Provisions Of Vietnam Peace

WASHINGTON — Agreement has been reached to end Vietnam war — the longest in American history — with a cease-fire effective Saturday and complete U. S. withdrawal coinciding with use of all war prisoners, President Nixon told the news on Tuesday night.

Nixon said it is a just and honorable way to end a nightmarish, decade-long war that left nearly 60,000 Americans dead and maimed and caused an unprecedented upheaval at home.

Presidential adviser Henry Kissinger and Hanoi's Le Duc Thieu initiated the agreement in Paris and it will be formally signed Saturday, a spokesman said.

An internationally supervised cease-fire is to go into effect at 10 p.m. CST Saturday.

The release of all American-held prisoners of war throughout Indochina within 60 days.

The withdrawal of the remaining 24,000 U.S. troops in Vietnam within the same time frame.

The fullest possible accounting for all those missing in action.

A guarantee that the people of South Vietnam will have the right to determine their future without outside interference.

Nixon did not mention either Cambodia or Laos, but stated that the agreement would bring peace "in Southeast Asia" to the Vietnam's two neighbors.

President recalled that he outlined conditions for a cease-fire during his visit to the Pentagon last May 8.

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Final Rites For Lyndon Johnson

SAN ANTONIO - Lyndon B. Johnson, the tall Texan whose dreams of a "Great Society" to end poverty and social injustice were shattered by the Vietnam War, died Monday of a heart attack. The nation's 36th President was 64.

His death came just days before an expected end to the war Johnson escalated into a major conflict that divided the nation he hoped to unite.

SECOND FORMER PRESIDENT TO DIE Johnson died just 27 days after Harry S. Truman, the nation's 33rd President succumbed to old age. The deaths left the United States with no living former presidents for only the fourth time in its history.

Johnson was stricken at his LBJ Ranch in his beloved Texas Hill Country where he grew up. He was flown in a private plane 80 miles to Brooke Army Medical Hospital in San Antonio and pronounced dead on arrival at 4:30 p.m. CST.

Johnson was thrust into the presidency on Nov. 22, 1963, by the assassination in Dallas of John F. Kennedy.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe led fellow Texans in praising and mourning the passing of the man elected to the presidency in 1964 with the largest popular plurality vote in American history.

"His programs broke more shackles, educated more children, cared for more of our sick and did more to improve the quality of life than any other President in our history," said Briscoe, who took office six days ago with Johnson attending the ceremony. "We will not see another man like him again."

The body of former President Lyndon B. Johnson lay in state Tuesday in the library he created as his own memorial and as a school for better government.

The closed and flag-draped casket was placed on a raised platform in the Great Hall of the eight-story Lyndon B. Johnson Library on the University of Texas Campus.

Johnson, the nation's 36th president, died Monday of what doctors described as "severe coronary artery disease." He was 64 and had been wracked by heart problems since the 1950's.

Mrs. Johnson, accompanied by daughters Lynda and Luci and their husbands, stood together as the casket was carried by eight servicemen to the bier in the hall.

Mrs. Johnson wiped a tear from her eye as she embraced a family friend who had joined the line of mourners.

As the body was transferred from the hearse, a military band played "Hail to the Chief" and a 21-gun salute was fired.

Lockney Considering Hospital District Formation

A group of interested citizens met in the Lockney First National Bank Tuesday evening to hear a report on the present condition of the hospital and to initiate plans to enable the hospital to continue to operate.

After consideration of the possibilities by which the hospital could continue to serve the community, the group voted to support the formation of a hospital district, to be called Lockney General Hospital District.

Taking action on legal advice obtained, a steering committee was elected by secret ballot. The committee composed of Hubert Frizzell, Erwin Boyd, Gene Collins, Claude Brown, Conrad Henderson, with L. N. Johnson as alternate, will confer with a lawyer in drawing up a bill to be passed by the legislature to authorize an election to set up the hospital district.

To give some immediate financial aid to the hospital, more than \$1,000 was contributed by those present. Others who may wish to have a part in this financial help should

contact Claude Brown or Mrs. Duckworth at the city hall to learn the way to make out their checks. The city will be acting as a non-profit group for collection of funds to be turned over to the hospital.

Formation Of District It was thought by those present at the meeting Tuesday night that a hospital district could be formed of precinct 2 of Floyd County to maintain the cost of operating the Lockney Hospital. Dr. W. J. Mangold who has owned and operated the hospital for the past 21 years has said he will give the hospital to such a district.

where she was valedictorian of her class, later she did graduate work at the University of Chicago and taught public school in Brownwood, Henrietta and Chico, and also at Baylor College. While teaching at Baylor she and Dr. Lon V. Smith, who was practicing medicine in Floydada at the time, were married in Chico on March 29, 1916, and Mrs. Smith came to Floydada as a young bride. During World War I she was head of the Red Cross work in Floyd County and during the depression she was asked to substitute in high school as a teacher of junior and senior English. She remained five years.

Barbara Hawkins was born June 13, 1883 in Jacksboro, Texas and moved with her parents to Chico shortly after where she attended school. She was a graduate of Baylor Female College at Belton

In 1935 Mrs. Smith applied for the office of postmaster in Floydada and was appointed by George Mahon, Congressman at the time. She remained as postmistress until 1952. Her husband died Oct. 6, 1941.

Mrs. Smith had been a Sunday School teacher for some 57 years in the First Baptist Church where she was an active member. She taught a men's Sunday School class for 30 years.

Mrs. Smith helped organize the first federated study club in Floydada and was the first president of the county council of federated clubs. She was a charter member of the 1922 Study Club, active in WMU

work and was a most sought after speaker. Mrs. Smith was selected Woman of the Year for 1961 by the 1950 Study Club, and was a life member of the Caprock district of Federated Study Clubs.

Mrs. Smith is the author of "Twenty-Two Devotional Talks."

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Ralph (Emma Louise) Johnston of Floydada; a sister, Mrs. J. V. Booth of Beaumont; and three grandsons, Ralph Jr., who is attending seminary school at Louisville, Kentucky; Lon of Denver, Colo., and George of Floydada.

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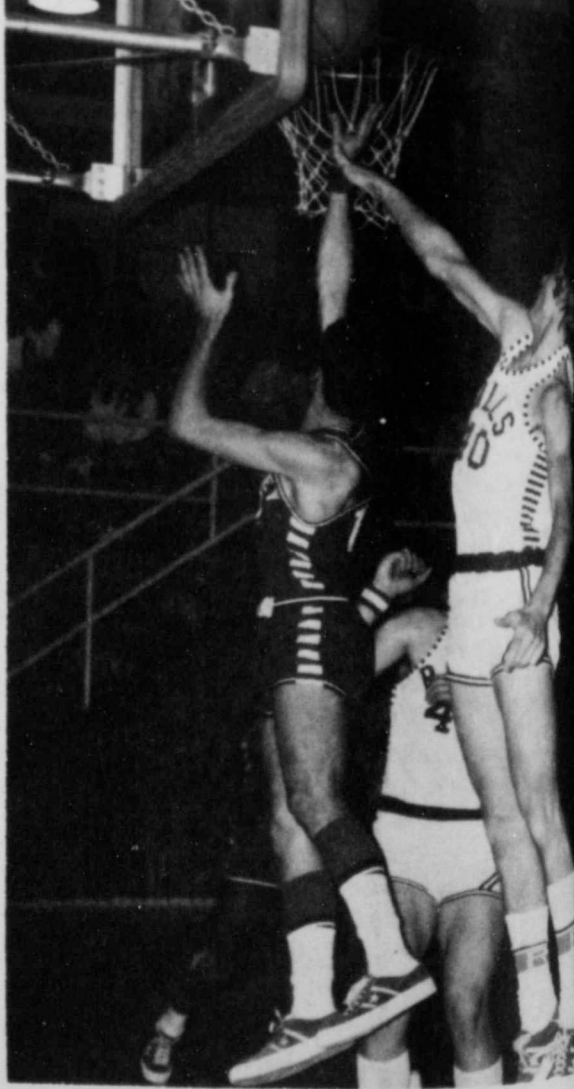

Johnson died just one day before peace was announced in Vietnam, for which he worked so hard.

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

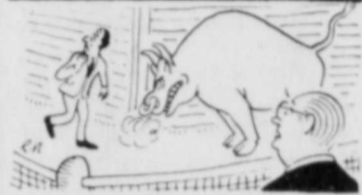

After school snacksters have good reason to "drink up" if the family shopper reads the labels to compare ingredients and prices of real juices, imitation juices and synthetic juices.

Most synthetic drinks containing Vitamin C are two or three times more expensive than real fresh, frozen or canned orange juice. Some synthetic drinks may be less expensive source of Vitamin C, but they may not contain all the other important nutrients. For example, although we drink orange juice primarily because it is rich in Vitamin C, it also contributes Vitamin A, thiamine and the minerals calcium and iron.

In drinks such as instant breakfast drink, imitation lemonade mix and instant soft drink mix, sugar is present in the greatest quantity, followed by citric acid, several chemicals, vitamins, artificial flavors and color - but no real juices. Some imitation orange juices, however, contain less than 10 - and some up to 50 - percent orange juice.

Drinks made with a substantial amount of real juice deserve priority over entirely synthetic drinks, because they're likely to provide more food value. In addition, they eliminate the excess of sugar so injurious to teeth or the caffeine - not recommended for growing youngsters - included in cola. Check the drinks served to your family. Make sure they are getting the needed nutrients from the drinks provided.

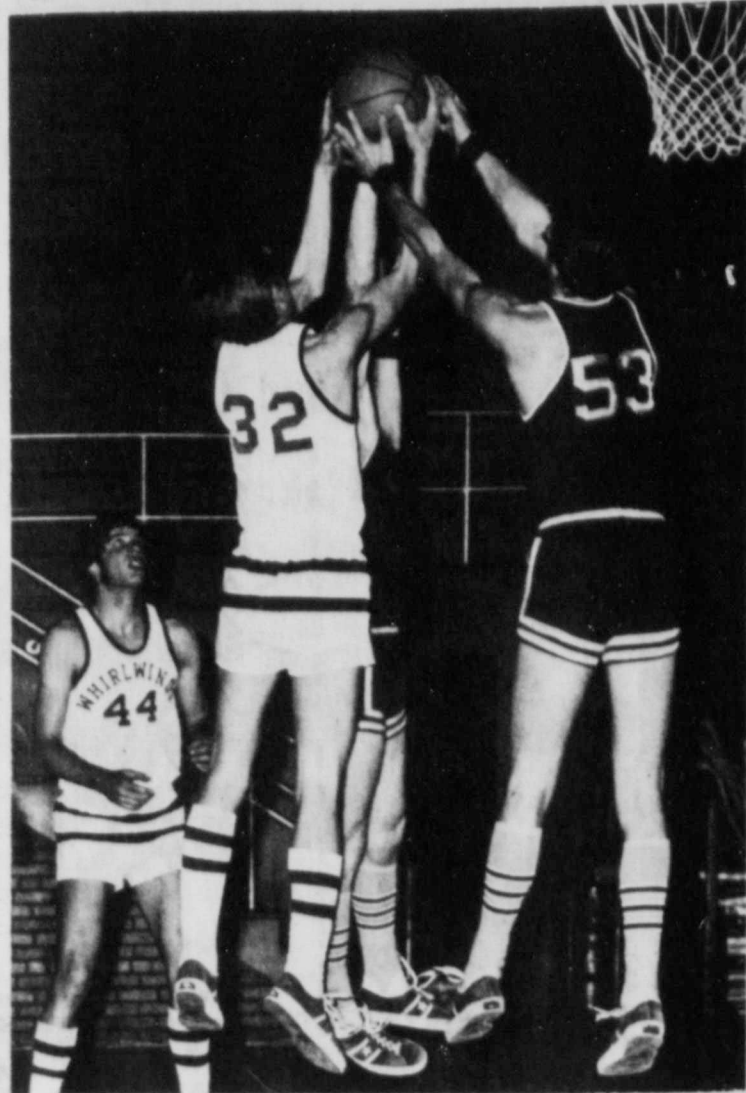
Donette Marble scored 14 points for the Whirlettes. Carol Cozby led the defense with seven rebounds and four recoveries.

The JV Whirlettes have won five and lost seven this season. They play Olton at 4:15 today (Thursday) in the Littlefield tournament.

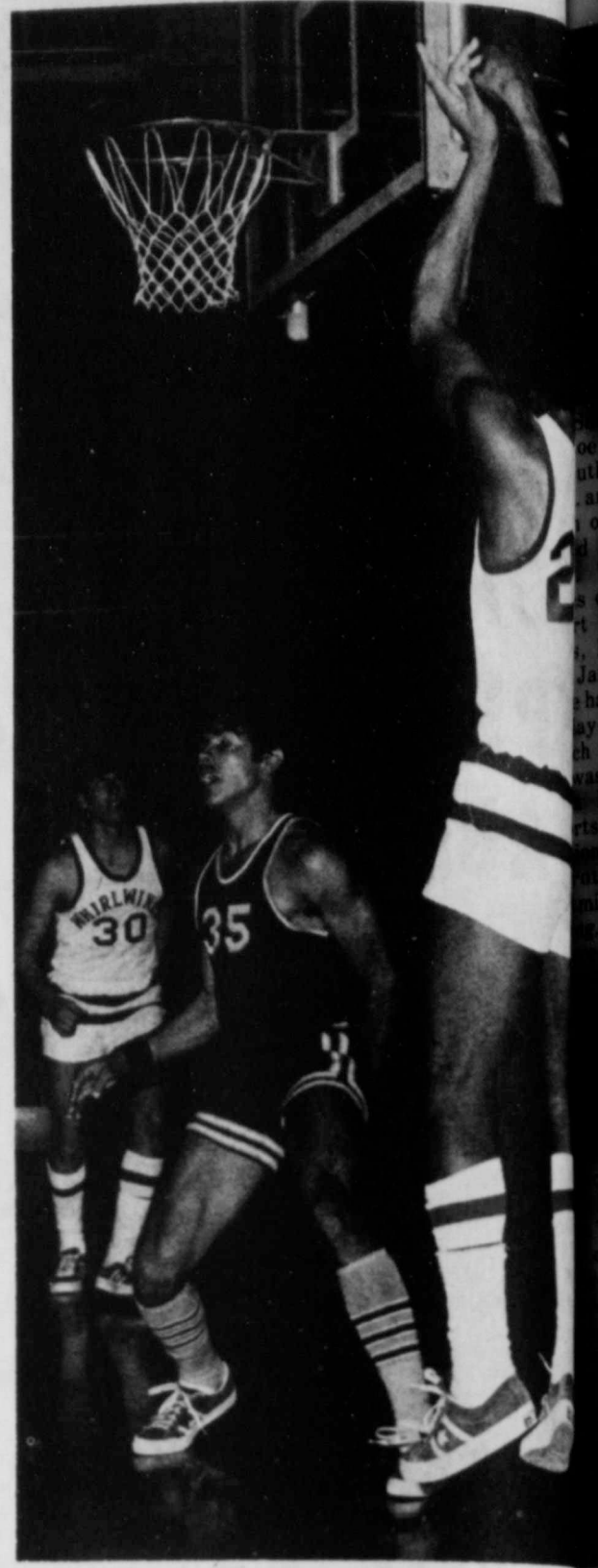
Netters In Meet At Brownfield

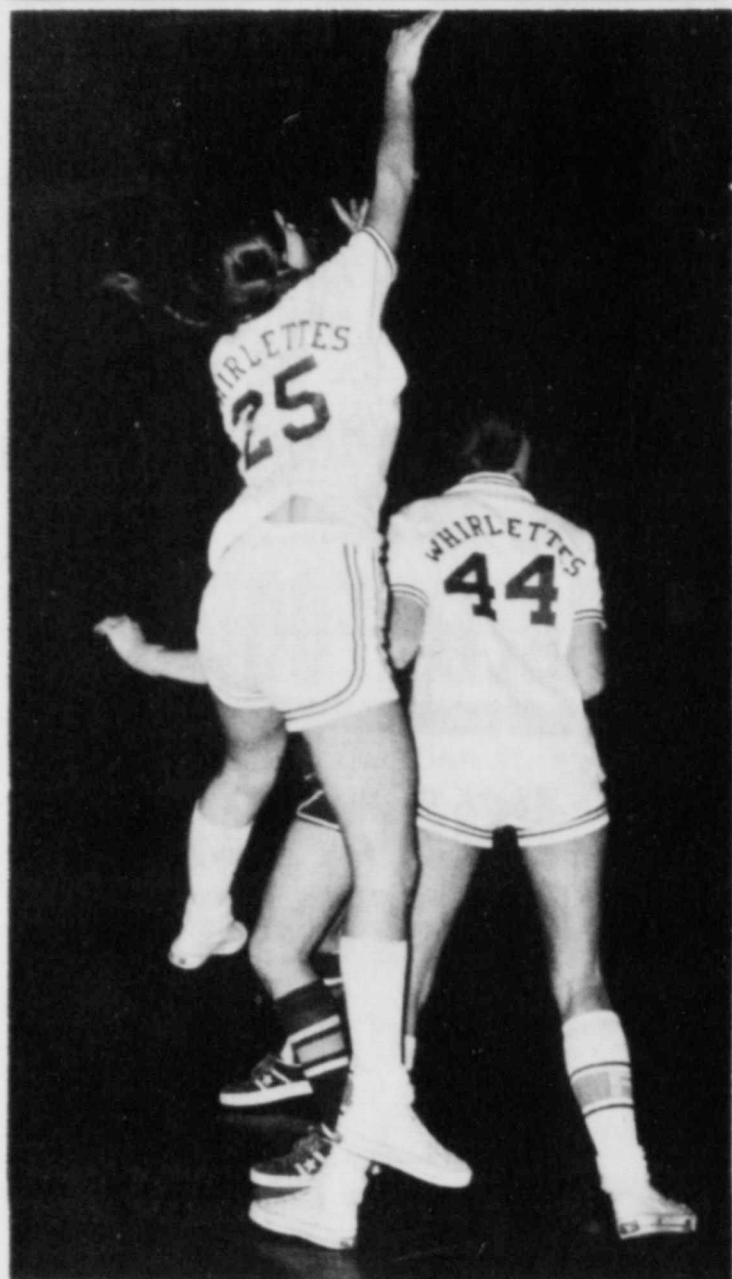

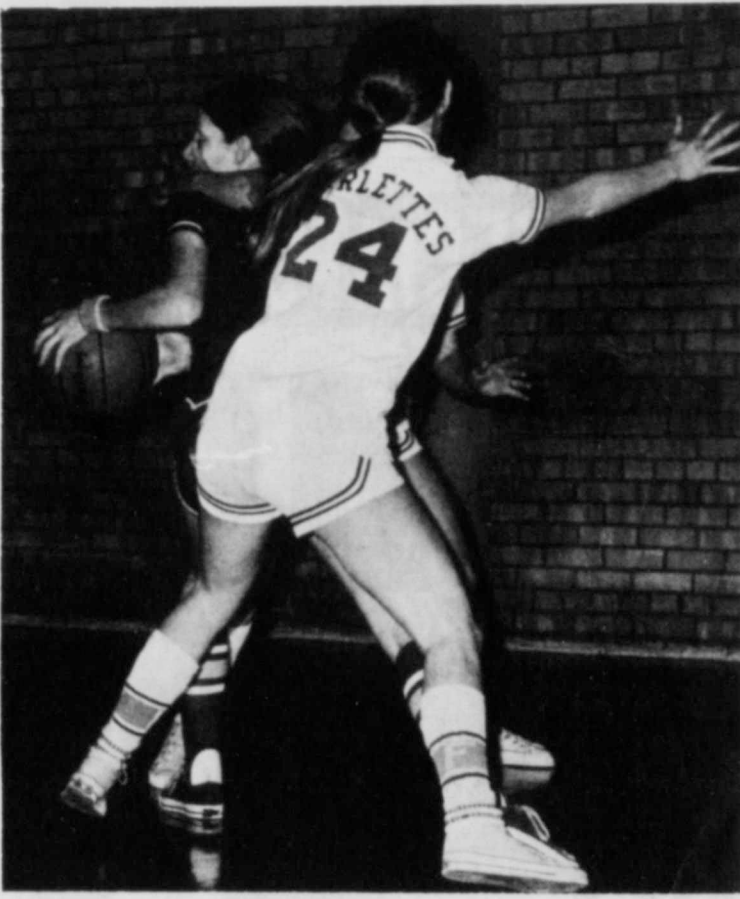

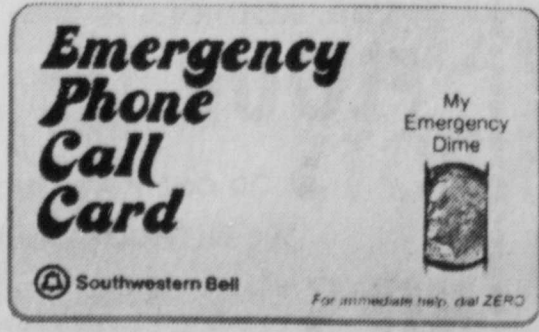
