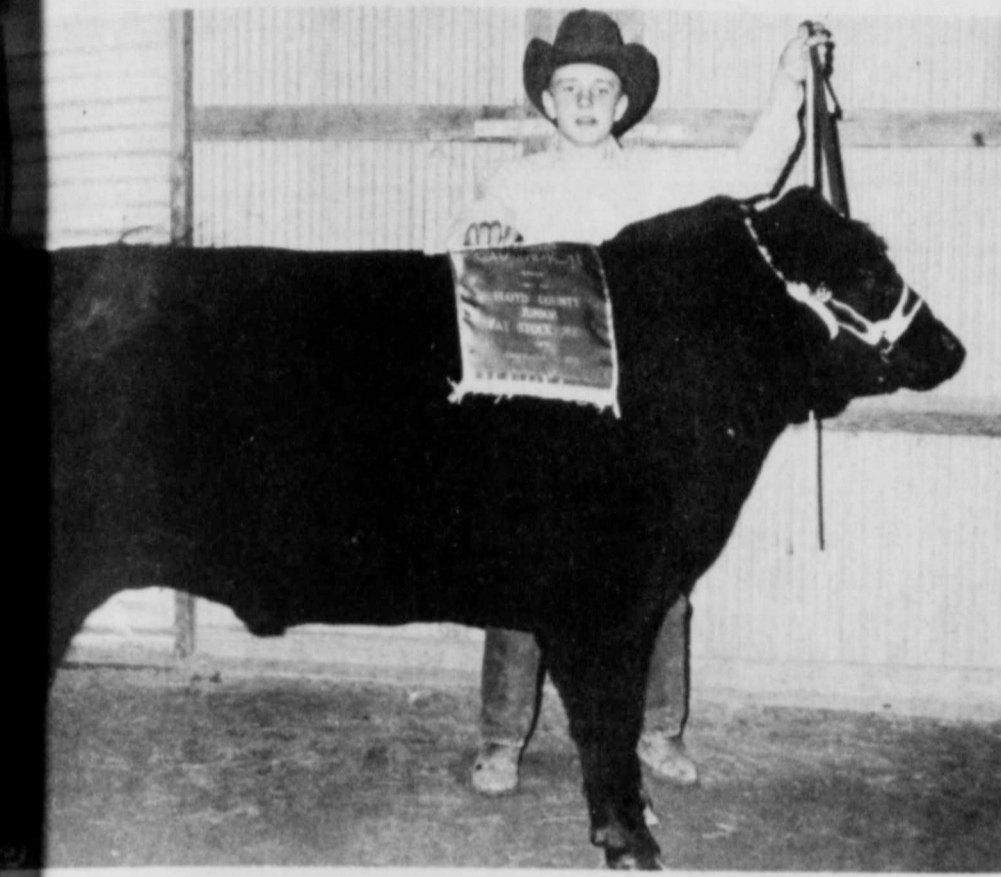

Ricky Hrbacek of Lockney, a 4-H Club member, showed the grand champion steer at the 1973 Floyd County Junior Fat Stock Show Tuesday. Hrbacek's 1009-pound Angus beat out two other breed champions, a Hereford shown by Jay Jones and a "cross and other breeds" steer exhibited by Jon Jones, for the grand champ designation.

The 1082-pound Hereford exhibited by Jay Jones took the reserve championship of the show. The reserve champion exhibitor is a member of the Floyd County 4-H Club.

Ricky Gross, a Lockney FFA member, had the grand champion swine in the Floyd County show, a 231-pound Duroc barrow.

Jeff Robertson of the Floydada FFA showed the reserve champion barrow, a 210-pound entry in the "cross and other breeds" division.

Floydada FFA members took four of five championships in the lamb show, and 4-H'er Darla Assiter won in one lamb division.

Carla Bean of the Floydada FFA showed a reserve breed champion steer.

Second-place lamb exhibitors included the following: Greg Jones, Randy Quisenberry, Ray Hinton, David Quisenberry and Roxann Ford.

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Three Whirlettes Make All District Basketball Team

Floydada Whirlettes Nancy Puckett and Sonja Curry have been selected to the 4-AA All-District Girls' Basketball team, selected by district coaches last week. Cindy Moore made honorable mention on the all-conference team.

Sonja, a junior, was a unanimous pick as all-district guard. "She is probably the outstanding guard in the district," Coach Don Ford said. "Other teams have a tremendous respect for her because of her speed, size, quickness and good ball handling," he noted.

"Nancy had a frustrating year because opponents concentrated on stopping her, but she still did a good job," Ford said. "Her selection emphasizes the ability she has and one coach pointed out her good attitude," he continued. The junior Whirlette forward averaged over ten points a game during the 1972-73 season.

"Cindy, a three-year letterman, exhibited good leadership as a captain and was the stabilizer in the Whirlette defensive effort," Ford said.

Grand Champion Auction Bulletin

The Grand Champion Steer of the Floyd County Junior Fat Stock Show brought \$11.10 a pound. The steer weighed 1,009 pounds, and was bought by the First National Bank of Lockney. The steer belonged to Ricky Hrbacek of Lockney.

The Grand Champion Swine of the Floyd County Junior Fat Stock Show sold for \$2.90 a pound, and belonged to Ricky Gross of Lockney. The swine weighed 231 pounds, and was bought by The Lockney Cooperatives.

Football Nets Floydada Schools \$14,921.55

Floydada's net receipts from football games totaled \$14,921.55 for the 1972 season, according to a report from Preston Watson, Floydada public schools athletic director.

Regular-season varsity games brought in \$7,710.66, and playoff games added another \$5,846.81. Junior varsity and freshman games netted the schools \$402.60, and the junior high (seventh and eighth grade) game net was \$961.48.

Gross gate receipts for 1972 Floydada football amounted to \$34,539.47, including three playoff games. The regular season gross was \$16,680.89, and the playoff gross came to \$15,907.50. JV, freshman and junior high games added \$1,951.08.

The schools split the take after paying expenses such as officials' pay, travel expenses, and, for the playoff games, payment to the UIL and the Plainview Chamber of Commerce.

Girl Scout Cookie Sale Begins

If you have been asking, wishing for, wondering when the Girl Scouts will ring your doorbell with a case of cookies in hand, you can stop wondering and wishing! Tomorrow, February 23, the annual Girl Scout cookie sale will begin at 4 p.m., and for the next two weeks, girls in uniform or wearing proper identification such as their Girl Scout pins will be selling the famous five flavors of the popular cookies.

All age levels in the Girl Scout organization will be eligible to sell — Brownies, Juniors, Cadettes, and Seniors — and they'll tell you that the Butter Shorties, Mint, Peanut Butter, Assorted, and Chocolate Chip 'n Nut cookies are the best you can buy anywhere!

Mrs. Alton Higginbotham, Floydada Cookie Chairman, checked carefully the unloading of 410 cases of the cookies Tuesday to distribute to the troop chairmen who in turn have distributed them to the girls. Each case contains 10 boxes of cookies, and Mrs. Higginbotham said, "With the enthusiasm and excitement that goes with cookie sales, I think we'll sell every case! People realize that once the sale ends in two weeks, there won't be any more Girl Scout cookies for another year."

Profits from the cookie sale are divided between the local troops, an Opportunity Fund for Girl Scouts, and the greatest profit goes to the improvement and maintenance of Camp Rio Blanco near Crosbyton. This established camp is used by all members of the Girl Scout organization for troop camping, summer camping, supervised camping, leadership training, and offers girls who will take advantage of it some of the finest in camping programs. Last year, the cookie sales enabled the addition of the Archery program at Rio Blanco, the MAD (Music, Art, Drama) week for girls during the summer, besides the necessary improvement to the Wagons, the Tent units, and swimming pool.

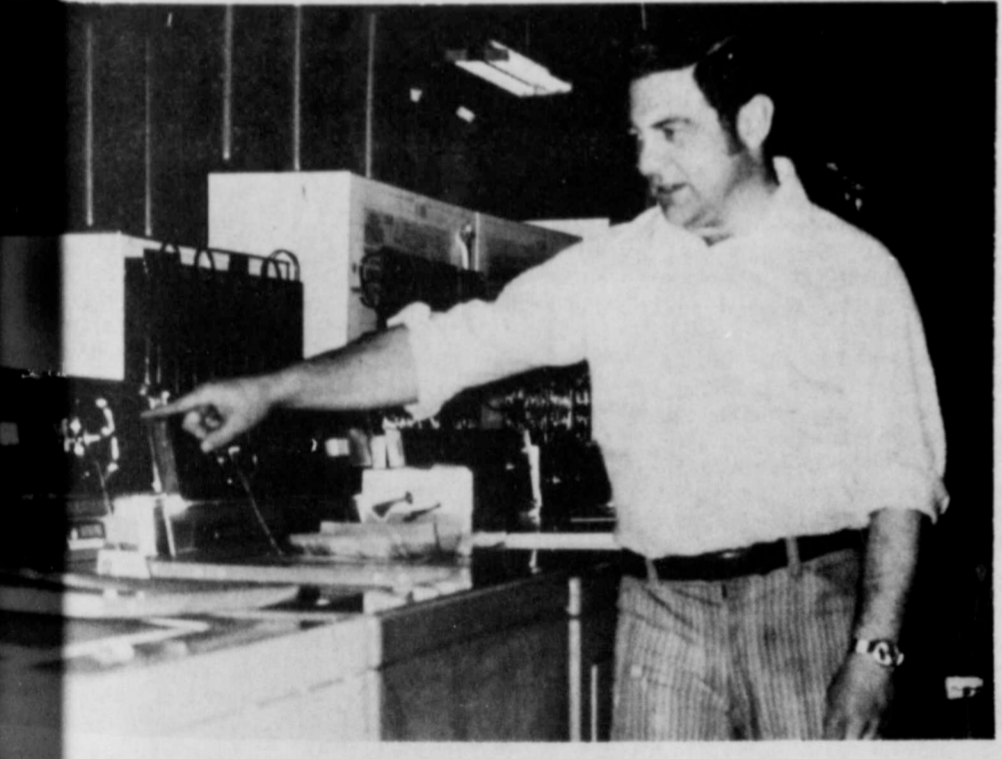

RECEIVED a letter from one of the "Blue Notes" thanking me for bringing back pleasant memories to her. Jeanie Hines Carpenter, who is with the Hays County Teachers Credit Union in San Marcos, is one of the former "Blue Notes" and is inquiring the whereabouts of Ruby L. Bevil, music and choir director of the group. If any readers know of Mrs. Bevil, get in touch with Jeanie at Box 1205, San Marcos, 78666.

ONE of my readers mentioned they thought Ann Swepton had just completed 32 years of teaching in the Floydada School System, having started her teaching career at Hillcrest. If this is so, and if my figures are correct she has taught in high school longer than any teacher there. I think Henry Barber was at high school the longest until he retired.

LOOKING back over some school history, I recall the late Homer Steen and Maud Hollums used to tell tales of their school days in Floydada. I think I remember them saying the first Floyd County school was started in 1890 and the first graduating ceremony was held in 1908. Mrs. Hollums said no boy-girl dates were allowed during the week and a student could not date his teacher, even though some teachers were only a year or so older than the student. The boys wore knee high pants and the girls short calico dresses until they reached the age of 16, then the boys were considered old

enough to wear long pants and the girls started wearing long dresses to the ankles with high button shoes and always silk sashes around the waists. Each student bought his own text book. There were no school or county libraries at that time. For entertainment the boys played town ball (whatever that was) and there was little social life for the youngsters, as there were no cars so most had to walk.

I BELIEVE the first school in Floydada was opened in 1890 with 20 students and one teacher. At the end of the year the enrollment had increased to 50 students and after the school population rose to 97. The first school structure proved to be inadequate and a larger frame building was erected in 1907. A large brick building was built in 1920 east of town which was used for high school and sixth and seventh grades. The 1907 school building burned in 1922. The first regular high school building was erected in 1924. This at the present time is now our Junior High building. In 1927 the curriculum included 31 subjects and 26 credits. The new high school was first occupied Jan. 21, 1957.

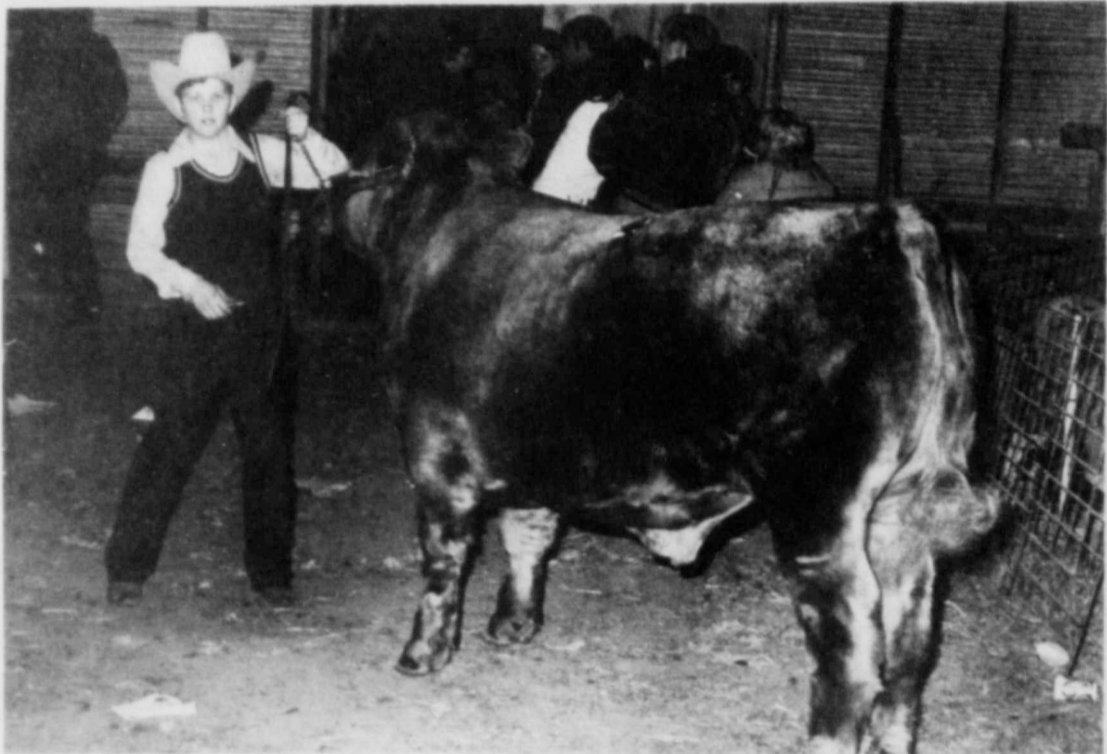

Last year, she was a teacher's aide in a full IPI program at a Plainview elementary school. Her own version began last fall when all students in her classes were tested in addition. Students able to perform satisfactorily on this test moved on to subtraction. Those remaining in addition worked many pages of problems until they too gave evidence of grasping that one area of mathematics. (This same process has been repeated as each student moves along to the next level of study — addition to subtraction, to multiplication, to division, to fractions, to decimals, to percentages and to geometry.)

Now, two students are studying geometry, and the others are scattered somewhere along the line. Mrs. Eitelman believes that this emphasis on one area at a time strengthens the basic skills, and then builds on them until greater math knowledge is achieved.

Grades? At intervals she gives tests to check on the individual student's comprehension of his studies. Grades

Entering the classroom, the student gets his instructions as to what he individually is to work on that day. The textbook is rarely used, and Lea Eitelman does not give lectures. The student copies problems from his area of study into a spiral notebook and gets to work solving the problems. If he ever needs help or further directions, he goes to her desk. Or another student may be asked to help explain some concept. (Lea says that fractions seem to be particularly hard for the students to understand and to relate to how they are used every day.)

At first, problems were often copied incorrectly into the notebooks, but this is not so much a problem now as the children are learning to concentrate better. Students check their own work against answer sheets. Mrs. Eitelman examines each student's notebook periodically to be sure that he is gaining an understanding of his work.

At least every two weeks, Lea leads the children in math games such as relays or multiplication bingo. Most enjoy these breaks, but a few would prefer to spend their time solving more problems and moving on to the next math skill.

No matter what area a student is working in, his grade can be as high or as low as his comprehension. Therefore, a student in geometry and a student in subtraction may be making the same grades. A score of 100 is possible if the student is doing well on his particular level of math.

If the student's work is individualized — then his tests must be individualized also. This is extra work for the teacher, who last week mimeographed seven different tests for her five classes, and then also used parts of each test for certain students. This meant she gave about 14 different tests.

Hightower Introduces More Bills

A bill involving predator animal control with the use of aircraft in Baylor, Foard, Wilbarger, Knox, Cottle, King, Dickens and Stonewall Counties was introduced in the Texas Senate Wednesday morning by Vernon Senator, Jack Hightower. In addition, Senator Hightower introduced seven other bills involving bail denial, admissibility of evidence in receiving stolen property cases, and licensing and bonding as related to motor fuels.

The proposed predator law authorizes the parks and wildlife department to issue permits for predator animal control by the use of aircraft in the eight named counties. The department will issue permits only when they find the action necessary to protect or to aid in the protection or administration of land, water, wildlife, livestock, domesticated animals, crops or human life. Birds or fowl are not included as predators under the proposed law.

A joint resolution amending the state constitution to permit the legislature to set the laws and rules governing the release or detention of prisoners awaiting trial or appeal was filed with two other bills in a comprehensive effort to lessen the number of crimes committed by criminals out on bond while awaiting appeal or trial. Senate Bill 244 by Hightower increases and names the offenses for which bail can be denied. Also filed by Hightower was a proposed law to aid, by broadening admissibility of evidence, in prosecution of persons accused of receiving stolen property.

The three bills involving the licensing, bonding and the issuance of tax permits were filed by Hightower at the request of the comptroller's office.

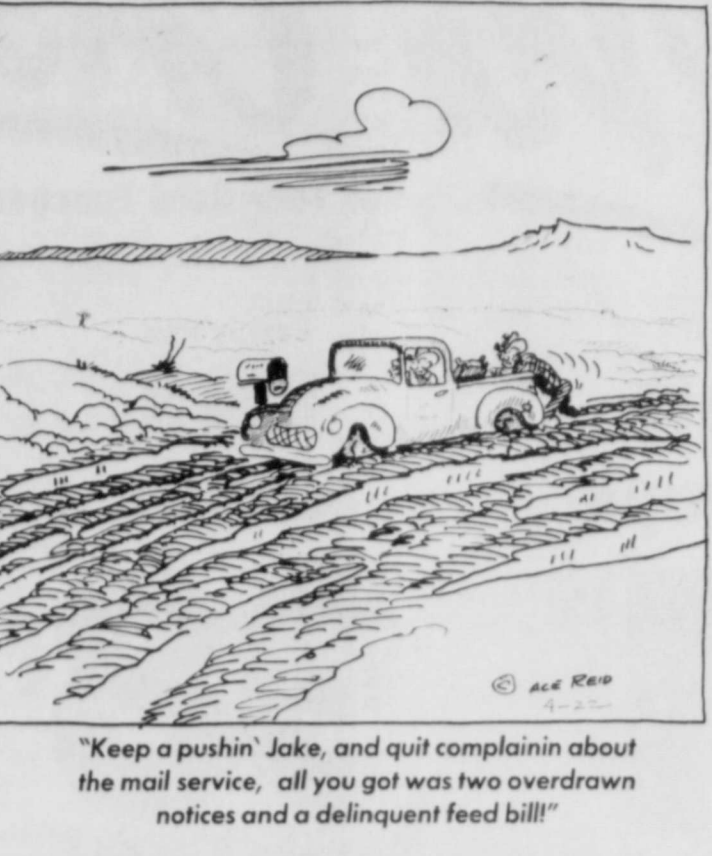

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

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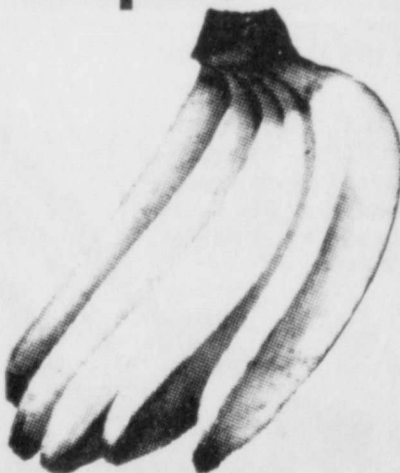
