancelled out by wilt and weeds."

The highest producing counties on the Plains, according to the estimate, will be Lubbock and Dawson, with a volume projection of 215,000 and 210,000 respectively. Some Dawson County observers are saying they may replace Lubbock County this year as the area's leading producer.

The most severe cut in county production from the September estimate shows up in Gaines County where the figure dropped

30,000 bales from 180,000 to 150,000. Cotton plants in that county reported that after a re-assessment of all crop conditions, particularly fields with stem problems, "we think the lower figure is a little more realistic."

A good sized drop in estimated production was reported in Dickens County, from a 23,000-bale guess last year to 18,000 bales now foreseen. Primary reason is given as insect infestations in that area.

Unfred said value of the crop to the area economy is a question mark under currently declining market prices with anything like a reasonable price and if the government is fairly good, its value should approach \$350 million.

The joint PCG-LCE committee will look again at the prospects and issue revised estimates as of November 1.


