## Cogdell Clinic Dedication Sunday

The dedication ceremony for the new open house for the clinic are scheduled for Sunday afternoon from 2 to 5 p.m. at the Cogdell Clinic. The recently-completed building, already in use by the Floydada doctors, was built by the people of the area. The Caprock Hospital is on behalf of the Ann Cogdell Hospital trust was created by the family of Martha Ann Cogdell who passed away at the age of 13. The walls, secretary of the hospital district of directors, will be guests to the ceremonies Sunday, after which Robert A. Williams, Caprock Hospital administrator, will discuss the physical makeup and functions of the clinic and its relationship with the hospital. Jay S. Hale, Jr., Caprock board of directors president, will make a special presentation, and C. B. Melton will give a dedicatory prayer. The dedication ceremonies will be followed by the informal open house.

The overall size of the clinic is 5,760 square feet. The building is of masonry and brick construction, with four suites for four doctors. Each suite has one nursing room, an office area and four examining rooms. There is a central reception and visitor area for all suites. Raymond Powell is the building's architect and Bill Averett is the building contractor. Both are from Lubbock. The Caprock Board will host the dedication. The hospital board controls the building, but has nothing to do with the private practices of the doctors who practice in the clinic. The board acts only as "landlord" of the building.

# 'Winds, Childress In Regional Grid Battle

...from the 'Wind Cheerleaders... Higher and higher up that ladder we are climbing — going straight to the top. We are playing the Number 1 team but that only gives us that much to work for. ## Bobcats Ranked High

The Floydada Whirlwinds, in quest of a regional championship, must take on the number-one-ranked AA team in the state Friday when they meet the Childress Bobcats in Plainview's Bulldog Stadium. The Bobcats bring a perfect 11-0 record to the contest, while the 'Winds stand 10-0-1. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. Floydada fans will occupy the east-side seats, as Childress won the toss for home-team designation last Saturday.

The Whirlwinds feel that, physically, they can stay with the top-ranked Bobcats. The teams are about equal in size, according to head coach L. G. Wilson, and he thinks the 'Winds have everything Childress has — a well-balanced team with quickness and experience.

Both teams exhibit balanced running — passing — kicking games, and both teams' offensive and defensive lines are quick off the ball.

Wilson described the Childress defense as a "swarming, aggressive type of defense that will really get with you and try to cause the big mistake or the bad play." The Bobcat defense has allowed 59 points in eleven games this year, 19 of those to 2-A champion Clarendon in the season opener. Childress has shut out four teams — Wellington (62-0), Stamford (16-0), Quanah (20-0) and Panhandle (37-0 in bi-district).

The Whirlwinds have five shutout games on the 1972 ledger, two against Littlefield (3-0 in a non-conference game and 7-0 in last week's bi-district tilt). The 'Winds blanked Levelland (21-0), Ralls (28-0) and Abernathy (35-0). The Floydada defense has given up 64 points during the season.

The Bobcat quarterback, Turk Nelson, has a reputation as a good passer and a tough, aggressive, competitive player. Nelson was the starting quarterback for the Bobcats in 1971. The 5-9, 160-pound senior field general gained over 100 yards rushing against Panhandle last Friday in the bi-district playoff, including a 61-yard touchdown carry.

Halfback Larry Johnson, another 100-yard-plus performer against Panhandle, was a starter last year for the 'Cats. The Hesperian has no information on Johnson's rushing yardage total in '72, but he owned two 1,000-yard seasons before this campaign.

Jerry Neel (5-10, 155) is a dangerous receiver for Nelson's passes. The Bobcats, according to Floydada Coach Wilson, are primarily a running team, but can throw when they need to.

Big man on the Childress defense is Tim Lewellen, a 6-foot-2, 205-pound tackle.

Floydada should be in "pretty good" physical shape for the regional contest. Only injury to a Whirlwind in the Littlefield game was to halfback Jerry Hearon, who turned an ankle on the carry that got the 'Winds their penetration in the fourth quarter. Hearon will probably be ready to play Friday, Wilson said.

It will be the Whirlwinds' second trip to the regional playoffs since Wilson took over the reins in 1968. The 'Winds lost 36-6 to powerful Iowa Park, eventual state champions, in the 1969 regional game, also played in Plainview.

In previous Floydada-Childress games, the Bobcats own a 3-2 series edge. Childress defeated the 'Winds in the 1952 regional playoffs, 32-0. The teams are even in regular-season play, each with two victories. Childress bested the Whirlwinds 30-19 in 1962 and 7-6 in '63, but the 'Winds came back with victories in 1964 (21-7) and '65 (26-0).

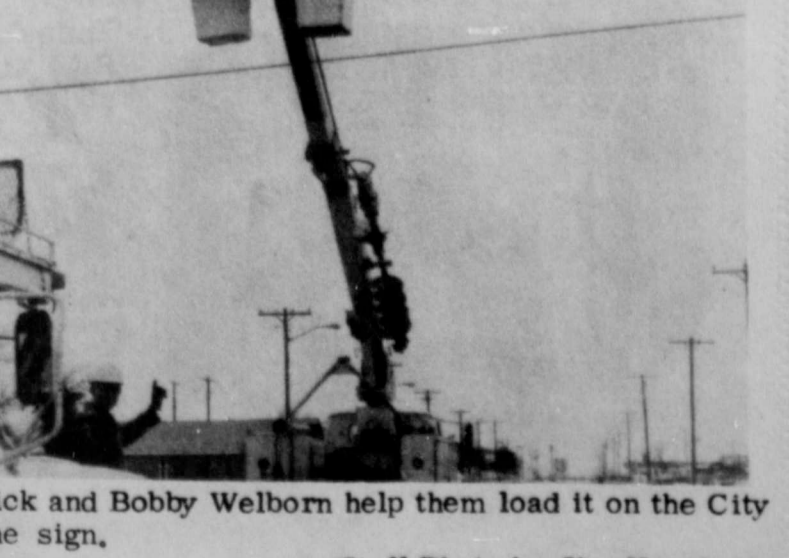

**Chocolate Chip Steamed Pudding**  
1 1/2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips  
1/2 cup water  
2 eggs  
1 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 3/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar  
3/4 cup water

Melt chocolate chips with 1/2 cup water in top of double boiler over simmering water; stir to blend well.

Beat eggs until foamy on medium speed of mixer, gradually add sugar. Blend in chocolate mixture and vanilla. Combine flour, salt, baking soda and cream of tartar. On low speed of mixer add dry ingredients alternately with 2/3 cup water, beating just until combined. Pour into a generously greased and sugared (granulated) 5 or 6-cup mold or heat-proof bowl, filling about 3/4 full. Cover mold loosely with waxed paper or aluminum foil and tie securely around edge with string. Place a rack in a large kettle or saucepan; pour water into kettle to top of rack. Bring water to boil; place mold on rack. Cover kettle and steam over simmering water about 2 hours and 15 minutes. (Additional water may be needed.) Remove from heat, cool 10 minutes, remove cover and unmold onto a serving tray. Cut into wedges, serve warm with whipped cream and cherry sauce.

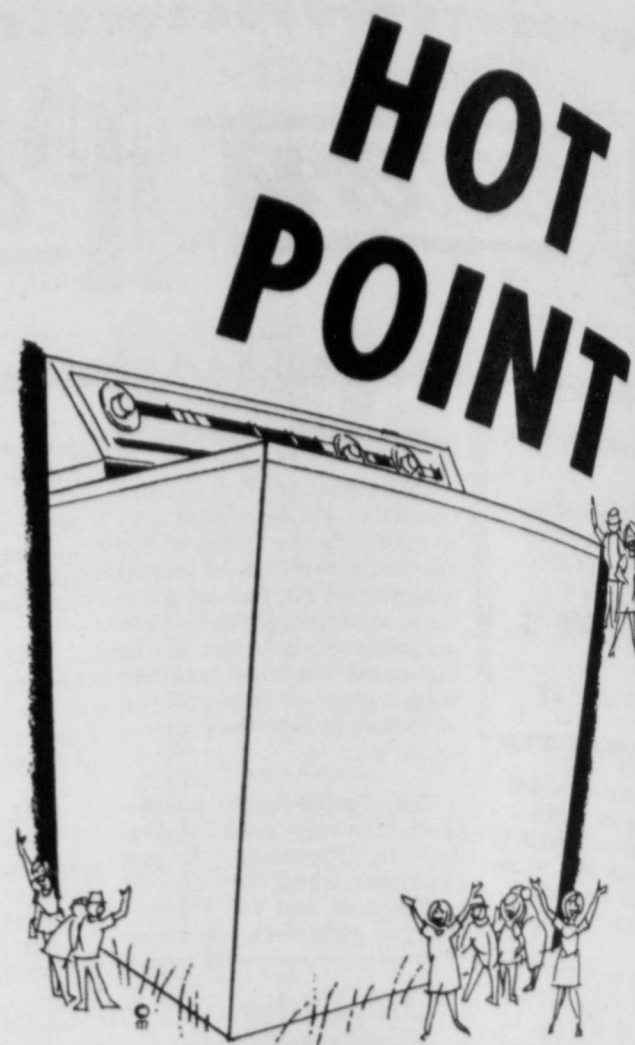

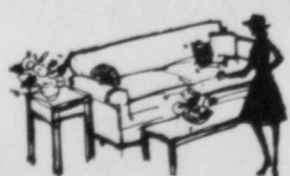

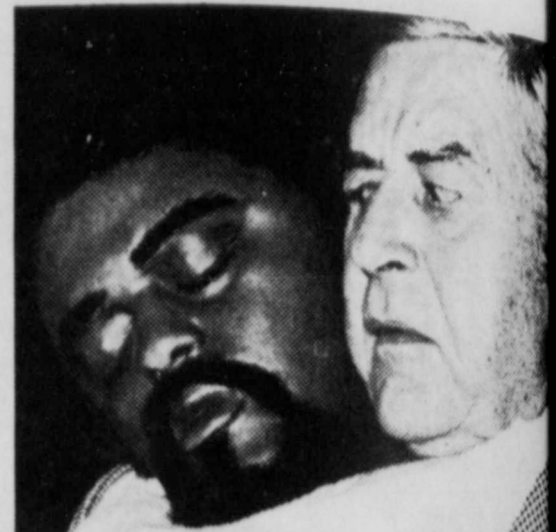

## A Brother's Eye View of the March of Dimes Poster Girl

YOU CAN see for yourself that Paula Pfeifer's big brother, Patrick, is serious and protective toward his sister, the 1973 March of Dimes Poster Child. Paula, 5, was born with open spine, club feet and water on the brain. Her birth defects are under control, thanks in part to the efforts of the March of Dimes.

"My little sister is famous," says Patrick Pfeifer, 8, of Tulsa, Okla.

Patrick is right. Paula Pfeifer, who will be six years old on January 21, is 1973 Poster Child for the March of Dimes. With the honor comes the duty of representing at meetings all over the United States some 15 million Americans who suffer from birth defects.

Some people think that Paula, who suffers from open spine (spina bifida), water on the brain (hydrocephalus), and club feet, was chosen by a group of experts, but Patrick knows otherwise.

"I'm the one who decided she should be poster child," he told a reporter recently. "My mom is in the Mothers' March every year. She gets all the neighbors to give to the March of Dimes so they can help kids like Paula."

Says O.K.

Patrick's parents explained that Paula and her mother, Georgia, would have to travel all over the country to tell people about birth defects and the work of The National Foundation-March of Dimes.

"You'll have to stay home and go to school," Mrs. Pfeifer told him. "and help daddy take care of the house."

After giving the matter due consideration, Patrick decided in favor of Paula's becoming famous. "Okay," he announced. "She can go."

But there are drawbacks to any decision, Patrick has learned. "Dad and I have a lot of

work to do when they are away," he reports, "like dishes and cooking and stuff. Last time they took a trip, we re-finished the kitchen cabinets." However, there is a brighter side.

"We eat out a lot," Patrick confides, "whatever we want: pizza, ice cream, potato chips, sundaes, just about anything." You get the feeling that Patrick is really kind of proud of Paula.

"She's awful smart for a kid her age," he concedes. "And brave, too. Did you know she's had nine operations? She's going to kindergarten now at my school. Do you like baseball?"

A third-grader at Grimes Public School, Patrick is an avid Little Leaguer. On balance, he thinks letting Paula become national poster girl was a good idea.

"I like the March of Dimes," he says, "and I'm glad lots of people are getting to know Paula and seeing that having birth defects is something a person can stand."

He glanced at the kitchen clock and added abruptly: "You'll have to excuse me now." With that he was out the back door carrying a bat and glove and a look of determination appropriate to a decision-maker.

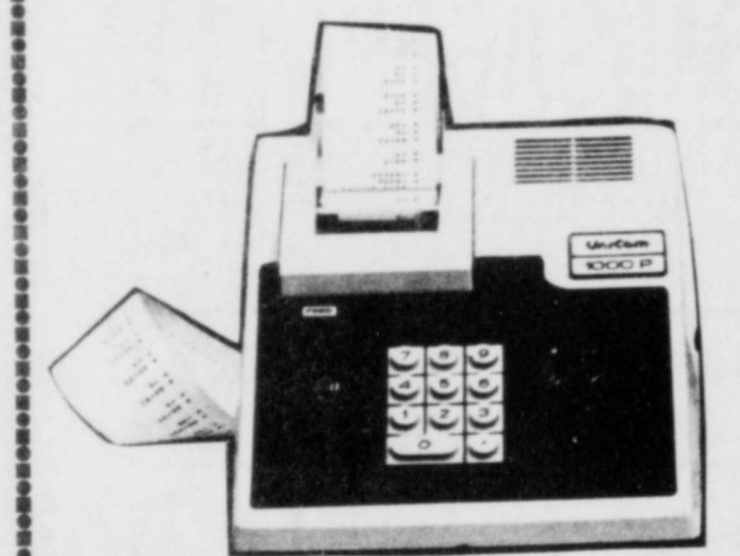

McClure, in speaking to schools in Texas this year, has traveled some 17,000 miles and says he will probably cover about 60,000 miles by the end of the year.

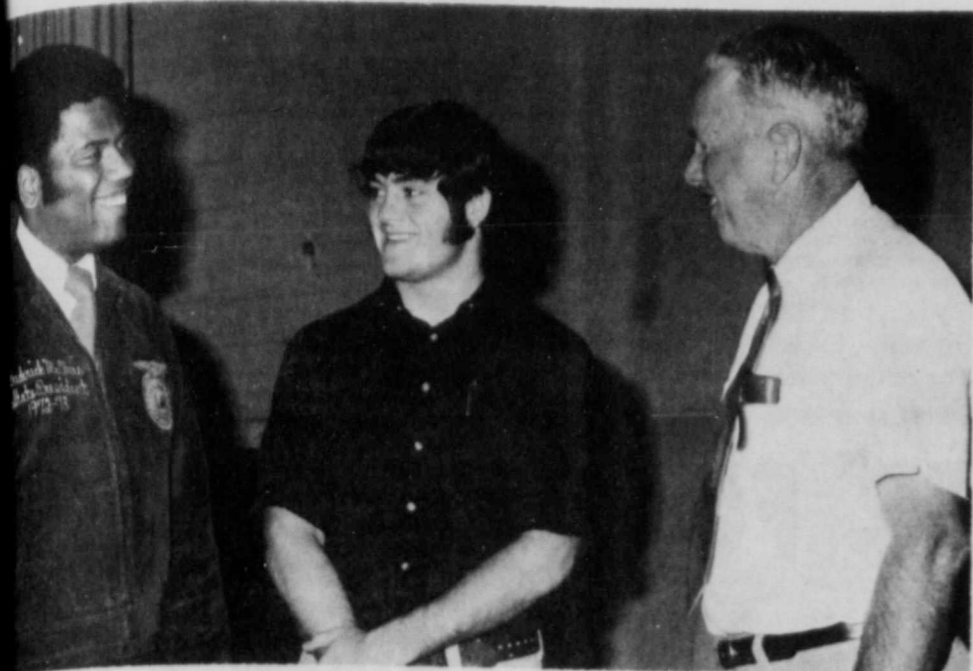
The state president of the Future Farmers, from San Augustine, says he plans to attend Texas Tech or A&M next fall and major in bio-chemistry.

### Questions and Answers



**Q. I was in a bad automobile accident and was laid up for 3 months with serious bone fractures. Since I had no earnings during this period, could I collect social security disability benefits?**

**A. No, monthly social security disability benefits can be paid only for a severe disability that is expected to last a year or longer. Monthly payments may start**

with the seventh month of disability. In addition, the disability must be so severe that it makes it impossible for the worker to engage in any substantial gainful activity.

**Q. I will be getting married this month. Since I will be protected as the wife of a worker covered by social security, why do I have to contribute?**

A. When you are ready to retire, you might qualify for higher cash benefits based on your own eligibility and earnings record. During your working years, you and your children could receive disability benefits based on your work record. And, if you should die while your children are still young, they could receive monthly survivors benefits based on your record.

**A. No. Checks for your family will be figured on your unreduced amount.**

**Q. I just recently retired. Last month I got my first monthly social security check and I'm not satisfied that the amount of my check is correct. What should I do?**

**A. As a first step, talk to the people in your social security office. They may be able to explain to your satisfaction why your monthly payment is the amount it is. If not, they can help you request a review, the first step in an appeals process that is open to you if you don't think the decision is correct.**

Dear Mr. Tooley:

My sister and I were surprised and slightly embittered at reading in your October 8 issue that the "Daily Hotel" was Floydada's first. We had an impulsive desire to write a correction but, came to the conclusion that few people, living in Floydada today, would be interested in early-day hotels.

Then, corrections began coming in — Mr. Lackey, Mr. Mark Martin, Mr. Ed Muncy, Mr. Lee Howard and Mrs. E. P. Nelson — Mr. Martin the only one thoughtful enough to mention our mother's hotel. As the controversy grew and you asked for more information, we could resist no longer.

"The Daily Hotel" was not Floydada's first, second nor third, in fact, it was the town's fourth — unless there were others before those mentioned in the paper.

Encouraged by relatives at Plainview, our mother, Mrs. Virginia Viles, with three young daughters, came to West Texas in 1907 or 1908, (our father having died in 1906) and decided to build a hotel — Floydada's third — "The Viles House."

Coming from a wooded, swampy and often river-flooded section of east Texas, the vast High Plains made a lasting imprint on us. It was a treeless, flat land of high grass with grazing white-faced cattle and whirling windmills — something we had never seen before.

We stayed at Mrs. Owen's hotel until our place was ready for occupancy, and remember Mrs. Owen, (later known as "Ma Mitchell") as a very kind person — kind enough to send our mother her overflow of business.

Soon there was business for all. There was no railroad and travel was slow — people coming across-country were glad for a few days rest. The mail hack came through twice a week, bringing passengers along with the mail. Traveling salesmen always had to make a layover and liked our mother's cooking — and, of course, there were the cowboys.

Floydada was our home. Here, my sisters and I grew up — going to school, attending church and making friends.

This account is written in memory of our mother. We feel she should be recognized as one of Floydada's hard-working, pioneer business women. We are quite sure our older sister would endorse this, were she living close.

A POLITICAL CANDIDATE in Arkansas published this advertisement after losing a hard-fought race:

"In my campaigning I lost four months and 20 days canvassing; lost 1360 hours of sleep thinking about the election; lost 40 acres of corn and a whole lot of sweet potatoes; lost two front teeth and a whole lot of hair in a personal encounter with an opponent; donated one beef, four shoats and five sheep to barbecues; gave away two pairs of suspenders and five calico dresses; five dolls and 15 baby rattles; kissed 126 babies; kindled 14 kitchen fires, put up eight stoves, cut 495 bundles of fodder, walked 4,065 miles, shook hands 9,080 times, told 10,000 lies and talked enough to make 10,000 volumes; attended 27 revivals; was baptized four times by immersion and twice by sprinkling; contributed \$15 to foreign missions, got dog bit 39 times and then lost the election."

The ad didn't mention it, but he probably failed to mention the issues.

Principal speaker was Dr. Anson R. Bertrand, dean of Agricultural Sciences at Texas Tech University. Dr. H. O. Kunkel, dean of Agriculture, Texas A&M University, was scheduled to speak but weather conditions prevented his arrival.

Several outstanding youths participated in the program. Carla Wilke, Lynn County 4-H member, gave the invocation and Pam Trimble, 4-H member from Lubbock County, responded to a welcome by Lyle Robinson, manager of Swisher County Electric Cooperative, Tulia, Texas. Ed Wilkes, farm director of KFYO Radio in Lubbock, was master of ceremonies for the event.

At the conclusion of the two-hour ceremony, the audience stood to honor the 4-H pledge led by Nancy Cook, Garza County 4-H member. For the honorees, it was perhaps fitting that they should reaffirm the pledge "To Make The Best Better," the motto that helped them achieve the Gold Star.

You can talk about scenic foliage tours in Colorado and along the Canadian River, but for a period during the fall there are some sights in the Caprock area that will rival many of these. Sometimes you can't get the real significance from the roads when you are driving through, but all up and down the rivers and creeks there's a profusion of color that is beautiful in anyone's book. The golden hues of the massive cottonwoods intermingled with the vivid colors of the smaller trees along the bottoms all blend together to present an inspiring sight. We'd like to see Otto Stubbs or some other good western artist capture this on canvas, for it is a LITTLE KNOWN splash of fall beauty that is unique to our colorful Caprock country."

# More Schooling Floyd County

NEW YORK, Nov. 25 — From a dollars and cents point of view, what is the value of a high school education to a young man in Floyd County? The answer is "plenty."

It is worth it to him, because it increases his earning potential and lifetime earnings through high school graduation.

The strength of national studies conducted by the Department of Commerce, the North Institute of the University of Michigan and the University of Wisconsin figures show that there is a connection between education and income. With each year in school the person's earning potential rises considerably.

Recently, that fact has been demonstrated with the young men in the local area. They are staying in school longer.

Latest figures show that 25 percent of the county residents, by the age of 25, now have a high school diploma, up from 10.9 years of formal education, which is more than the national average of 10.1 years acquired ten years ago. The median then was 10.1 years.

As detailed by the Department of Commerce, some 60 percent of the male population in the local area and 70 percent of the female, age 18 and over, are high school graduates.

As a bigger proportion of the population is found in many parts of the country, the increase in the amount of schooling being obtained in Floyd County, compared with the national average, is 7.9 percent.

How much more this education is producing at the time, financially, is indicated by the general

findings. They show that the median income being received by a man who has attended college for four years is approximately 45 percent greater than is paid to a high school graduate.

The high school graduate, in turn, has a 27 percent advantage over one who has no more than an elementary school diploma. For those who did not finish elementary school, the wage scale is 26 percent lower, on average.

Because elementary and secondary schools in the United States are handling more pupils, necessitating bigger expenses for salaries, supplies and maintenance, their operating costs in the past year reached \$47 billion, which was 161 percent greater than ten years ago.

## Carthel Receives Farm Efficiency Award

Chester Carthel of Lockney, and 13 other top U.S. farmers have been named to the Ford Motor Company's Farm Efficiency Award for outstanding agricultural achievement.

Floyd County farmer, Chester Carthel, received notification by telegram from the Ford Motor Company. The FFEEA program is headed by Ford's Tractor and Equipment Operations — America, which will award winners next year at a banquet.

Carthel is one of the nationally selected winners of the award. He was selected by the National Farm Efficiency Award Editor and his staff. Carthel is an agricultural expert, and his selections on farm management have accomplished exceptional results.

Carthel grows between 700 acres of grain every year, and in 1971 he harvested over 7,500 bushels per acre. "We average 7,500 to 8,000 bushels per acre," he says.

Carthel raises over 600 acres of wheat, 450 acres of corn, and 30 to 40 acres

of alfalfa for seed. "When we can avoid hailstorms, we figure we can beat 50-bushel wheat per acre in an average year," said Mr. Carthel. "We made around 80 bushels per acre two years ago, but hail has hurt us the past two years."

He chooses sorghum varieties that are medium maturing and can stand drought stress well. This is especially important on some of his sloping land where water penetration is poorer.

Mr. Carthel credits his planting program with much of his sorghum yield success. He plants eight pounds of seed per

acre in two 10-inch spaced rows on top of a 40-inch bed. "This is about the same population as if we planted in a single row," he said, "but distribution is better which gives us more shading for water retention and also holds back weeds. On sloping land we get better water utilization because our plants are closer to the water furrow — not in the middle of the bed, 20 inches away from the water."

Mr. Carthel said water is one of the big concerns of the future and farmers in his area are starting to reclaim and recycle irrigation water. "We're going to need much better management to save and prolong our water supply," he said.

A Farm Bureau member, Mr. Carthel also belongs to his local marketing co-operative and is active in local church and Chamber of Commerce programs.

### Matador Goes To Bond Vote

MATADOR (Special) — Voters in the Matador school district and the former Roaring Springs and Flomot school districts will go to the polls Saturday to decide on a three-part maintenance tax and bond election.

Voting, which will continue from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m., will be in the Motley County Courthouse here, the Roaring Springs School library and the Flomot cafeteria.

Three propositions will be submitted to the voters: 1) the insurance of a maintenance tax at a rate not to exceed \$1.50 per \$100 valuation 2) issuance of bonds totalling \$450,000 for the construction of additional school facilities and 3) \$140,000 for construction of a new gymnasium.

Some \$25,000 has been included in proposition 2 for renovation of the existing gymnasium and will be used for such as proposition 2 passes and proposition 3 is defeated.

If proposition 2 and 3 are endorsed, bonds totalling only \$425,000 will be issued for proposition 2.

School officials held a series of meetings in the three towns during early November for discussion of the issues.

## High Plains Research Foundation Recommends Minimum Tillage

Incorporating a profitable minimum tillage operation into a High Plains farming program should begin as early as a year ahead of time, or at least

immediately following harvest the preceding fall, scientists at the High Plains Research Foundation advise.

In planning ahead one year where grain sorghum follows cotton, Foundation scientists recommend instead of disking in Treflan, farmers planning to utilize minimum tillage practice the following year should incorporate Treflan with the rolling cultivator. This will reduce the amount of residue carryover.

However, farmers, who did not apply heavy amounts of Treflan in cotton this year, may be in position to take advantage of the unusually wet field conditions which allows a more rapid deterioration of Treflan. Under these conditions, scientists at the Foundation believe that many High Plains farmers may be able to increase their income from next year's sorghum crop by reducing expenditures in unnecessary land preparation.

In the minimum tillage program, outlined by the Foundation, farmers are urged to chisel the water furrows 12 to 14 inches deep immediately after harvesting cotton. This tillage operation is recommended as soon after harvest as possible.

The chisel operation serves several purposes. It opens the ground to aid winter moisture penetration into the root zone and roughens ground surface to catch more snow during the winter. Soil erosion protection is afforded by cotton stubble and the roughened surface.

It is not necessary to shred cotton stalks after harvest unless the stalks are exceptionally tall and will disrupt future planting activities by becoming entangled in planter chains and gears.

If concerned about the amount of herbicide residues, farmers are urged to put soil samples in pots for indoor plantings of grain sorghum this winter.

During the winter, on minimum tillage acreage, farmers are urged to control winter weeds with a mechanical operation.

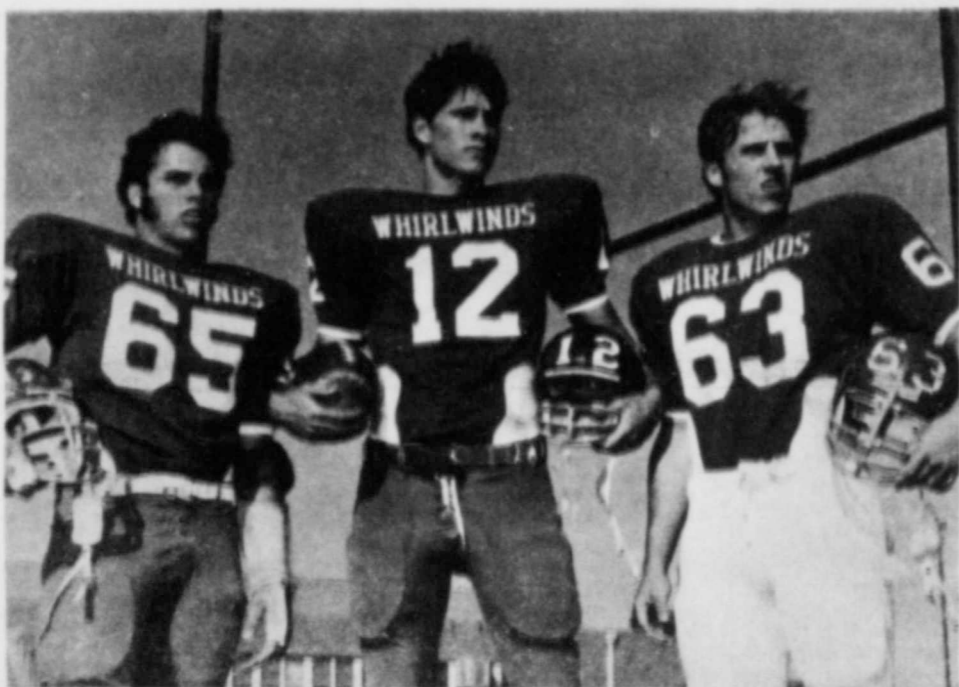
