

Big Turnout And Interest For Law Enforcement Meeting In Floydada

Over 200 people attended a meeting held in the Massie Center in Floydada Monday night and heard Floyd County Judge Turner and Sheriff Ingram explain that a centralized law enforcement program is being developed. Under the program, the city of Quanah and Hardeman County merged the law enforcement department and the sheriff's office and the force is under the jurisdiction of the sheriff. The city and county all over the state and nation, including Dallas, Lockney, and Floyd are looking at the centralized law enforcement as exemplified by the Texas county's "pilot program."

Mayor and Ingram, introduced by Floydada Mayor Jimmy Seay, gave brief reports of the program. The United States. Mayor said one of the recommendations for the program is the economy of law enforcement operation centralized under one sheriff, eliminating duplication of operation in the department and sheriff's office. He said in Hardeman County the city police officers were sworn in as sheriff's officers and all sheriff's office employees were given substantial raises, helping to attract personnel to law enforcement agencies. Mayor Seay offered better pay for Quanah and Hardeman County.

Mayor Seay and Lockney Mayor Claude Brown said the merger, the city force there numerous less patrolman, said, not including 24-hour radio service in Hardeman County, the

county pays 60 percent of the operation costs and the city of Quanah pays 40 percent. Corporation court is disbanded and all fines go to the county. The pilot operation received a \$72,000 grant from the Criminal Justice Department. Floyd County would be eligible for a similar grant, Turner noted.

Hardeman County received a 50 percent grant on the increase in salaries, a 50 percent grant on building a new detention center (to be matched by the county), plus grants for radio equipment, office furniture, supplies and car expense.

The Quanah-Hardeman system has an advisory board composed of one county commissioner, the county judge, the mayor of Quanah and one city councilman.

One of the main questions about the merger of the sheriff's office and police department is whether too much power is concentrated in the county sheriff. Ingram said under the centralized program the sheriff has the same power as before — he is an elected official with the same powers as a sheriff in any county.

Judge Turner summed up by saying "In the long run, considering the results obtained, I think combining the police department and sheriff's office has been a financial success. I know it has been an operational success."

Representatives from the Tulsa council were also present.

City Council Lets Fuel Contracts

The Floydada City Council opened bids for a year's supply of gasoline and diesel for its electrical plant and equipment at its regular monthly meeting Monday night. The gasoline and diesel approval went to Carthel Oil Company.

An uncontested bid to fix flats for the city's vehicles went to Crutchfield Tire Company.

In other business the council devoted a considerable amount of time visiting with Lawrence Stovall, distribution superintendent. Stovall reported that two or three of the big electrical power engines were being repaired on an emergency basis as gins began production around the clock last weekend.

The council decided to devote needed manpower and money to keeping the engines in full production, especially now when the city's four gins are beginning to operate around the clock.

Stovall also cited a problem of natural gas supply being curtailed 50% and switching the engines over to diesel fuel, which is much more expensive than natural gas. Stovall said Plainview giners had problems in running their drying machines as gas supply was also cut there.

The council hastily tabled remodeling of the city hall, expansion of a warehouse for truck service, a purchase of some nearby lots and purchase of a tar pot on two wheels for street repair.

Two members of the Primitive Baptist Church, Jim Jackson and L. L. Nixon Sr., attended a public hearing on rezoning classification change for the south one-half of Block 13, Texas Addition. They said they had no objections to the zone change, but were curious about the new duplexes that were to be built across the street from their church and the hospital.

Mayor Jimmy Seay assured the men that the duplexes would be modern in every respect and a progressive step for the housing needs of this community.

The council also discussed a contract that had been submitted to the County Commissioners Court for joint upkeep of the dump grounds, to be effective January 15, 1972.

All councilmen were present except Ed Hammond.

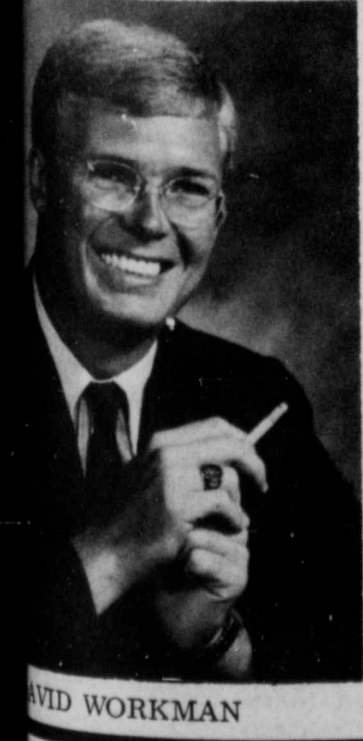

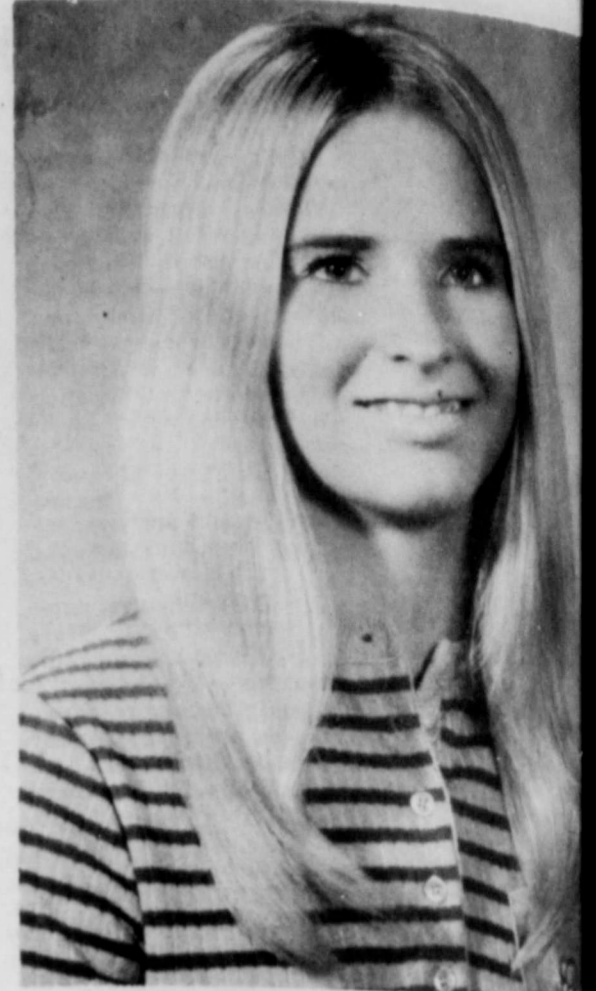

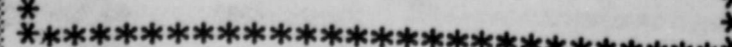

Shoppers Warned About Yuletide Thieves

Christmas shoppers were warned today to "Lock them up or lose them."

"Every day hundreds of Christmas shoppers in Texas are victimized by thieves who steal Christmas packages from parked cars, and sometimes the car itself," said C. C. Benson, manager of the southwestern division of the National Automobile Theft Bureau (NATB).

"Careless shoppers make it easy for the thieves by leaving their packages in clear view in the car, and often don't even bother to lock the car. They evidently believe that thieves take a holiday during the Christmas season, but soon find out that thieves instead are at their busiest."

Therefore, the NATB urges Texas motorists to always take these precautions while shopping:

*Don't leave packages or other possessions on the seats or the floor of your parked car. Put them in the trunk.

Roll your windows up tight, and lock your car doors.

*Don't forget to remove your ignition key when you remove yourself from your parked auto — even for a moment.

*Don't park your car in a remote or dimly lit spot.

Cattle Scabies Meet At Tulia

The House Interim Study Committee, investigating the Scabies Eradication Program, will hold a public hearing at 7:30 p.m. Thursday at the Swisher County Electric Co-operative building in Tulia.

Rep. Bryan Poff of Amarillo, chairman of the committee, said the hearing, the last scheduled for the Panhandle, is designed to give cattle raisers and other interested persons an opportunity to air their complaints and propose alternate means of controlling the disease.

"It is essential that as many persons as possible attend the meeting, so the committee can get the proper perspective," Poff noted. About 40 persons attended the first hearing, which was held in Dumas,

presenting almost three hours of testimony.

Many of the witnesses heard in Dumas asked that the Animal Health Commission's regulations be expanded to include spray dipping for the Scabies Eradication Program, citing examples of the spray machines' effectiveness, according to Poff.

"We are particularly interested in hearing testimony regarding the merits and demerits of spraying cattle as opposed to the full immersion procedure, as is now required," Poff said.

State Rep.-elect Pete Laney of Hale Center will host the hearing and sit with the committee. Committee members include Reps. Phil Cates of Pampa, Tom Christian of

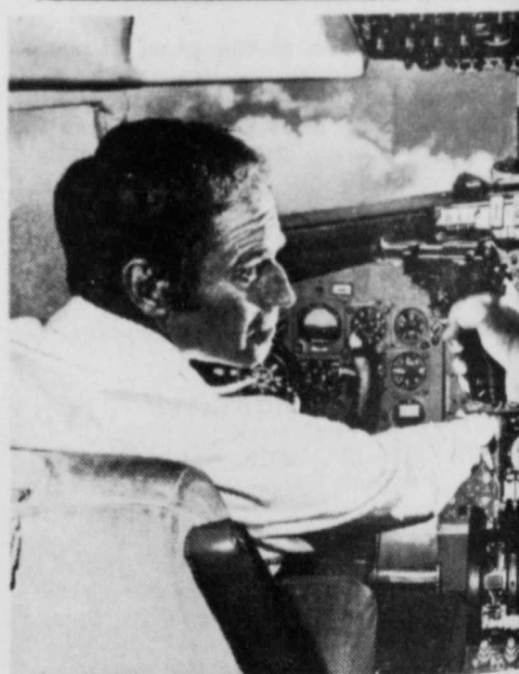

Cotton Harvest Gains Momentum

With Plains cotton continuing to gain momentum last week and is expected to reach a peak in the next few days. W. K. Palmer in the USDA Cotton Office in Lubbock. The USDA cotton offices at Lubbock, Lamesa and Levellville are processing approximately 100 bales daily during the week ending Friday, December 8 and classed from 142,000 bales per week. This brought the total for the four weeks to 540,000. The date last year only 400,000 bales were classed. The cotton classed at the Lubbock office were 100,000 bales in those of the week. Strict Low Miding (41) was the predominant making up 23 percent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Miding (51) made up 21 percent and Strict Low Miding (42) 17 percent.

Spotted (43) 10 percent. Average staple length was also lower than that of the previous week. Slightly over one-half of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week had staple lengths of 31 and shorter. The previous week 41 percent stapled 31 and shorter. Micronaire readings also were lower. Thirty-two percent of all cotton classed at Lubbock during the week had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 through 4.9, 18 percent "miked" 3.3 through 3.4, 32 percent was 3.0 through 3.2, 16 percent 2.7 through 2.9 and 2 percent was 2.6 and below. The Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA reported brisk trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were slightly higher on the better quality cotton but were lower on cotton with micronaire of 2.9 and lower. Prices ranged from \$2.50 per bale over the loan for cotton with micronaire of 2.9 and lower to \$35.00 per bale over the loan for high grade, premium micronaire cotton.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronaire range were: Strict Low Midding (41) staple 31-23.55 cents per pound, Strict Low Midding (41) staple 32 - 24.75, Low Midding (51) staple (31) - 21.50, Low Midding (51) staple 32 - 22.45, Strict Low Midding Light Spotted (42) staple 31 - 22.25 and Strict Low Midding Light Spotted (42) staple 32 - 22.45. Cottonseed prices were steady and farmers received \$44 to \$56 per ton for their cottonseed at gins.
