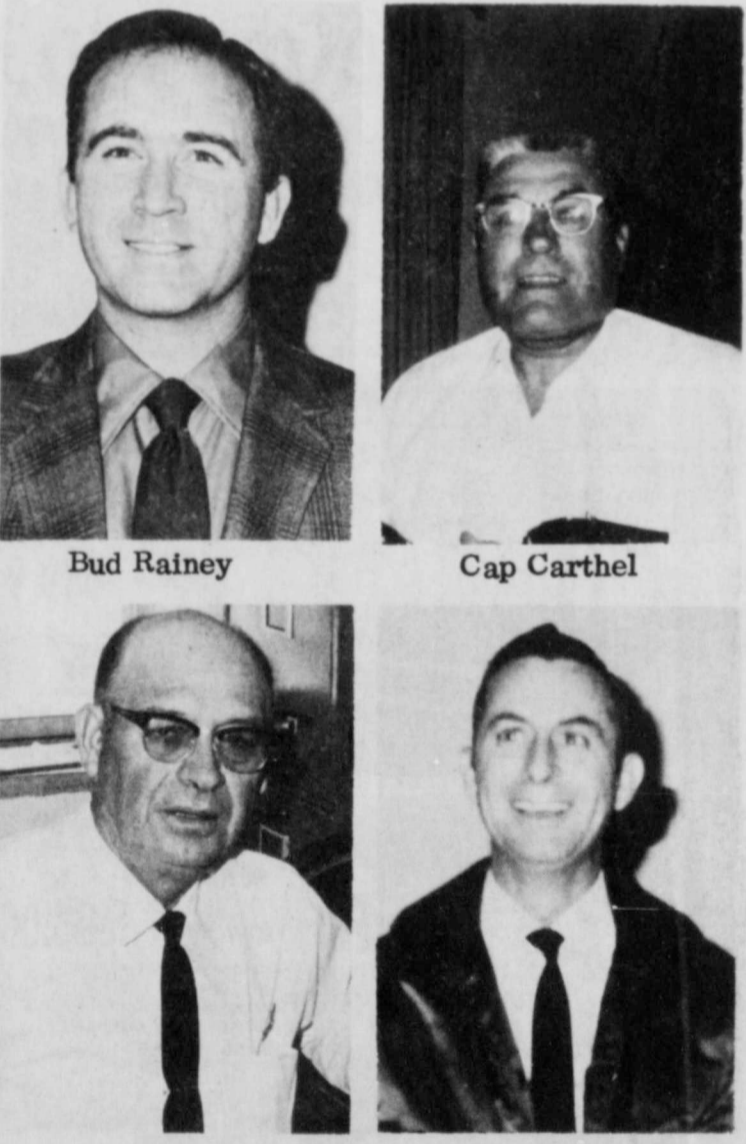

### Bud Rainey Announces Deputies



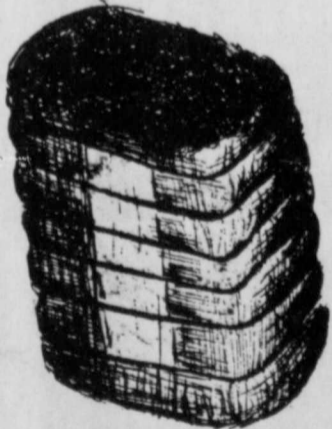

Floyd County Sheriff-elect Bud Rainey, who takes office January 1, today announced that Cliff Gilly, W. F. (Cap) Carthel and Billy R. Gilmore will serve as sheriff's deputies.

Gilly, who has been on the county force for three months, worked two years for the Lockney Police Department. A Floyd County native, he lived 30 years in Lockney and now resides in Floydada.

Gilmore worked five and a half years for the Bridgeport police department and nine months as a Henrietta policeman before coming to the Floydada Police Department six months ago. Gilmore, his wife and five children (three boys and two girls) live in Floydada.

Carthel, a Lockney resident, will continue to work on Lockney area sheriff's office business. He has been on the county force ten years.



### City Sales Tax Revenue Down

The City of Floydada received a check this week from the state in the amount of \$11,320.07 for the city's one-per-cent share of sales of taxable items sold in July, August and September. That figure is down from the \$11,854.86 returned for the same period a year ago.

The check for the third quarter was up from the second-quarter amount of \$10,164.67.

Total city sales tax revenue thus far this year is \$32,669.12 in Floydada.

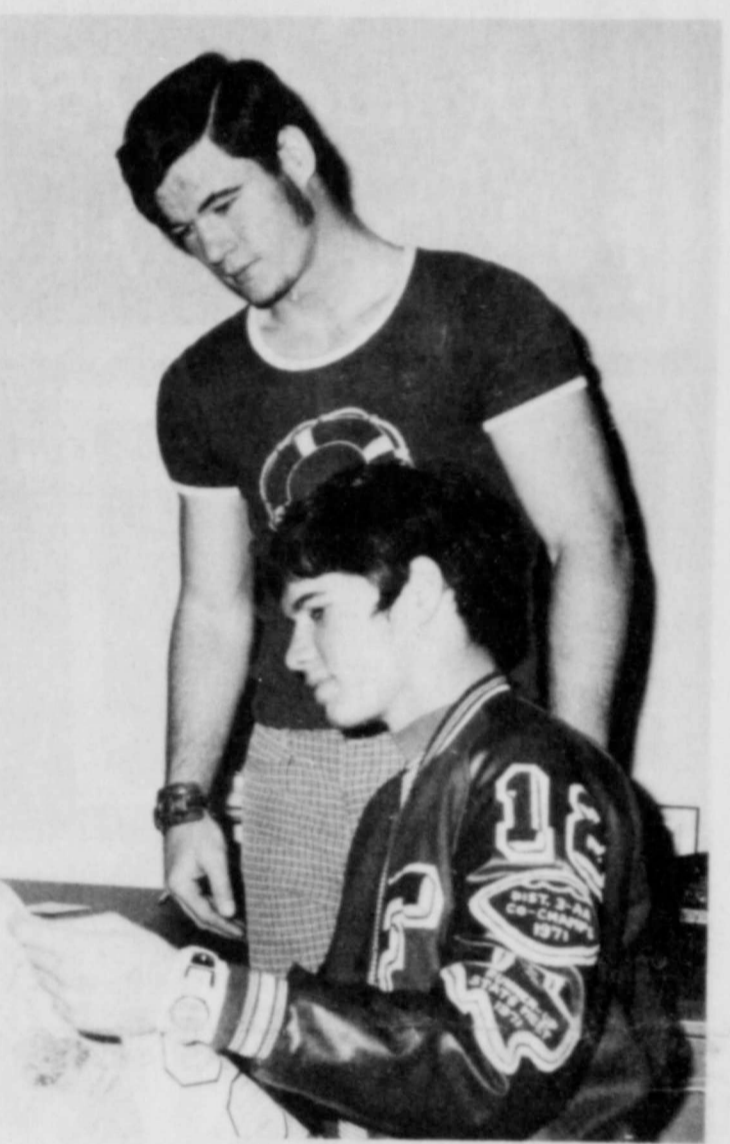
## Mike Hale, Terry Bunch S-T All-State Selections

Two Floydada Whirlwind football players, Mike Hale and Terry Bunch were selected to the Fort Worth Star-Telegram's All-State team. Hale made the Fort Worth newspaper's all-state second team both ways, as offensive end and defensive lineman, and Bunch was a second-team selection on the defensive line. The All-State selections were published in the Wednesday, December 27, morning edition of the paper.

Hale, a 180-pound senior, led the Whirlwinds in pass receptions during the 1972 season with 30 catches for 355 yards (a 11.5-yard average) and three touchdowns. He rushed for 92 yards and one TD. On defense, the Whirlwind end led the club in fumble recoveries with six, was in on 87 tackle assists, and made 16 unassisted stops.

Bunch, a 215-pound tackle who made the Texas Sports-writers' All-State second team last year as a junior, led the Whirlwinds in tackles with 26 unassisted and 136 assisted stops during the '72 campaign, which saw the Winds qualify for the state quarterfinal playoffs for the first time in the history of the school.

## Key 73 Begins

Therefore, all Christians in Floydada and the surrounding areas are urged to stop wherever they are at noon each day during this specified time and ask God's blessings and guidance for this united effort of Christians to take the Continent for Christ.

At least the Assembly of God, First Baptist, Calvary Baptist, First Christian, First Methodist, and Nazarene Churches in Floydada will be opened each day and the public is invited to stop in and pray for this great movement. But wherever you are — and whatever you may be doing — stop and pray, and ask God to bring the Continent to Christ.

The Whirlettes defeated Wilson Thursday in the consolation round of the West Texas Girls Invitational Basketball Tournament in Slaton.

The Floydada girls held a 10-7 lead at the end of the first quarter and increased the lead to 25-12 at the half and 29-14 at the three-quarter mark, before outscoring the Wilson girls 23-11 in the final frame.

Sharon Decker led the scoring for the Whirlettes, with 22 points. Debbie Johnson netted 14, and Nancy Puckett chipped in 10.

Defensively, Sonja Curry grabbed four rebounds and made nine recoveries and Cindy Moore had six rebounds and five recoveries.

Friday, the Whirlettes were eliminated from the Slaton tournament when they lost to New Deal by a single point, 26-25. Floydada was behind 10-4 after one quarter but pulled to even at halftime, 15-15. The Whirlettes fell to a 23-19 disadvantage after three quarters and were down 26-19 in the last frame before pulling to within a point at the game's end.

Nancy Puckett scored 16 points to lead Floydada. Sonja Curry got 13 rebounds and five recoveries to pace the defense.

The Whirlettes, now 4-11 for the season, travel to Dimmitt Tuesday and open conference play at Lockney Friday.

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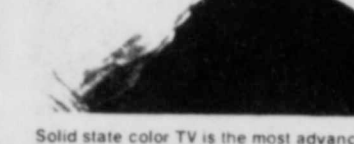

# Providence Man Tells Of Early Day Road Book From Amarillo To Plainview

**LURON BROWN**

PLAINVIEW—The hillbilly replied "You can't get here" when directions to the next town had been close right answer when travel was in its infancy.

Over the way was by trail or across prairie now, the problem frequently was finding way from one town to another. "The Automobile Book," a travel guide published in 1901, to remedy the problem.

Historian who today directs highway markers might wonder if the Book was not as helpful.

of the 1920 edition by Wyatt McInerney of the Providence County northeast of Amarillo has 872 pages of text between points in the county.

Book, printed on high light weight paper bound in imitation leather, lists 82 changes in route between Amarillo and Plainview over a distance of 83.3 miles. The highway of 78 miles, described as "natural roads, a section of the Borderland Route."

highway from Farwell to Clovis. At the time the book was published "a new highway was contemplated from Farwell via Littlefield and Mule Shue."

Turn right." One-tenth of a mile farther, "Five corners; turn square left." After two-tenths of a mile, "End of the road; bear right." Directing attention to "Cemetery on right" could have lent a somber note to the maneuverings of the by then befuddled driver.

At the 15 to 20 mph speeds automobiles attained over the rutted, winding roads, a driver surely found it difficult to keep his eye on the Blue Book and the road at the same time. Usually a passenger sat beside him reading the directions. But the guide aimed at solving the problem.

"The Blue Book" holder with transparent face" was offered for \$3 in genuine leather. The holder was supposed to "do away with that death grip" and could be "hung on the robe rail or carried in the driver's lap."

Population of Amarillo was listed as 20,000. The site of the battle of Adobe Walls, Palo Duro Canyon and the Canadian River Valley were mentioned as points of interest.

From Lubbock to Clovis, distance 116.2 miles, the traveler was routed via Shallowater, Roundup Station, Farwell and Texico. Perhaps to boost morale the guide mentioned that the route was "over the postal highway from Farwell to Clovis. At the time the book was published "a new highway was contemplated from Farwell via Littlefield and Mule Shue."

If it seems the sparsely settled Plains required numerous changes of directions, roads in the hilly, wooded, more settled parts of the country with more corners, curves, turns and jogs must appear just short of impossible of negotiation.

A summary of motor laws in Texas showed that speeds should be "Reasonable and proper. Public highways 25 miles per hour; in or near built-up sections 15 miles per hour and business districts 15 miles per hour."

Under "What to take on the tour" the Blue Book cautioned: "Travel as light as possible" and proceeded to list as travel aids no less than 84 items ranging from tool kit, tires, tubes, chains ball of binder twine, piece of wood to set under jack and a length of chicken wire to use when stuck in a sand bed.

Directions for improvising a patch for a blown-out casing with rubberized canvas from the luggage cover or several thicknesses of newspaper were provided. The best type tire pump in preference to "one of the old back breakers" was recommended.

"Grease the speedometer swivel joint. If you have never greased it hunt it up and give it a surprise." An accurate speedometer was very important if the motorist was to keep on the winding and narrow.

The effort that went into recording the thousands of directionals must have been tremendous. But travelers in those days had the pioneering spirit of "Find a way or make a way." Still, there must have been some stumblers, like the instructions leading off the route from Sterling City to Lubbock: "Leave court house at Sterling City on left. Go west. Curve right and left around Wooden Church."

## Southwestern Public Service

### Invest In New Equipment

Southwestern Public Service will invest more than \$6,000,000 in new equipment and improvements over the next five years, it was announced today by Roy Tok, president of the company.

The area has turned itself economically and all are "go" for future growth. We must be prepared to keep pace with the power that will be needed to keep the lights on. Tok said in announcing the expansion of generating facilities.

Southwestern's generating capacity of 631,000 kilowatts would be completed by the end of 1975. Tok said before the end of 1975, construction on a 350,000 kilowatt unit would go into production.

Southwestern's generating facilities at Riverview which will go into production in mid-1973. This unit, in size, is large in nature. Its exhaust is piped to a waste water treatment plant and steam from the unit will supply 60% of the power to drive the installed conventional generating unit at the site.

By reusing the heat from the gas turbine units, the efficiency of the generating units is increased by 20%.

"We are working every day to find the way that we can conserve resources. We have experienced some shortages in gas fuel, but we have a commitment to our customers which demands that we find the fuels to meet their electric service needs," Tok said.

Southwestern pioneered in the use of treated sewage effluent as cooling water at its Nichols Station, near Amarillo, beginning more than a decade ago. Now they have gone one more step and are using equipment that cleans up the treated water to the point where it can be purified for use as boiler feed water. This is being done on the first unit at Jones Station and is projected for the second unit at that facility and also for the 1976 unit.

"When we have installed all of the generating facilities proposed through 1976, we will save, on the average, 14,000,000 gallons of potable water through the use of sewage effluent. That's the equivalent of the daily water needs of a city of 100,000 people and is a most important conservation consideration," Tok added.

Returning to the matter of fuel resources, Tok said that the 350,000 kilowatt unit planned for 1976 will be built so that gas, oil, coal or even solid waste can be used as fuel.

"This one is actually going to have a garbage door on it," he said.

Speaking in a more serious vein, he added, "We are confident that our suppliers will find the gas that we need for fuel, but we will be prepared to burn other fuels if it doesn't turn out that way. We assure our customers now that, if it is necessary to use coal as a fuel, every standard of environmental protection will be met - and exceeded, if possible."

The 1976 unit will be located north of Amarillo so that the sewage effluent can be purchased from the city.

A major transmission line project for 1973 is a 230,000 volt line running from Tuo Interchange, north of Abernathy, to Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo. This will provide a second 230,000 volt path or backbone for the interconnected transmission system and make the movement of power between major generating facilities and the areas of greatest use more efficient, reliable and economical.

"It is difficult to pin down exactly how many dollars will flow into the economies of the communities we serve because of this expansion program. We will purchase all of the transportation and office equipment locally and as much of the supplies and materials as possible. Local suppliers will provide the gas or oil fuel. Construction labor accounts for about 22 to 25% of the cost of a new generating station.

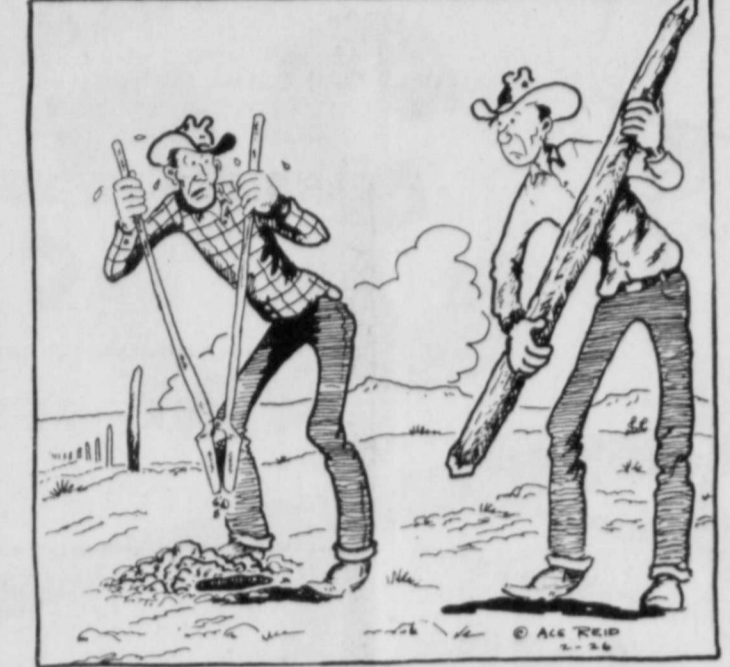

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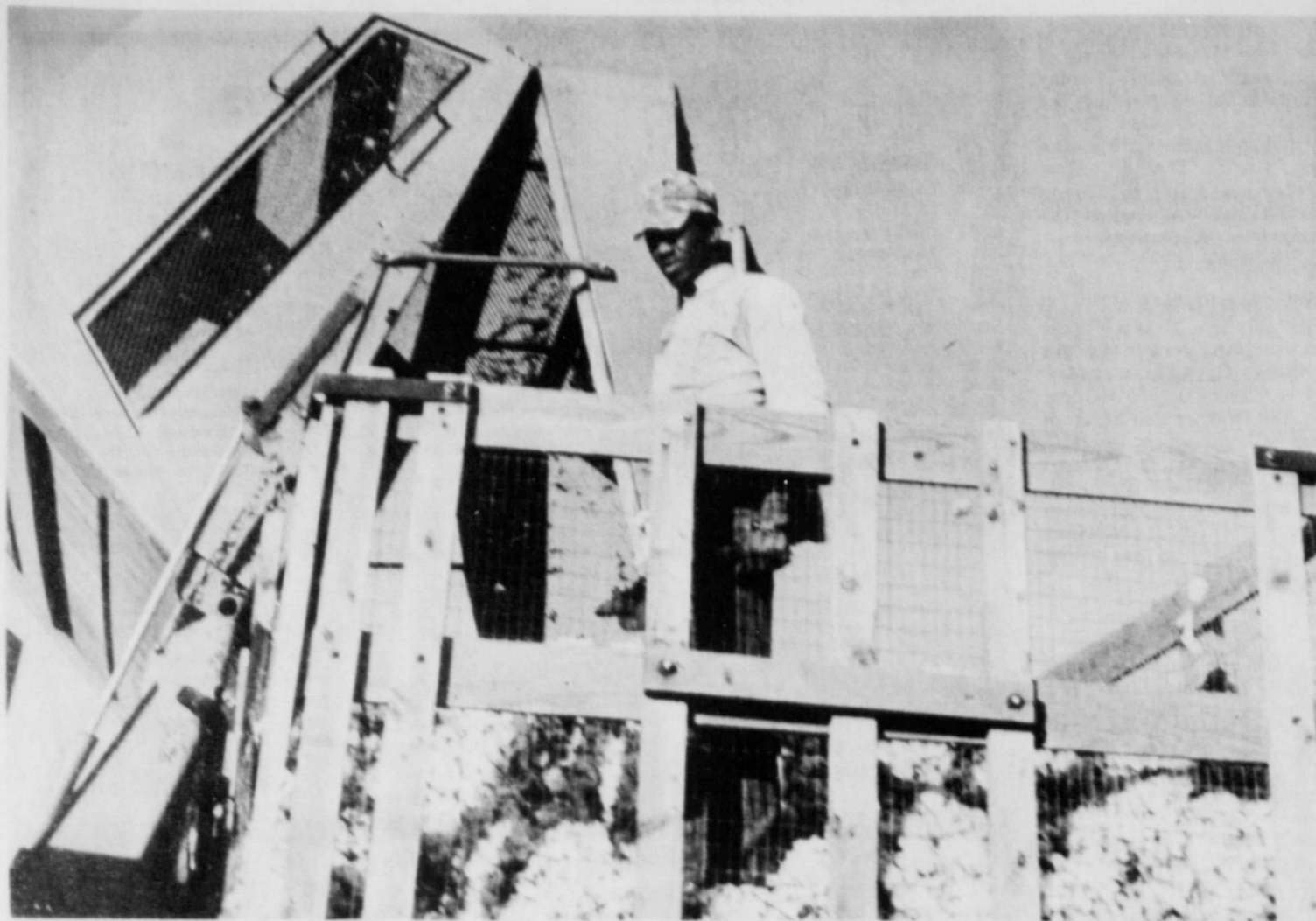

At the present time the Floyd County Noxious Weed Control District is applying herbicide on fence rows, implement parking lots, and around irrigation wells for weed control. Fence rows should be clean

before the application for better control. The soil should be wet with the herbicide mixture, which is impossible when the old weeds are still standing. All farmers interested in this type of Weed Control should contact the Weed District office and leave request. John Campbell, Superintendent of the District, stated that type work by March is possible so that the District can concentrate their effort on bindweed at that time.

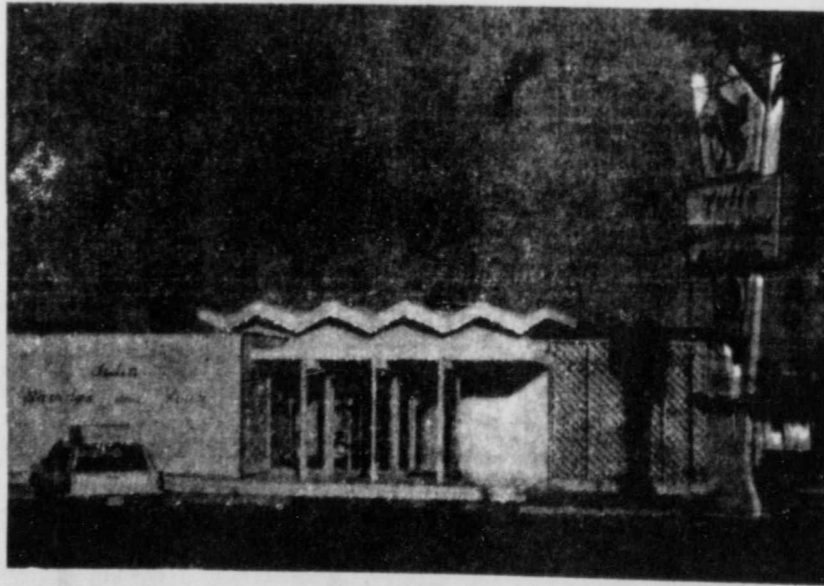

## Farmcast

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture  
John C. White, Commissioner

Small Grain Figures Released... Wheat Pasture Grazing Limited... Milk Production Declines... Cotton Production Estimate Declines... Screwworm Reports Needed.

COTTON production for the state is now estimated at 3,900,000 bales. This compared to only 2,579,000 bales last year. The present estimate is about 300,000 bales under the November projection.

Yield is expected to average 359 pounds per acre compared with only 263 pounds last year. Harvested acres this year are expected to total 5,220,000 compared with 4,700,000 in 1971.

Harvest on the High Plains continues to lag due to bad weather.

Production of American-Pima cotton is expected to total 31,000 bales compared with 35,300 bales in 1971. Yield is expected to average 431 pounds of lint per acre compared with almost a bale per acre last year.
