

#### Controlling Cotton Seedling Disease

Cotton seedlings are sturdy little creatures, but wind, hail and disease do take heavy tolls of these young plants before they're able to mature. Weather, of course, is beyond man's control, but steps can be taken to reduce the toll exacted by seedling diseases.

This conclusion comes from Dr. Earl Minton, plant pathologist with the USDA. cooperating with the Texas Aricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock.

One of the important measures in disease prevention, he says, is the use of fungicides.

"A protectant chemical to control fungi not only evens the odds a bit against diseases, but it also helps the seedling's performance," Minton reports. He says that through studies

conducted at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, experiment station scientists and specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service annually prepare a list of fungicides for seedling disease prevention. These are revised each year, based on data gathered not only from the studies but from regional observations and supplementary seed treatment tests as well.

"Only those treatments hich caused the seed to perform better and which were specifically registered for use on cotton seed are included in the list of fungicides." Minton adds. "Some of them are Busan 72, Busan 72 + Demosan, Captan, PCNB + Dexon, Phenyl mercury acetate, Terracoat L21, Vetavax + Captain, and Vitavex +

"A protectant fungicide is particularly important this year," he emphasizes, "because of the unusual amount of reduced quality cotton seed. Although it will not compensate for the reduced quality, a fungicide will help protect the young seedlings from attack by disease producing pathogens found in both soil and the seed.

According to the research plant pathologist, best results are usually obtained if the seed treatment chemical contains a systemic fungicidal agent which will protect the entire plant from disease by moving




