Migrant Health Becomes Part Of South Plains Health Provider

On June 1 the Floyd County Migrant Health Project will become a component of a four-county regionalization program, South Plains Health Provider Organization. Other counties in the program are Hale, Crosby and Lamb. The Floyd County unit will still be located in the Floyd County courthouse, and the county will continue to participate in the program, according to staff RN Billie Jordan.

The same staff — Mrs. Jordan and Mrs. Evelyn Ulmer, RN's; Mrs. Beverly Kincer, secretary; Mrs. Amanda Torrez, nurse's aide, and sanitation inspector Choise Smith — will continue to perform the same health services for Floyd County people.

Services formerly provided by the Migrant Health Project, in the future to be provided by the Health Provider Organization, include immunization clinics, tuberculosis testing, water testing on private wells, and follow-up on possible rabid dog cases and other environmental problems.

David Oates, administrator for the South Plains Health Provider Organization, will have offices in Plainview.

Members of the temporary board particularly stressed that any voters who thought there might be a chance they would be out of town July 7 should vote absentee at city hall before July 2.

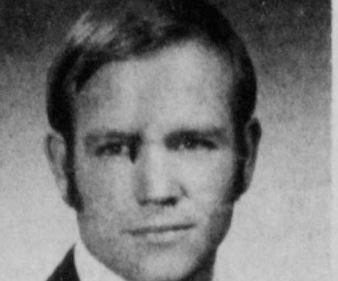
Llano Estacado Farm Workers Inc. Gets Economic Opportunity Grant

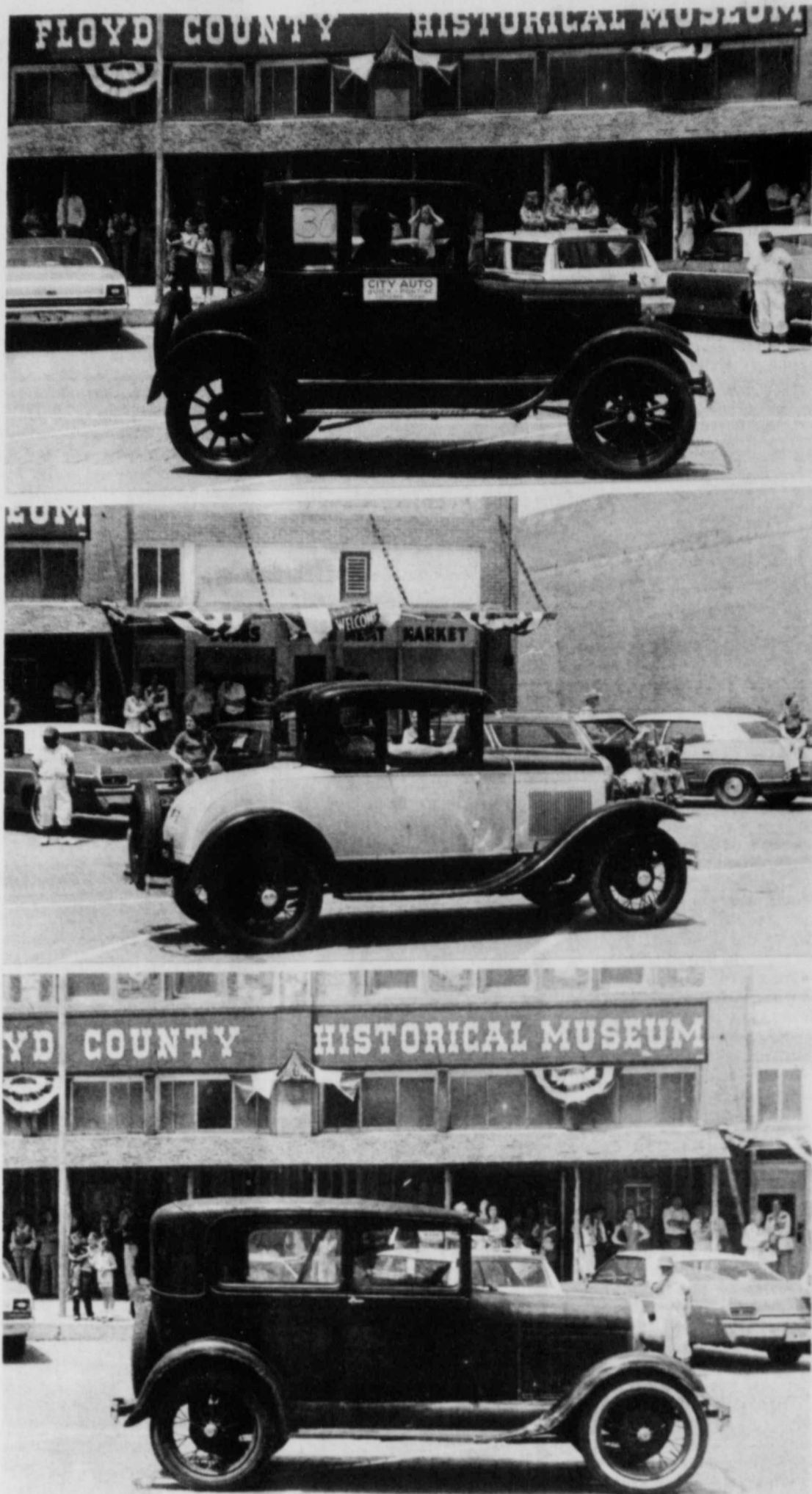

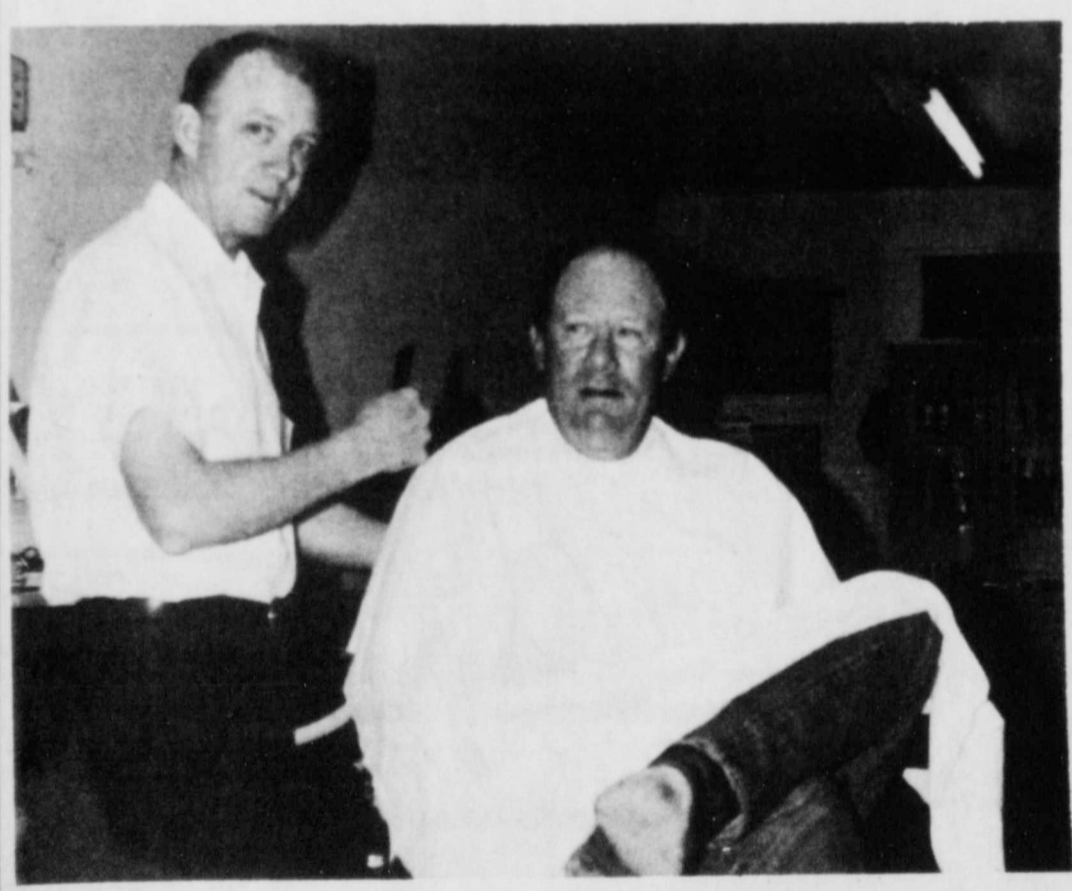

Methodist Conference To Meet On McMurry Campus

ABILENE — Several proposed constitutional amendments are expected to cause some debate when the 64th Session of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church meets on the campus of McMurry College, June 5-7.

The three-day session is being held at McMurry for the first time in history. McMurry College is owned by both the Northwest Texas and New Mexico Annual Conferences, and is celebrating its Golden Anniversary this year.

Ministers and laymen will be here representing more than 225 churches in the Northwest Texas Conference.

Bishop Alsie H. Carleton, resident bishop of the Northwest Texas-New Mexico Area, will preside over the conference which has announced this year's theme as "Heritage... Horizons."

Dr. Hilbert J. Berger, pastor of St. Andrew United Methodist Church of West Lafayette, Ind., will be the conference preacher.

The conference is expected to take action on eight amendments to the denomination's constitution referred by the 1972 General Conference.

One proposal would give laymen a vote on such matters as ordination, character, and conference relations of ministers.

Another proposed amendment would permit each of the 76 annual conferences in the 10.6 million member denomination to elect as many additional lay members as necessary to equalize lay and ministerial membership in the annual conference.

Another amendment would remove the 21-years-of-age qualification for delegates to General Conference.

Other amendments deal with boundary changes within the denomination, substitution of nouns and pronouns in the constitution and a provision to permit more frequent meeting of the general church body.

Dr. Berger's first sermon is set for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday (June 5) in Radford Auditorium. He will speak again at 2 p.m. Wednesday and again Thursday evening.

Ordination of deacons and elders will precede the reading of appointments during Thursday evening's session.

Two special multi-media presentations will highlight Wednesday's agenda. First, a presentation by the conference called "Sights and Sounds of Service" will be shown at 9 a.m. which will relate to all educational facilities in the conference, such as colleges, camps and special projects.

On Wednesday evening at 7:30 p.m., McMurry College will officially kick off its Golden Anniversary celebration with a multi-media theatrical presentation under the direction of Mrs. Muriel Burress, assistant professor of speech.

The presentation will cover the first 50 years of McMurry, moving in chronological order from the college's first president, Dr. J. W. Hunt, up until the present.

In addition to the proposed

amendments, serious consideration will be given to the conference council on ministries.

A special memorial service is set for seven ministers and 10 widows of ministers who have died since the last conference on Tuesday afternoon.

A "Dialogue with Berger" is scheduled at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday in the McMurry dining hall as all clergymen will be able to ask Dr. Berger questions on an informal basis.

Bishop Carleton will have breakfast with all laymen, laywomen and youth in the Fellowship Hall of Aldersgate Methodist Church at 7 a.m. Wednesday with the same format as the "Dialogue with Berger."

Dr. Darris L. Egger, Abilene District Superintendent, is serving as the host DS, while Dr. Bert Affleck of McMurry is the host Campus Minister.

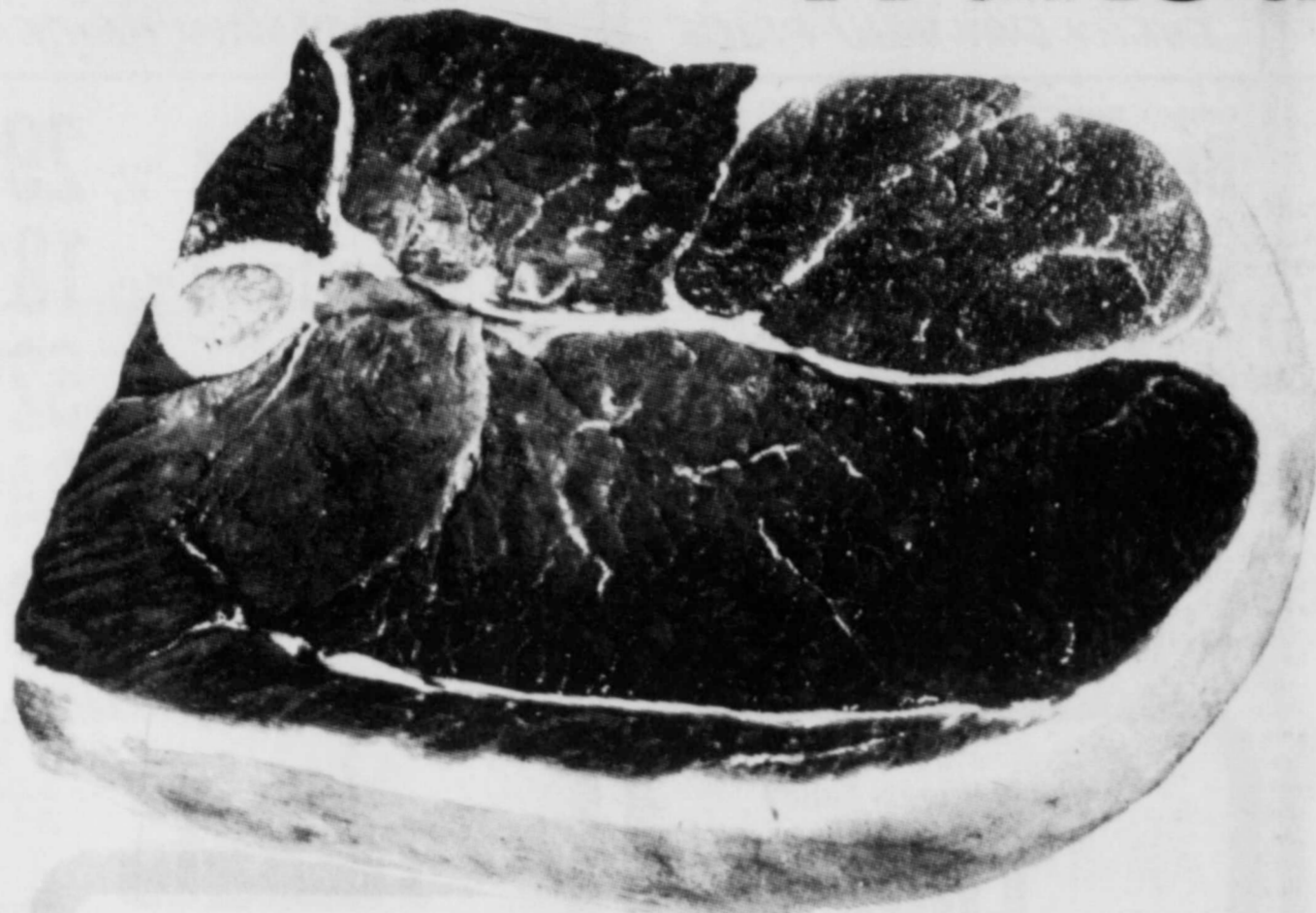

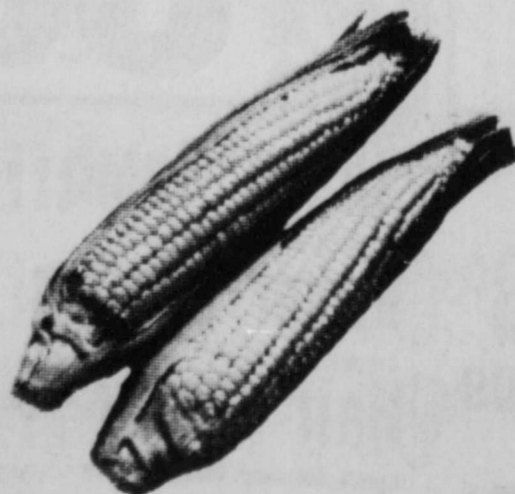

Controlling Cotton Seedling Disease

Cotton seedlings are sturdy little creatures, but wind, hail and disease do take heavy tolls of these young plants before they're able to mature. Weather, of course, is beyond man's control, but steps can be taken to reduce the toll exacted by seedling diseases.

This conclusion comes from Dr. Earl Minton, plant pathologist with the USDA, cooperating with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock.

One of the important measures in disease prevention, he says, is the use of fungicides.

"A protectant chemical to control fungi not only evens the odds a bit against diseases, but it also helps the seedling's performance," Minton reports.

He says that through studies conducted at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, experiment station scientists and specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service annually prepare a list of fungicides for seedling disease prevention. These are revised each year, based on data gathered not only from the studies but from regional observations and supplementary seed treatment tests as well.

"Only those treatments which caused the seed to perform better and which were specifically registered for use on cotton seed are included in the list of fungicides," Minton adds. "Some of them are Busan 72, Busan 72 + Demosan, Captan, PCNB + Dexon, Phenyl mercury acetate, Terracoat L21, Vetavax + Captain, and Vitavax + Fthiram.

"A protectant fungicide is particularly important this year," he emphasizes, "because of the unusual amount of reduced quality cotton seed. Although it will not compensate for the reduced quality, a fungicide will help protect the young seedlings from attack by disease producing pathogens found in both soil and the seed."

According to the research plant pathologist, best results are usually obtained if the seed treatment chemical contains a systemic fungicidal agent which will protect the entire plant from disease by moving

upward in the plant stem as it continues to grow.

"Systemic chemicals such as Demosan, Vitavax and Terra coat L21 are probably the most effective protectant fungicides for the Oklahoma and Texas areas," he pointed out. "Demosan and Vitavax should be used as an overcoat with other fungicides."

"Planting at the right time is another important step to be taken toward protecting the young seedlings. Producers should be aware of the proper soil temperature necessary for seed germination before planting," explains Minton.

"Soil temperature taken at 8 a.m. daily at the eight-inch depth should average 60 degrees or higher for seven to ten days after planting. This results in rapid seed germination and seedling emergence, and increases survival chances since seedlings are more susceptible to disease during cool weather because of their inability to grow."

Concludes the pathologist, "Crop rotations are also recommended as a protective measure especially for cotton and grain crops. By rotating crops every year or two, the seedling diseases which are already in the soil will not have the chance to continually grow with each successive planting, and will eventually break down."

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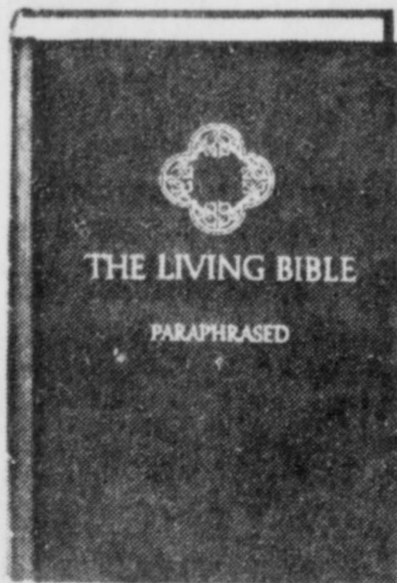
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Automobile Titles Stolen

Texas Wheat Producers Host Danish Flour Millers

The announced projection of a record U. S. wheat crop of 1.28 billion bushels and a projected 83.2 million bushels in Texas — the highest since 1961 — is prompting an "all out" and continuing effort to line up markets and buyers at home and abroad for the increase in order to turn the golden harvest into cash and profits for producers, according to Bill Nelson, Amarillo, Executive Vice President of the producer supported Texas Wheat Producers Board. As a part of this effort, three "trade teams" of potential foreign users are scheduled to converge on Texas wheat fields, country elevator operations and port facilities during the peak harvest period. They will come from Denmark, Brazil and Korea — all small, but rapidly expanding wheat market areas.

The first such team will be in Texas, May 31 through June 2. Members will include Mr. Erik Odum Jorgensen, Chief Buyer of Dansk Mel-Central, Odense, Denmark; Mr. Hans Christian Petersen, Vice Director, Havne-Mollen, Fredericia, Denmark; and Mr. Deni-Joseph White, Market Specialist, Great Plains Wheat, Inc., Washington, D. C. This groups principle interest in Texas will be to observe the export operations and wheat quality maintenance techniques at the Port of Houston, which handles seventy percent of all Great Plains area wheat which is exported, according to Nelson, who will join the foreign buyers in Houston and conduct conferences and on-the spot facility studies with members of the Houston

Merchants Exchange and officials of the Port of Houston.

U.S. Agriculture Attache, Harlan Dirks, stationed in the American Embassy in Copenhagen, who assisted with the team member selection, points out that "now is an ideal time for U.S. wheat interests to expand market development activities with the Danes. Over the past three years domestic regulations in Denmark have limited the blending of imported wheats with that countries own 24 million bushel production, but with their entrance to the EEC (Common Market) this year, it is reasonable to conclude that a substantial increase in imports will occur. It will be up to the U.S. wheat producer and trade groups to capture this growing market area for U.S. wheat."

Other wheat-area visits for the Danish visitors will include studies of various aspects of the total U.S. wheat production and marketing operations in Minnesota, North Dakota, Colorado, Kansas, Washington, D.C., and New York.

The 5-man Brazilian Wheat Board team will be in Texas, June 8-13 and in addition to the port area will study wheat production and marketing with local farm and grain trade groups in the Rolling Plains, Wichita Falls-Burkburnett-Vernon area.

The Texas Wheat Producers Board is acting as Texas host for the group. Sponsors of the U.S. tour are the Great Plains Wheat, Inc. (of which TWPB is a supporting member) and the Foreign Agricultural Service of USDA.

Keeping snakes away - The best way to keep snakes away from your home and yard is to make the premises less attractive to the creatures, says a wildlife specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Get rid of any cover and possible food sources and block access to your residence area. Trash piles and tall grass and weeds are favorite hiding places for snakes. Since snakes feed on small rodents such as rats and mice, these rodents should be eliminated from the premises.
