The Floydada City Council and the Floyd County Commissioners have agreed on use of the city's dumpground for another year and this week signed the following agreement contract:

LANDFILL CONTRACT  
THE STATE OF TEXAS,  
KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS:  
COUNTY OF FLOYD  
This Landfill Contract between The CITY OF FLOYDADA, TEXAS, a municipal corporation acting by and through its Mayor, having theretofore been authorized to enter into such contract by the City Council of the City of Floydada, Texas, and FLOYD COUNTY, TEXAS, acting by and through its County Judge, having been duly authorized to enter into this contract by the Commissioners Court of said County, WITNESSETH:  
WHEREAS, said City owns and operates a sanitary disposal and dump ground located on a portion of Section 90, Block 1, A.B.&M., Floyd County, Texas, and said City desires to enter into a joint use agreement concerning the same under the following terms and conditions:  
1. Said County has paid the sum of \$2,000.00 cash in hand, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged.  
2. Said County agrees to dig whatever pits the City and County mutually determines and agrees that it is necessary and advisable to be dug on said dump grounds area.  
3. Residents of Floyd County residing outside the City of Floydada shall be entitled to and shall be permitted to use such dump grounds in the same manner and with no greater restrictions than are placed upon City residents.  
5. This contract is for a period beginning January 1, 1973, and expiring January 1, 1974, and it is understood and agreed between the parties hereto that such contract will be renegotiated on or about October 15, 1973, for future years.  
6. The City of Floydada or the Floyd County Commissioners Court may at any time cancel this contract upon a 30 day written notice to either party from the date of the notice of cancellation, if the City of Floydada further agrees if this becomes necessary that they will refund the pro rata cost of the unused portion of pits dug at whatever cost (\$1,800.00 or \$2,000.00 per pit to the City).  
7. Notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary, said City is to remain the sole owner and proprietor of the lands known as "The City Dump Grounds" and said County does not desire to control the management nor shall it be liable to any person, firm or corporation by reason of the said City's management and use of the same.

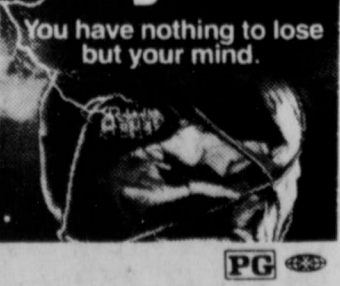

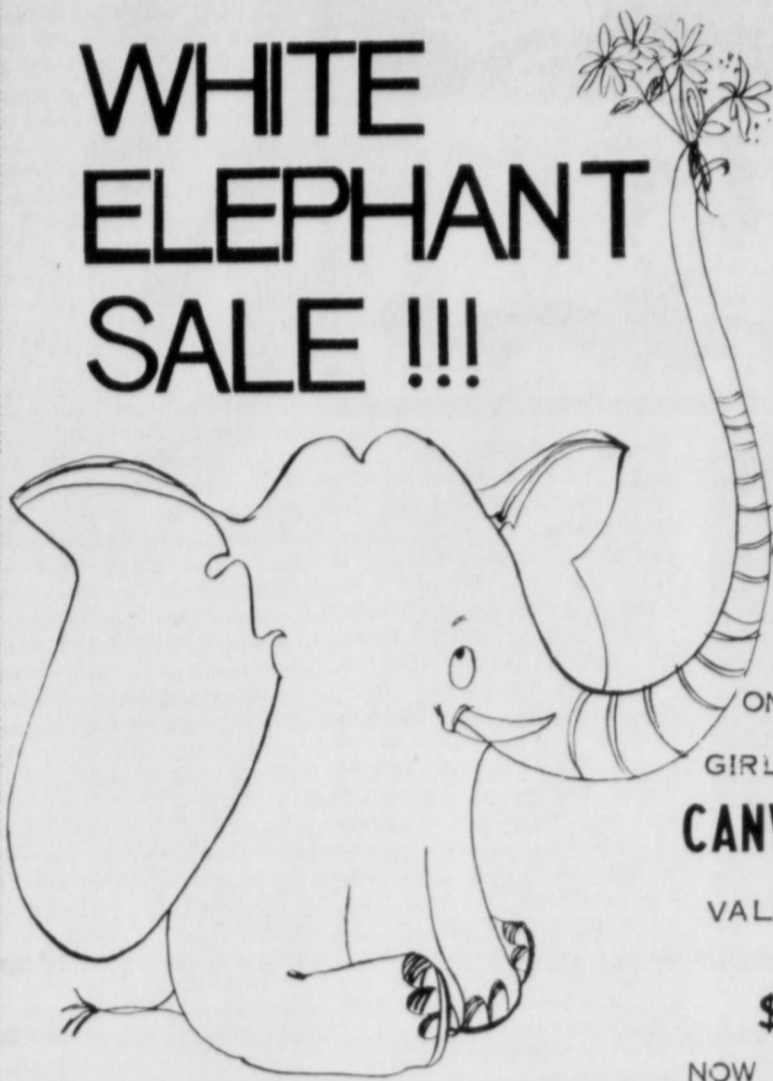

# Letters To The Editor

January 28, 1973

Wendell: I promise both to our Floydada friends and to our friends whom we met, I will try to describe our entire trip. It might be too long for you to print, but print whatever you can and I will begin with our taking off from Lubbock at the beginning of that terrible snow storm.

Lubbock about 6:30 p.m., bound for Houston where we took a LaFrance Airlines for Paris non-stop. We left at eleven p.m. where the fog was zero and we had the air very long till they were serving dinner in a five course meal. First it was salmon with trimmings, then it was a quail, but don't say how much. So I was served a quail on toast. By then my capacity was full and I had a glass of water and soon found out that water is for horses we we settled for a coke.

Back for some rest and passed New York in the far west where we changed our course to Paris, where we landed at the next evening, and we were met by the travel agency taxi which was to take us to the Grand Hotel and pick us up the next morning and take us to the airport (where Lindbergh made the first solo flight in 1927). However, we were taken to downtown Paris and saw many wonderful buildings, also that four legged tower that we read so much about. It was cold and freezing and our driver told us that a nice show in Paris at 11 p.m. and lasted till 3 a.m., so I asked him what could we do at 7 and 71 do at a Paris night club; and as we had been up for a while, what we wanted was to get some rest where we could have a good night's sleep.

On the night we asked the manager where we could get a hamburger. He said just down there in the snack bar, so we went to the list over and decided on a hamburger steak with french fries. He asked what we wanted to drink and we said, "water". He said, "we don't serve water", so we just decided on coffee. It was about an hour we were served the steak and mine and the branding iron had seared through the hide but the Old said there were grill marks so we tried to eat the soggy hamburger. I couldn't get my tea sweet, so I looked at Mat and took it by the salt shaker, and asked for my bill. I handed him a five dollar bill, "two more". I gave him another five, and he said I was a nice mistake and handed me some paper, Fred said we worth trying, and two small coins about the size of a nickel, so we went to the room and went to sleep.

With us left for Johannesburg on time, passing over Barcelona, Mrs. W and the Mediterranean Sea, going over Tunisia, and we entered the ground as we went over the Sahara Desert. When we surprised the west coast of Africa we ran into heavy clouds and from lightning and could hear thunder above the plane noise because we knew old Satan was letting us know that we were going to be on his property. As we got close to Johannesburg we ran out of the storm and landed at 1:30 a.m. When we were getting close to the airport we looked up and saw Fred, Babe, Kit, Dwane, and I waving to us from the upper story. When we had passed through Passports, ready for Customs, they let Fred in to help with our suit cases.

Light add that Fred had asked that I get a new Remington of Christ and ship it, but no one would ship it in. So I called U.S. Customs at Lubbock who okayed it to be shipped if Continental Express would accept it, and all this was taken care of with a tag I mean that this was a new gun that had never been out of the state. Fred went to Johannesburg with no trouble and Fred told me I was bringing it but he was told it had to be a used gun. When I picked up my baggage, he said, "Daddy, this is a gun". I said, "the hell it is," so he slipped the tag off and it was only one man at customs. He said, "please unwrap that to see it." He looked it over and said, "This must be a new gun." I told him I had been used some and he kept looking it over. I told him it was registered in the USA in my name. He told me I would be in the state to get this gun out of Africa and Fred told me I was for it away when I left Africa. Then he told me that only used it to be tax free but he was going to pass this gun and Fred should sign a form there transferring the gun to him. He said, "Please take this gun out of here with your father," and I told him I had opened that big box with 8 stetson hats, new shoes and gloves, plus other items I would be now looking for a cell door in black Africa.

They had rooms at the Holiday Inn for the rest of the night as it was a.m. We talked for a couple of hours. About 6 a.m. we ate breakfast and headed for Val, where Kit and Rodney live and where Fred's business is located. A new home is close to the Ken Reynolds' farm, a nice remodeled house built by Rodney's grandfather in 1915, built all of fine rock and most of the original furniture, a beautiful place, and we saw many pictures.

There was a wonderful building, finished for repair parts and it is Rodney's design, has two acres bought, but one acre is off with a very nice fence, with a nice stock of parts, chisels, and Everman land levelers. We spent the rest of the week with Kit and the Reynolds' who made our visit very pleasant and we met Rodney's son, Paul and family, whom we liked very much, and had visits. We could have spent a month with the Reynolds and we would be welcome as we had so much fun talking about Africa.

Saturday, the 13th of January, we bid them goodbye and went to Hilton, where Fred and Babe lived. We passed through thousands of acres of waving grassland covered with sheep. The grass was about a foot high, red in color, and we began to pass miles of corn which is the main money crop. It was in the roasting ear stage since they are just starting to harvest and there were just millions of acres of corn and sky and rolling type, like Denton or Cooke County. Fred's and Babe's home is in Tropical Africa. It was very beautiful with all kinds of fruit ripe or getting ripe. We thought our world with the many trees beautiful, but it can't compare to the beautiful homes and yards of Africa, on the other side of the globe. All the cities and homes are beyond describing, so we took a hundred pictures of Africa, to see if we really saw what we really saw.

Next Monday Fred and I went alone to Pietermaritzburg where Fred went to the bank where I could get Rand for my money and I had given Dwane a check to enter college. Fred was getting it cashed next to me. So I said that check is out of bed, I signed it, so he grabbed it and beat it somewhere and he said the president said "hell yes, cash it, it is the man from Texas." So we went in and had a nice visit with Mr. Reese.

Usually when we spent the day meeting different people and went over the city which is like all South African cities, very beautiful and pretty. The day before we had gone through Lion but as it was cloudy we took many pictures of the wild animals. It takes a cloudy day for them to be out. Also we saw some of the dancers in their freaky looking costumes and at the very night you could hear them making wonderful music.

The next day we headed down the coast in a different part of the world but sugar cane all of which was being cut by blacks with a long knife. There would be from a few to fifteen hundred Blacks in one field and there were thousands of acres. After going several hundred miles from Durbin, we had stayed overnight on the beach of the Indian Ocean, to see mountains and large ranches and it was fun to see narrow gauge rail tracks with small steam engines

making short curves as short as our country roads, but the cars had only two wheels at the front and rear, making perhaps 12 miles an hour up the mountains. We would go from sea level to 6000 feet and stayed at Rodney's grandmother's overnight, where she and her deceased husband had lived for fifty six years, and where there is no electricity, and will not be for the next fifty years. During the late evening and early morning hours a small portable light plant is cranked, but she is happy as her son lives close by.

We headed back to Hilton a different route and when we got close to home Fred said "Daddy, you have been through every state in South Africa."

The next day we flew as tourists to Salisbury, Rhodesia, which the USA doesn't recognize. They should, as it is one of the richest nations in the world, for chrome, copper and other minerals but our state department or whoever controls this, had rather pay double for Rhodesia minerals than purchase it direct. However, I think things are changing a little, when we arrived at Salisbury we looked up and saw Fred Sherman, president and Norman Peacock who visited here with the Lloyds and Dr. Jack Jordons taking pictures. Of course they are the Barlow Company who has large machinery contracts in Africa.

Fred said, "Mark, you and Mat are my guests for the evening, and night," so we went to his home where we had a lunch and tea and he told Norman to take me through the factory that evening and was told that a big dinner was planned in our honor that night and what a dinner it was! We felt very humble in meeting all the officials and officers of the Barlow Company who hope, in time, Rhodesia will be recognized by the USA and from reports they like USA farm machinery.

The next morning Norman and wife carried us through the beautiful city of Salisbury and over some of the farm territory, all of which we enjoyed.

After eating a nice lunch we were taken to the airport and bid farewell to our Rhodesia friends and were on our way to Durbin and on to Hilton.

So a week ago today (Sunday) at 2 p.m. at Durbin, we bid farewell to our family, all in smiles and no tears and headed west to Johannesburg where we were to board a 747 Jumbo for London, having spent two wonderful weeks together.

And as we left I knew we may at times have embarrassed our host by using a fork where we should possibly have used a spoon, but I knew in their hearts we had come a long way to meet our family and to say thanks to the many friends who had been so good to our family, and we in our plain way were not used to English ways as we in Texas were pioneers and had grown up in a state where six flags had flown and a Texan somewhere had been born in Texas and had held every office known from shoe shine boy up to the President of the USA and we are proud of our heritage, how humble it might be.

We left Johannesburg 3 1/2 hours late, the cause we will never know. We had a very stormy night and arrived in London at

10:30 a.m., and our plane to New York was to leave at 10:30. We had been assured by S.A.A. flight engineer we would be met by a hostess who would carry us to TWA, through customs and on a shuttle system. But through some error there wasn't one and it was 1 degree below zero and someone told us we had better go inside, which we did, and we found ourselves in a hallway with no way to carry our luggage. A sign pointed "TWA", so we started walking the 500 yards to TWA. We could hear our name being called and a 35 pound suitcase gets heavy. So we finally saw a man waving us to hurry. Hurry, hell, I was give out. So Mat went ahead. They put her on board and met me at customs and carried my suitcase in and by that time I was popping out with sweat all over. In fact, I thought I was going to pass out, but they gave me plenty of air and I soon recovered.

We were put in tourist class. Mat told them we were "first class". They said "no" but in a few minutes they came back and said they made a mistake, we were first class. When we were settled I told the flight officer I knew we looked dirty, having been up all night, and I said, "you didn't think a Texas farmer could ride first class". He said, "I sure didn't", so I told him my Texas banker was good to me and let us have the money.

Our twelve hour trip to New York came in on time and when I showed my passport, I told the man we had been up all night and would be glad to find a bed as we were leaving for Texas the next morning. Our luggage was on a cart I found. He said take it to the counter where a long line was waiting. As I started to unlock the suitcase, an officer tapped me on the shoulder and said, "follow me". He gave me a paper and pointed to a door and said, "you are clear."

So we rested overnight and came to Lubbock on time. So we came home, traveling 3400 miles by air and possibly 1500 by car and have a happy feeling that our family is well established and doing good in their new country. Some day when the distance gets shorter by faster aircraft and boarding conditions improve, we may again visit that very wonderful country on the other side of the world and til that time comes, we are here among our friends of over fifty years.

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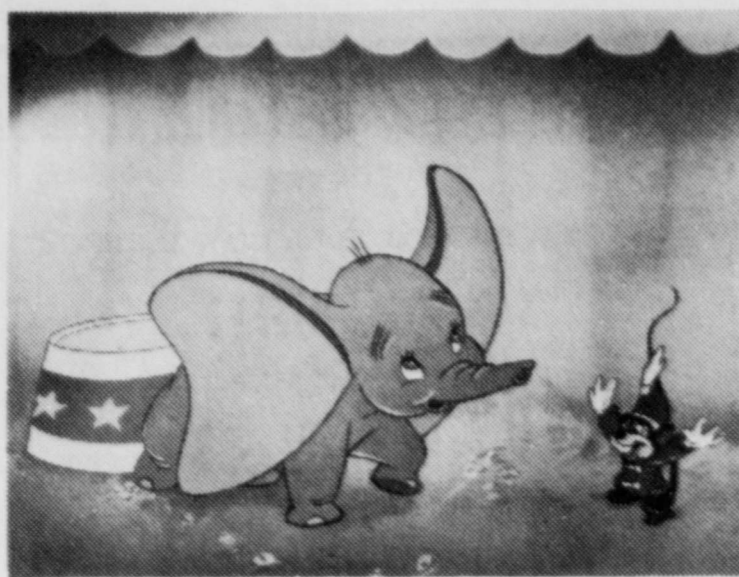

"I shall always be grateful to President Nixon for his consideration on this and in so many ways," she said.

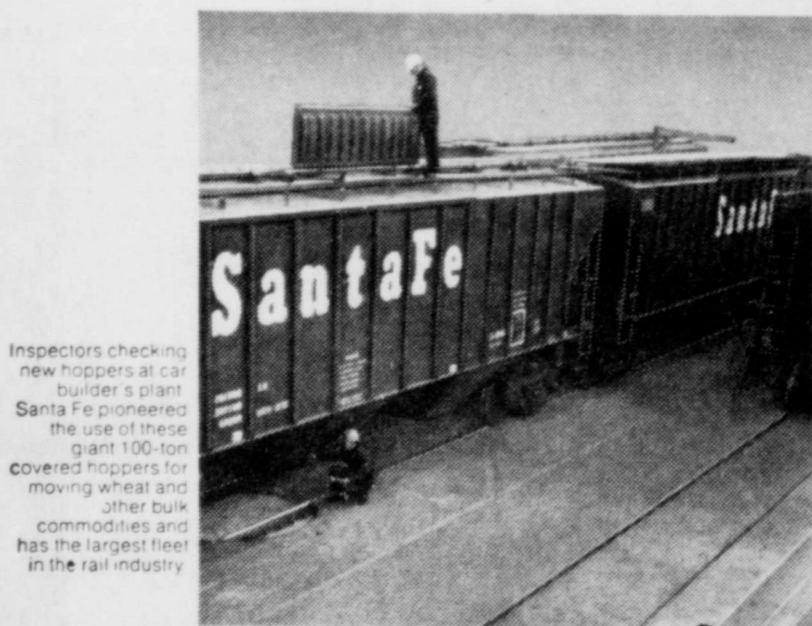

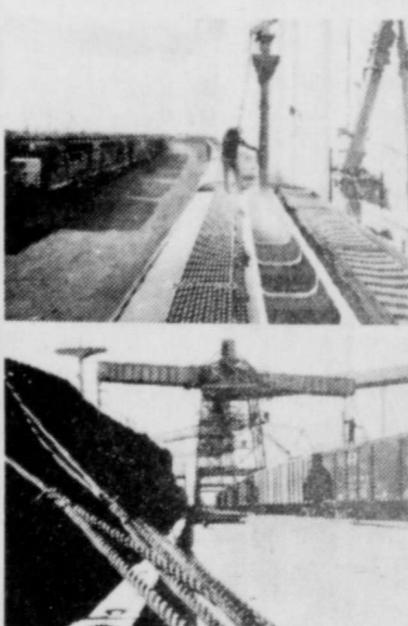

America's wheat is making a historic turnaround

1,000 additional, 100-ton covered hoppers are now being completed to give Santa Fe 11,000 of these giant cars to help move export wheat to Russia
